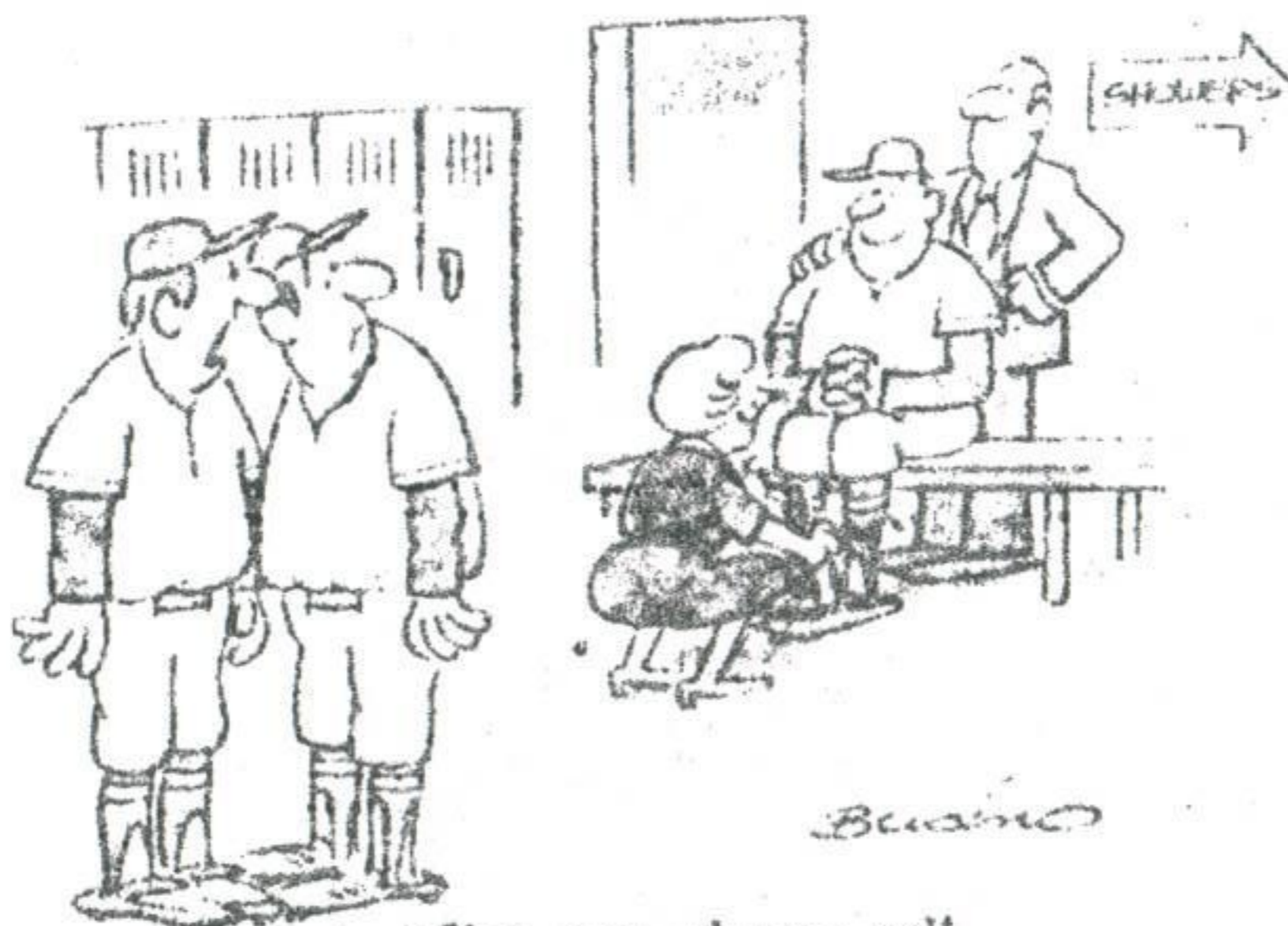

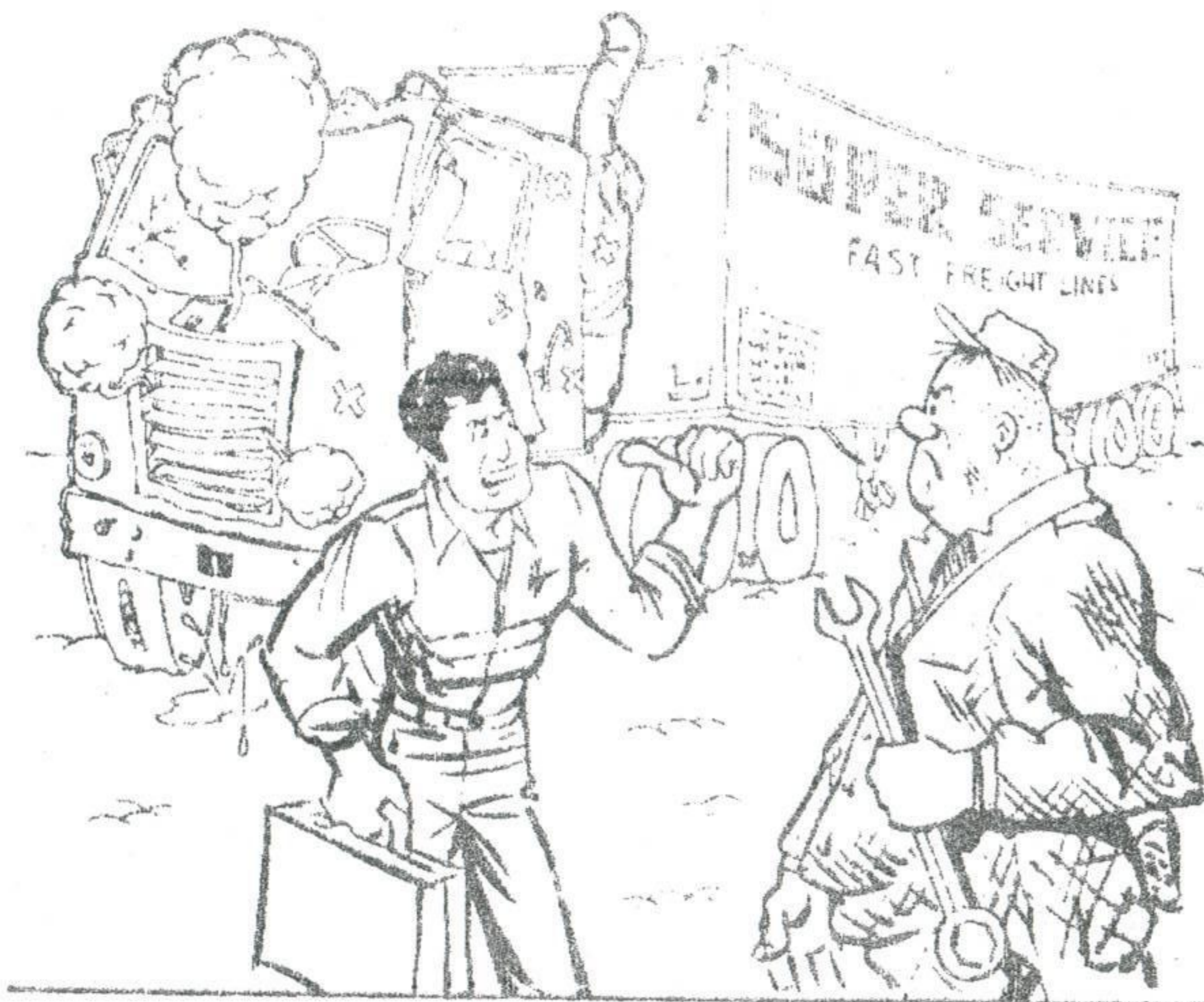

As we enter the vacation season, here are some tips for safe vacation driving:

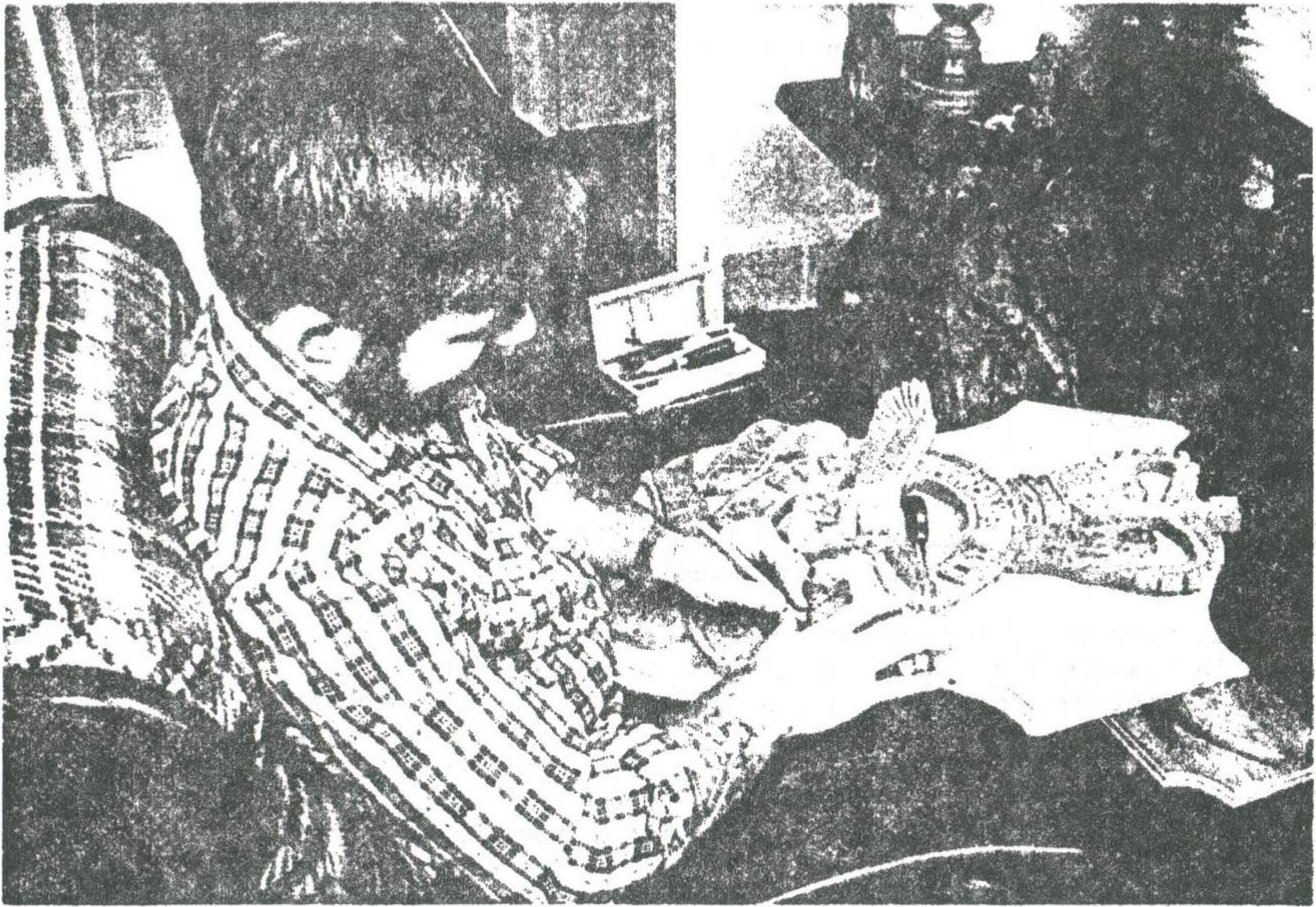
1. Get the feel of your car. Know what it will do. It will perform differently than the vehicle you drive daily to work.
2. Make a schedule for your trip which allows plenty of time and which will not keep you more than eight hours a day at the wheel.

Have a good time. Drive carefully and remember -- we want you back in better condition than before. Recreation does not mean wreck-creation.

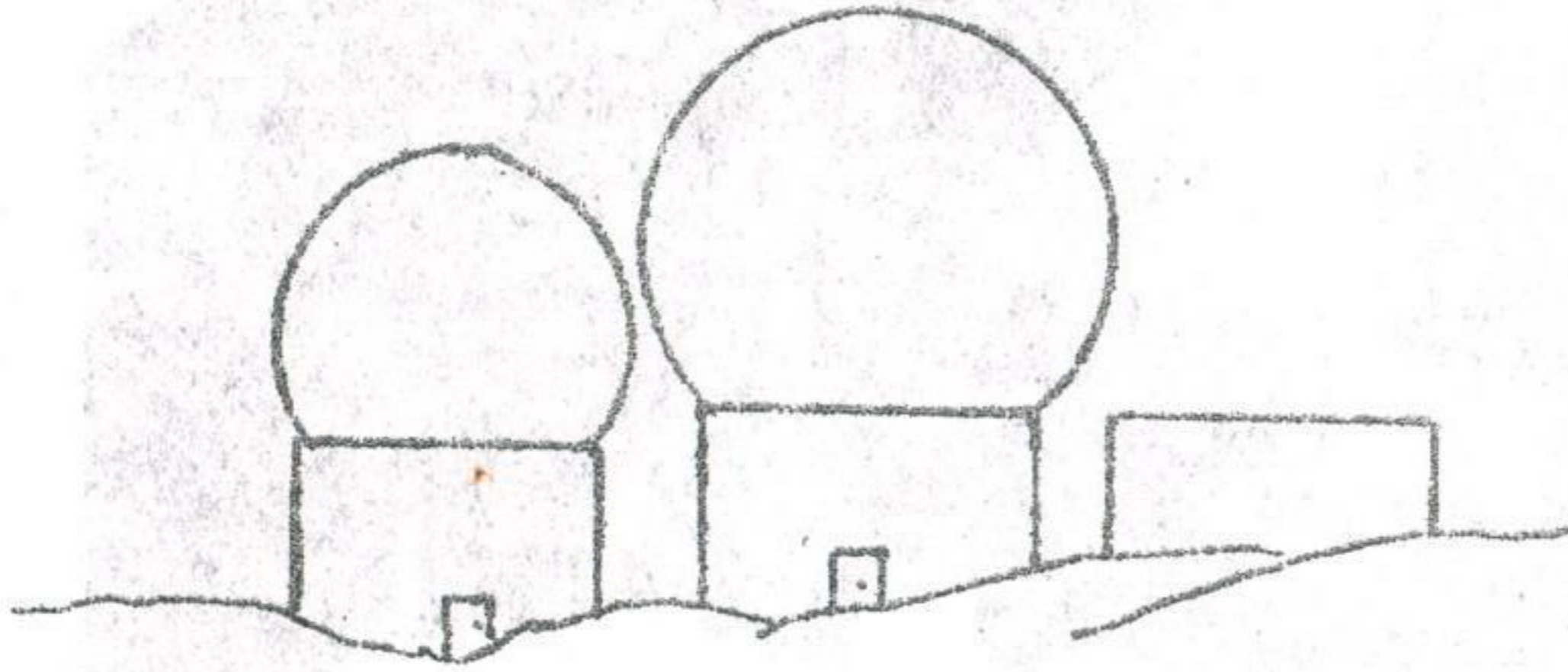

WINNIPEG--Robert J. (Woody) Woodward is the kind of guy who lets the chips fall where they may. But, with his wife's permission. And it's a good thing, too, because things can get kind of messy around the Woodward's Winnipeg household. Woody, would you believe, is a wood carver. When not on duty as a sergeant-airframe technician at CFB Winnipeg, you'll find him in his favorite living room chair, plastic sheet spread before him, happily littering the place with wood chips. It's a hobby he spends a lot of time on, and, according to several dozen people who own some of his handiwork, he's good at it. His specialty is carving plaques--replicas of official armed forces crests and badges--for presentation to visiting VIPs and people stepping back into civilian life after a career in the military profession. His work now is in such demand that he spends most of his leisure time at it. He works with cedar, kiln-dried for the purpose, which he gets from a Winnipeg supplier. He tried pine once, but it split, ruining his work. To keep up interest and quality in his work, Woody says he has several carvings on the go continuously, in various stages of completion. His ambition is to carve every official badge in the Canadian Armed Forces, so he can assemble a complete collection. That's a lot of cedar, a lot of time, and a lot of chipping. He says he makes a few bucks for his efforts, but a professional who once appraised his work says he's under-charging. To that, Woody says, if he charged by professional standards, few could afford his creations. That's a situation, he says, he wants to avoid. "I'm happy to settle for the expressions of people who are presented with my plaques." Sgt Woodward, formerly of Kamsack, Sask., joined the Canadian Forces in 1964. His folks, Mr. and Mrs Robert Woodward, still live there. He, and his wife, Eileen, and two sons, have been in Winnipeg since 1975. Woody says he doesn't expect to get rich at his hobby, "but my family will always be in the chips."

AROUND THE HOUSE

STORING FOOD FOR LONG-LASTING SHELF LIFE

Canned - Store in the coolest cupboard, away from the oven and dishwasher. Most stay at peak quality for at least one year. Contents of dented cans may be safe, but discard those that bulge, spurt when opened or give off a putrid smell.

Mixes - Store in unopened original bags or sealed jars in a cool dry cupboard. If they pick up moisture, they'll lose their ability to rise later during baking.

Cereal - Keep in sealed jars to avoid infestation. Store oatmeal in freezer up to 1 year.

Flour - Store whole wheat in freezer or refrigerator (fat content in wheat germ goes rancid at room temperature).

SALTY SOLUTIONS

For water or heat stains on tables - apply a thin paste of salt and salad oil, let stand for an hour or so, then wipe and polish with a soft cloth.

Carpets - give them a liberal sprinkling of salt before vacuuming. It helps destroy moth larvae and brightens colors. To remove grease stains, sprinkle the spot with salt and rub vigorously. Repeat several times, then vacuum the area. To freshen the carpet, add a few drops of Nilodor to 1 cup of salt, sprinkle and vacuum.

Oven - pour salt over grease or burned spills while still hot. When the salt has absorbed the grease and is cold, use a stiff brush to remove debris.

TIME AND MONEY SAVERS

Dip a frayed end of a shoelace in glue and shape to a point. Let it dry thoroughly, and it will be good as new.

A button sewn on each end of the drawstring of pajamas, shirts or washable jackets will keep the string from disappearing.

To clean out your dishwasher, fill both soap dispensers with baking soda, load the washer with dishes and you will find that both the washer and your dishes will get a good cleaning.

SHIP WRECK (CASSEROLE)

Into bottom of a buttered casserole dish, slice 2 good size onions. Over this, place: thin slices of raw potato (2 med. size). Add thick layer of cooked hamburger. (1 lb.) Sprinkle 1/2 cup uncooked rice over this. Then add 1 cup diced celery or sprinkle with celery salt. Season each layer with salt, pepper and paprika. Top with 1 can tomato soup and 1 can boiling water. Cover and bake in moderate oven about 2 hrs.

SWISS STEAK VENISON

| 2 lb. round steak | 4 tbsp. fat or oil |
| 1/2 cup flour | 1/2 cup finely chopped green pepper |
| 1 tsp. salt | 1/2 cup finely chopped onions |
| pepper | 1/2 cup chopped celery |
| 1/2 tsp. cinnamon | 2 tomatoes, or 1 cup of juice |
| Garlic or oregano to taste | 1/2 cup red wine |

Dip meat in flour salt and pepper, cinnamon, oregano - well mixed - and pound with a mallet until all the mixture is absorbed. Sear quickly in hot fat and reduce heat. Add onions, green pepper, celery, tomatoes and liquid. Simmer 1 hour.

- dash of humour

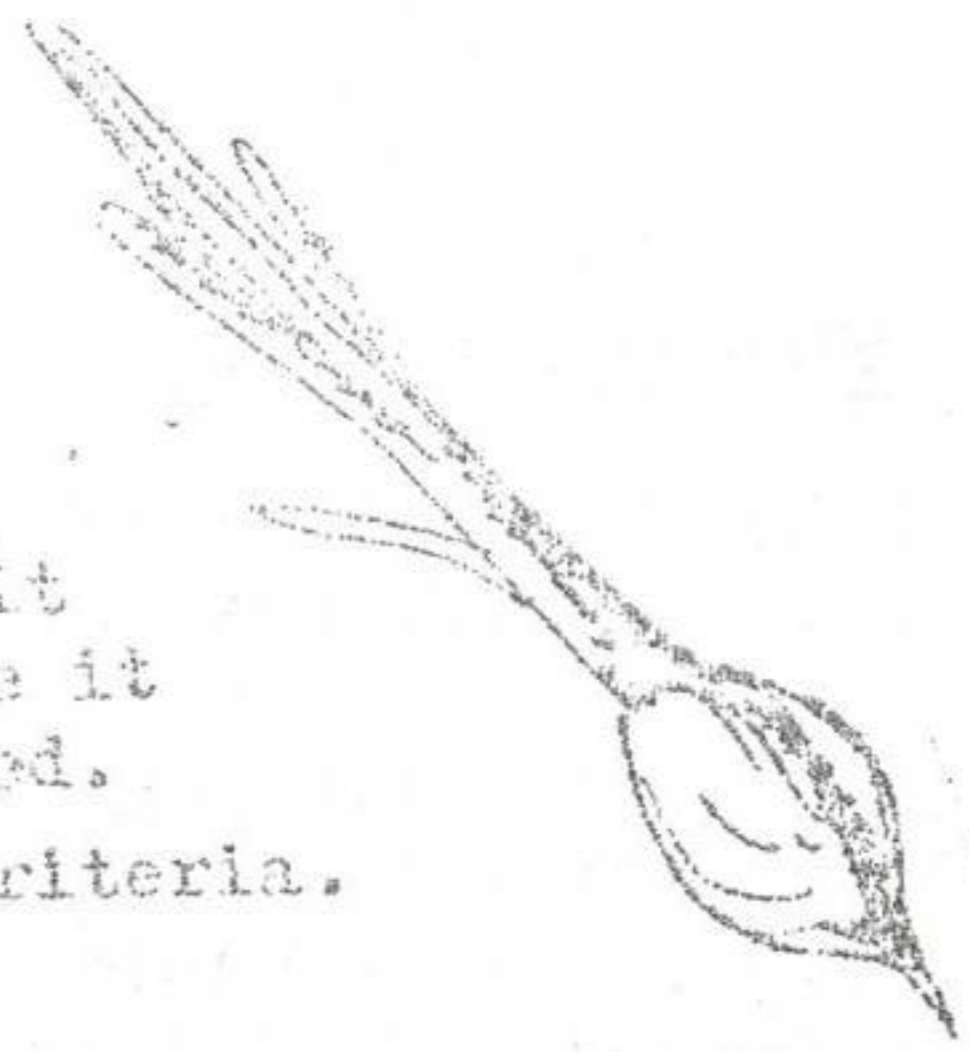

NEW BOOKS

HELEN AND TEACHER-THE STORY OF HELEN KELLER - JOSEPH P. LASH AND ANNE SULLIVAN MACY

Helen and Teacher is the intimate story of two great American women whose lives were bound together for all time. The author follows these two gifted women for almost one hundred years, from 1860s to Helens death in 1968. Among the revelations of this story are Annies fiery confrontations with all those Headmasters, philanthropists, relatives - who threatened to separate her from Helen; the idyllic and then stormy years of Annie's marriage to John Macy; her passionate involvement with pacifism, socialism and women's suffrage; the foray into vaudeville and a hilarious episode in Hollywood. Helen came into close contact with the most illustrious people of her time: Graham Bell, Mark Twain, Charlie Chaplain, but the heart of the biography is the relationship between Helen and Annie.

RAGE OF ANGELS - SIDNEY SHELDON

Jennifer Parker, the daughter of a small town lawyer, joined the staff of the District Attorney of Manhattan, to fight for justice as her father had done. But less than 24 hours after being sworn in, Jennifer's hopes, her dreams, her career, were smashed and she found herself facing disbarment and a possible prison sentence. So begins the story of a brilliant and beautiful young woman who becomes one of America's most successful defense attorneys. It is also the story of the two powerful men in her life: Adam Warner, a man of honor and integrity, born to lead his country; and Michael Moretti, compelling, strange and vengeful, a dark angel who spreads wide his wings of terror.

THE SECOND LADY - IRVING WALLACE

Billie Bradford, the brilliant and beautiful wife of the President of the United States, is on a State visit to Moscow when she is abducted by the Soviets, and Vera Vavilova, a superbly trained Russian undercover agent and actress who is the First Lady's physical double, is put in her place. The imposter's mission is to induce the President to reveal a U.S. secret that will drastically tip the world balance to

Russia. But she knows she must move carefully as one false move can destroy her masquerade, whether at the breakfast table, in front of T.V. cameras or in the Whitehouse bedroom. Meanwhile the real Billie Bradford, embarks on her own program of deception - seeking ways to escape, daringly leading a Soviet intelligence officer astray in the most intimate area of her married life, an area about which the Russians could not possibly have any information. Two women each playing a treacherous game in a foreign land, propelled toward a face to face confrontation and totally unpredictable and shocking climax.

THE DEVIL'S ALTERNATIVE - FREDERICK FORSYTH

It is 1982, a man is rescued, near naked and unconscious, from a skiff floating in the Black Sea swell off the coast of Turkey; a few months later the world stands at the brink of the unthinkable, as men and women in Washington, Moscow and London, struggle against the ticking count-down of doom. A failed Russian grain crop, a fanatic band of Ukrainians, a last chance Soviet-American treaty, a loaded super tanker held hostage in the North Sea - these are only some of the strands so skillfully plaited into an ever tightening cable of terror.

THE LAST ENCHANTMENT - MARY STEWART

Merlin, whom men call "enchanter", is the narrator of this novel of Dark Age Britain, which begins with Arthur now King by right, having drawn the sword Caliburn from the stone. He instantly plunges into fierce combat against the Saxon enemy, fighting to achieve the "small miracle" of unity and independence that Britain alone attained among the dependencies of a crumbling Roman Empire.

SERVICE REGISTERED RETIREMENT SAVINGS PLAN

Changes to the Plan

As you may be aware, at the end of January, the Bank of Montreal and The Canada Trust Company announced the addition of life insurance coverage to their RRSPs.

The Service RRSP was not covered by this announcement as this Plan is a private plan, with participation limited to present and former Canadian Forces personnel and their spouses, and, as such, is a plan totally distinct and separate from the plan offered by Canada Trust to the general public.

After discussions between National Defence Headquarters and Canada Trust, it was agreed that life insurance coverage should also be offered on the Service RRSP. Complete details of this coverage are outlined on the enclosed "Notification of Life Insurance" which should be retained for future reference.

Simultaneously, a change is being made in the Savings Option. Interest on the Savings Option has been credited on the last day of each month. Effective 1 April, the interest will be calculated monthly but credited quarterly, on the last days of March, June, September and December.

**SERVICE REGISTERED RETIREMENT SAVINGS PLAN
NOTIFICATION OF LIFE INSURANCE**

Service Registered Retirement Savings Plan eligible planholders are insured for life insurance under the following terms and conditions and such others as may from time to time be applicable:

ELIGIBILITY

Each planholder under age 60 is covered by life insurance on his/her deposits in the Savings Option and Investment Certificates.

AMOUNT OF INSURANCE

Insurance coverage is equal to an individual planholder's total balance(s) in the Savings Option and/or Investment Certificates up to a maximum of \$30,000.

COMMENCEMENT DATE

Coverage commences March 2, 1981 for an individual who was a planholder on that date. A new planholder's coverage begins six months after his/her plan is opened (in the event of accidental death, coverage is immediate).

LIMITATIONS

Life insurance coverage does not apply to:

- deposits in the Equity, Income or Mortgage Options
- planholders age 60 or over
- situations where death is the result of suicide

AMENDMENT/TERMINATION

Terms of coverage may be amended from time to time. Termination of coverage is the earliest of the following:

- a) group policy under which this life insurance is offered is discontinued by either the insurer or Canada Trust
- b) planholder reaches age 60
- c) planholder no longer has a balance in the Savings Option and Investment Certificates.

CONVERSION/EXTENSION

This is a group term insurance and as such cannot be extended or converted by the planholder

DESIGNATION OF BENEFICIARY

Life insurance amounts are payable to the beneficiary named in the RSP application or as the planholder might otherwise specify in writing to Canada Trust.

INSURANCE CARRIER

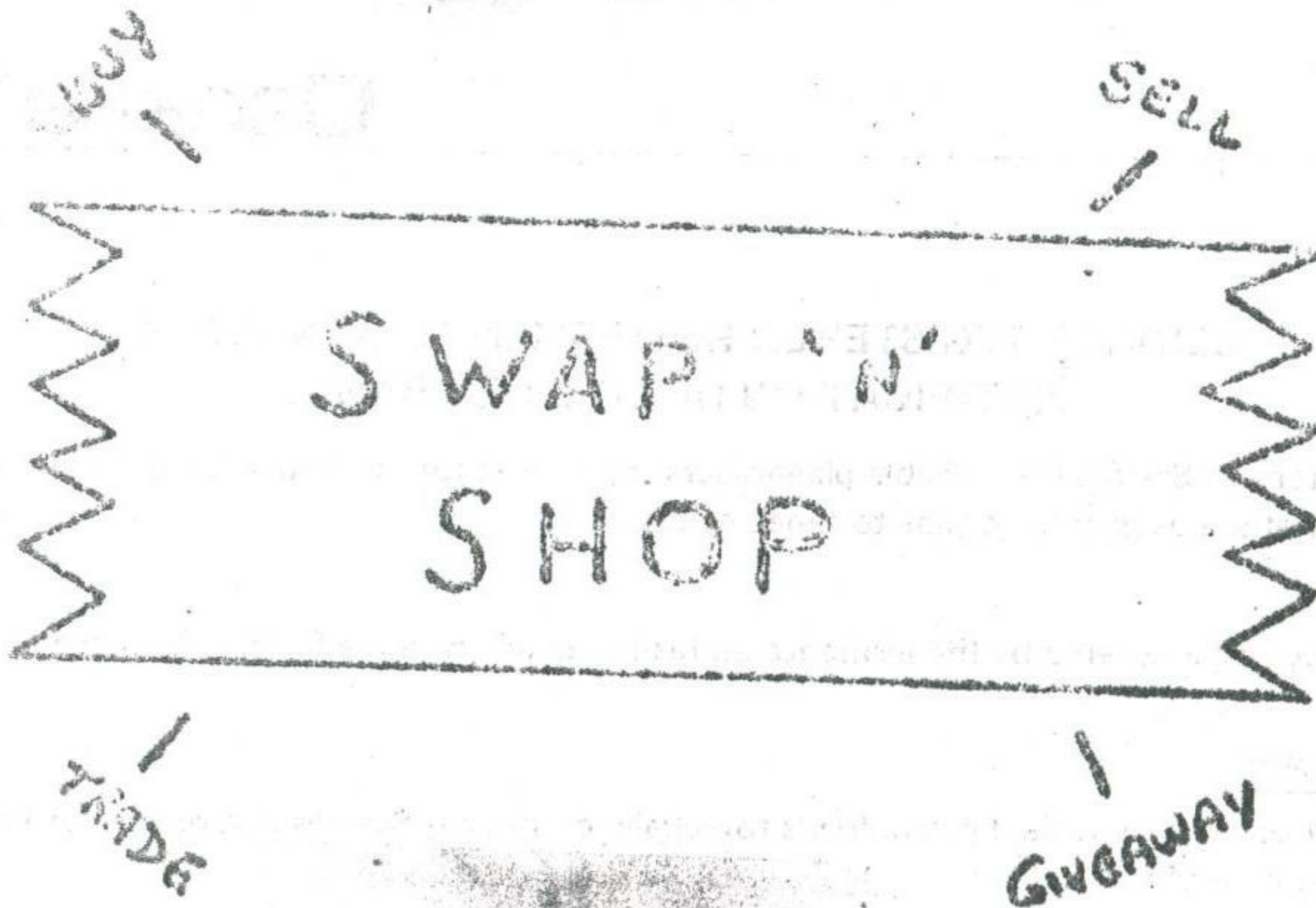
Life insurance is provided through a group policy with the Confederation Life Insurance Company.

FURTHER INFORMATION

Enquiries should be directed to The Canada Trust Company, Retirement Savings Plan Department, 170 Laurier Avenue West, Ottawa, Ontario, K1P 5V5.

This card should be retained with your other RSP documents. The terms of the group policy govern in the event of any variance between this card and that policy.

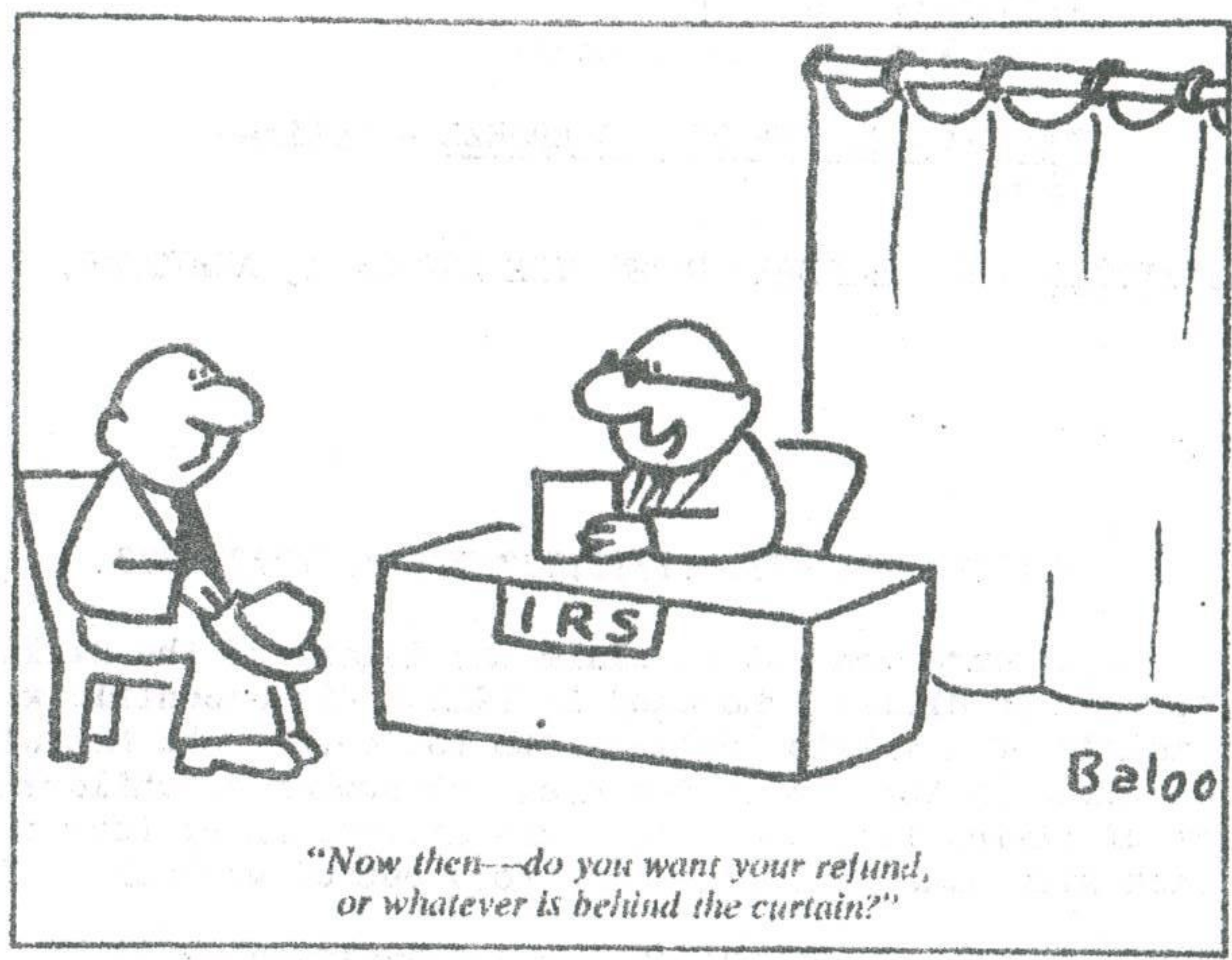

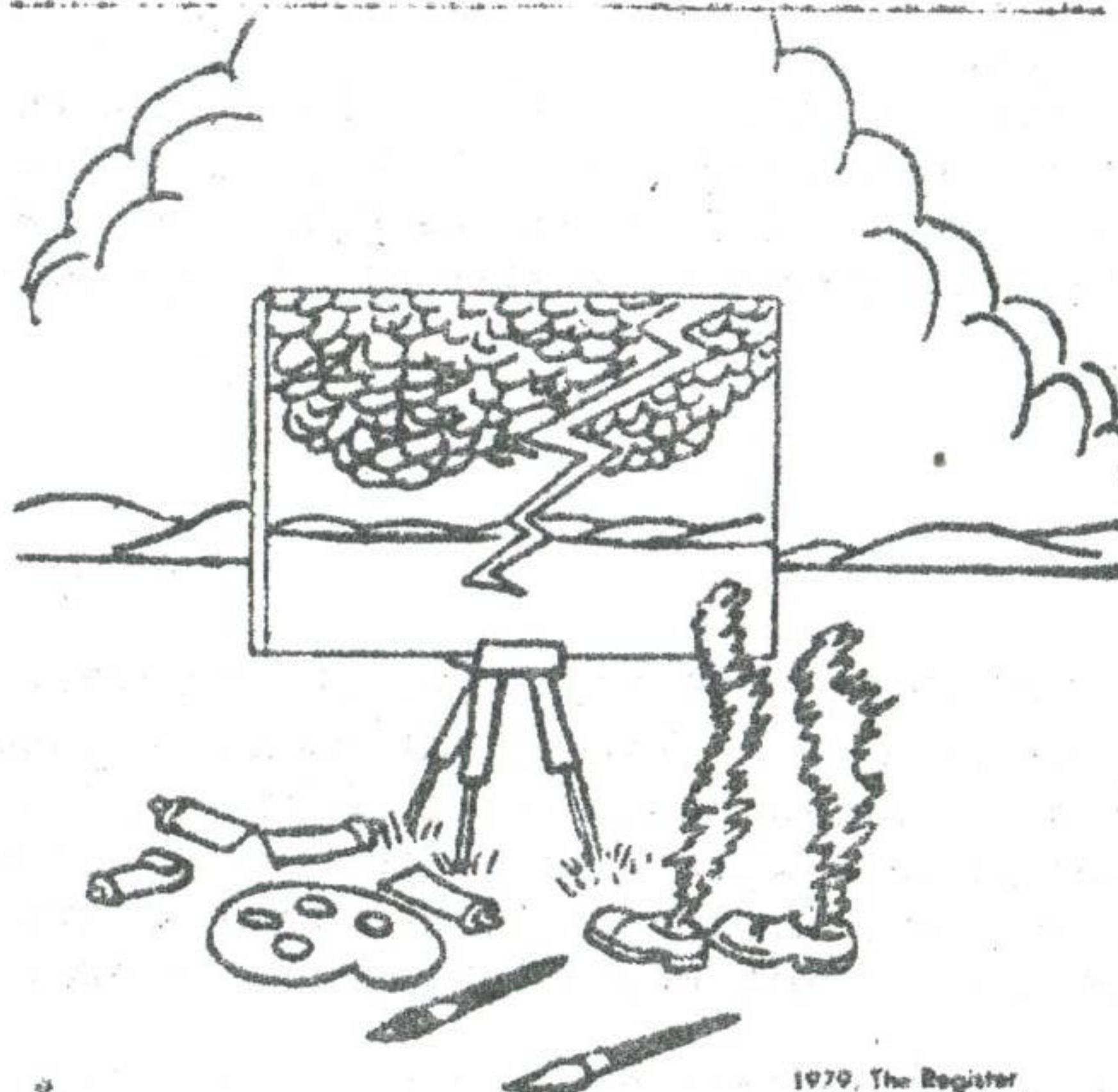

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5 1/2% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.

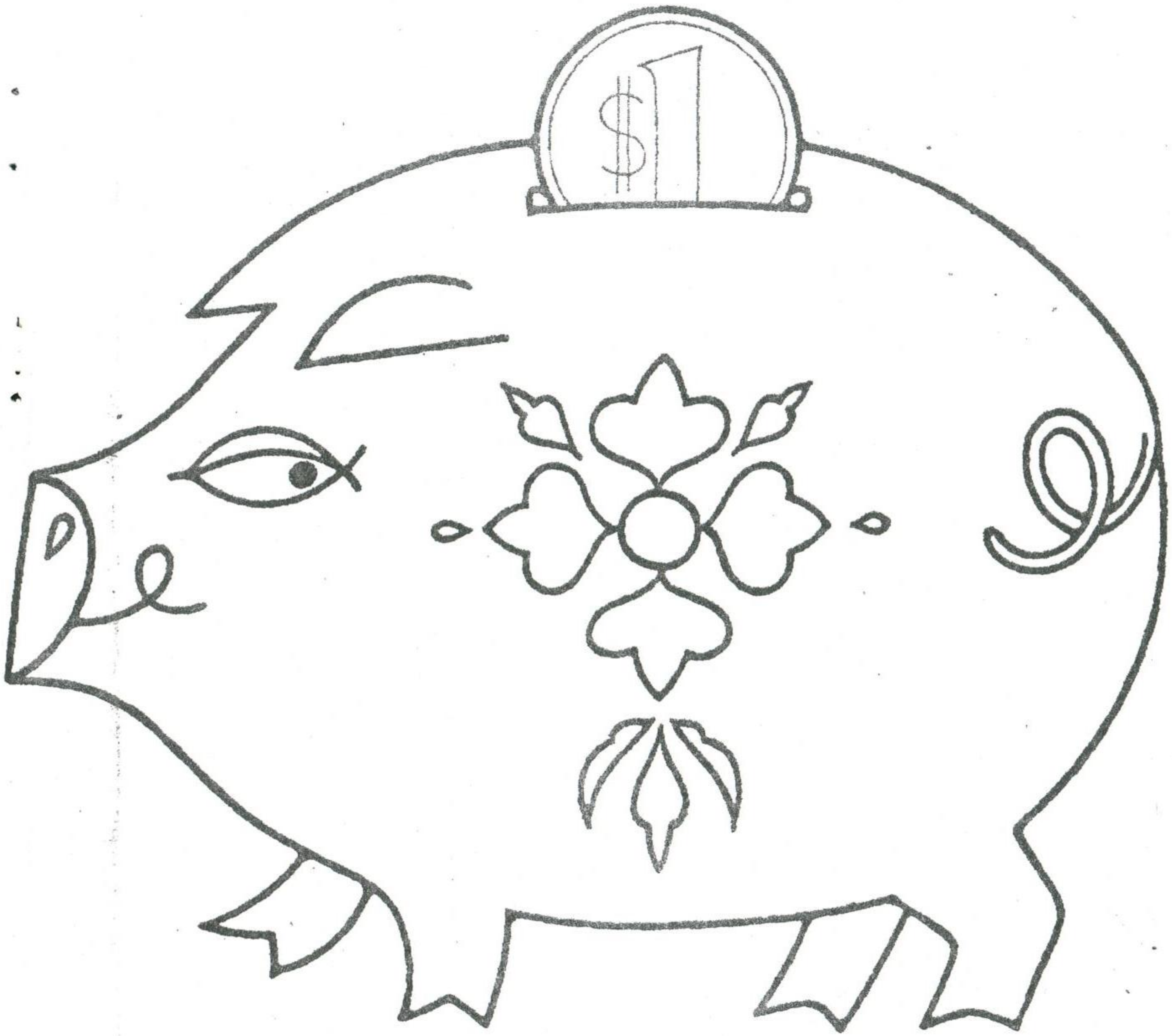
