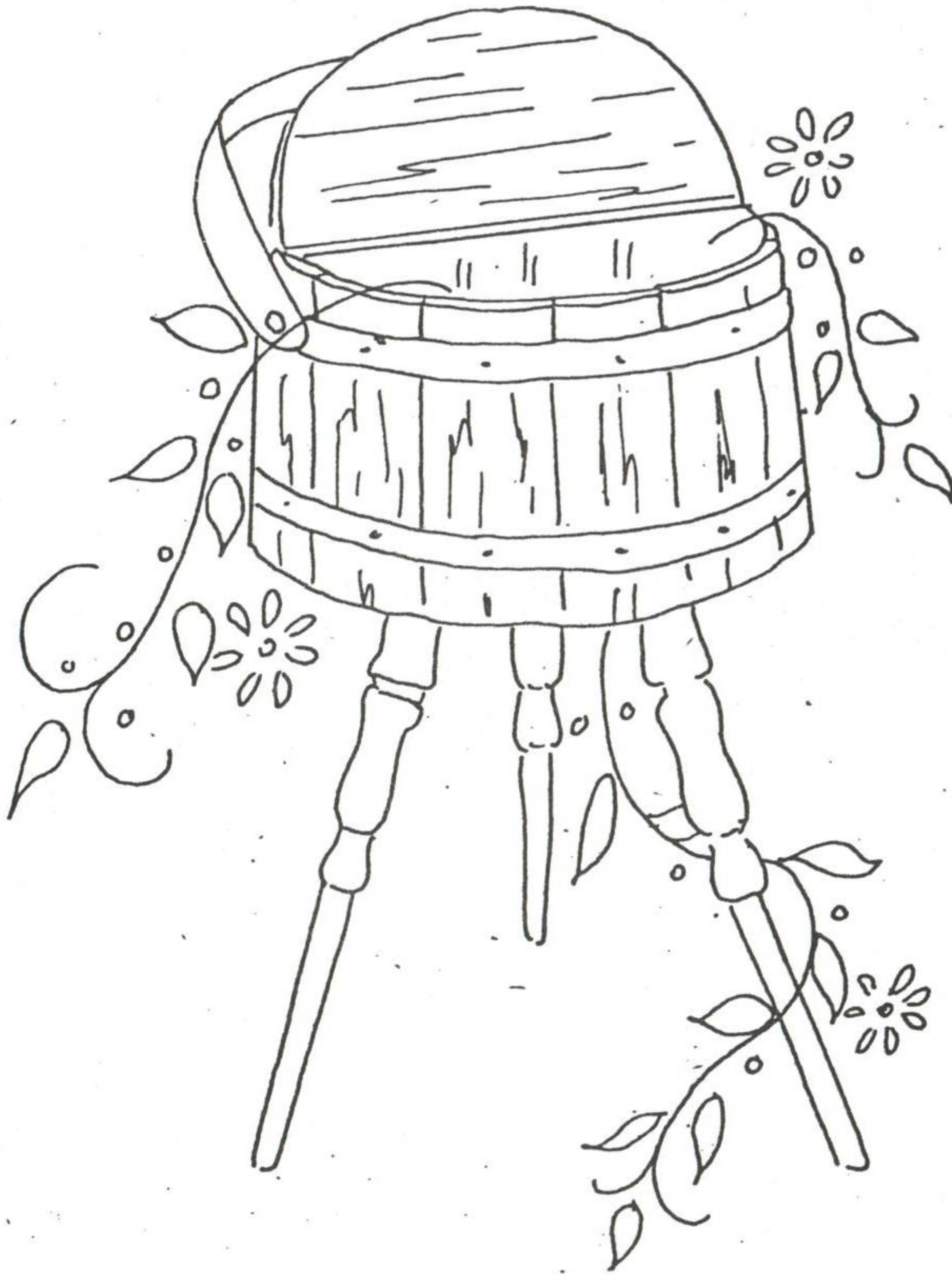

AROUND THE HOUSE

Don't discard your worn pillow cases. They make wonderful dust covers for clothing hung in closets. Just cut a hole in the middle of the closed end and pull the hanger hook through.

What's the key to making tender piecrust?

It's simply accurate measurement of ingredients, to ensure the correct balance of fat and flour, not too much liquid. Too much flour will give you a tough crust. Too much fat results in a greasy, crumbly crust. Too much liquid will require the excess flour that results in a tough crust.

What is the correct temperature for serving table wines?

The rule: White wines are served chilled to about 45 to 50 degrees F., which takes about two hours in the refrigerator. Chilling them to a lower temperature greatly diminishes flavor. Always serve red wines at room temperature, about 60 to 70 degrees F., to enjoy their aromatic qualities. Uncork about one hour before serving so the wine's bouquet develops fully.

Serve cheese at room temperature for maximum enjoyment. About 30 minutes to one hour before serving, remove the cheese from the refrigerator to restore full flavor and bouquet. The exceptions to the rule are the fresh (no aged) cheeses - cottage, creamed, and Neufchatel - which should always be served at refrigerator temperature.

For hard-cooked eggs without peeling problems, poach the eggs until they are firm and fully cooked, then drain and chop for salads. Fresh hard cooked eggs are almost impossible to peel without leaving half the egg clinging to the shell.

REVITALIZING MASK

- 1 teaspoon honey
- 1 whole egg, lightly beaten
- $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon brewer's yeast
- $\frac{1}{4}$  teaspoon lemon juice

Mix all ingredients until well blended. Apply to face. Lie down for 15 minutes. Rinse with cool water.

What's the value of a homemaker these days? A lawyer reports that the value of the average homemaker is \$793.79 a week or over \$41,000 a year. According to the study the average homemaker performs at least 22 separate functions, ranging from cleaning woman and cook to chauffeur and nurse. But the greatest amount of time in any week - 168 hours on average-is spent on child care. At even a token dollar an hour, this amounts to almost \$9,000 a year.

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GUNNY SACK PARADE. Epithetical description of unemployed married men who lined up with bags (or gunny sacks) to receive their quota of food and shelter-and-food tokens. This was a common sight in Vancouver during the Depression.

The seven hours or more a woman spends cleaning house - at the minimum rate of \$3.21 an hour - adds up to \$24 a week; 13 hours as a cook - at \$4.75 an hour is another \$62 a week. While the three hours a week, on average, that a wife spends acting as maid/hostess for her husband - at \$20 an hour - adds another \$60 to her "wage bill."

Some other dollar values for housework are:

- Laundress 5 hr. x \$3.10 = \$18.29
- Gardener 2.3 hrs. x \$5 = \$11.50
- Caterer 1.5 hrs. x \$7.71 = \$11.57
- Dishwasher 6.2 hrs. x \$3.10 = \$19.22
- Secretary 2 hrs. x \$5 = \$10.00

The lawyer intends to use these figures as the basis for his clients' claims in future divorce settlement cases.

If you own a food processor, you know that some foods you chop tend to stick to blade edges. It helps to spray metal knife blades with a nonstick pan spray or to coat them with a bit of salad oil before putting in the food.

Handy idea for hardware storage: It's sometimes hard to find which container has the nuts, bolts, hangers, or nails, when they're all stored in coffee cans and other nontransparent holders. Tape one of the items to the top of the can. You could label the containers, but seeing the specific piece is quicker.

### HERE'S ERMA

My children insist that I introduced the word "No" to the Western world. It's a distinction I don't deserve though. I am sure that I'm not the first mother in North America to use the word "No". In fact, there is no doubt in my mind that when historians decipher cave markings of prehistoric cave dwellers and discover etched in a rock a plaintive, "Mom! Can I eat the leftover bear? her response chiseled below will translate into, "No! I'm saving it for lunch!"

REGISTERED RETIREMENT SAVINGS PLANS

Whether we like it or not, someday we will all have to retire and live on our pensions. With today's ever increasing prices, how can we be sure we will have enough income at retirement? One way to do it is to invest in Registered Retirement Savings Plans through a trust company, bank, credit union or other financial institution.

An RRSP is a savings plan in which you can invest money for your retirement, and at the same time, defer tax on your contributions. This money earns interest (tax free) in the plan while it is open, to give you more money at retirement. The only time you pay tax on this money is when you close a plan and receive the total amount in it, make a withdrawal from it, or use it to buy an annuity for yourself.

Your RRSP can be managed in two ways - by the issuer of the plan, or by yourself. Having your plan administered and managed by a financial institution is the easiest and most popular method. In order to get the best plan available, you should shop carefully and compare what different financial institutions offer. Some points to consider are listed here:

- costs to open and/or close a plan
- monthly or yearly administration fees
- do you have to buy an annuity with that company (i.e. is there a penalty if you don't)
- past performance of the plan (rate of return)
- how long are rates guaranteed, and how often is interest credited to you
- options available in the plan for your investment dollars
- are withdrawals permitted, with how much notice, and is there a cost

If you choose a self administered plan, you must register it with a government approved trustee and pay that trustee an administration fee. The only difference in this kind of a plan is that you control where your money is invested. Keep in mind, though, that only certain investments are allowed in RRSPs to make them tax deductible. Check with your district tax office for more details.

When you are comparing plans, don't forget to look at the Service RRSP. It is one of the best plans available today. You can get information on it from your local SISIP/SRRSP adviser.

Remember too that you can have more than one RRSP as long as your total contributions to all your plans do not exceed your limit.

Once you have a plan open, the next step is to contribute to it. For those in the Forces, the limit is 20% of your earned income or \$3,500, whichever is less. From this you must subtract your CFSA and CPP/QPP contributions to come up with your allowable contribution. This figure is on your T4 slip, or if you don't want to wait that long, your accounting officer can give you a rough estimate of what your CFSA and CPP/QPP contributions are. You have 60 days after the end of the year to contribute to an RRSP and be able to claim a deduction for the current tax year. Contributions made after the first 60 days may only be claimed in the next tax year.

Your spouse may also have an RRSP, whether or not he/she has income. If your spouse works for a company that has a pension plan, the contribution limits are the same as yours, the lesser of 20% of income or \$3,500 minus contributions made to the company plan. Should your spouse be self employed, or not belong to a pension plan, the limit is the lesser of 20% of income or \$5,500. You may contribute to either your plan or your spouse's, or both, as long as the total contribution to both does not exceed your contribution limit. The advantage of contributing to your spouse's plan (especially a non working spouse) is that in your retirement years, you will be able to spread the tax between the two of you instead of having it all come off one income. In addition, each of you may receive up to \$1,000 a year of pension income tax free from your RRSP annuity after age 65, so it makes sense to have a plan for both you and your spouse.

If you find yourself short of money in January and February (and who doesn't?) you can borrow money to put into your RRSP. The interest you pay on this money is tax deductible, except if you use the money to contribute to your spouse's plan. However, the best way to contribute is a little at a time, as that is easier on the pocket book. Also, since your money is in the plan sooner, it earns interest sooner.

In order to claim a deduction for your RRSP, you must have a receipt from the issuer of your plan. Should you not have your receipt by April 30, you should file your tax return without claiming the deduction. Then, when you do get the receipt, send it along with a letter explaining the situation to your Taxation Centre, who will adjust your return. And don't forget to include your name, address, SIN and account number.

Should you have any questions on RRSPs that are not answered in this article, contact your local taxation office. Next month the subject of how to make the best choice for receiving your retirement income will be discussed.

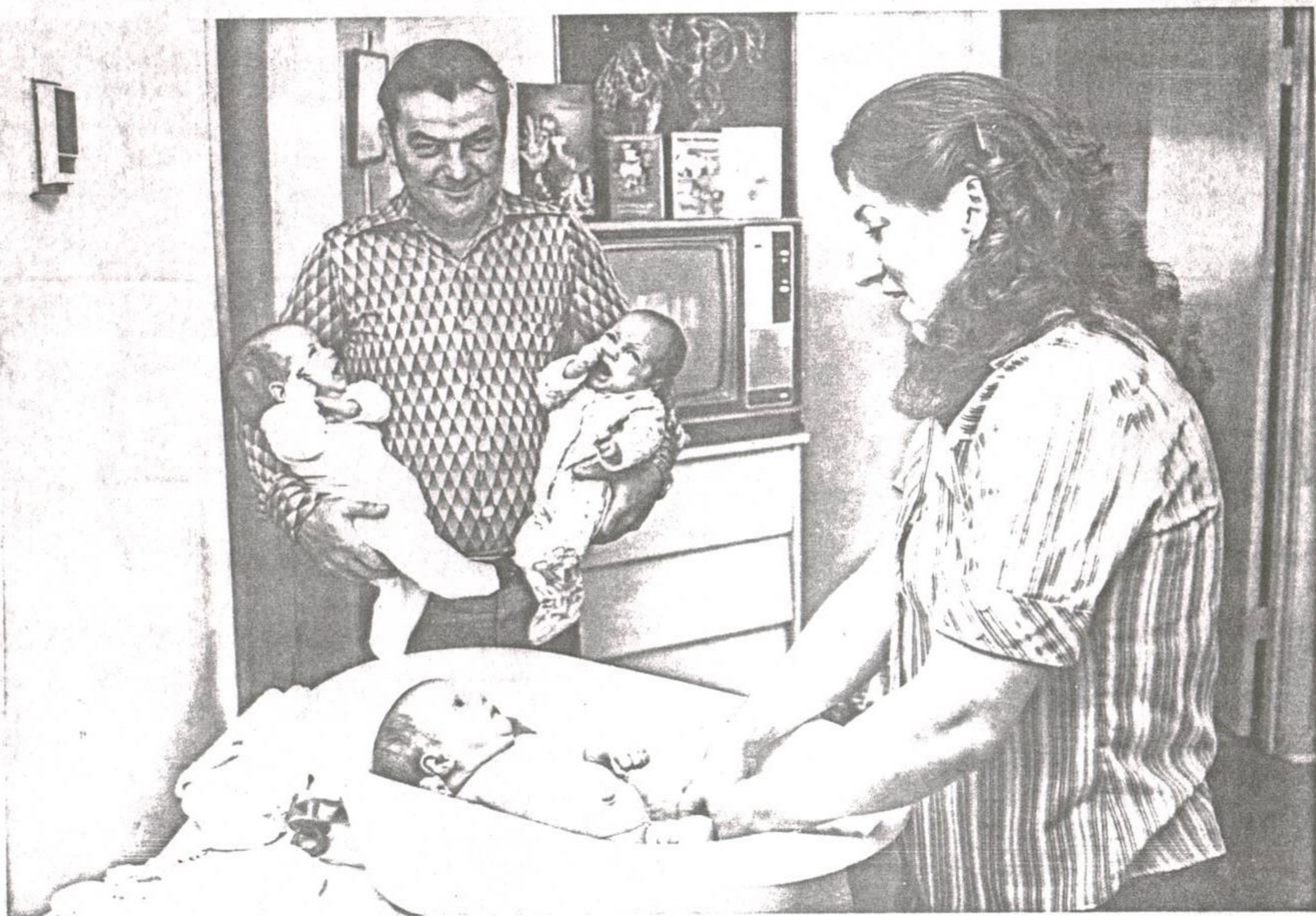

HAZARDOUS KETTLES

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) is warning owners of electric kettles to be on the lookout for a possible hazard.

During the past several months thirteen kettles have reportedly exploded in Canada. Production of the kettles involved was discontinued in September 1977.

CSA is urging the public to check the base of their kettle for serial numbers which will reveal whether or not their kettle may be hazardous.

The bases of the failing kettles bear the numbers 10, 11, 14 or 16 together with either of the following:

- (1) CSA number LR 37933 with a red four digit number between 6100 and 7275.
- (2) CSA number LR 26791 with no red four digit number

The kettles were manufactured by ETM (1976) Ltd., 857 Fenmar Drive, Weston, Ontario M1L 1C8.

CSA is warning people who own these kettles to stop using them.

HAZARDOUS COFFEE MAKERS RECALLED

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and the Sunbeam Corporation (Canada) Ltd., are warning owners of some Sunbeam coffee makers to stop using them immediately because of a potential shock hazard.

During a routine quality audit, Sunbeam personnel found a manufacturing error which resulted in substandard electrical spacing. In some instances, the spacings may be so narrow that the metal warming plate may become electrically alive. To date, CSA has received no reports of injuries.

Approximately 2000 units of this new product have been distributed across Canada since September 1980.

The coffee makers can be identified by the following marking die-stamped faintly on the bottom of the product:

Model CM-2  
125V AC 60 Hz 1300 Watts  
Sunbeam Corporation (Toronto) Ltd.  
LR 42804  
(CSA Monogram)  
Made in Hong Kong  
(Date Code) "GE" & "SE"

If you have one of these coffee makers, STOP USING IT IMMEDIATELY and take or send the product to one of 23 Sunbeam Appliance Service Company locations in the following major cities for immediate repair while you wait:

This problem exists only with model "CM-2" and date code "GE" and "SE". No other Sunbeam models or date codes are affected.

Units which have been repaired and corrected new products can be identified by the letter "S" marked on the bottom of the product and on the outside of the carton.

COFFEE MAKER WARNING

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and the manufacturer are warning owners of Proctor-Silex Automatic Drip Coffee Makers to be aware of a possible fire hazard.

During the past several months a number of coffee makers reportedly caught fire. These coffee makers were manufactured in Canada by Proctor-Silex and were sold exclusively in Canada bearing the Proctor-Silex label and the CSA mark. Investigations by the manufacturer have indicated that in most cases the fires have been caused by improper servicing or tampering with the electrical system. All of the fires occurred with coffee makers made before December 1976.

If your coffee maker has been serviced, repaired or the bottom plate removed for any reason by anyone at any time, use of your coffee maker should be discontinued immediately and it should be returned to Proctor-Silex Re-inspection Centre, P.O. Box 2100, Picton, Ontario K0K 2T0 for free re-inspection and/or repair. Please return only your base unit. Do not forward the accessories or glass carafe.

In addition, although the investigation to date has not revealed a defect in design which may result in a hazardous condition, if there is a malfunction or concern of any kind with respect to your coffee maker, to aid in a continuing monitoring of these coffee makers, you are urged to return your coffee maker for a free safety inspection.

HAZARDOUS PORTABLE HEATERS RECALLED

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and Ohm-Rite Electrical are warning owners of "ORLI MARK III" 1200W portable fan heaters with white enclosures to STOP USING THEM IMMEDIATELY due to a potential fire hazard.

CSA has recently learned of four fires involving these heaters. To date, all fires reported have been confined to the front grille area of the heaters. CSA has not been advised of any injuries or property damage.

If you have a white "ORLI MARK III" heater which has the following marking:

In the summer of 1944 in occupied France, Foxhound, a British agent operating from a village near Chartres, believes he has discovered a way to assassinate Field Marshal Rommel. He requests instructions. In Berlin, operation Valkyrie moves forward. It is the Generals' plot to assassinate Hitler, replace him with Rommel, and then seek a negotiated peace. Berne; Allen Dulles, of the OSS, is approached by a secret emissary from the generals'. Would the Allies negotiate if Valkyrie were carried out? London; Allied intelligence groups decide to reject Foxhound's plan but the Gestapo has blown his Resistance circuit. Foxhound has vanished. This story is based largely on fact, it is drawn from the clandestine operations during World War II.

QUEEN JEZEBEL - Jean Plaidy

When the citizens of France at last understood Catherine de'Medici, they compared her with Jezebel. This novel tells the full story of the Massacre of St. Bartholomew for which Catherine was mainly responsible. She was always striving to hide from the world, and herself, the fact that none of her children trusted her, no man or woman loved her, yet relishing the thought that all France feared her.

LOOK BACK ON DEATH - Lesley Egan

Jessie Falkenstein, prosperous L.A. Attorney/Private Eye is working on the case of the death of Louise Tredgold. Eight years ago she was killed and a jury had sent her nephew, Richard, to the penitentiary for the murder. Richard maintained his innocence and refused parole for a murder he did not commit. When the means to rational deduction led to dead ends, Falkenstein decided that a more unorthodox approach was called for: a seance to contact Louise Tredgold.

THE PARMA LEGACY - Dorothy Backer

This is the story of three women who live out the plights and delights of a woman's estate in the 17th century France. Nobel Catherine, peasant Martine, bourgeoisie Angelique are locked together by circumstances in their separate searches for identity. A mysterious treasure, the pearls of Parma, gleams through the story. A river of pearls with a life and history of their own.

MONTY - Robert La Guardia

Classically handsome, gifted, a legend before his death, Montgomery Clift created the mold for James Dean and Marlon Brando. Women literally screamed for him; critics acclaimed him, yet he died, at the age of forty-five, a haunted and broken man. Why did so promising a life end so tragically? Here, through years of research, interviews with his families and friends, illustrated with sixty photographs is the first in-depth biography of Montgomery Clift, a 1950's rebel on screen and off.

THIS SHAKING EARTH - John Gribbin

Earthquakes and volcanoes have always held a fascination for mankind. Within the next few years a major quake will almost certainly occur along California's San Andreas Fault. The author is a specialist in astronomy and earth sciences. He sets out the theory of continental drift and explains how earthquakes and volcanoes occur. There are 220 pictures from the archives of many nations as well as especially commissioned artwork.

THE SNOW LEOPARD - Peter Matthiessen

Peter Matthiessen and field biologist George Schaller set out from Pokharra, in Northwest Nepal, hoping to reach the crystal Mountain, a 250 mile journey, across the Himalaya, on the Tibetan plateau. Since they wished to observe the late-autumn rut of the bharal, or Himalayan blue sheep, they started thier journey as winter set in and five weeks were required to reach thier destination. Where bharal are numerous there was bound to appear that rarest and most beautiful of the great cats, the snow leopard. Hope of glimpsing this near-mythic beast in the snow mountains would be reason enough for the entire journey.

DEATH IN DARKENSS - Alec Whitney

Detective Bill Armstrong had been wrong before. Some of his hunches and instincts no longer carried much wieght with his superiors in the London police. But this case is different. A man has claimed he has kidnapped Prince Charles. He wants a large ransom or he will be killed with - in 8 hours. As the hours tick away and the Prince cannot be found, Armstrong manages to convince even Scotland Yard that the threat must be taken seriously.

THE DEAD ZONE - Stephen King

Johnny Smith is an ordinary man with a talent for teaching. An accident slams him into a coma that will last for 4½ years. When Johnny wakes up he finds he can scan the minds, the past and the future of certain people through a single touch. He is forced into the role of Cassandra - morally compelled to warn, and inevitably despised for his effort. One day he shakes the hand of an ambitious politician and is visited by a vision of a future so unspeakable that only he can believe its' truth.

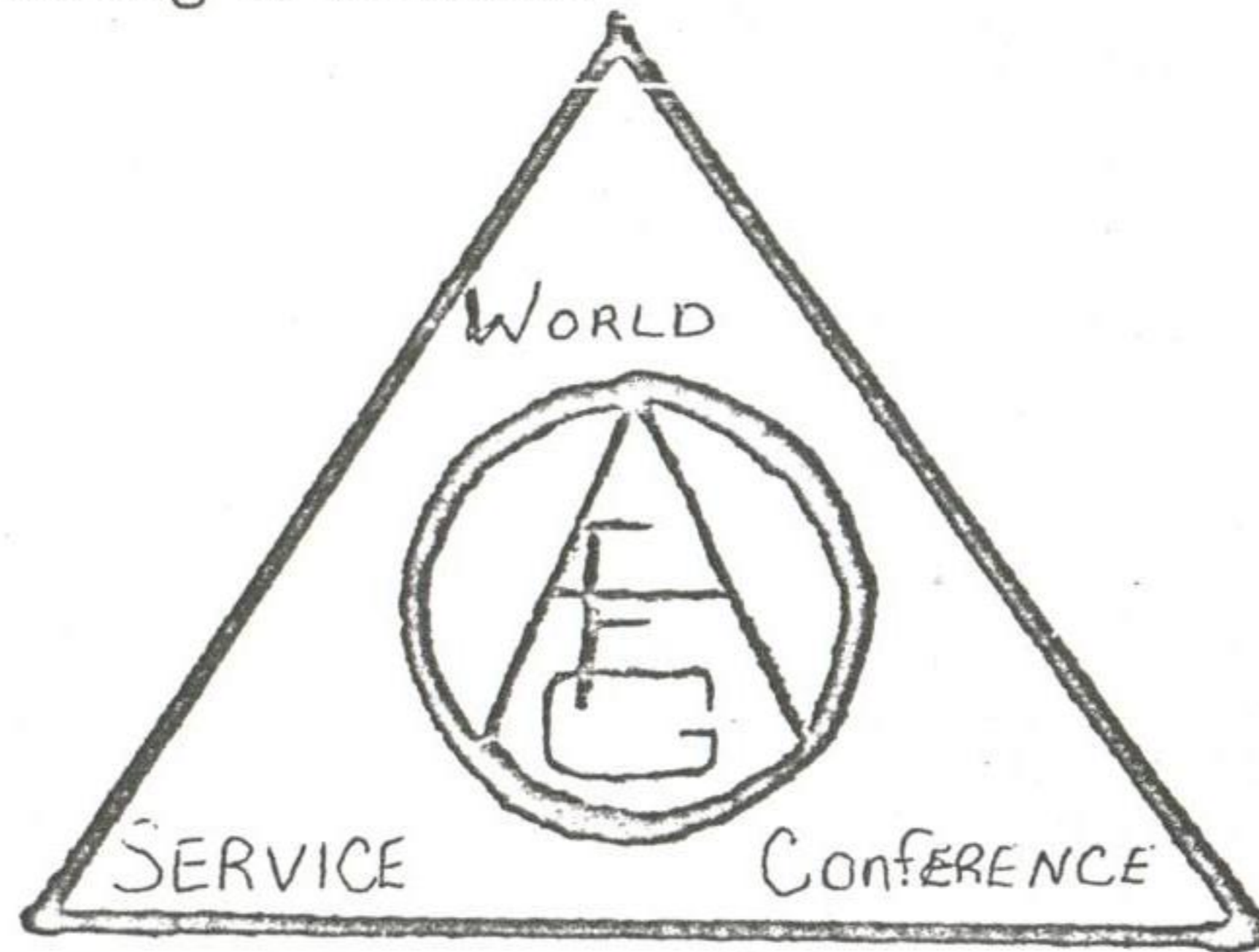
We, as Al-Anon members, would like our friends to be aware that alcoholism is an illness and it does affect not only the alcoholic but family and friends as well.

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in co-operation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50. to \$500. are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100. per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
