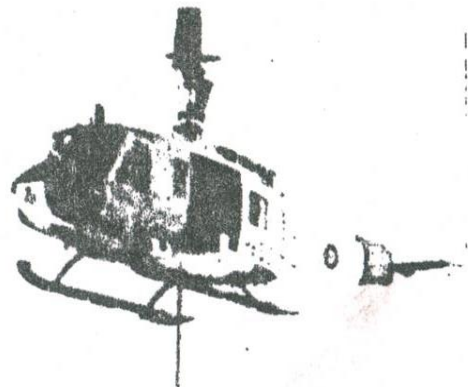

Persons have been observed using sling shots on the station contrary to SSOs.

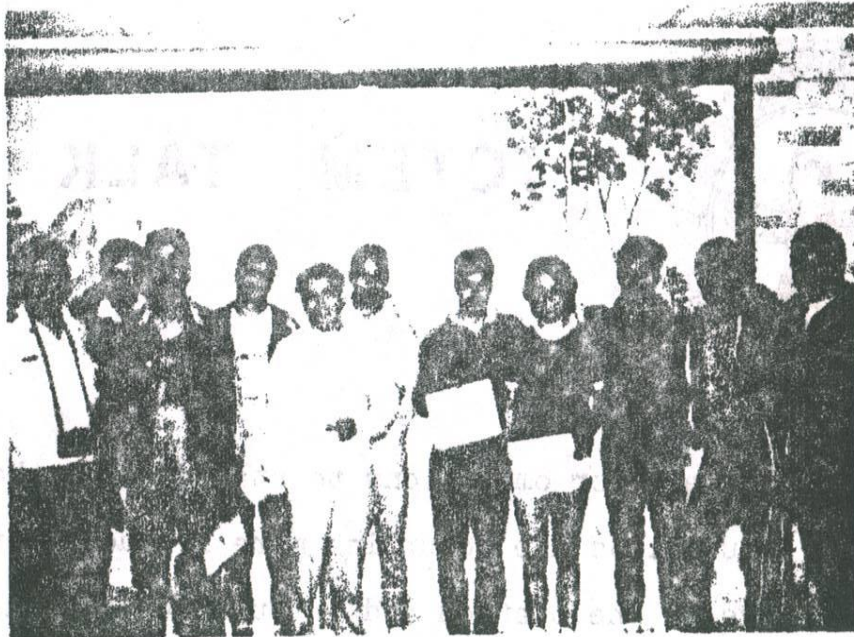

AROUND THE HOUSE

Keep a recipe card upright by placing it in the tines of a fork and putting the fork handle in a glass. Carry the glass with you from counter to range as you cook.

To keep a recipe card or book clean while you're cooking, spray it with hair spray.

To remove the core from a head of lettuce, hit the core end once against the counter top sharply. The core will then twist out. This method also prevents the unsightly brown spots that result from cutting into lettuce.

Lettuce will not rust so quickly if you line the bottom of the refrigerator's vegetable compartment with paper towels or napkins. The paper absorbs the excess moisture, keeping vegetables and fruits fresher for a longer period of time.

Add a touch of garlic by rubbing a crushed clove of garlic over the salad bowl before adding salad ingredients.

Open asparagus cans from the bottom to avoid breaking the tips

Use a clean coffee percolator to cook fresh asparagus. The asparagus stand upright this way-stalk side down-and the tips steam perfectly while the stems cook to a tender finish.

To keep beets red, cook them whole with two inches of stem. Also add a few tablespoons of vinegar to the cooking water to prevent fading.

A slice or two of stale bread in cooking water minimizes the cooking odor of broccoli. Skim the bread from the surface after cooking.

This also works with cabbage.

Drop carrots in boiling water, let stand for five minutes, then drop them in cold water. The skin slips right off.

To keep cauliflower a bright white, add a little milk during cooking.

To keep cheese from hardening, butter the cut end.

To soften hardened cheese, soak it in buttermilk.

Brush a little oil on the grater before you start grating, and cheese will wash off the grater easily.

A dull knife works much better than a sharp one for slicing cheese.

Warm the knife before cutting cheese, and the cheese will cut as easily as butter.

To prevent mold, store cheese in a tightly covered container with some sugar cubes.

Cottage cheese will remain fresher longer if stored upside down in the refrigerator.

ICE CREAM POPS

2 eggs (beaten)
 1/2 cup milk
 2 tbsps. honey
 2 tbsps. vegetable oil
 1 tsp. vanilla
 1/2 cup diced fruit
 1 cup whipping cream
 Blend ingredients together in an electric blender for about two minutes until smooth. Pour into cups and freeze, inserting wooden sticks when thick.

WAKE ME UP FRUIT SHAKE

1 sm. banana peeled & sliced
 1 egg
 2 tsp. honey
 1 cup orange juice
 Combine banana, egg and honey in a blender until smooth. Add orange juice; blend until frothy. Serve in a tall glass for a meal or serve in small juice glasses to add nutrition and flavor to a regular breakfast.

SPECIAL FROZEN FRUIT YOGHURT

1 pkg (15 oz.) frozen sweetened strawberries or raspberries
 1 envelope unflavoured gelatin
 1/3 cup sugar
 1/4 tsp salt
 1/2 cup cold water
 1 tbsp lemon juice
 1 cup plain yoghurt
 2 egg whites (unbeaten)
 Puree the berries in an electric blender. Combine next five ingredients in a saucepan and stir over low heat until the gelatin and sugar dissolve completely. Add this mixture and the yoghurt to the pureed fruit and blend until smooth. Pour into two ice cube trays and freeze until nearly firm. Remove the trays and turn the mixture into a large bowl or blender. Add the unbeaten egg whites and beat until smooth and frothy. Return the mixture to the freezer trays, freeze until firm.

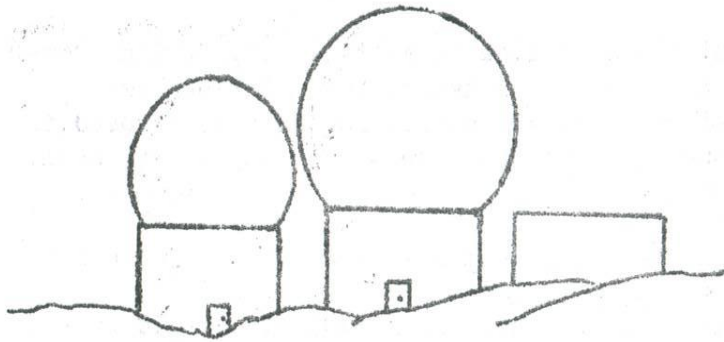
1. When you decide to wash the car and don't know what washer setting to use: CALL MOM.

DRIFTING HOME - PIERRE BERTON

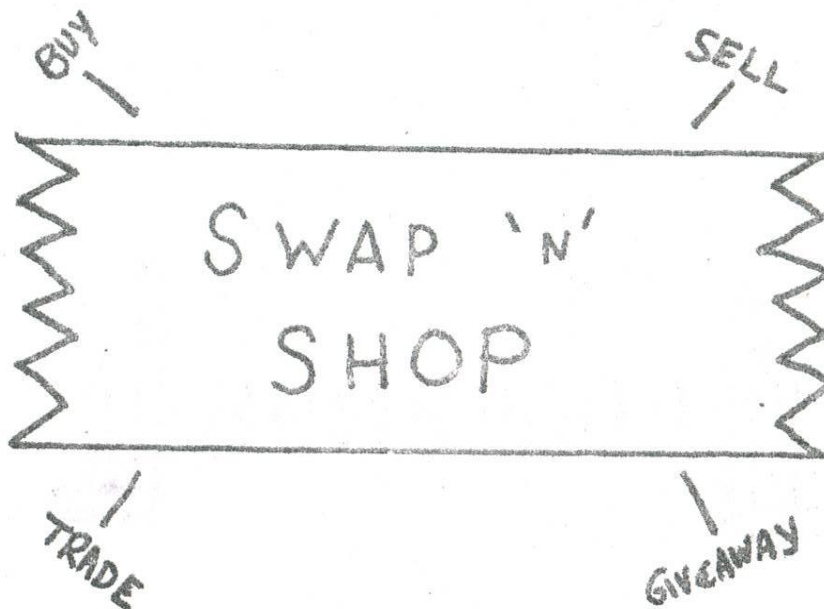
This is an account of a journey by Pierre Berton and his family down one of the world's last great wild rivers, the Yukon. Few men ever have the opportunity to take their sons and daughters back with them into their own childhood so completely as the author has in this story of a summer voyage down the Yukon in rubber rafts. This journey took the author, his wife and their seven children over the Klondike goldrush route of 1898 from Lake Bennett, B.C., to Dawson in the Yukon Territory. It was down this unchanged river that the author's remarkable father paddled with thousands of gold-seekers the summer of '98. When the rush ended and the crowds left, his father stayed on as government mining recorder. It was there, in Canada's most famous ghost town, that Berton spent his own vividly-remembered childhood.

RUFFLES AND FLOURISHES - LIZ CARPENTER

Liz Carpenter's job in the White House, as staff director and press secretary to Lady Bird Johnson, was to keep five hundred news-hungry reporters happy and the image of the First Family unscathed; handle twelve jangling phones; help arrange and produce Mrs. Johnson's whistle-stop tours and safaris; write speeches and collaborate with speech writers; cope with intellectuals, artists and the stars of stage and screen; live through White House luncheons, dinners and weddings and hang onto her sense of humor. In this chronicle of behind-the-scenes life in the White House during the Johnson Administration, the wittiest woman in the Great Society entourage tells it the way it was, with ready laughter and a few fleeting tears.

A CALCULATED RISK - RAE FOLEY

Guy Harding a successful public relations man, was killed late one night in an automobile accident; his young wife, Sara, injured. The "accident" was soon revealed to be murder, plotted and carried out with diabolical cleverness. Paul Smith, the brilliant columnist of the weekly Sentinel, was the logical suspect. If Harding had lived, Smith would have been sued for libel, his career ruined. The young journalist had no alibi for the time of the crime, and there had been damaging gossip about his violent temper. 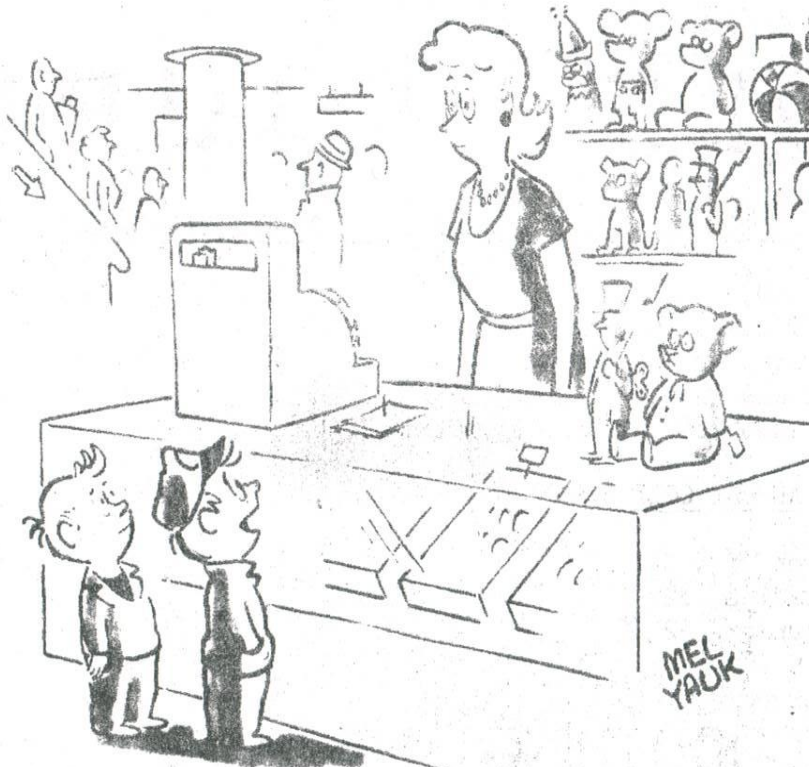

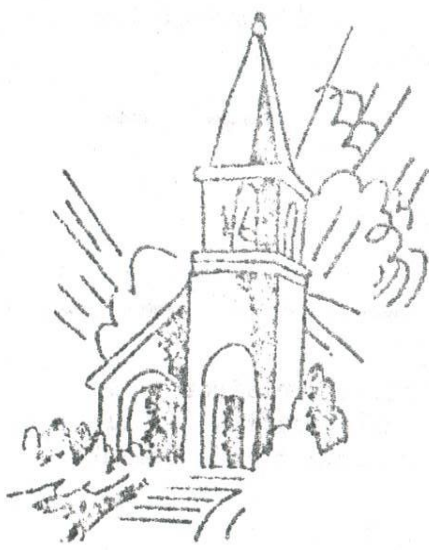

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
