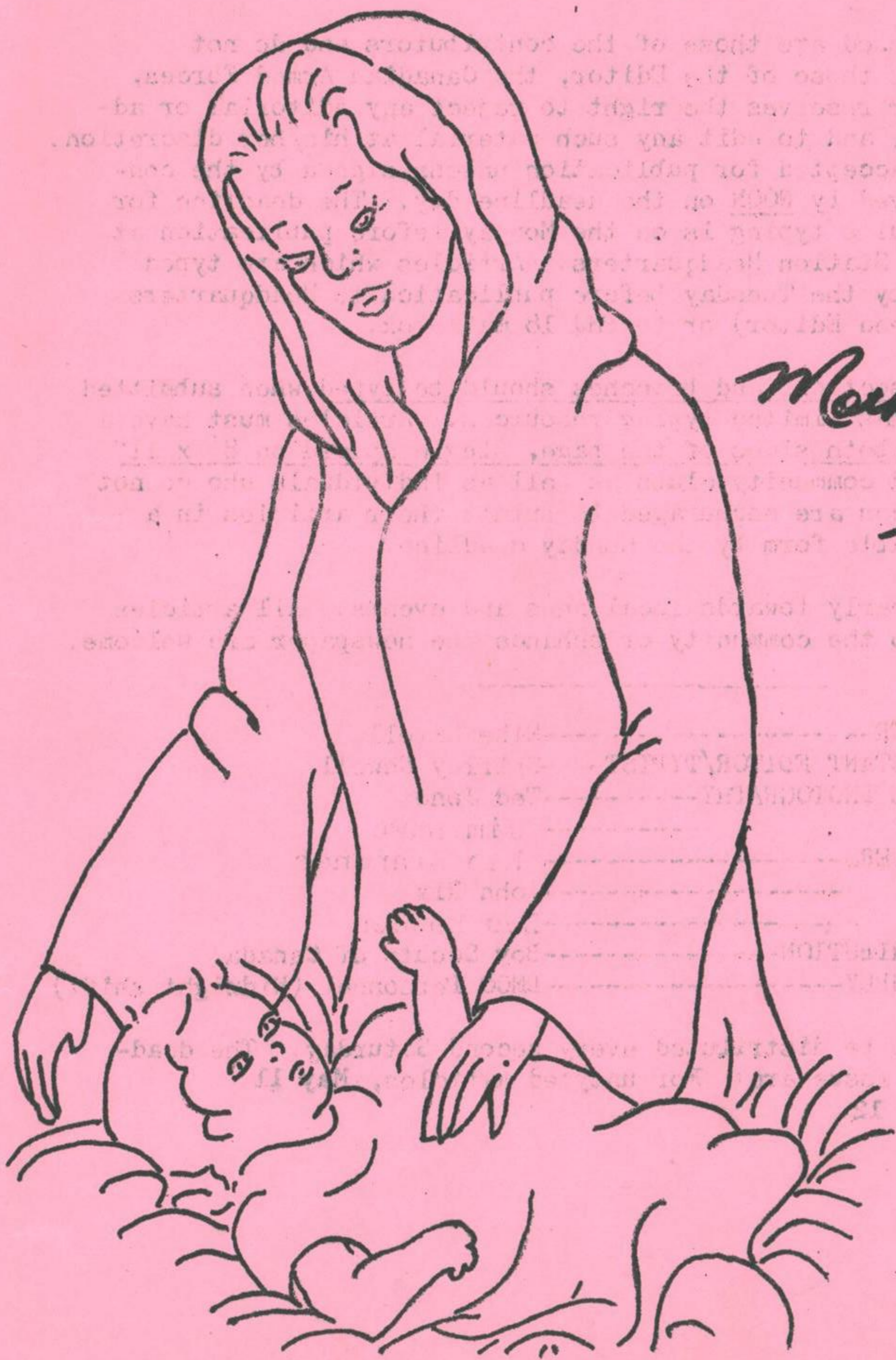

CHILD SAFETY WEEK 1-7 MAY 1981

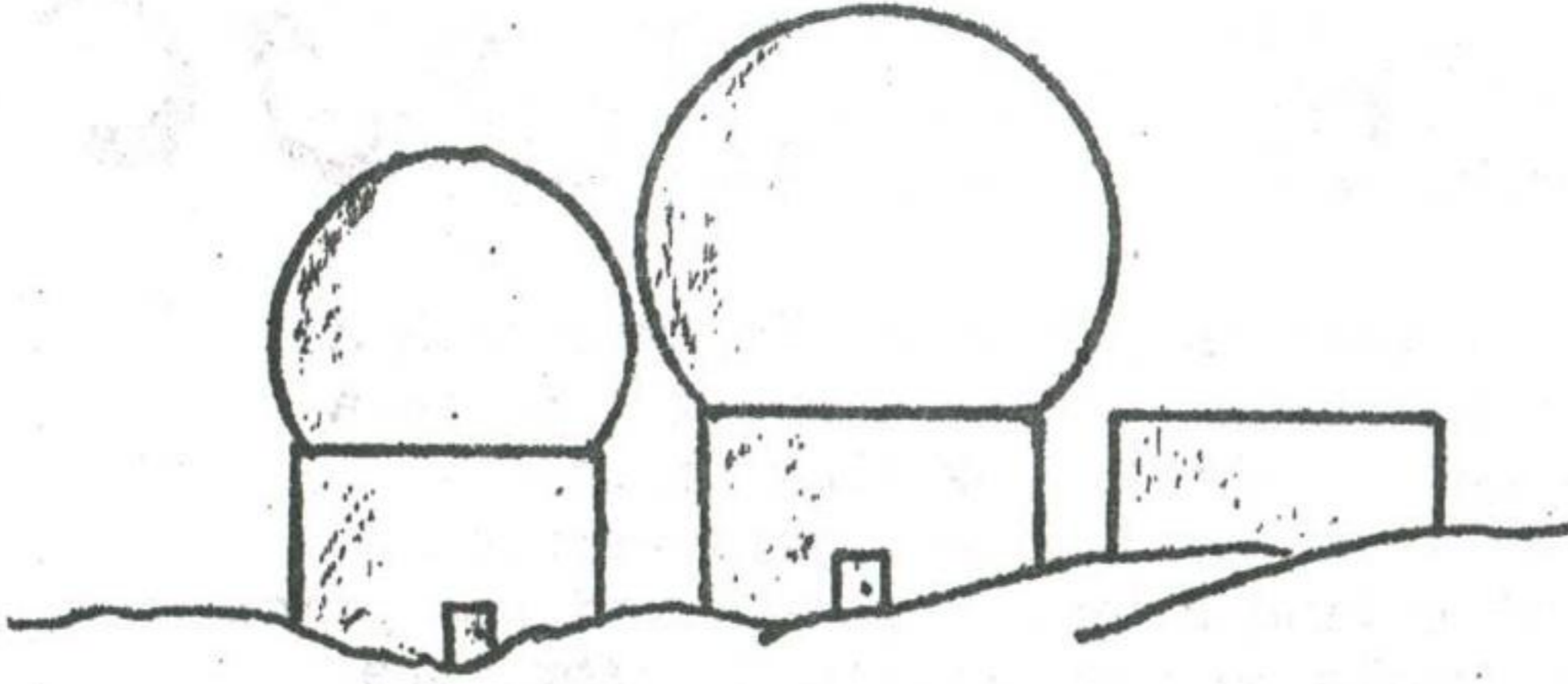
The following is a message from the Governor General of Canada:

BEAUTY TIPS

NIGHTTIME FACIAL SCRUB - For normal and combination skin that tends to blemish: $\frac{1}{2}$ cup rolled oats, 1 tablespoon corn meal, 1 teaspoon baking soda. For dry skin, eliminate baking soda. Combine ingredients in blender. Blend until oatmeal is finely flaked. Splash face with hot water. Lather any pH balanced cleanser in hands. Mix in 1 teaspoon of scrub and massage face and neck. Rinse with warm water. Pat skin dry. Apply safflower oil to dry areas.

WHEAT GERM MASK (oily skin) - Mix 1 tablespoon wheat germ powder with 1 tablespoon yogurt. Apply to complexion. Leave on for 15 minutes. Rinse with cool water.

REFRESHING LOTION - Mix together 3 ounces cucumber juice, 3 ounces distilled witch hazel, and $1\frac{1}{2}$ ounces rose water. Place in a jar. Refrigerate. After cleansing face, soak a cotton ball with lotion and gently pat over skin.

ROUGH SKIN SLOUGHER - Mix 1 cup sea salt with enough baby oil or olive oil to form a moist, grainy texture. While in the shower, wet skin, then massage mixture over rough flaky areas.

NO MESS MOISTURIZER - Fill a plant atomizer with three parts moisturizing lotion to one part water. After bathing or showering, spray your body with the mixture. Pat skin dry.

QUICK NAIL DRY - To dry nail polish in seconds, without investing in a "quick dry" product, spray with a cooking oil spray, like Pam.

PAINLESS PLUCKING - Numb eyebrows by applying baby teething cream before plucking.

EMERGENCY DANDRUFF TREATMENT - Dissolve 10 to 15 aspirin tablets in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup warm water. Gently massage into scalp. Leave on 15 to 20 minutes. Rinse thoroughly. Repeat in a few days if needed.

HAIR REVITALIZER - When there's no time to shampoo, revive curly hair that's gone limp by steaming it. Add a teaspoon of vinegar to a quart of boiling water. Turn off heat. Lean head over steam, six inches away, until hair is slightly damp. Style as usual.

AT-HOME EXERCISE EQUIPMENT - Fill two empty gallon milk jugs with water and use for arm exercises, the way you would use weights. Great for firming up arms.

PERFECT SET - If your electric rollers don't stay in place with regular wire clips, or you've lost the clips, use plastic "jaw" clamps, they're faster to use and rollers stay secure.

SALMON PUFFS

4 eggs beaten
1/2 lb salmon
small onion
salt & pepper
3/4 cup flour
1 tsp baking powder
Beat together, drop by spoonful into deep fat. Serve with mushroom or tomato soup. Also great as a fondue.

SLUSH PUNCH

4 cups sugar }
6 cups water } boil 5 minutes
and cool
add 1 pkg Knox gelatin
juice 5 oranges, 2 lemons
5 bananas mashed
Add 5 cups pineapple juice
Freeze.
Take out 1 hr before use and let it get slushy.
Add 3 large gingerale and 1 pkg frozen strawberries.
NOTE: I use less sugar and find it more to my liking.

LEMON SNOW

1 envelope gelatin dissolved in 1/2 cup cold water.
Dissolve 2 cups sugar into 1 cup boiling water. Add gelatin.
Add 3/4 cup lemon juice, grated rind of 2 lemons.
Add 3 cups cold water.
Freeze until solid.
When ready to use, whip with mixer until fluffy like snow.
(1/2 glass of mixture to 1/2 glass gingerale)

They travelled at high speeds to deter possible hijackers and to lessen demurrage, so valuable was their cargo.

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Mr. D.R.B. McArthur, Chairman, Metric Commission Canada (MCC) addressed the 7th Annual Conference of the American National Metric Council in Washington, D.C. today 1981-04-13. Mr. McArthur noted that the Canadian government had confirmed its commitment to the policy that "a single coherent measurement system based on metric units should come to be used for all measurement purposes required under legislation, and generally be accepted for all measurement purposes." McArthur told 230 attendees from the United States and Canada that Canadians will complete the metric conversion of retail food store scales over a carefully scheduled period of two years starting on 1982-01-01.

Metric conversion continues in accordance with the plans and schedules prepared by the various sectors of the Canadian economy with the assistance of Metric Commission Canada. As of 1981-04-02, 92 of 102 sector plans have been approved by the Commission for publication. The Commission itself has held 61 meetings in cities all across Canada since it first met in Ottawa in 1972.

In spite of reluctance from a minority of corporate interests and regional groups in relation to retail food scale conversion, the Chairman of MCC noted that cooperation from industry at all levels, as well as with provincial and territorial governments has generally been good. The strong support of the majority of Canadians will ensure Canada's future in a world that has gone metric.

SISIP - COVERAGE AFTER RELEASE

Reference: A. 5479-15-2 (ADM(Per)) dated 6 June, 1980

1. Attached at Annex A is an extract of Reference A, a motion, by the Service Insurance Board of Trustees, to introduce a new post release insurance plan. The new plan is to replace the current Post Retirement Continuation Plan which suffers from the following shortcomings:
 - a. an annual rather than a monthly premium;
 - b. SISIP members would prefer non-diminishing rather than diminishing term insurance; and
 - c. the qualifying period, to obtain PRCP of 15 years service prior to release, is excessive.
2. The motion gave D Comp D authority to proceed with the development of a new plan to be introduced effective 1 January, 1981, subject to final secretarial approval of the rate by the Board.
3. During the period since the Board meeting the following changes have been made which require your agreement:
 - a. TITLE - The title of the Plan has been changed to SISIP - Coverage After Release, which more accurately communicates the purpose of the coverage;
 - b. The SISIP - CAR allows members to convert all SISIP life insurance coverage, held prior to release, to the "CAR" and individual policies;
 - c. UNDERWRITING - It is now being recommended that the Plan be "experience rated" with a "stop-loss" policy; this in effect means that the SISIP's liability as a result of poor experience is limited and that the insurer, Maritime Life, is responsible for liabilities beyond a set amount. Underwriting on a "fully-pooled" basis means that Maritime assumes any surplus. Since it is anticipated the Plan will generate a surplus, it is felt that the underwriting should be such as to return the surplus to the Plan;
 - d. The premium rate has been reviewed and amended such that it is now considered, by Maritime Life and Wm M. Mercers, to be the best possible rate which we could offer and yet guarantee the financial security of the Plan. The rate structure compares very favourably with other non-diminishing term insurance plans; and
 - e. The Plan was to be introduced effective 1 January, 1981; this did not allow sufficient time to complete the necessary negotiations with the insurer and yet have your final approval to proceed with implementation.

THE TIME OF MY DEATH - ALAN JEFFRY BRESLAU

It was a routine flight to Rochester, N.Y. Alan Breslau thought it was odd that the plane would take off in a severe thunder storm, but he was a seasoned traveler, so he fastened his seat belt and relaxed in his seat just behind the cockpit. That was his last moment of relaxation for a long time. The plane rose a hundred feet into the air, shuddered, flipped on its side, and crashed. THE INVASION OF CANADA - 1812-1813 - PIERRE BERTON

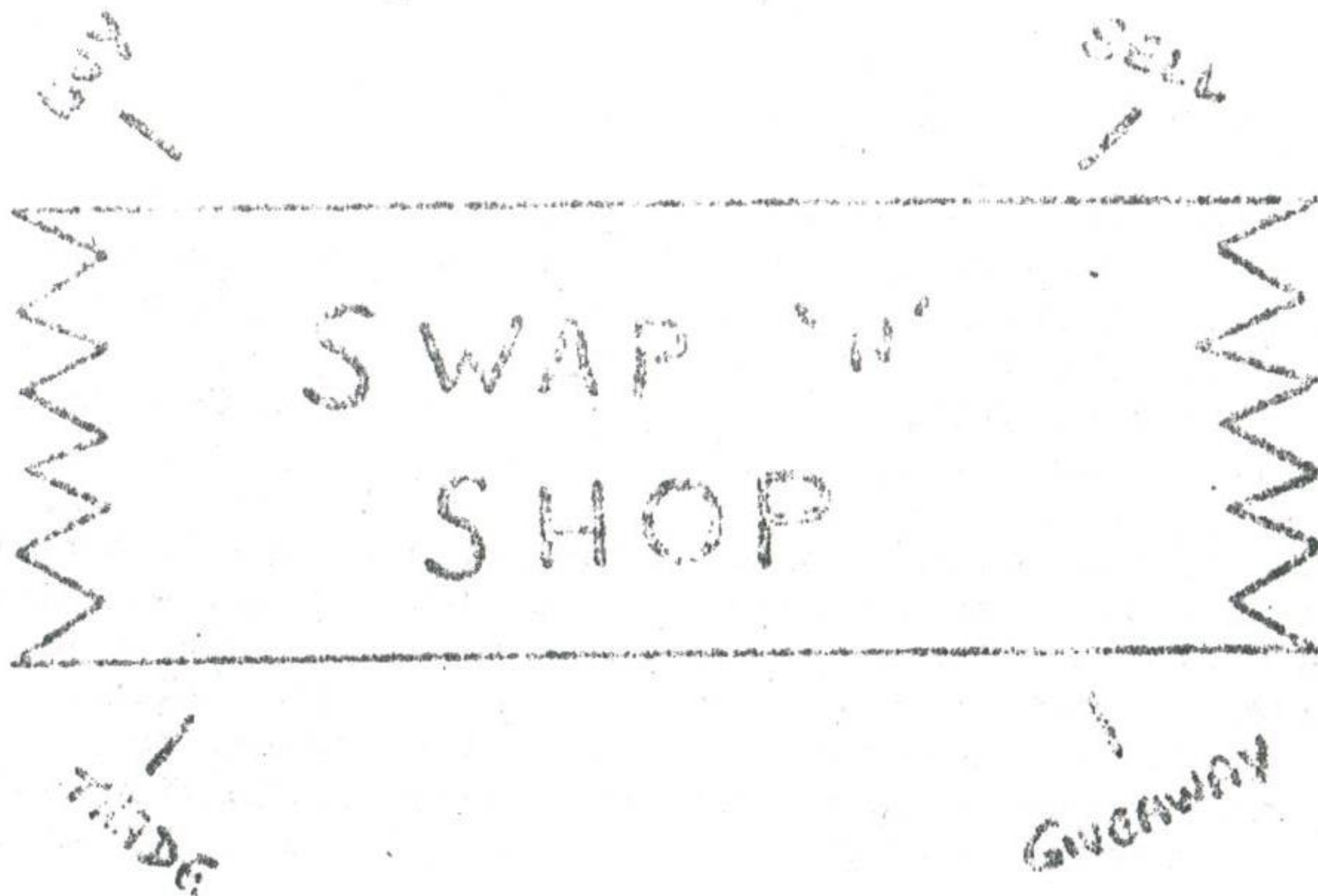

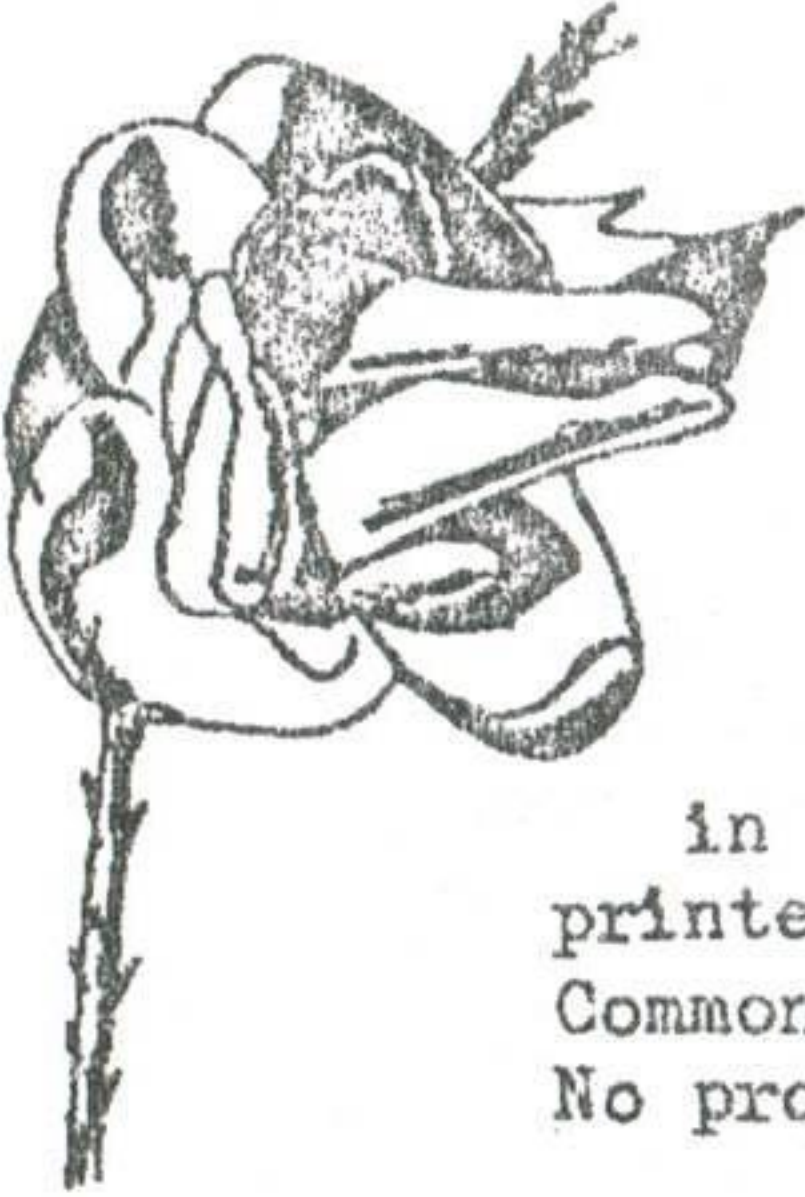

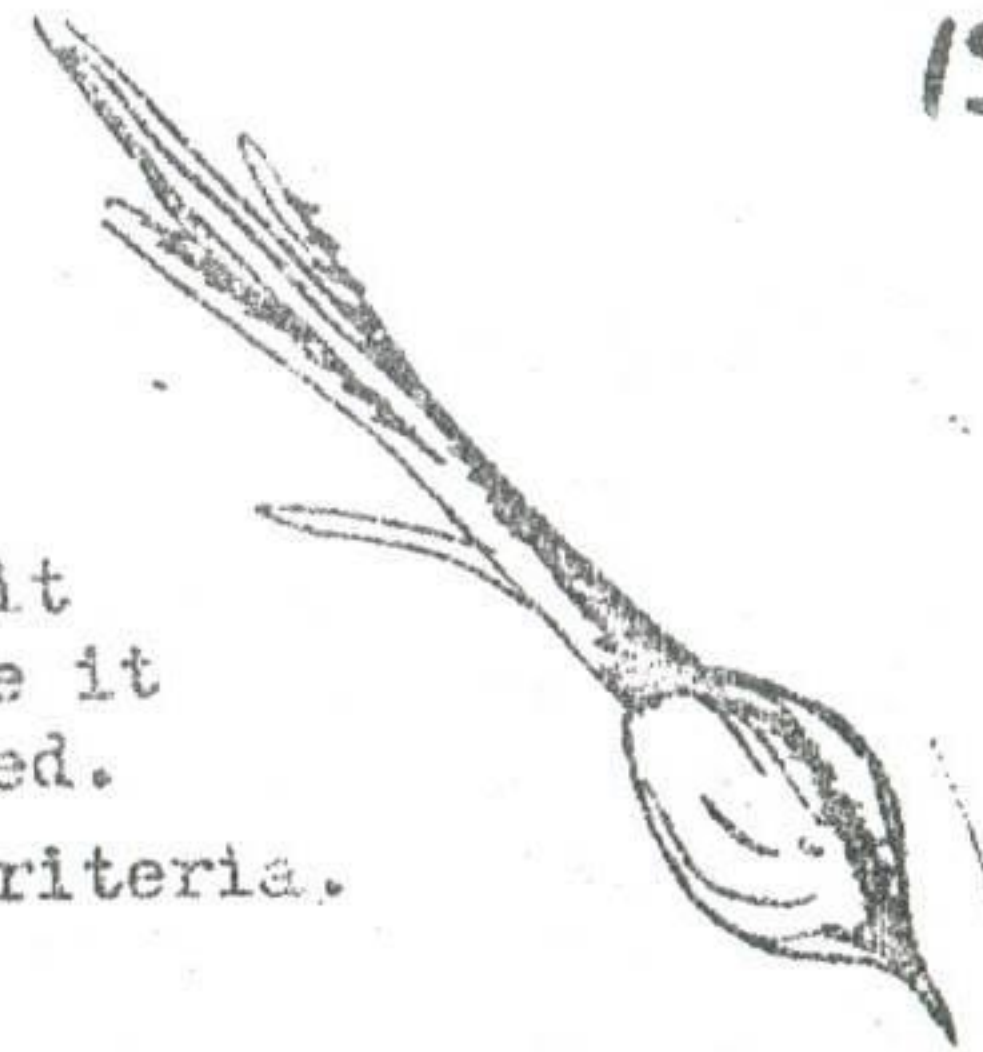

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
