

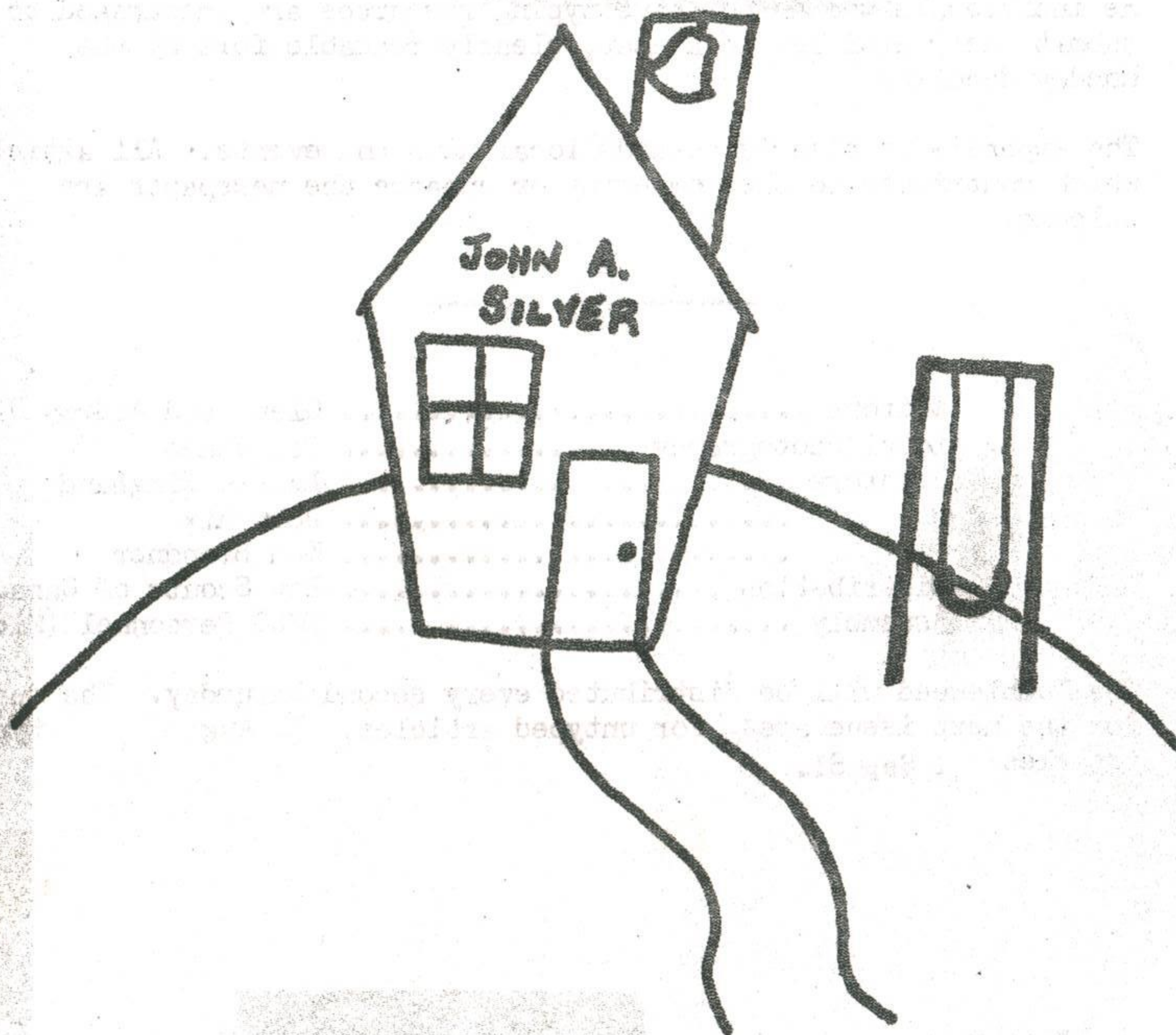

A MESSAGE FROM THE MASTER GOPHER

It gives me great pleasure to announce in this issue the appointment of MCpl Terry Collins as the new Mayor of Tumbleweed Park effective 1 Sep 81. As everyone is well aware, the office of mayor is very demanding and very important to our community. Programmes and activities organized by the mayor and his council affect all of us. In order for the mayor to have a successful year he must have the support of everyone on the station. I therefore ask that all personnel pitch in and support MCpl Collins throughout his year as mayor.

You have probably heard by now about the compulsory physical fitness programme. I would like to give you a little background information and the reasons behind my decision to proceed with a compulsory programme.

If you recall, NDHQ cancelled the compulsory aerobic testing programme for the over 30 group and retained the compulsory test for under 30's. The cancellation of the programme for over 30's has left very little incentive for them to maintain a good level of physical fitness.

All CF personnel should maintain a level of fitness which will enable them to perform their normal duties with maximum efficiency. They should be prepared to meet any emergency which may require the use of their physical resources. Further, good physical fitness will contribute to the maintenance of their health.

It is anticipated that this fall NDHQ will announce a new programme for physical fitness for all ages. In order to be prepared and for reasons previously stated, an organized programme at CFS Alask is required.

In the past, the approach to voluntary physical fitness programmes has not been very successful. In order for a programme to be a success and have everyone participate it must be compulsory. Our PERI staff have organized a programme that provides a good selection of periods to participate. Further, their programme consists of both exercises and games which will make them more enjoyable.

I am confident that our programme at CFS Alask will be a good one, and that all personnel will look forward to their two sessions a week at the gym.

We have a new school starting this year - the Alask Play School. Mrs. Naldrett and Mrs. Palka have organized a Play School for the three and four year old members of our community. The Play School will provide an excellent educational beginning for our little ones and it will be a valuable community service. I fully support this endeavour and ask that all personnel assist the Play School when requested throughout the year.

A station orientation briefing for new personnel is scheduled for 1330 hrs 03 Sep 81 in the Parish Hall. Information will be presented as follows:

1. Station Briefing - CO
2. Community Affairs - Mayor
3. Fire Safety - Fire Chief

A tour of the Operations Site will follow the formal briefings.

This is an excellent opportunity for new personnel to get firsthand information about the station. It also offers support personnel and wives a chance to have a look at the operational side of the house. I am expecting a good turnout for this occasion.

From Summerside MAdO to Alsask CAdO.

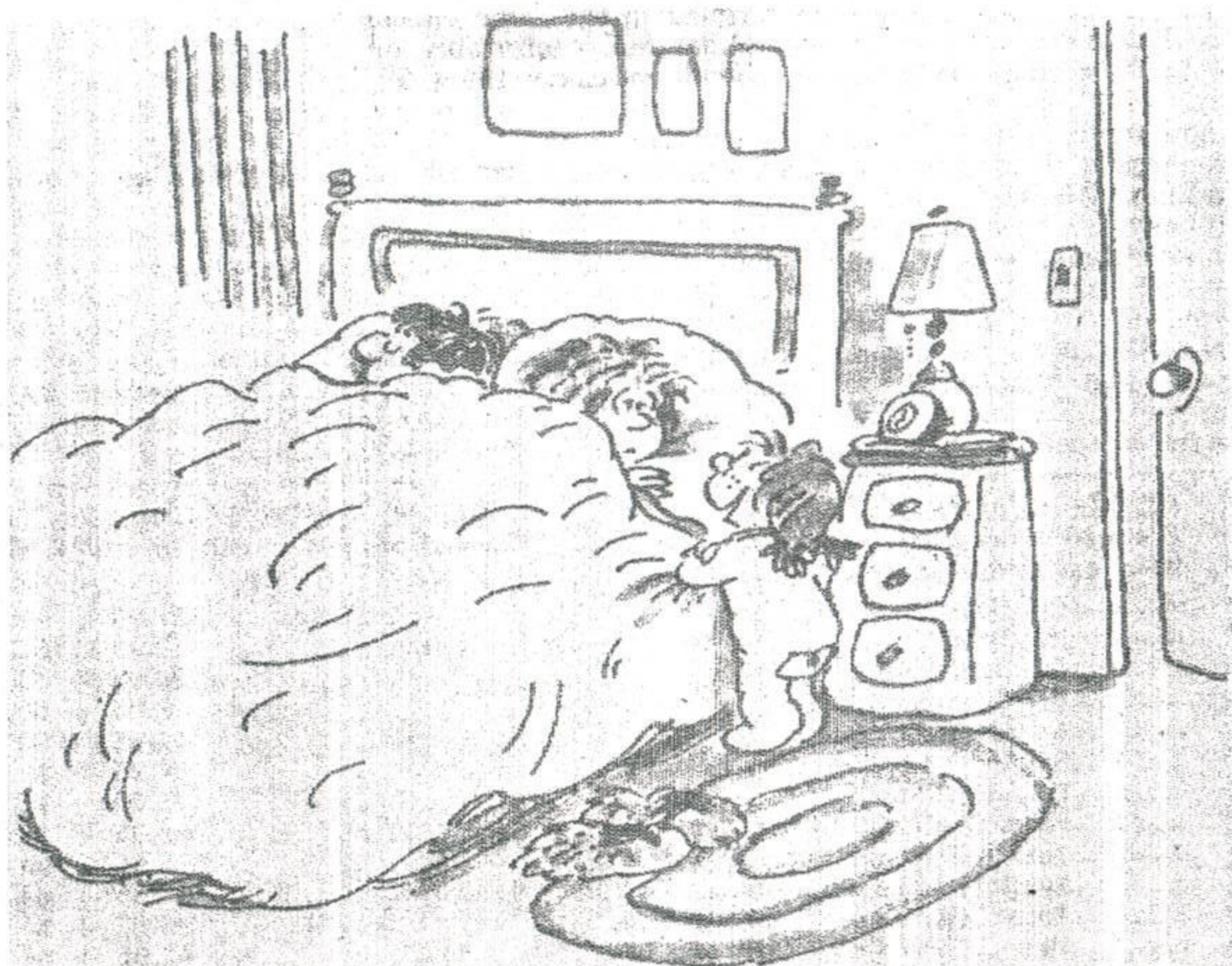

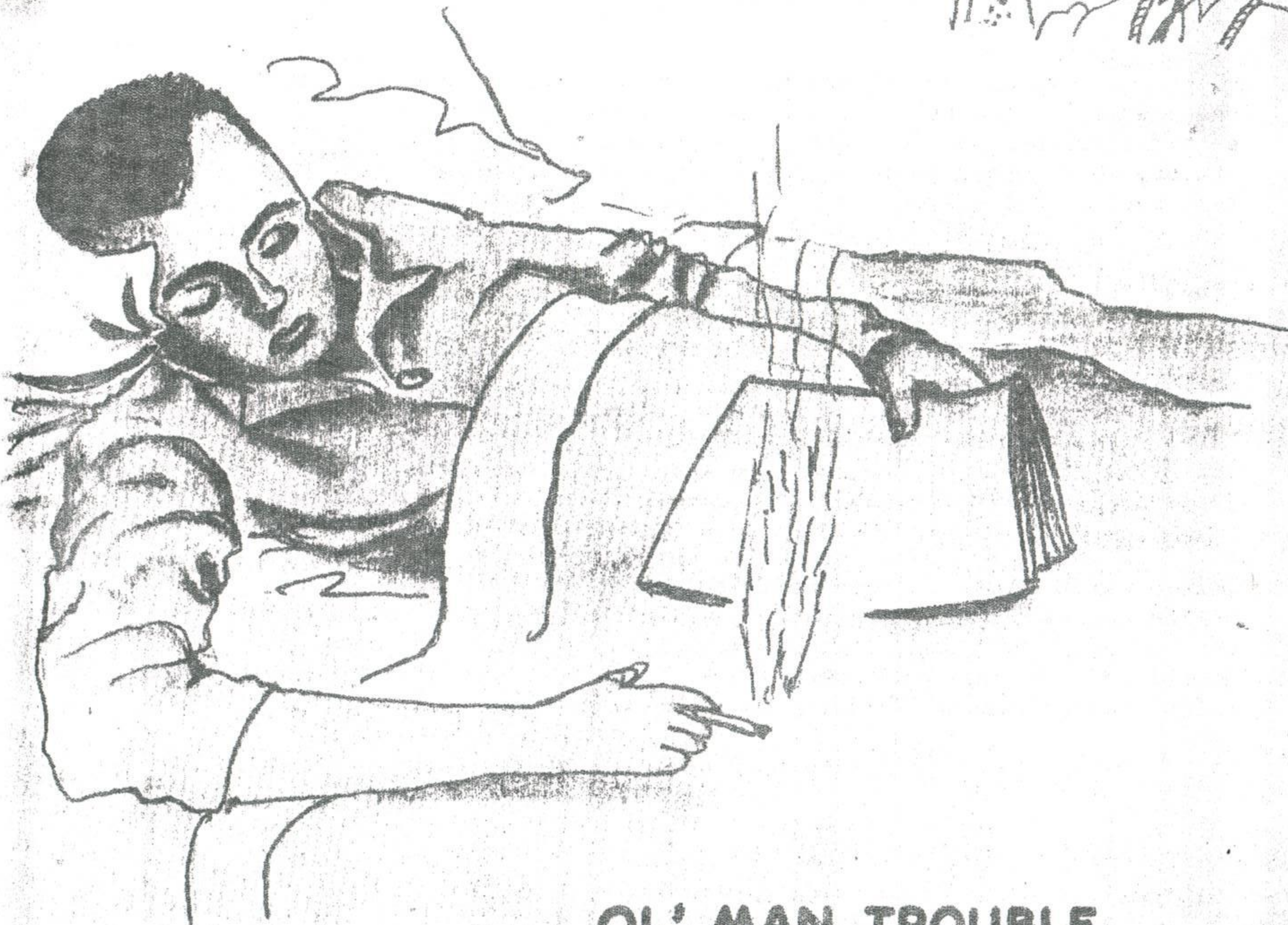
5. Driving is a full-time, 100 per cent attention occupation.

Oven Cheese Omelet

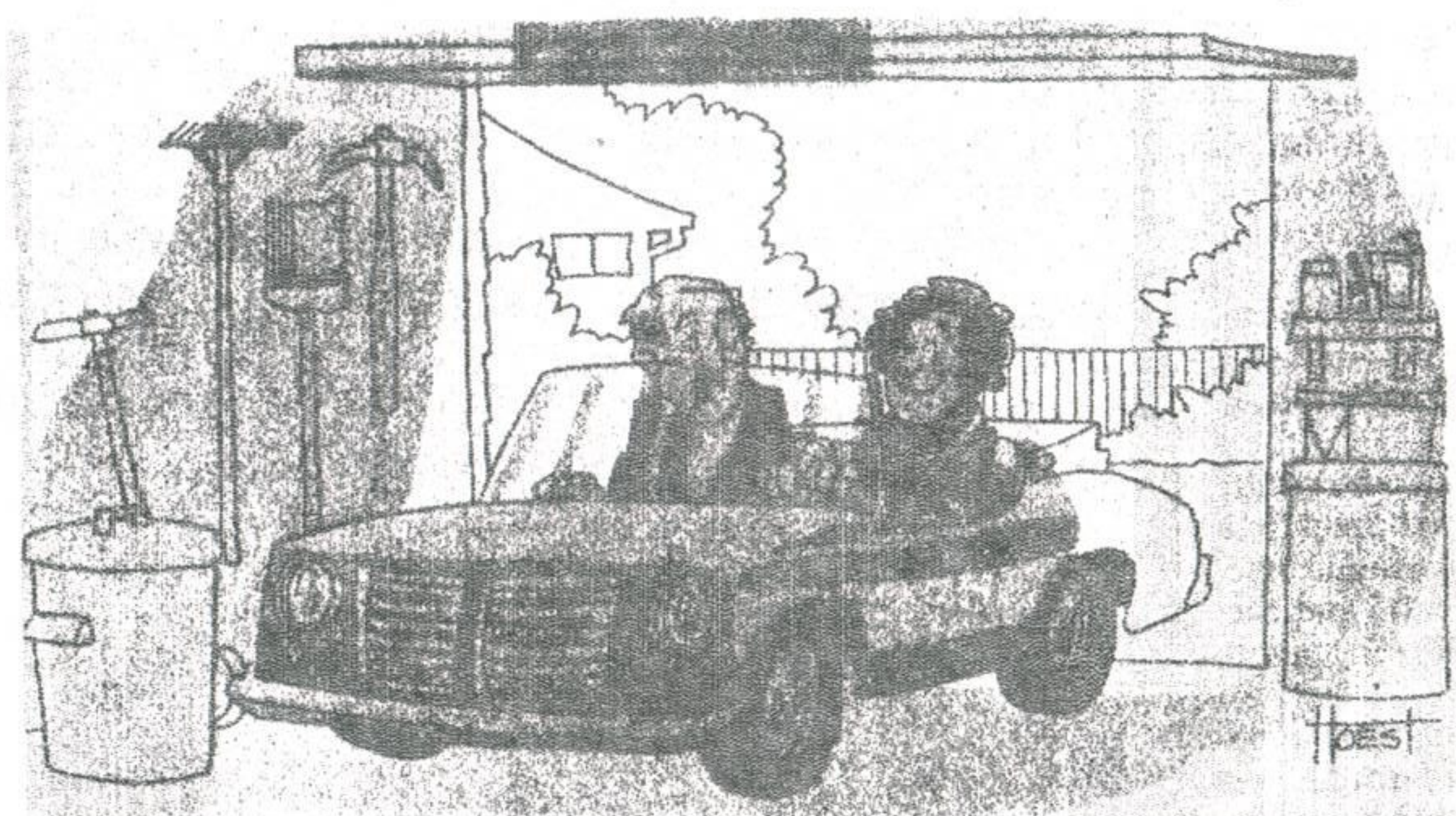
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|--------------------------|-------------------------------|
| 6 Beaten eggs            | 3/4 cup grated process cheese |
| 1/3 cup skim milk powder | 2 tsp melted margarine        |
| 1 cup water              | 1/4 tsp salt                  |
| 1 cup soft bread crumbs  |                               |

Combine ingredients. Pour into greased 8 inch square baking dish. Bake at 325 degrees F until knife inserted in center comes out clean (25-30 mins) Serve immediately - 6 servings.


Luncheon Casserole

- 1/2 cup sliced onion
- 2 Tblspoon fat
- 1 - 10 oz can condensed tomato soup
- 1 cup (4 oz) grated cheddar cheese
- 1 - 12 oz can luncheon meat - cubed
- 2 cups cooked noodles (4 oz uncooked)
- 1 cup bread cubes

Saute onion in fat until transparent. Combine with remaining ingredients except bread cubes. Turn into greased baking dish and bake 20 mins at 350 degrees F. Top with bread cubes and bake 10 minutes more. Serves 6.

# BOOKENDS

AND NO BIRDS SANG - by Farley Mowat. A searing condemnation of the atrocity of war...

The anguished odyssey of a young soldier struggling to stay alive in a world gone mad...

This is Farley Mowat's brilliant and haunting war story.

In July of 1942 Mowat was an eager, idealistic infantry lieutenant barely out of his teens, bound for England on a troop ship and impatient to see action.

This powerful account of the action he saw and somehow, against all odds, survived is a true story which evokes the terrible reality of warfare with an honesty and clarity fiction can only imitate.

Savage fighting in Sicily and a long, tortuous struggle through the Italian mountains devastated the young lieutenant's illusions of romantic adventure until: "For the first time I truly understood that the dead... were dead."

Here is the agony and the antic humour, the tragedy and the tedium, the special camaraderie shared only by those who have fought a war. Here too is the impassioned anger of one soldier who discovers he can no longer accept the bloody carnage which engulfed him near the end of the Italian campaign.

THE LAST ENCHANTMENT - by Mary Stewart. It is a richly woven tapestry peopled by princes and soldiers, grave-robbers and goldsmiths, innkeepers and peasants and witches, in a finely described landscape where each forest, lake and hill is charged, not only with the natural life of the countryside, but with the twilight spirits of older mythologies - multiple threads merging into the bright promise of the future, and linked though Merlin in the archetypal themes of a fast, exciting and powerful story.

Merlin's (whom men call "enchanter,") story focuses on a different kind of warfare against more subtle and dangerous enemies. Of these the chief is Morgause, rose-gold witch and half-sister to Arthur, whom she once snared incestuously to her bed, an act resulting in the birth of a son, Mordred, who will be the most dangerous of all.

The account of Merlin's own enchanting is not, however, a tragic one. In the dark ebbtide of his gift he finds that he is not totally deserted by the god who bestowed it. Struggling for resignation, he finds a fulfillment that even he had never dreamed of. His power and bright vision will be there at the King's service as long as Arthur lives, and as he believes, long after.

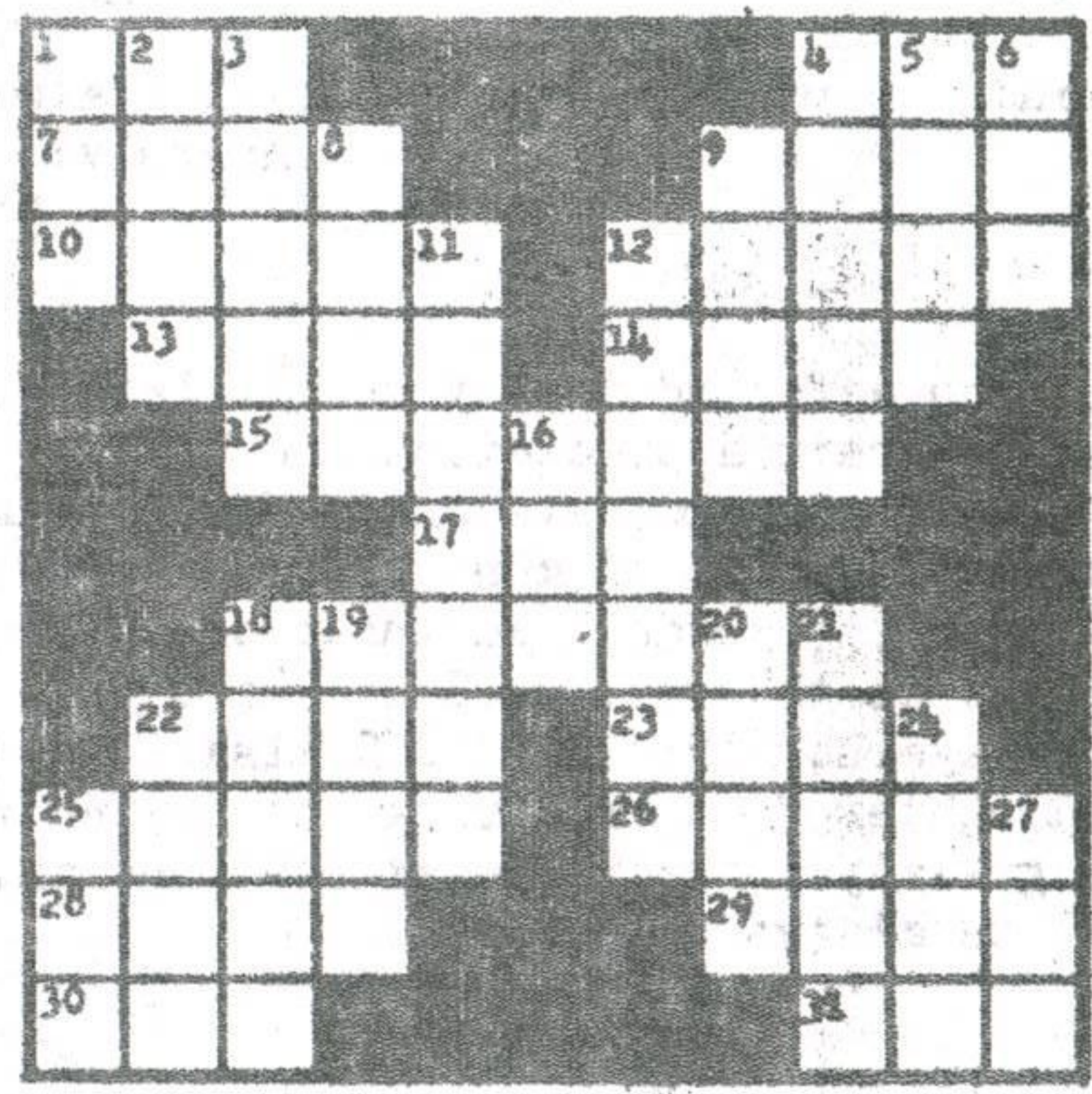

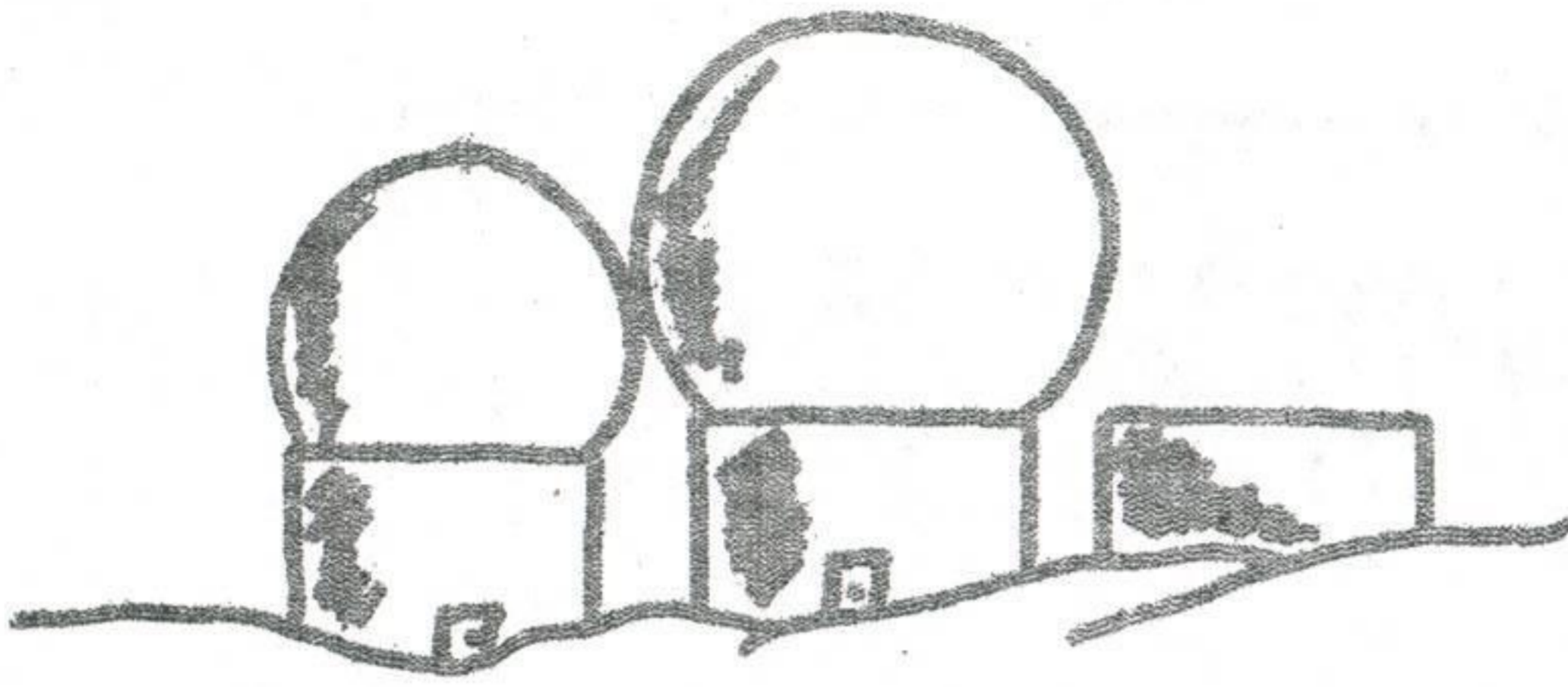

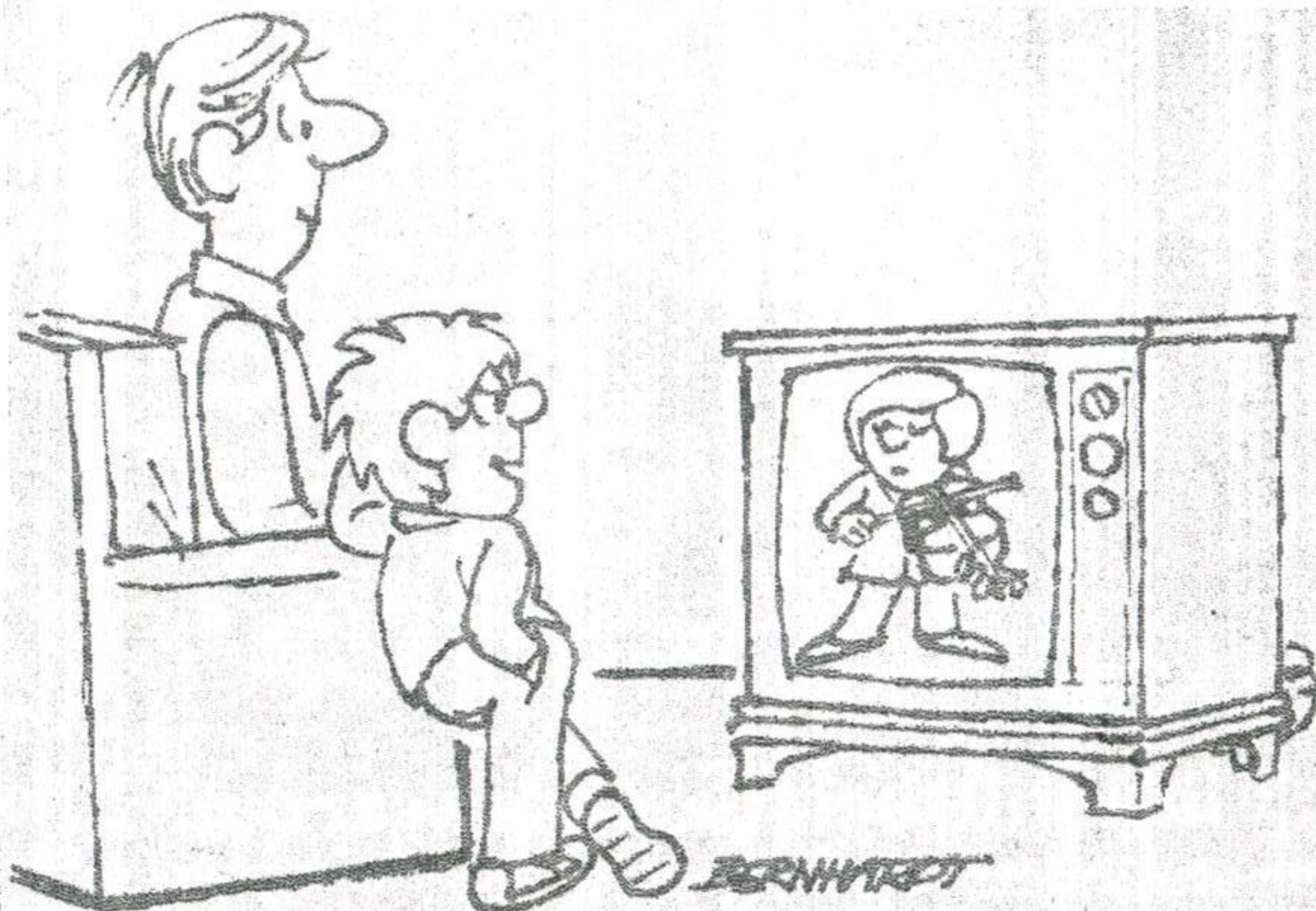

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5 1/2% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.

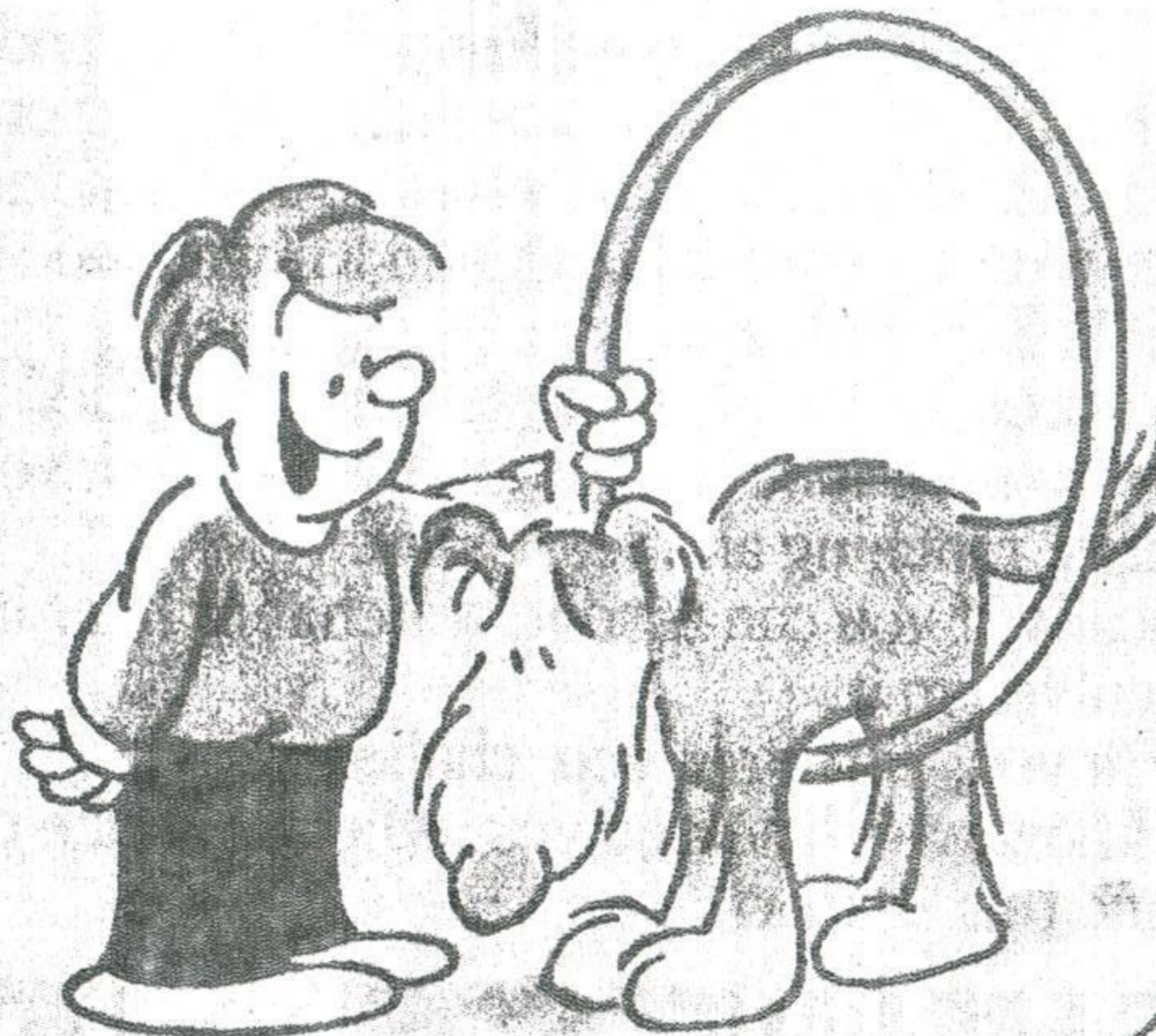

#### ANNOUNCEMENT

Defence Minister Gilles Lamontagne has announced the appointment of Brigadier-General J.M. Lionel Bourgeois, of Marcelin, Sask., as director general information at National Defence Headquarters.

BGen Bourgeois joined the RCAF in 1952 under the Regular Officer Training Plan and graduated from the University of Toronto in 1956 with a degree in mechanical engineering. He has served as a air navigator and an engineer both in Canada and overseas in France.

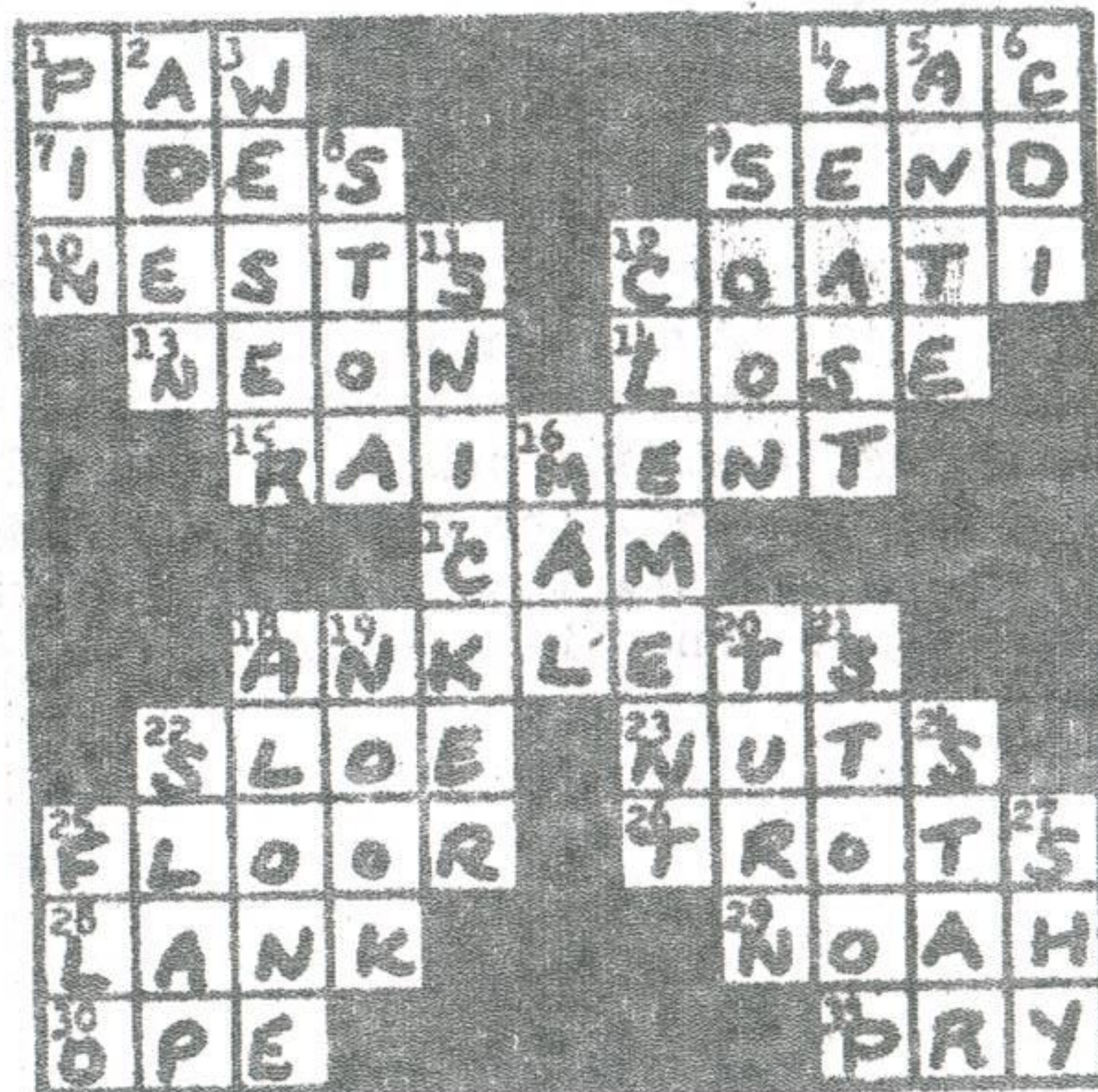
If you find yourself using these kind of statements, perhaps you should take a second look at the situation and rephrase your statement or better yet refrain from commenting on the situation all together.

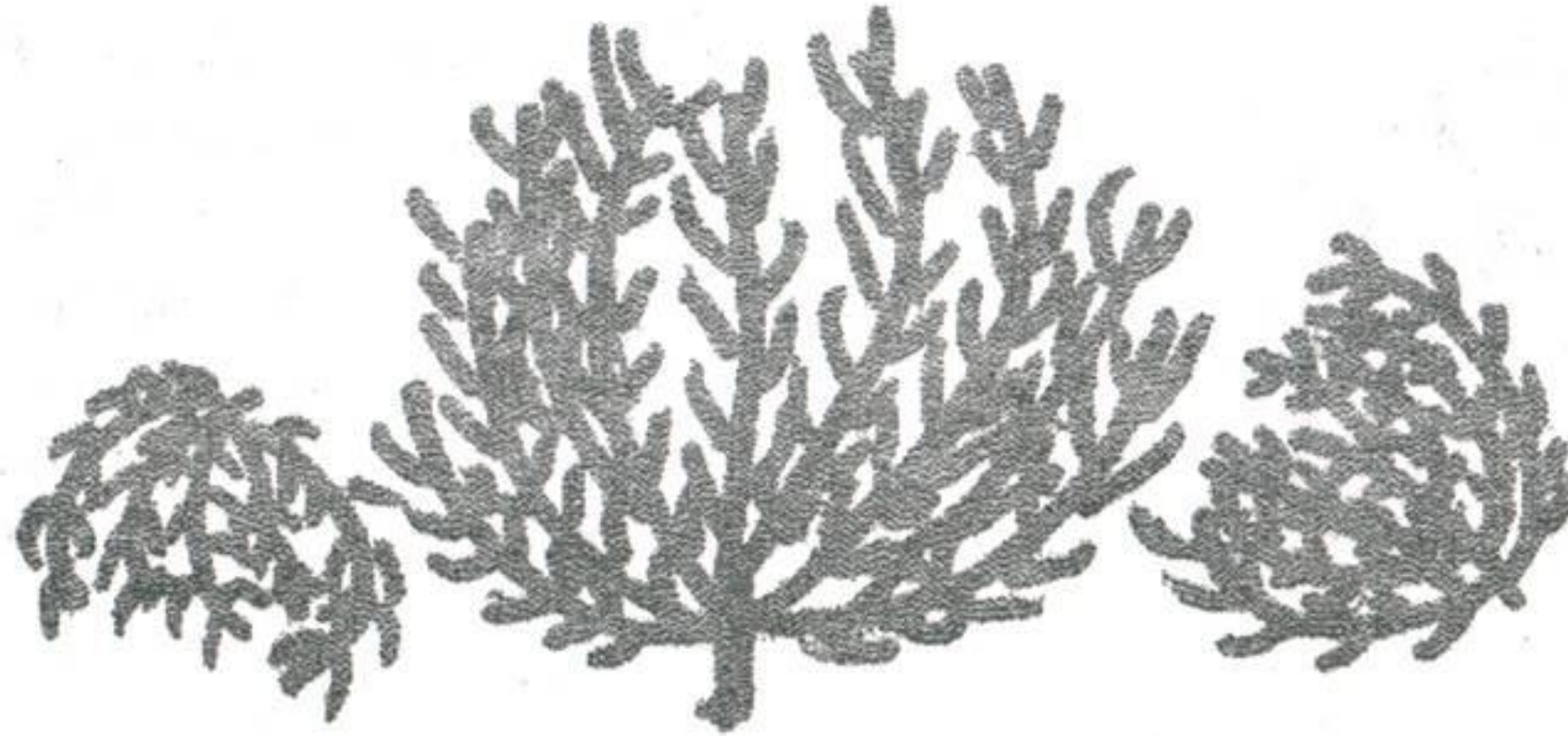
