Congratulations Lynn, you've graduated from sticking your nose in the pop bottle instead of drinking it, to missing your mouth while drinking and getting a shower.


It was decided that Lynn needs a snorkle to drink out of the water fountain.

BOOKENDS

THE AVRO CF-100 - by Larry Milberry. Still in service after 30 years in the air, the Avro CF-100 twin-jet interceptor is one of Canada's great aviation success stories. It is the only Canadian-designed fighter to go into mass production.

Known officially as the Canuck, and unofficially as the Clunk, the Lead Sled, the Aluminum Crow as well as other sometimes unmentionable names, the CF-100 was once a familiar sight in Canadian and European skies. With its Orenda engines housed in bulky fuselage-hugging nacelles, it is a distinctive-looking aircraft. Beside today's supersonic fighters it looks positively archaic. This book describes the aircraft's development from design and first prototype flights to all later Marks, even including proposals for a four-engine CF-100 and an STOVL ground-attack version. This handsome book tells the story not only of the aircraft but of the people who flew it. In its heyday over 20 years ago the CF-100 served on the front line with NORAD and NATO. Such aspects as aircrew training at North Bay and Cold Lake, squadron formation, weapons practice, armament research, and service with the Belgian Air Force (the only other air force to fly the CF-100) are covered in detail. Fascinating first-person accounts describe such events as test flying, scrambles, a bail-out after a near-fatal mid-air collision, and an electronic warfare mission with the Clunk playing enemy bomber.

The book includes the largest and finest collection of illustrations of the CF-100 and its ever published--over 300 photos, engineering drawings, cut-aways, foldout cockpit diagrams, and maps, as well as superb colour profiles by aviation artist Peter Mossman.

THE FLASH CHILDREN - by Mabel Esther Allan. Dilys and Megan thought their new home, beneath a railroad embankment, ugly, but Arthur liked the way the Manchester - London express rushed by. Another consolation was the "flash" -- a great sheet of salt water, home of many waterfowl. Then they met Dan and Edith -- who entertained themselves by hurling stones at birds and also at windows -- and the visually handicapped Brian. It was Brian who introduced them to what was to become their summer occupation -- helping to restore a British manor house in an attempt to obtain the designation "ancient monument." But Dan and Edith were interested in the house, too, and its many windows.

As the summer unfolds, Dilys, Arthur, and Megan learn things besides carpentry and painting. Through Brian and an artist friend their appreciation of beauty is expanded, and they discover that there is a lot of good in almost everyone, even window smashers. Best of all is Brian's gradual adjustment to his sight impairment.

If you have lots of bills, receipts, letters and other records, but no room for a filing cabinet, use a hanging plastic purse file. You will find that standard size file folders fit neatly into the pouches.

An old shaving brush is great for dusting pleated lampshades in seconds. The bristles are long enough to get dust out of the deepest pleats and soft enough not to damage the most fragile of your fabric shades.

Spray silver, brass and pewter ashtrays with furniture polish to make them easier to clean and keep them from holding smoking odors.

White rings and spots on wood furniture are tricky to remove. Skin Care:

Dab blemishes with lemon juice a few times a day to help dry them.

After washing your face, splash cider vinegar mixed with warm water. Let it dry in the air - great for clearing blemishes!!

Here's a great overnight eye-cream - odorless castor oil.

Rub dry skin from your face, elbows, knees and feet with Miracle Whip salad dressing. Rub a little into the skin and let dry partially. Then massage vigorously with your fingertips. The dry skin will roll away. Use only Miracle Whip - mayonnaise won't work.

Your skin needs moisture, not oils. This method helps to trap moisture in the pores where it is needed - wash your face thoroughly, then, while it is still wet, rub in a tiny bit of petroleum jelly. Keep wetting your face and smoothing the jelly until it loses its greasy feeling. The jelly will not be oily, but it will trap the moisture.

To cleanse your pores deeply, give your face a sauna once a week. Fill a bowl with boiling water and add the juice of half a lemon and a handful of herbs. Cover your hair with a shower cap, lean over the bowl, and make a tent with a towel draped over your head. After about 15 minutes, rinse your face with very cold water.

To relieve the puffiness and redness of tired eyes, lean back and put over your eyes either slices of cucumber, cold used tea bags or ice cubes in cloth.

RECIPES

Homemade Mayonnaise (blender)

1 egg
 1/4 cup lemon juice or vinegar
 1/2 cup dry mustard
 1/2 tsp salt
 1/8 tsp pepper
 pinch of cayenne
 1 1/4 - 1 1/2 cups vegetable oil

Combine egg, lemon juice (or vinegar), mustard, salt, pepper, cayenne and 1/4 cup of oil in jar of blender or food processor; blend until smooth. With the machine still running, slowly drip the remaining oil in (the more oil the thicker it becomes) make 1 1/2 cups

Rice Carrot Loaf

2 Cups cooked rice (3/4 cup uncooked)
 4 beaten eggs
 2 1/4 cups grated carrot (about 12 oz)
 2 cups (8oz) grated cheese
 1 tsp salt
 1 1/2 tsp Worcestershire sauce
 1 1/2 tsp dry mustard
 Dash of pepper

Combine ingredients and pour into 9x5 inch loaf pan. Bake at 325 F until set (about 1 hour). Serve with ketchup if desired - makes 8 servings.

In the next issue of the Tumbleweed I will enlighten you on Special Orders. Remember, the money you spend on base, stays on base for your support.

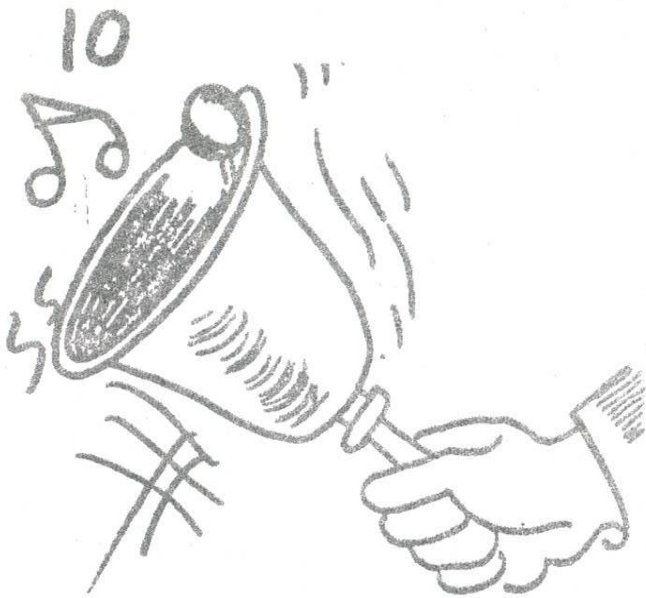

7. Garbage to be emptied outside and a clean garbage bag placed in the can;
8. Ensure that no crumbs are left either on the cupboard or on the floor;
9. Tea towels and dish cloths to be taken home, washed, folded and returned to the appropriate drawer.

THE BABY-SITTER AND YOU!

How old must a person be before he or she can take over the duties of a Baby-sitter?

It is strongly recommended that any person engaged for Baby-sitting purposes, should be a mature and stable individual of at least 12 years. It would be preferable to select a person with experience or training in child care.

A successful Baby-sitting job should be carefully planned to ensure the safety and well-being of both Baby and Baby-sitter. Suggestions which may be of assistance are listed below:

- * The whereabouts of the parents of the child should be left with the Baby-sitter, including Telephone Numbers, Names and Addresses of people or places they will visit. Have a pencil and paper available at the telephone for messages. Special instructions as to Bedtime Rules, Feeding, Time for Lights out, etc., should be left.
- * The Telephone number of the Family Doctor, Fire and Police Departments should be handy. A relative or other adult person who may readily assist, should be noted.
- * Check and lock all doors and windows. Do not unlock doors for anyone not expected, except in an emergency.
- * Avoid making personal telephone calls. Keep the telephone available for incoming calls from baby's parents.
- * In case of fire, first get baby and other children out of the house or apartment. Then call your local Fire Department, from a neighbour's telephone, if necessary.
- * If suspicious about strange noises, a face at the window, a telephone call that worries you, or if any emergency arises, call your local POLICE FORCE.
- * When the child's parents return, report any unusual happenings. Accept escort to your home as planned. However, if a parent is to drive you home, but appears intoxicated, insist on calling your parents to make other arrangements.

CRIME PREVENTION BULLETIN

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.

For those not familiar with YBC the following is a short history:

Nineteen years ago, a program named the Youth Bowling Council was organized for young bowlers with the following aims and objectives:

1. To provide an interesting program that would encourage more youngsters to participate in the various games of bowling.
2. To set up a program of crests and awards for the bowlers who achieve certain degrees of skill.
3. To arrange and conduct a series of tournaments and championships that would be interesting and a challenge to all youth bowlers regardless of their skill.
4. To set up a program that would encourage adult bowlers to take a greater interest in youth bowlers and in instructing youngsters in the etiquette, rules and customs of a proper organized and conducted league.

Here is what has happened since then.....During the first year of the Youth Bowling Council (1963-64), the 5-pin program was conducted only in Ontario. The following year, the program was expanded to a national scale including Man, Sask, Alta, and BC. Nfld, NB, Que, NS, NWT and PEI joined the force in later years. The 10-pin program started in 1970 with the provinces of BC, Alta, Sask, Man and Ont participating.

The Bowling Proprietors Association of Canada administers the program.

The National Youth Bowling Council each year enlists the aid of over 6,000 parents and other adults to voluntarily coach, supervise and instruct the children. Their continuing support is of immense value in the efforts of the Youth Bowling Council to teach the youngsters the art of bowling and the value of sportsmanship and fair play.

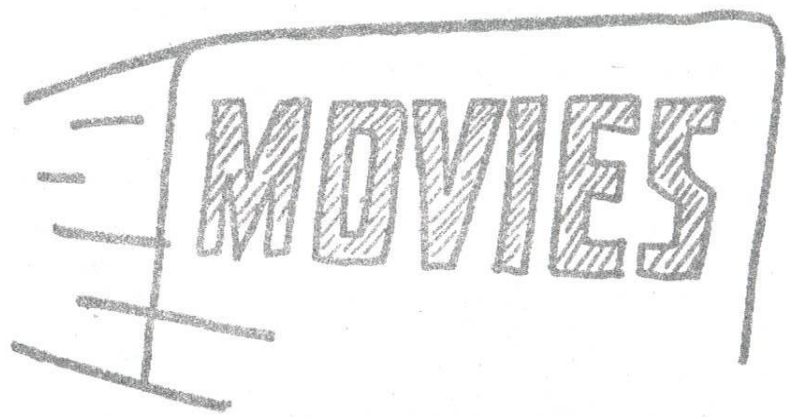

SAUNAS RECALLED

Owners of Home Spa sauna heaters Models HE 50,-60,-75 and-90 and Homecraft Sauna heaters Models HSH 5,-5,5,-6,-7.5 and-9 should stop using them immediately because of a potential fire hazard according to the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and Westhome Manufacturing Limited.

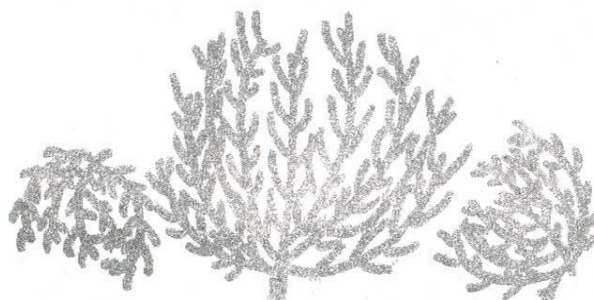
