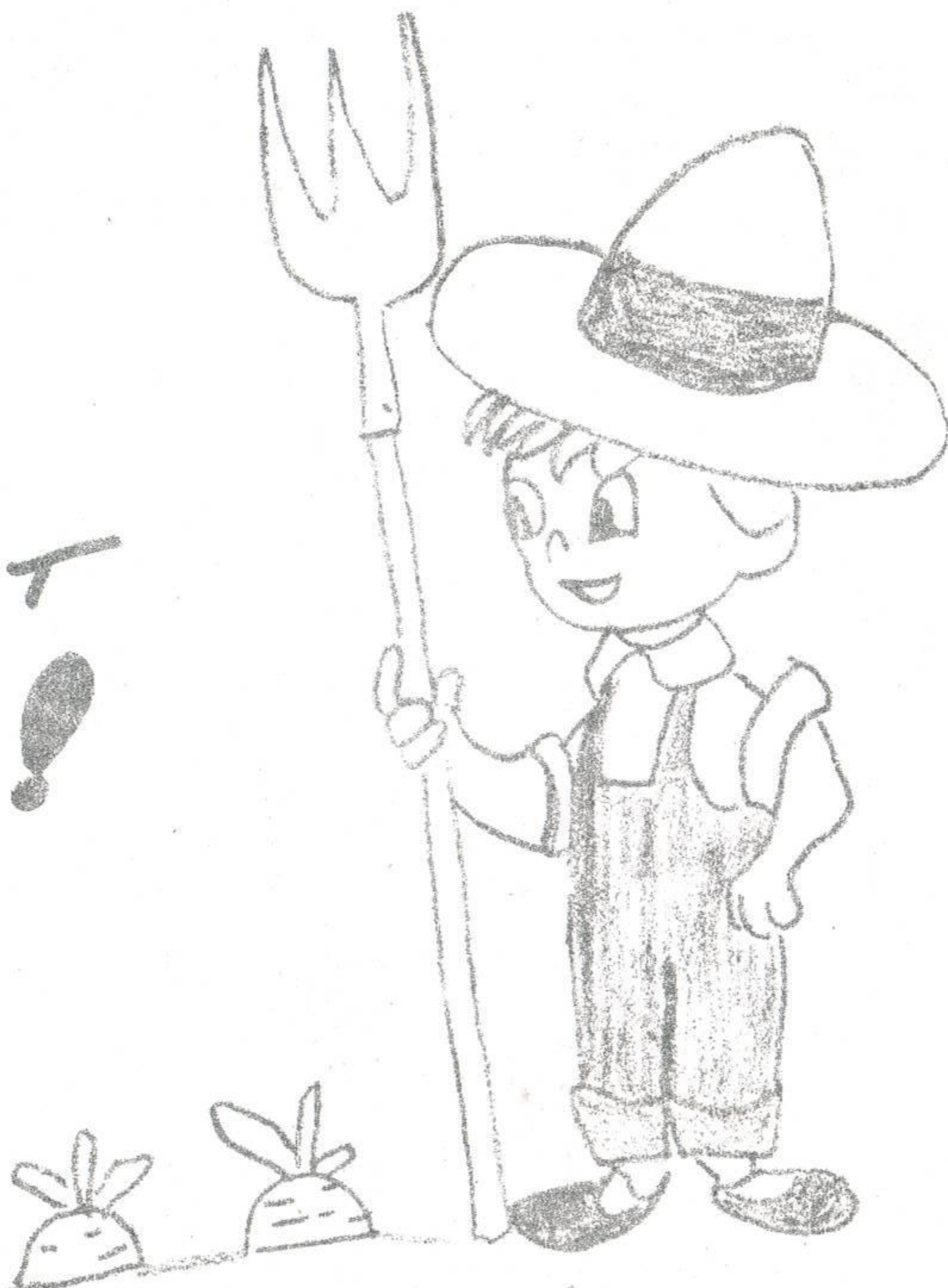

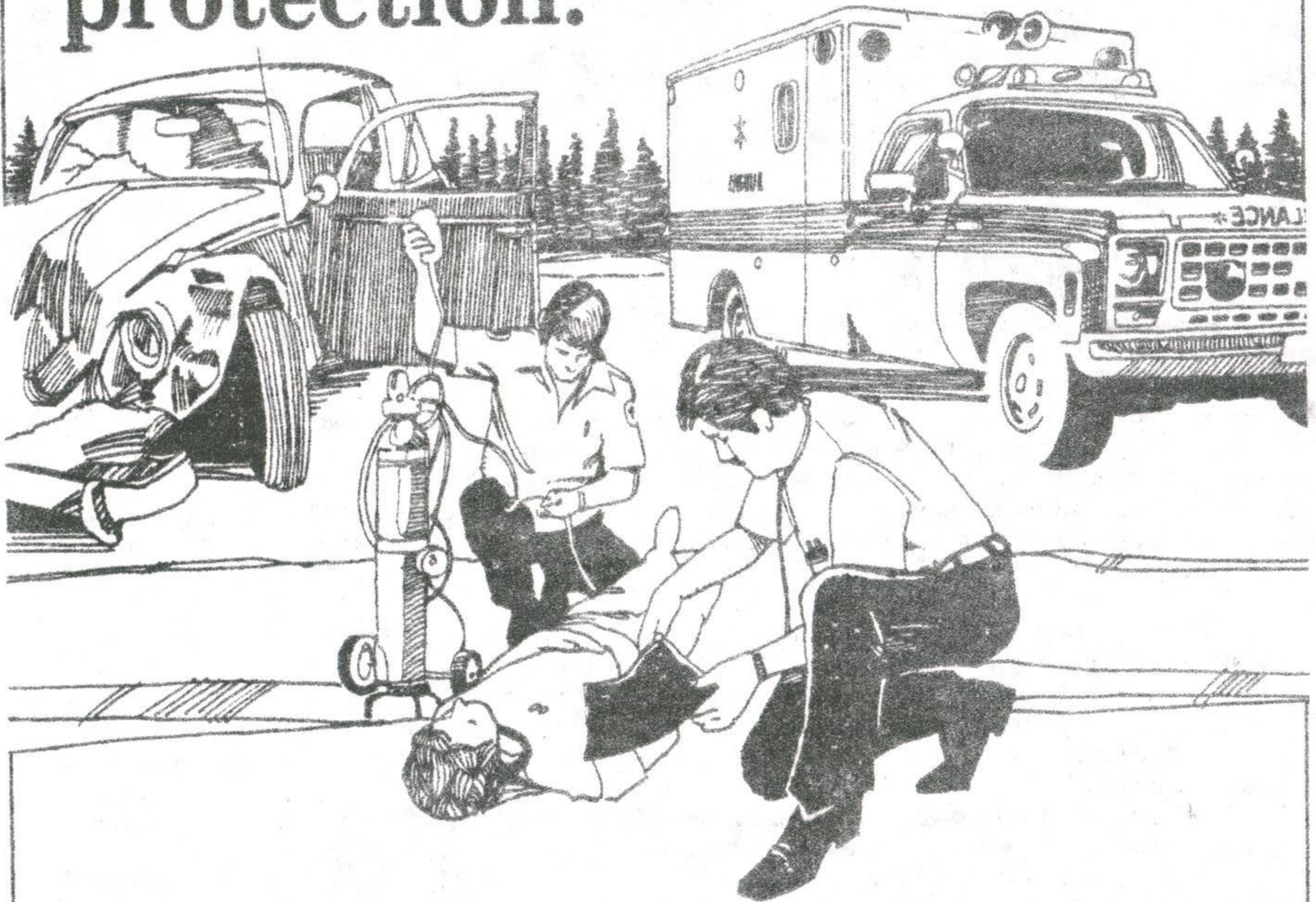

Store bars of soap (until used) on the shelves with the labels off. Not only do you have a room deodorizer but the bars harden and help them last longer when being used. Thanks to Stu Gordon for this idea.

Clean aluminium windows and door frames with silver polish in cream form.

### Hair Care:

### RECIPES

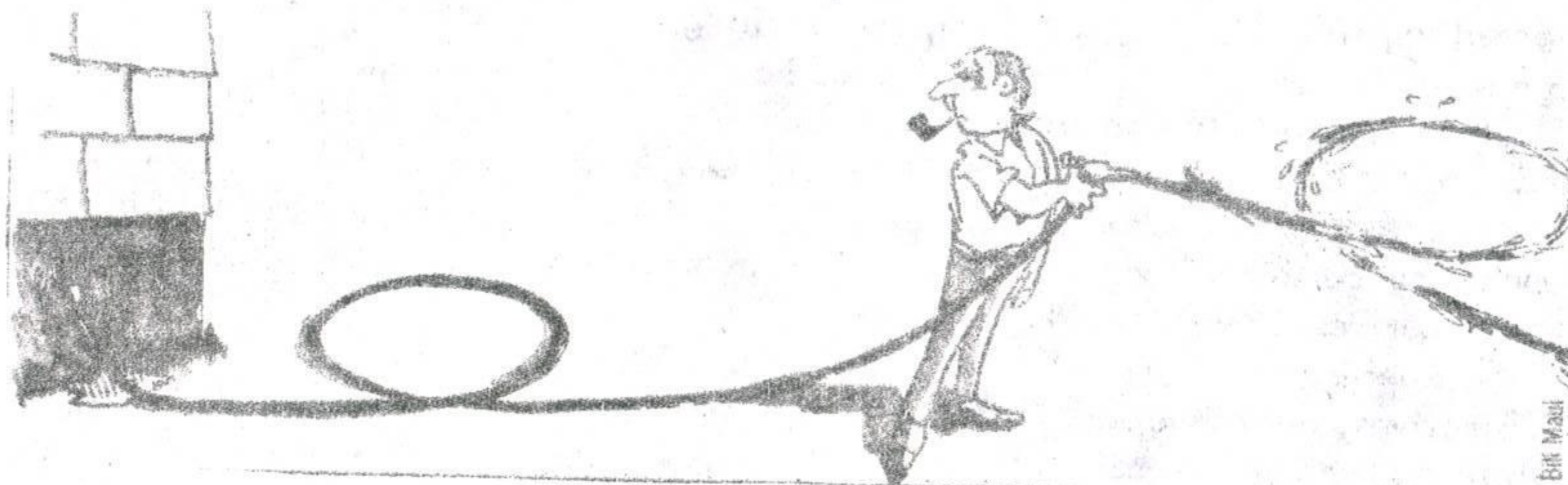
#### Unbaked Caramel Cookies

In a large saucepan combine 2 cups granulated sugar, 3/4 cups butter or margarine and one 6 oz can (2/3 cups) evaporated milk. Bring mixture to a rolling boil, stirring frequently. Remove from heat and add one 4 oz package instant butterscotch/caramel pudding mix and 3 1/2 cups rolled oats; mix together thoroughly. Cool 15 minutes; drop dough from teaspoon onto waxed paper lined tray. Refrigerate - yield about 5 doz.

#### Crescent Pizza Wedges

1 can Pillsbury refrigerated Crescent Dinner Rolls  
Tomato sauce or Kraft spaghetti sauce  
Chopped pepperoni, cooked meat or fish  
Chopped mushrooms and/or vegetables  
Seasonings, as desired  
1/3 cup Kraft grated parmesan cheese  
Yield: 8 Pizza wedges

Preheat oven to 400 F. Separate dough into 8 triangles; place on greased cookie sheet. Spread with tomato or spaghetti sauce. Top with meat or fish, vegetables and cheese. Season as desired. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 400 F for 15 to 20 mins until edges are golden brown. Serve hot. If you prefer pizza with thin, crisp crust, pat dough out to about half again its original size. To make different kinds of pizza wedges, just substitute some of the key ingredients.

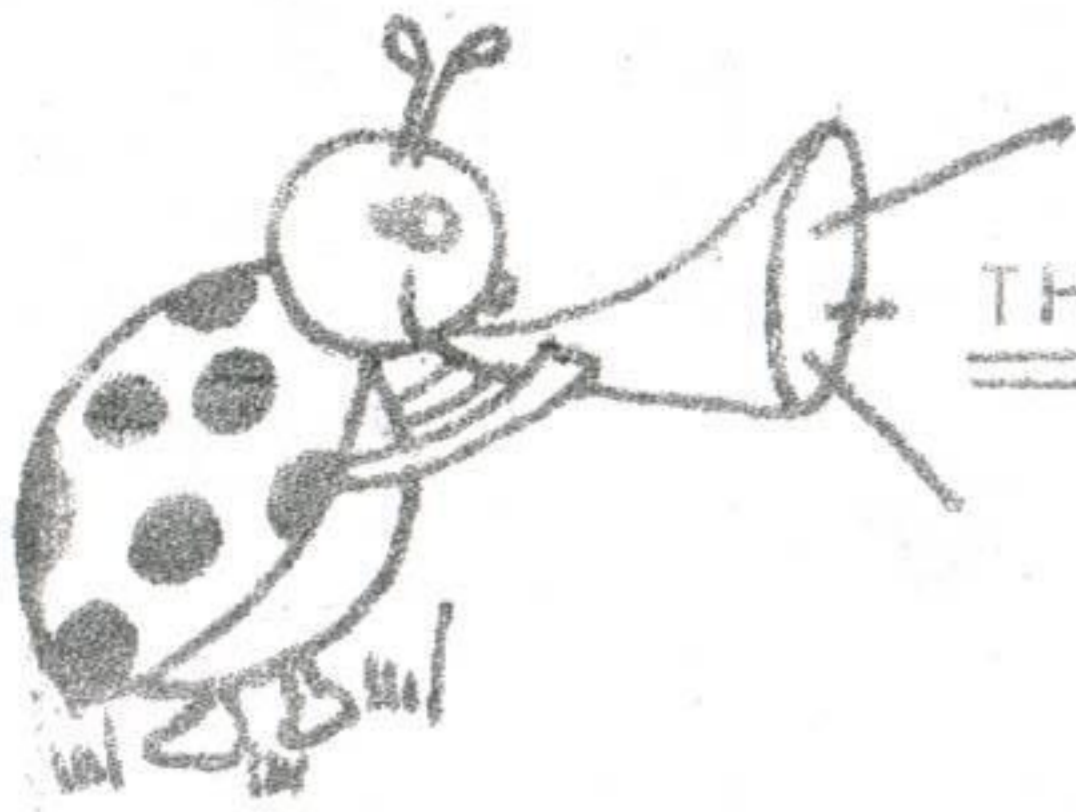
The Girl Guide Objectives

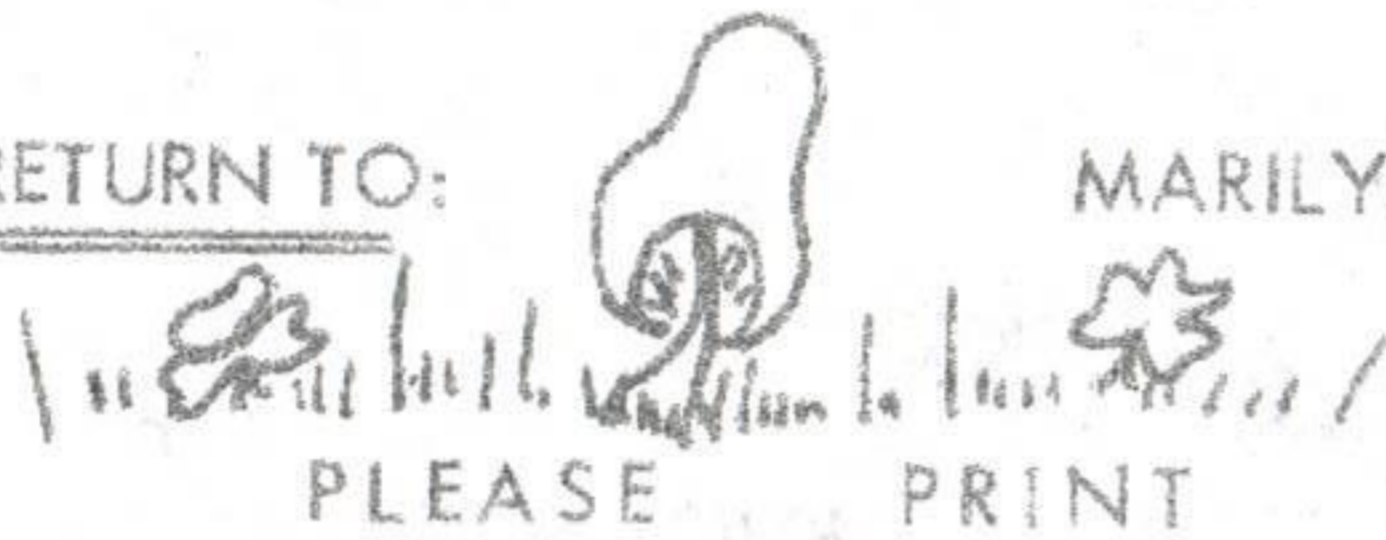

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.

## MISCELLANEOUS

Garbage pick up is on Tuesdays and Fridays at 8:00 a.m.

All pets on Station must be registered and show proof of vaccination. Call the Pet Control Officer, Mike Palka 2370.

The water treatment plant has a limited capacity which, during the summer months, is highly taxed because of the demand for watering lawns and flower beds. A water restriction must be enforced to maintain the water pressure and fire protection level.

The following restrictions will be in effect starting 01 May on PMQ lawns and flower beds:

- odd numbered MQs/trailer pads on odd numbered days;
- even numbered MQs/trailer pads on even numbered days;
- hours of watering from 5:00 to 10:00 p.m. on days mentioned.

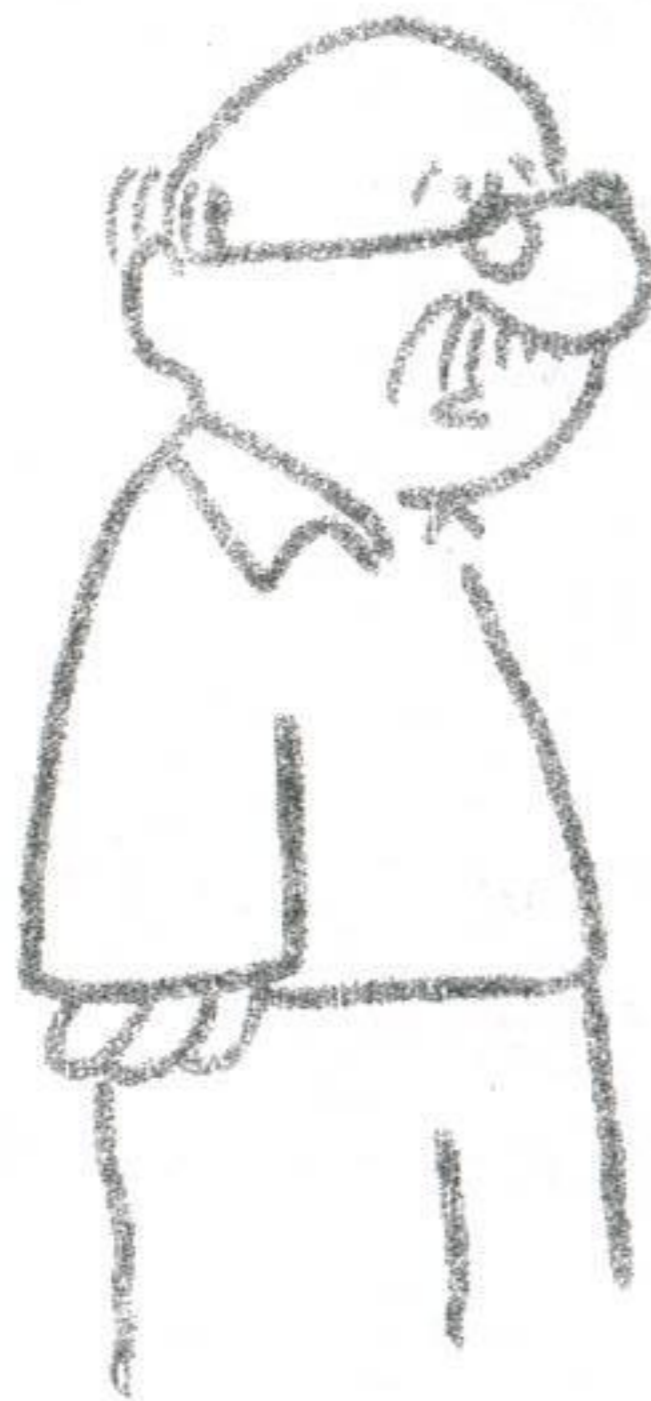

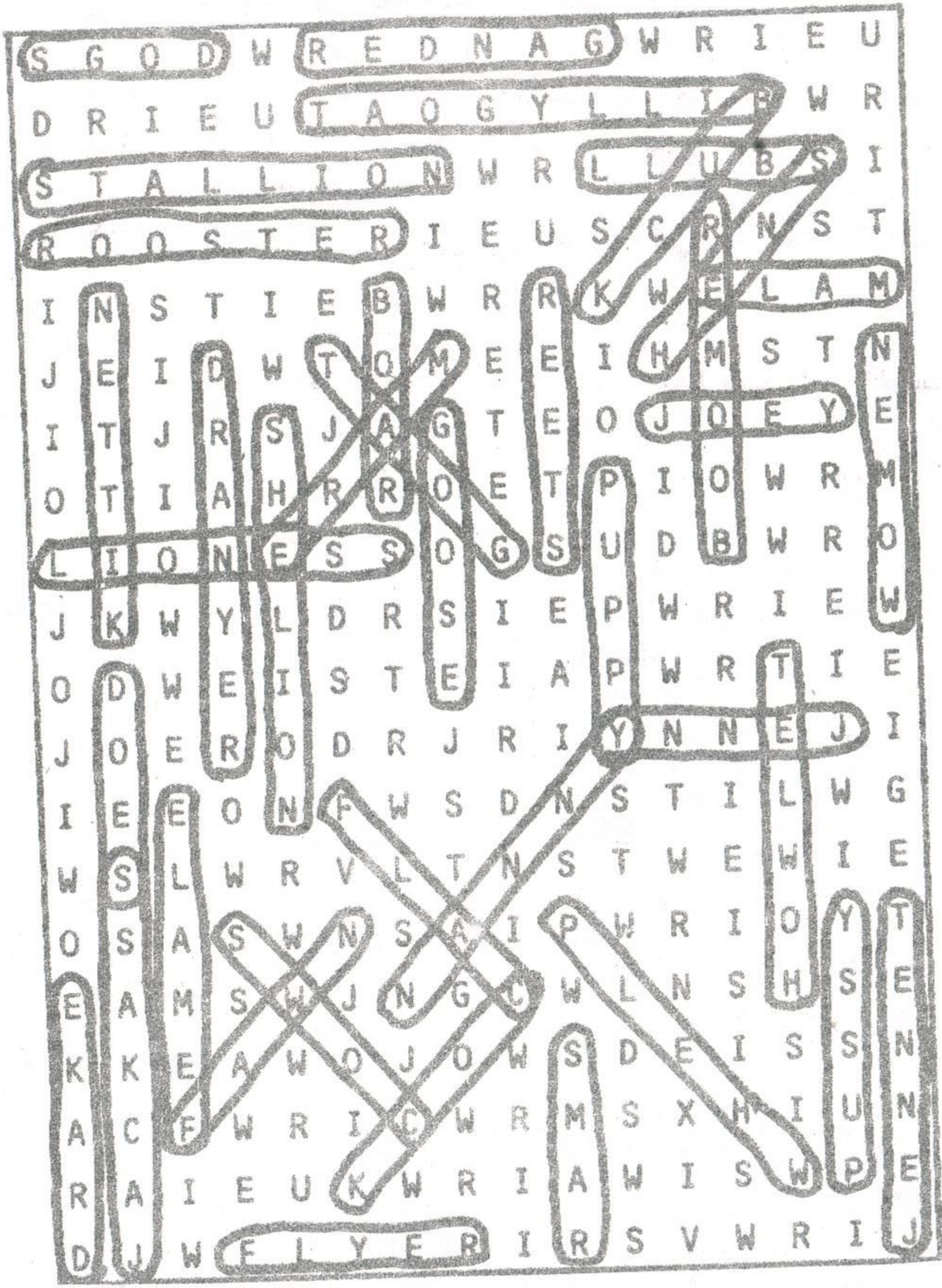

SAUNAS RECALLED

Owners of Home Spa sauna heaters Models HE 50,-60,-75 and-90 and Homecraft Sauna heaters Models HSH 5,-5.5,-6,-7.5 and-9 should stop using them immediately because of a potential fire hazard according to the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and Westhome Manufacturing Limited.

CSA investigations have discovered a change in the construction which could cause high temperatures resulting in charring of adjacent wood walls. CSA has not received any reports of injuries. 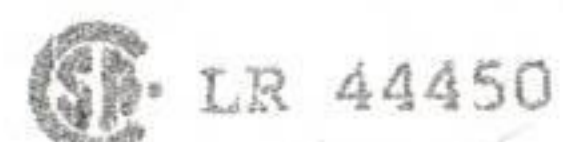
