

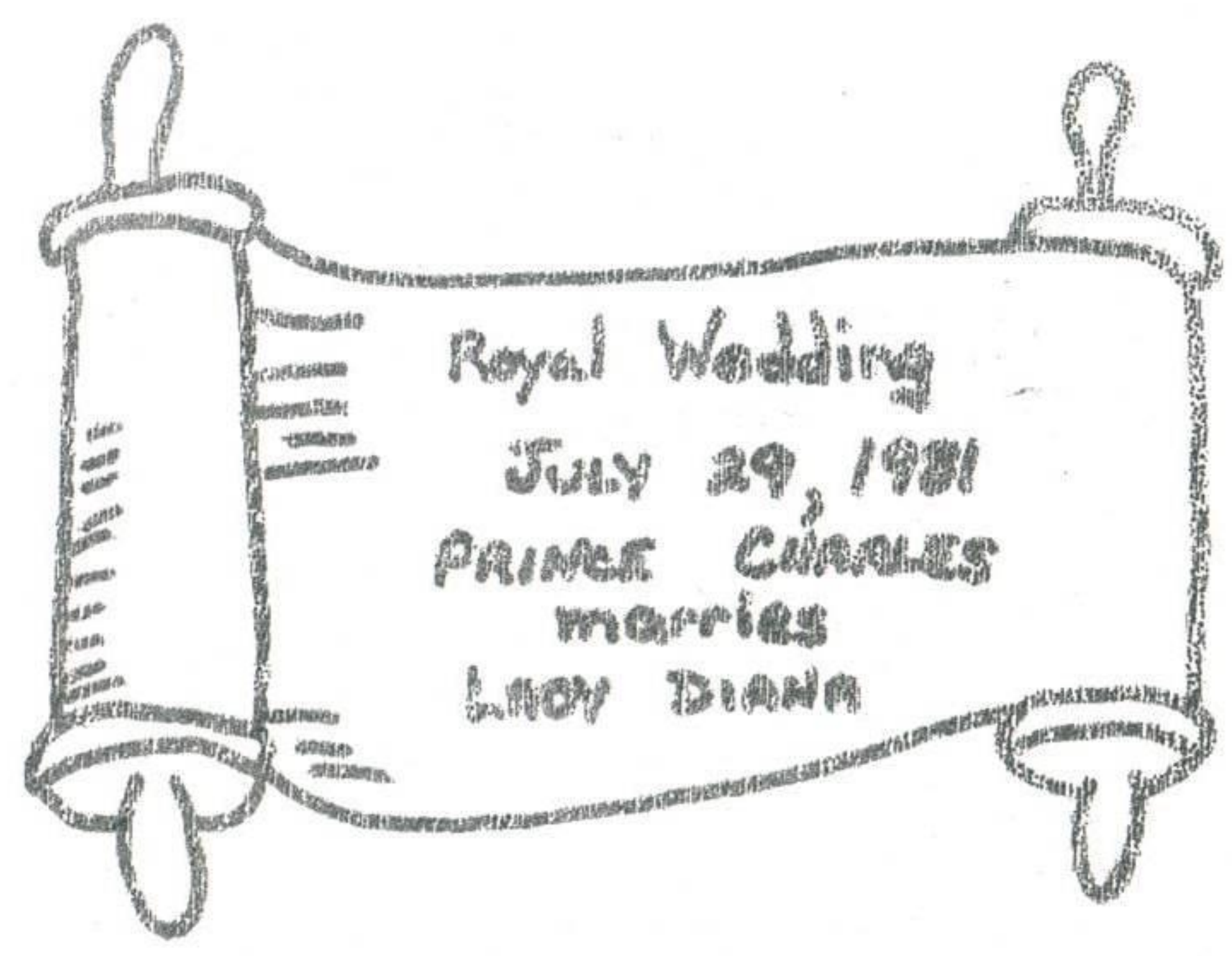
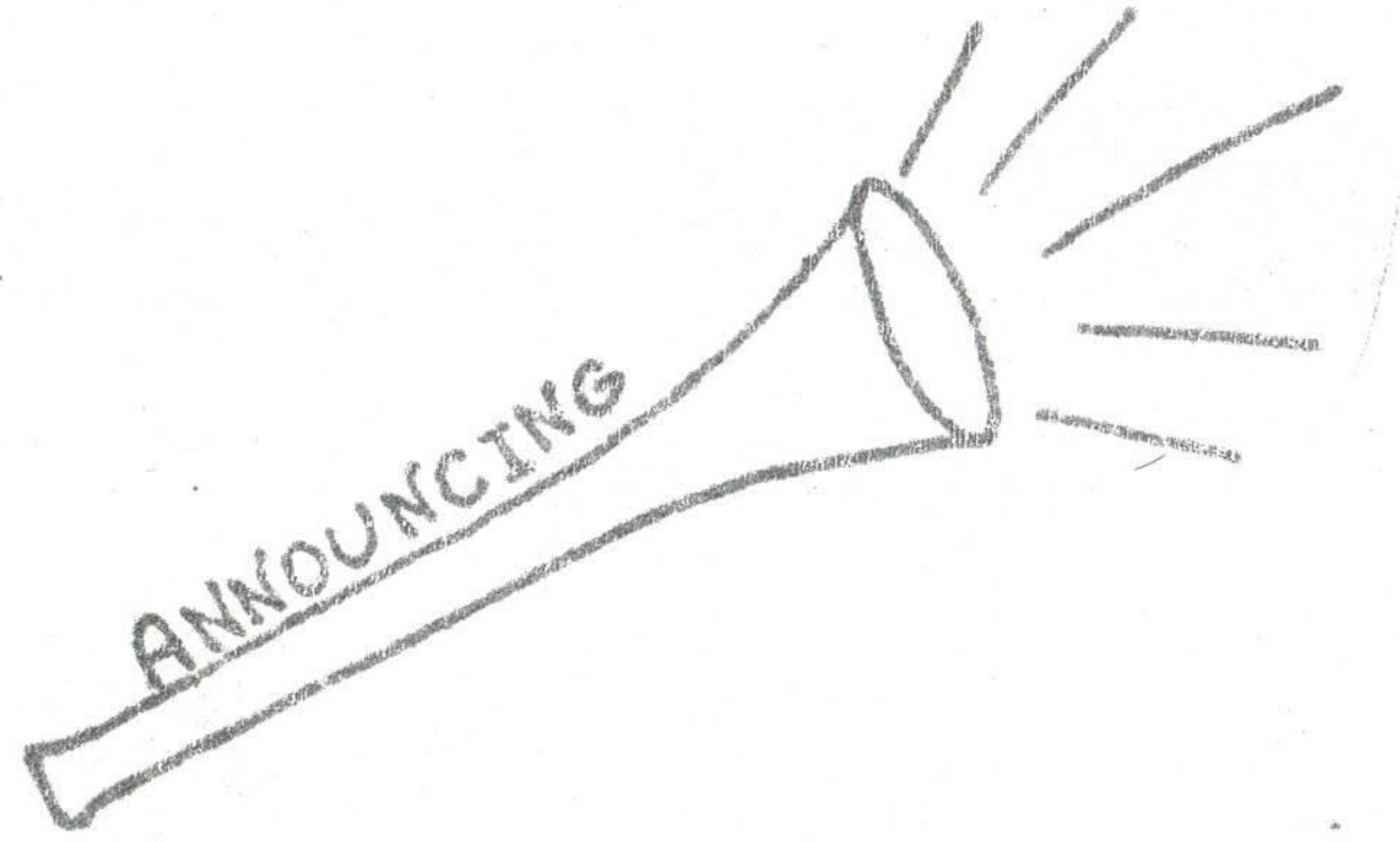

Major W.W. Sled

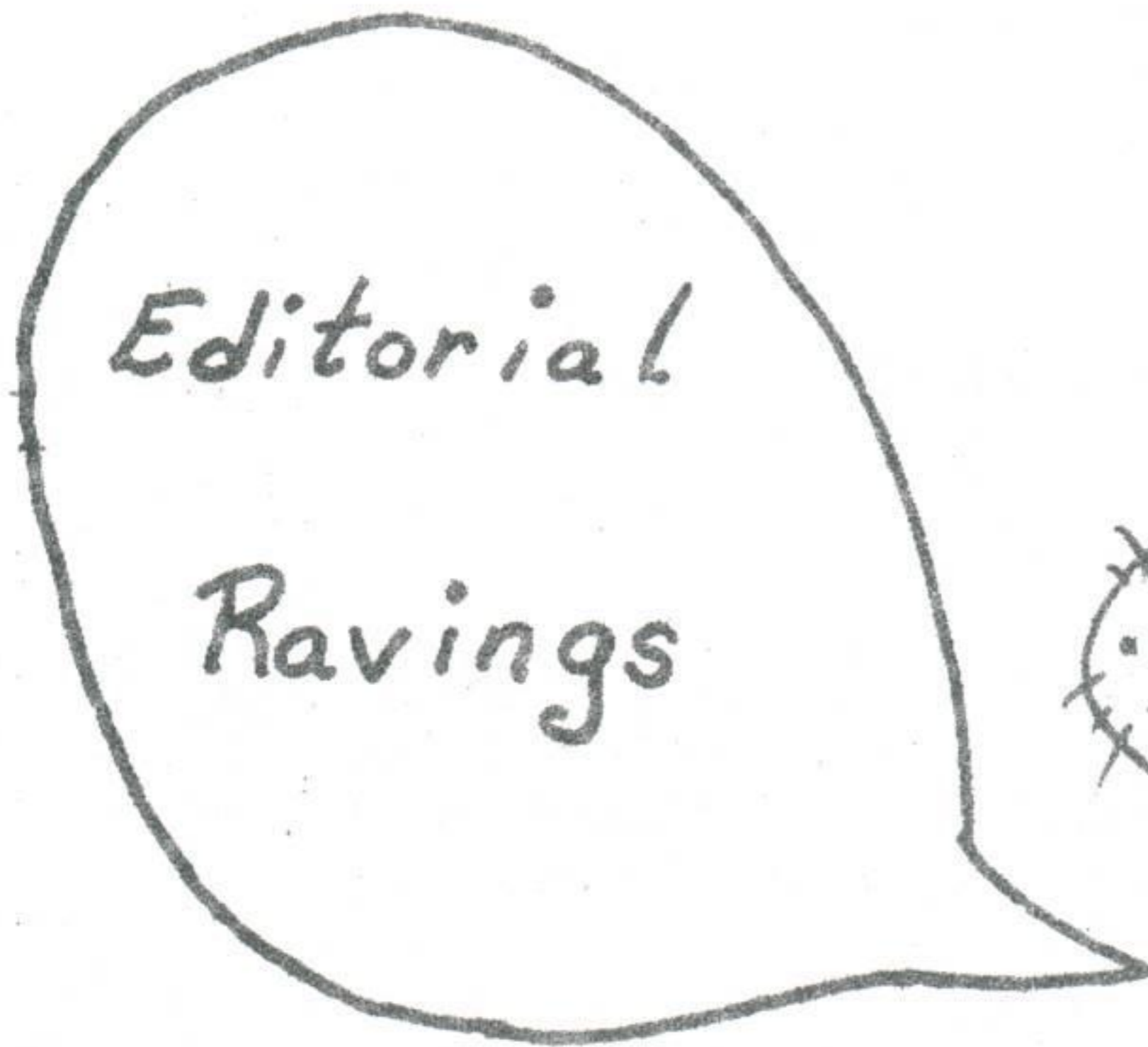
In this my first article as your Commanding Officer, I would like to take this opportunity to say how pleased I am to be posted to CFS Alsask. As you may know, I am originally from this part of the country and I look forward to spending a very happy and successful tour at Alsask.

I would like to thank everyone for the warm welcome extended to me and my wife Peggi at the Handover receptions following the parade.

I have not yet had the opportunity to visit all sections and meet everyone at CFS Alsask, however I hope to accomplish this in the very near future.

Most personnel at CFS Alsask are probably unaware of my background therefore a brief resumé of my career may be of some interest. I joined the RCAF in 1961 from the recruiting unit in Saskatoon. I trained as a Radio Officer at the Air Navigation School in Winnipeg where I received my wings in March 1963. I flew on Search and Rescue aircraft on the west coast (RCAF Stations Vancouver and Comox) until 1965 when I joined 409 Sqn at Comox as an operations officer. In 1966 I was posted to CFS Baldy Hughes as CADO. From there, I took Maritime Operational Training on Neptune aircraft and in 1968 was posted back to Comox on 407 Sqn. I flew in Neptune and Argus aircraft until 1970 when I was posted to Victoria as aide-de-camp to RADM R.H. Leir, Commander Maritime Forces Pacific. In 1972 I cross-trained to Long Range Navigator and flew CC130 Hercules aircraft with 435 Sqn at CFB Edmonton. In 1976 I was posted as a CC130 navigator instructor with 426 Sqn at CFB Trenton. I also served as 426 Sqn Administration Officer for almost a year while on strength at that squadron. I was posted to Toronto in 1980 to attend the Canadian Forces Command and Staff College where I spent my last 10 months before joining you here at CFS Alsask.

Peggi and I have three children - Ian (6) who will be starting grade one this year, Casey (4) and Carly (2).

We especially invite inputs from our friends in the Village of Alsask and surrounding district whom we feel are very much a part of this community's life.

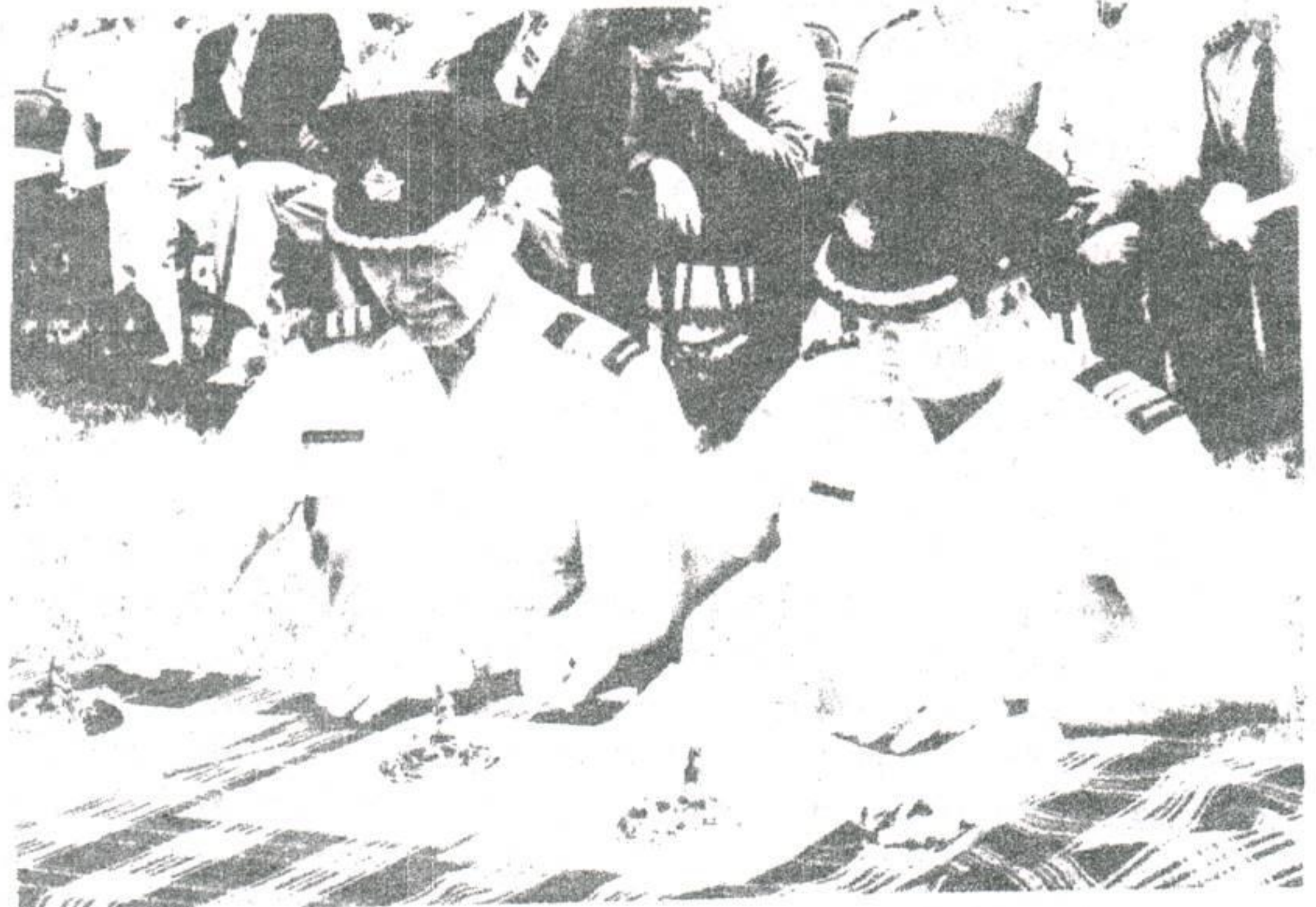

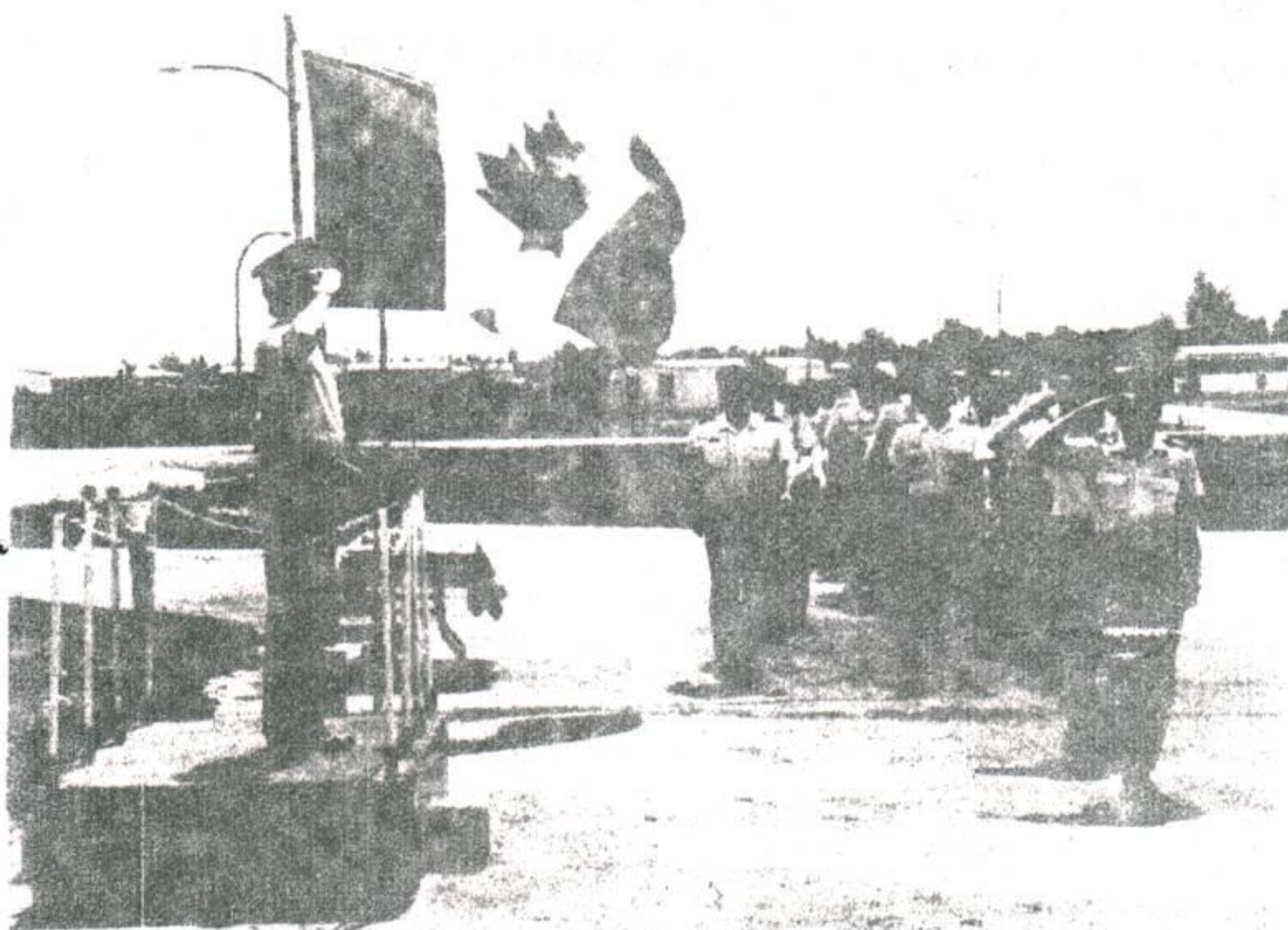

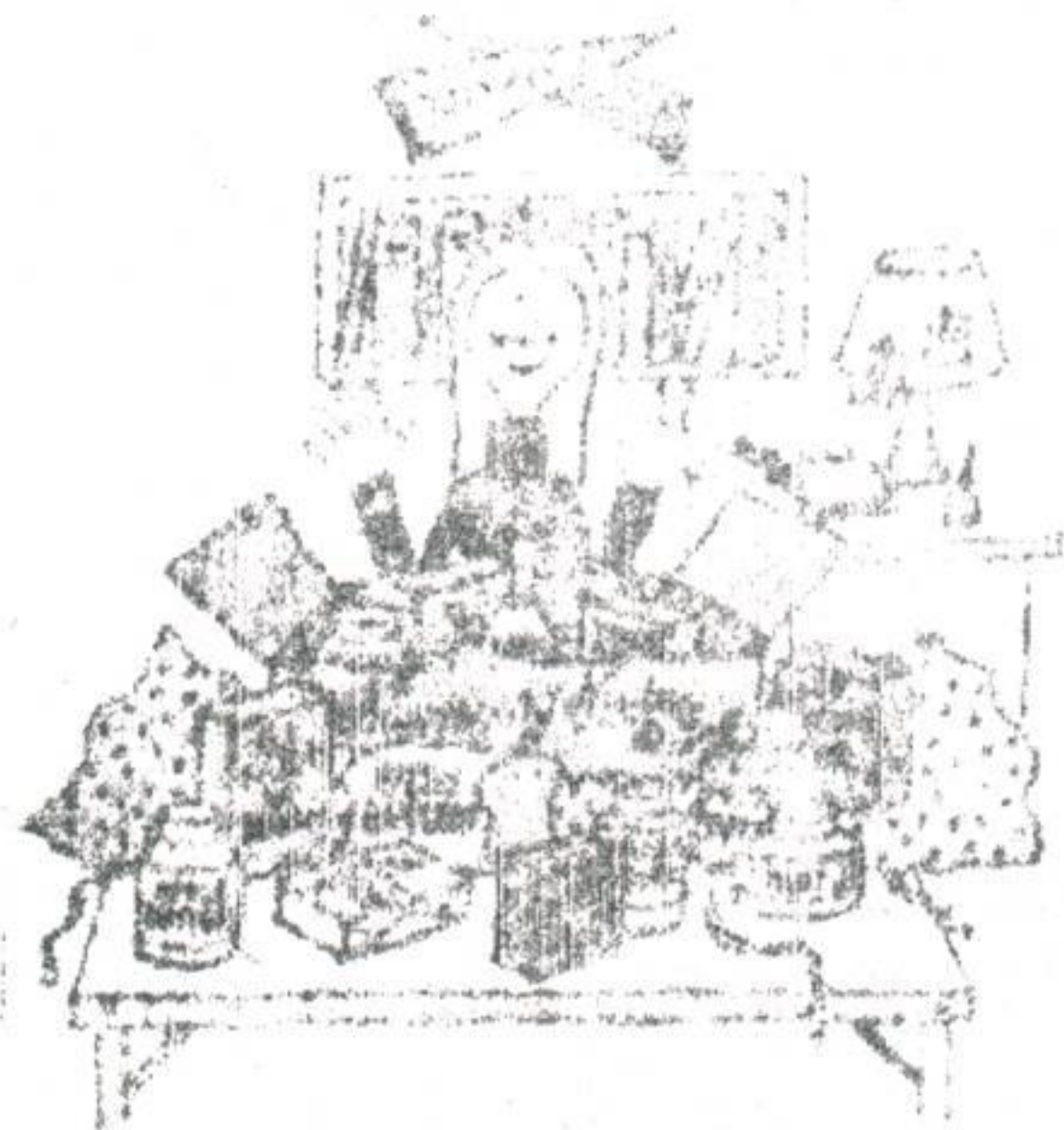
The Reviewing Officer and new CO Major Wayne Sled inspects the parade.

If extra blankets take up too much room, hang them from curtain rods solidly attached to the backs of headboards of beds.

A revolving tie rack is useful in the kitchen for holding measuring spoons, basting brushes, wire whisks and other small utensils.

Make a handy wall hung catch-all for a child's room by gluing several 48oz cans together and spray painting the whole assembly. Hang or set the rack on its side. The round cubby holes can hold small toys, drawing supplies, comic books and miscellaneous goodies.

When two children share a closet, each will get a fair share if you paint half the clothes rod one color and the other a different color, then select hangers to match.

Keep leather upholstery soft and prevent cracking by rubbing with a mixture of one third cup of vinegar and two thirds cup of linseed oil. For a quick cleaning, wipe with sponge dampened with milk.

Plain yogurt cleans keys of pianos quite nicely.

Ketchup cleans copper when you're out of copper polish.

All out of brass polish? Use a little Worcestershire sauce instead!!

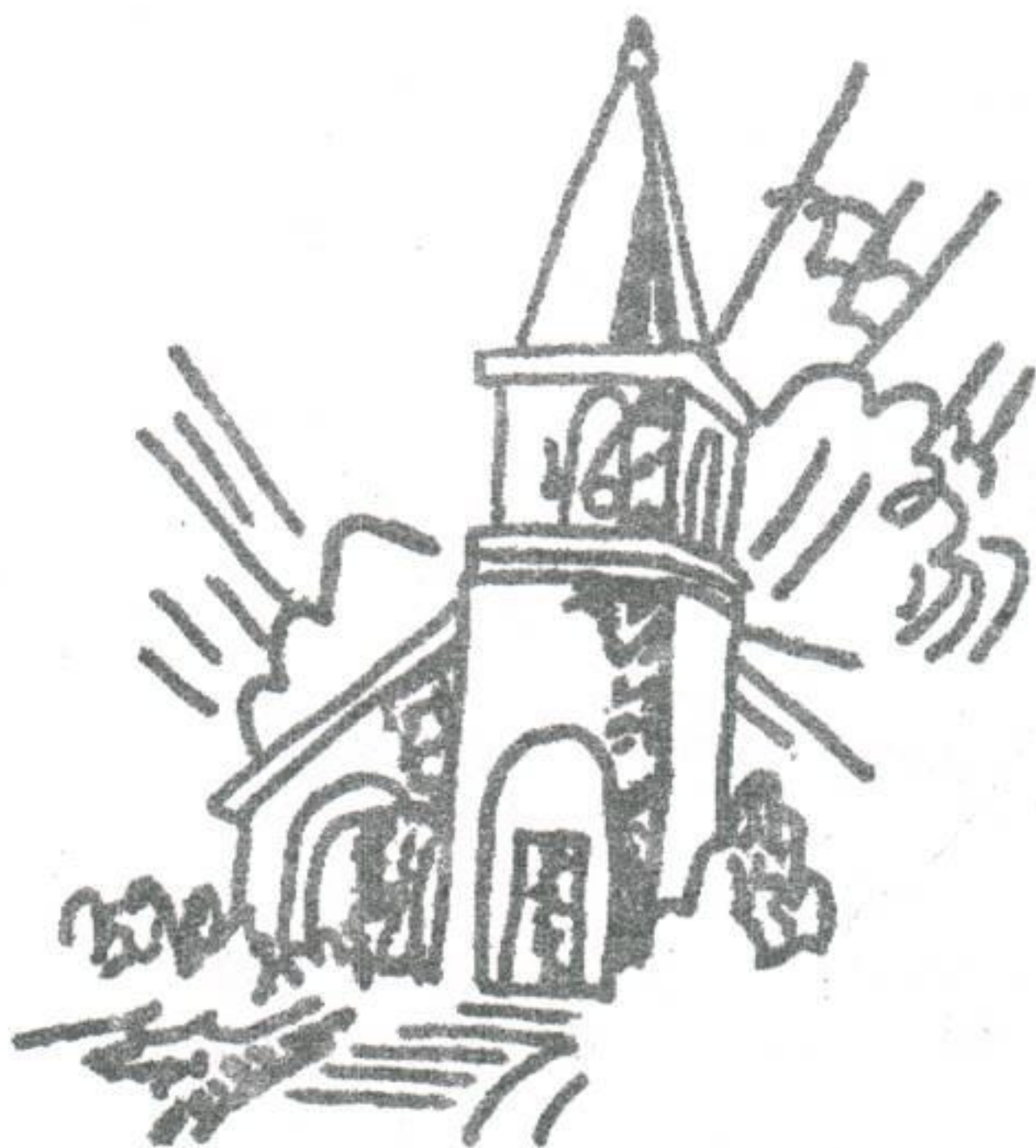

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.

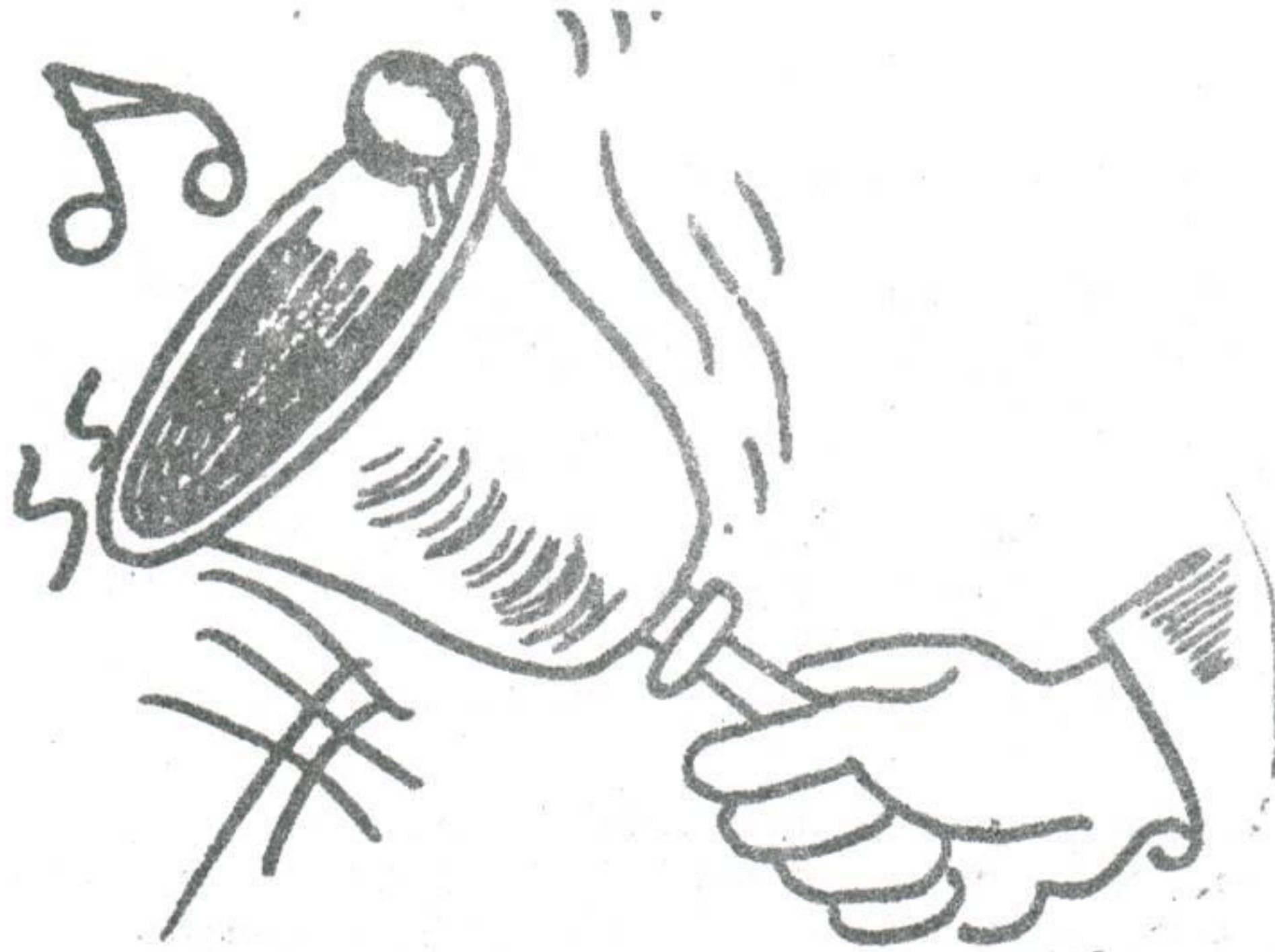

SAUNA

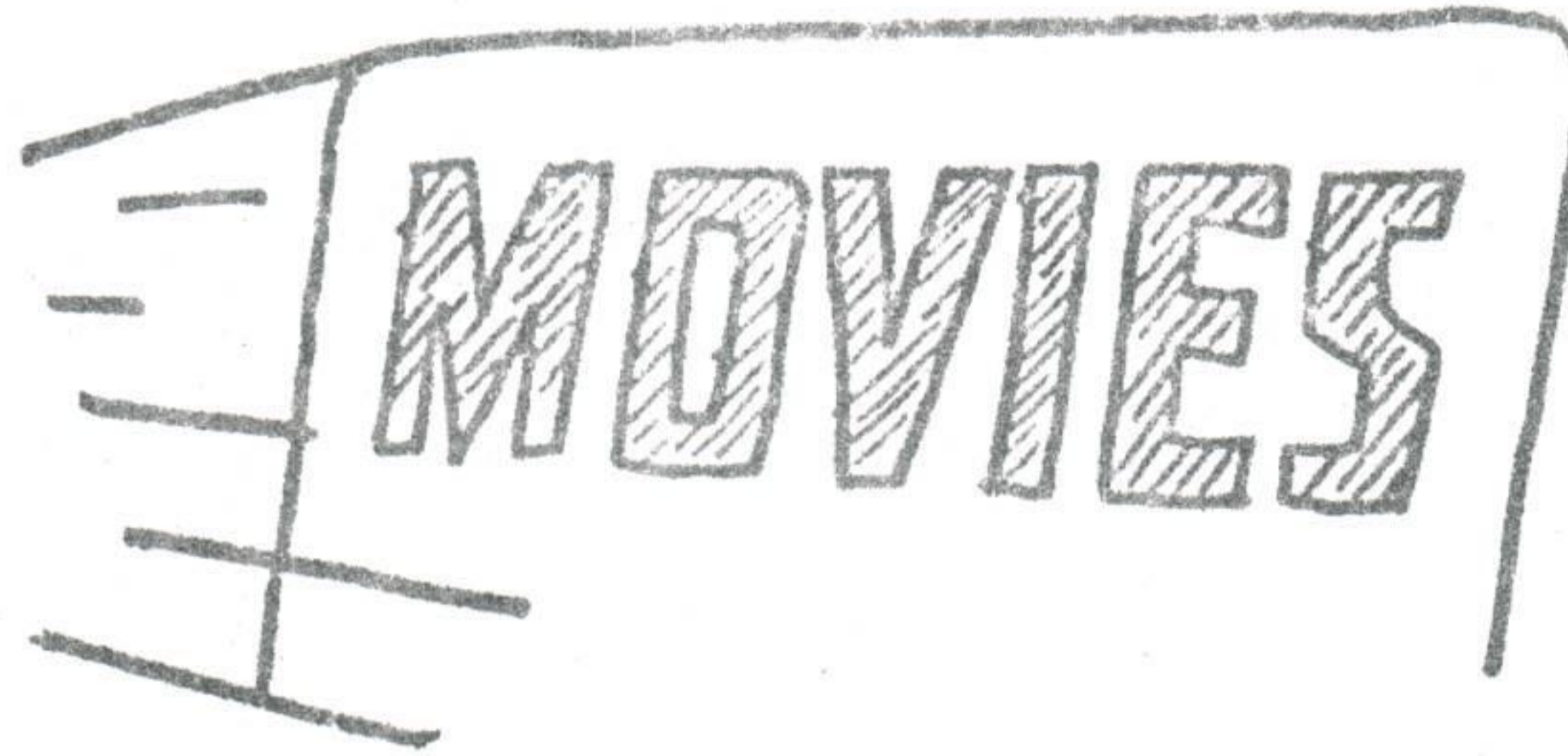
The repairs have been completed on the Sauna. It is now available for anyone wishing to use it.

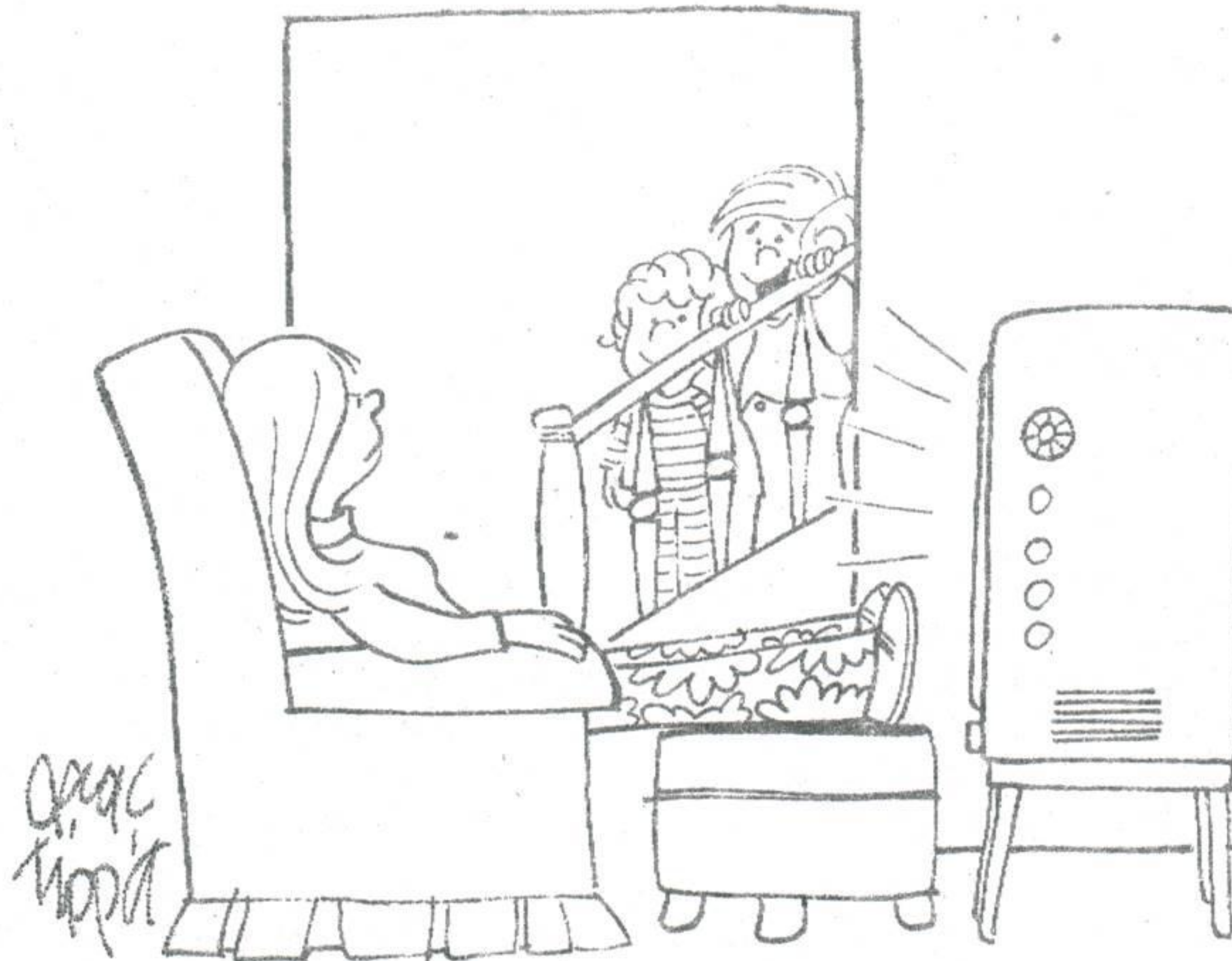

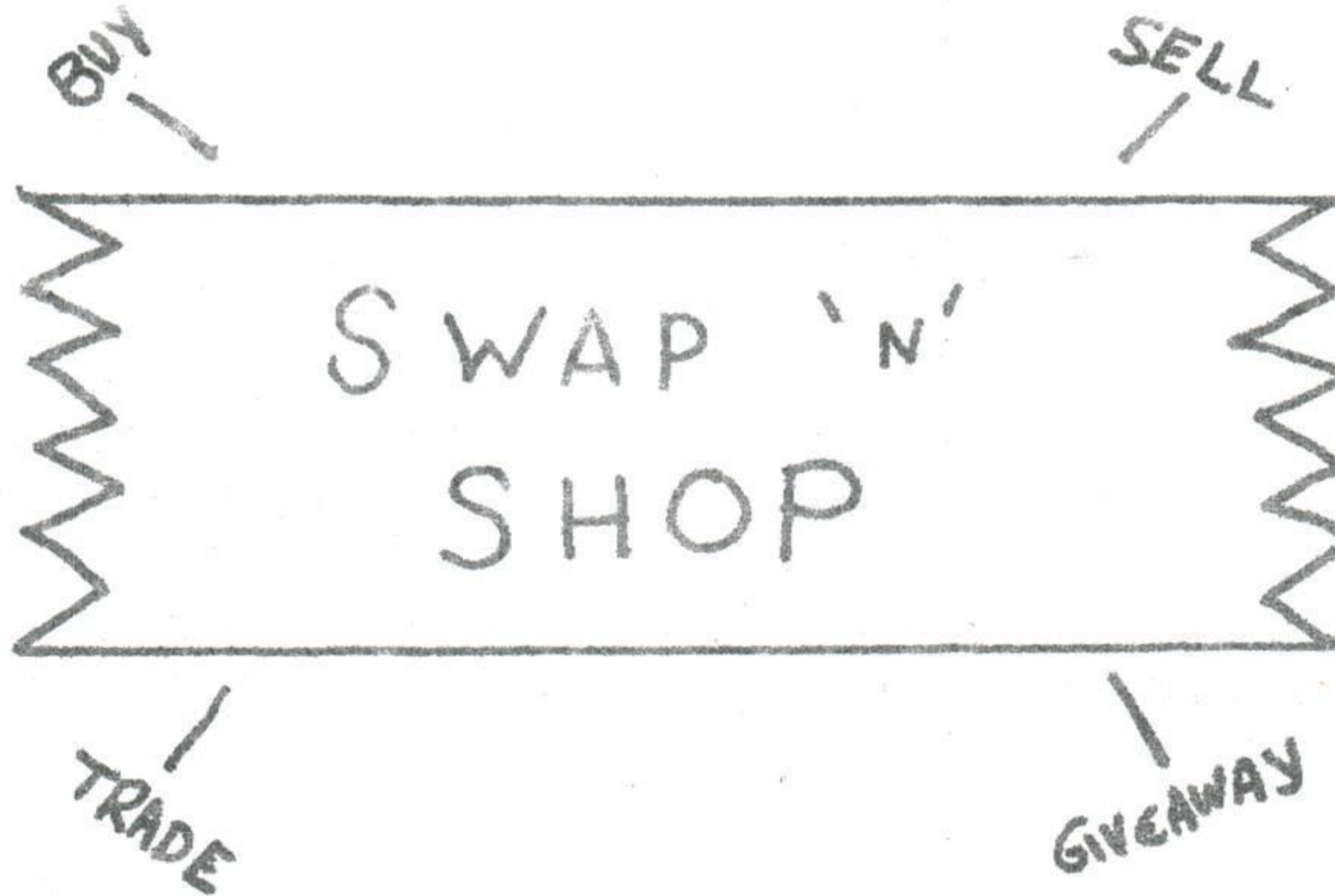

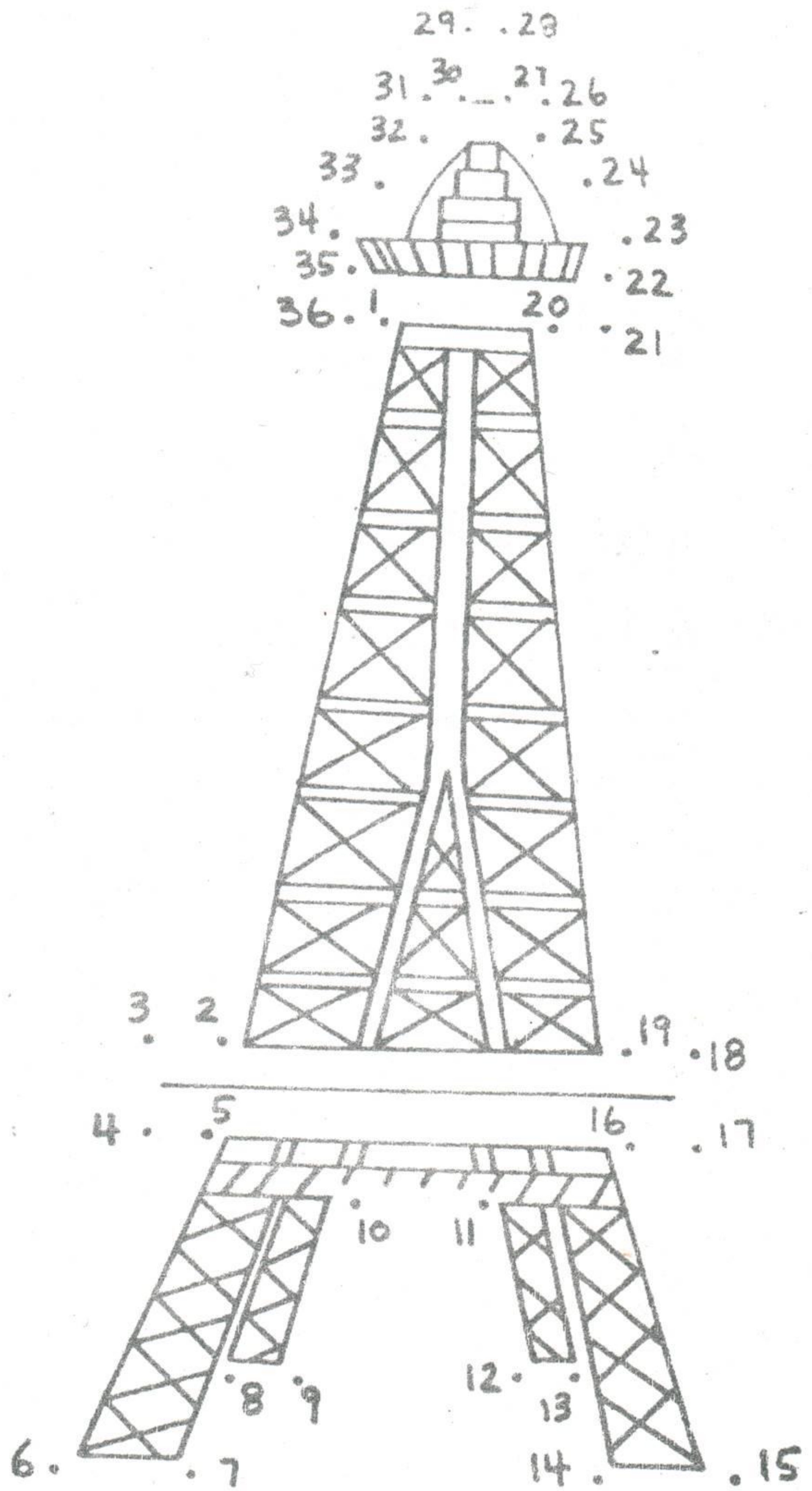
