As a result of his excellent mechanical sleuthing, all 66 Canadian Forces Kiowas were grounded to undergo a special inspection which revealed similar cracks in 51 aircraft. A part is now being manufactured to replace the cracked bracket that bolts the transmission to the airframe.

All members of building 2 would like to extend a warm welcome to Pte Kathy McVicars a newly employed driver for MSE.

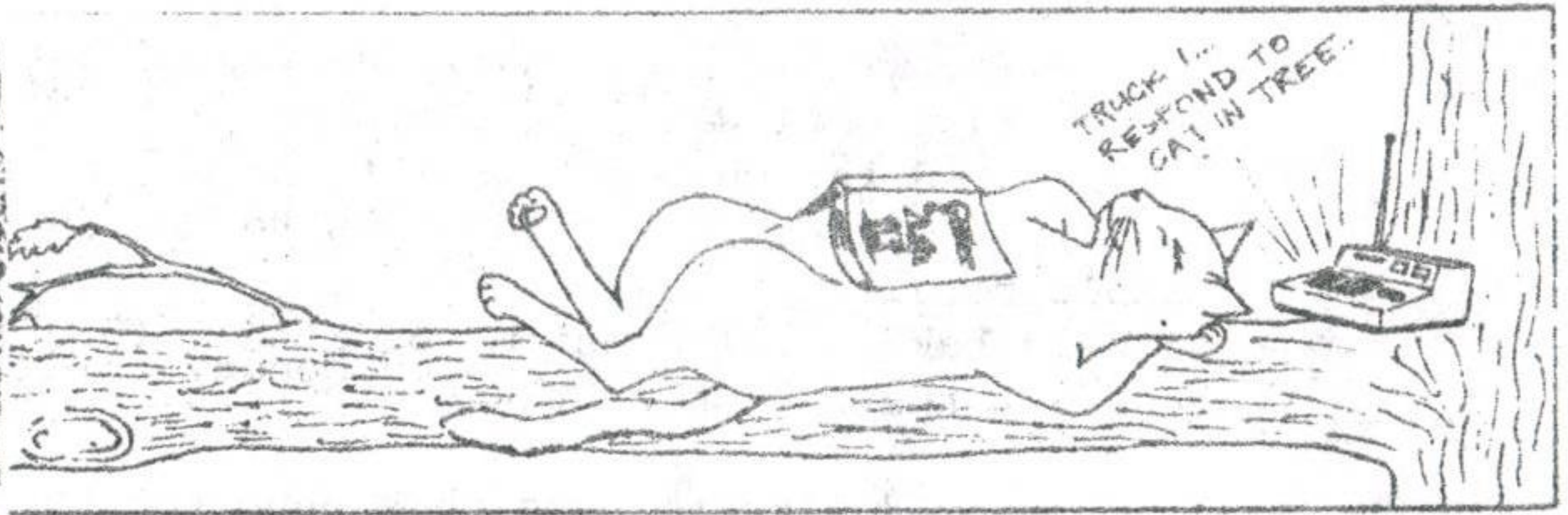

"I want you boys to come over to 810 Ridge Road—there's thish cat . . ."

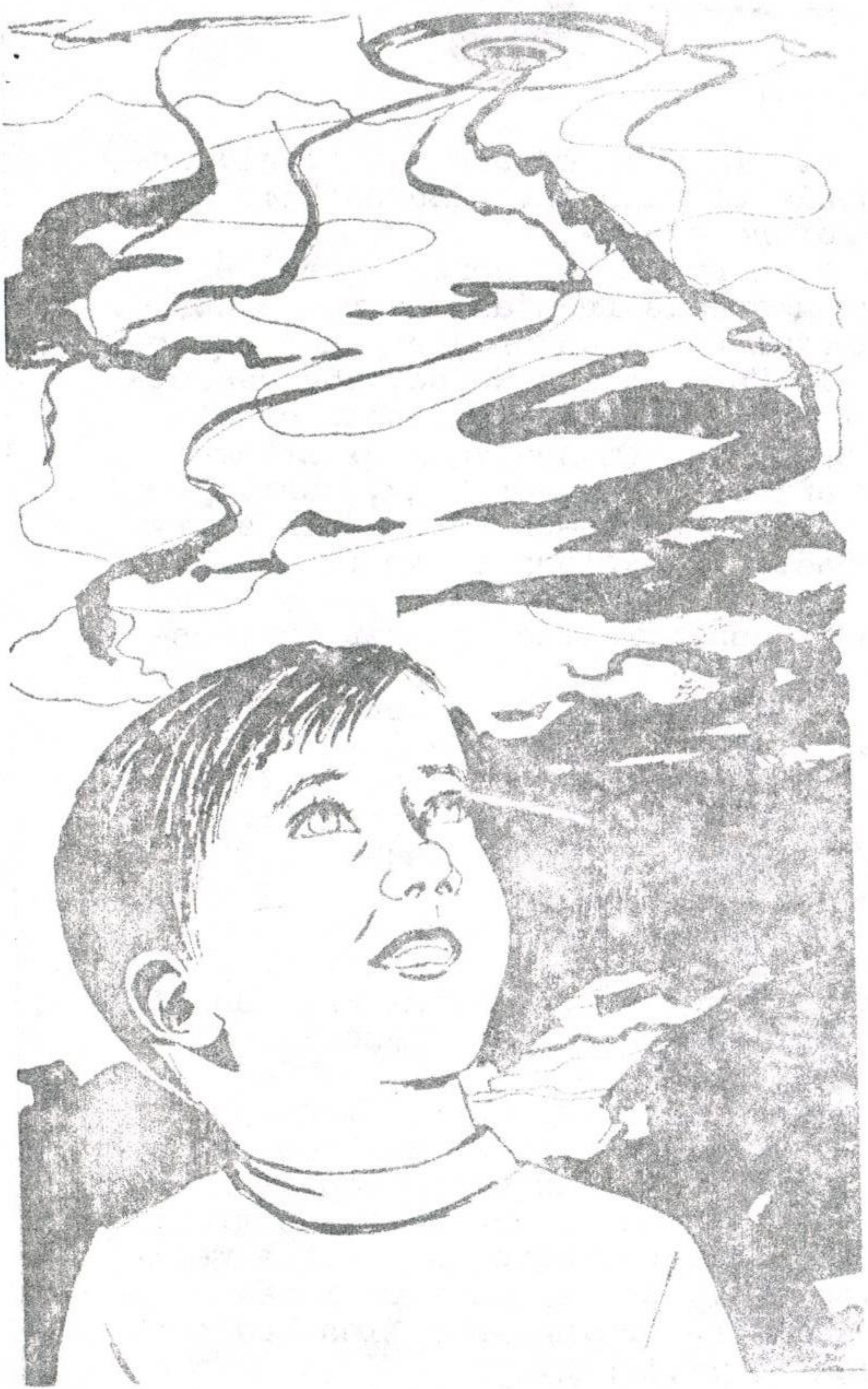

Screamer saves child

THE smell of smoke, the feel of heat, and the sound of crackling flames can strike terror in the heart of man and animal alike. Fear and dread cling like icicles in the deep recesses of the mind, often dulling the senses and creating panic.

The frantic urge to escape flames and toxic gases can send an intelligent, rational person through a closed door which is hot enough to burn the skin. It will cause a person to jump from a third-, fifth-, or even tenth-story window without a second thought.

Even the sound of a smoke detector waking a person from a sound sleep can create irrational behavior.

What would you do if your smoke detector goes off? Think about it! Have you planned your escape? Have you briefed your children and your spouse? Do you have fire drills? I can answer the question for one family.

Last month while her 4-year-old son was asleep in the bedroom, a busy young mother decided to run next door for just a moment. She left a pan filled with cooking oil on the range and neglected to turn off the burner.

You guessed it — the contents of the pan caught fire. The smoke alarm woke the child, who calmly got out of the house on his own before the fire department arrived.

What could have been a tragedy turned out to be a happy ending for this family.

If this happened in your home, do your children know what to do? Have you taught them? Or just pointed to the smoke detector and casually mentioned, "If there's a fire, get out"?

Maybe that child had God's angel on his shoulder, but we also know that his parents cared enough to prepare him for just such an emergency.

Planning and fire drills are not a waste of time. Repeat the procedures until your dependents understand the importance of escaping a burning home. And teach them never to go back inside once they have left a burning building. What they may save can in no way compare with what they might lose if they get trapped.


Remember: When the smoke alarm sounds, don't panic. If you see flames, don't panic. If your door is closed, feel and see if it is hot to the touch. If so, don't open that door. This can cause an explosion or can create such an inrush of air that even a small flame will flare into a blazing inferno.

Never speculate. Get to an exit. If you are above the second floor, start knotting bedsheets, drapes, or anything else you can find. Don't jump! Chances are the fire department will be there long before the flames reach you. If you have water, wet towels and sheets and put some across the bottom of the door. You can also use them to breathe through.

Don't depend on a pet to warn you of fire. Toxic gases near the floor can be fatal to a pet before it can alert you.

Your best bet right now is to check the batteries in your smoke detector (or check the alarm itself). The Govt spent a lot of money installing smoke detectors in every housing unit, so give that little screamer the best of care and it will care for you. It might be the only help between you and a fire. It is one thing in your home that should be allowed to scream. Two parents cared — one little boy is alive today.

ENCYCLOPEDIA OF HORSES - by Robert Owen. This book sets out to give a comprehensive picture of the most noble of animals. The book is divided into five main parts for ease of reference.

The first part, The Horse, covers the history of the horse, breeding and includes articles and photographs on breeds from all over the world. This is followed by informative and useful parts on saddlery and equipment, and breaking-in and schooling. In Care of the Horse, the essential daily routine of stable management and grooming are discussed at length. The final part, Competitive Sports, examines such exciting equestrian activities as show jumping and eventing, driving, hunting and polo. An expansive glossary and a fully cross-referenced index complete the manual and enables the reader to explore it to the full.

THE HIDDEN TARGET - by Helen MacInnes. Chance is the trigger that unleashes this whirlwind adventure. It unexpectedly brings Nina O'Connell and Robert Renwick face to face on a sunlit street in Amsterdam. Their last meeting had been in Geneva six years before, a time when Nina, fifteen, thought herself in love with this American army major attached to NATO. The years, Nina notes, have made Bob even more attractive; the years, Renwick notes, have transformed that pretty, enchanting girl into a beautiful, poised young woman.

In a nearby cafe they exchange news: Nina is off on a lark, an expense-free trip for a small group of students across Europe, the Near East, India, and, finally, the United States. Renwick is leaving NATO and the army to join a company of consulting engineers. Neither description is accurate.

Renwick, in charge of NATO's anti-terrorist section, is setting up an international intelligence agency, operating under cover and concentrating on the bloody, crazed epidemic of terrorism now running rampant. Nina's tour is not the lark she imagines. The two young leaders of the group are, in fact, expertly trained, experienced terrorists, part of a well-financed, brilliantly organized, meticulously concealed structure.

There is a final objective, sinister and devastating--and Nina had been chosen for the part she, in all innocence, will play.

These are a few of the elements that start this riveting tale. From the first scene--a meeting of conspirators in a church in Germany--to the breathless finale in Washington, the tension builds.

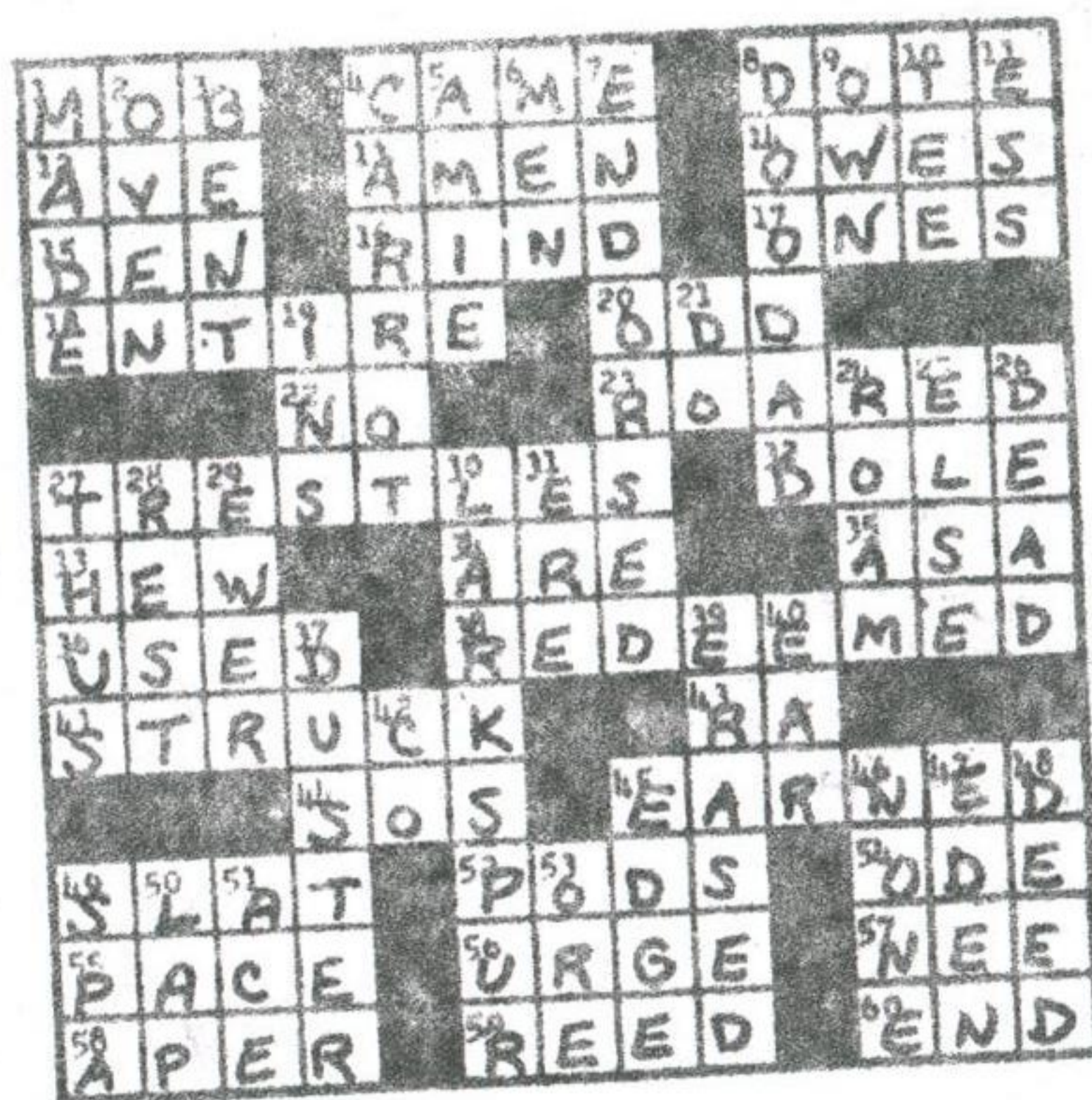

Because of considerably reduced numbers of vehicle orders being received, due no doubt to high interest rates and other adverse economical factors, the Servicemen's Automobile Club Limited will close operations as of December 31, 1981.

For those who were considering purchasing a car or truck through the Club in the near future, orders may STILL be submitted, provided delivery can be made prior to Jan. 1, 1982 (or within a reasonably short period thereafter). Due to the time involved in processing a "factory" built-to-order vehicle, orders would have to be filled from our suppliers inventories, which are somewhat limited especially in the 'popular' model ranges. Any requests therefore, should be called in to us with the least possible delay. However, purchasers should be flexible as to colour and options in order to assist the Club in securing an acceptable vehicle. Deposits with orders now reaching us for vehicles which cannot be delivered within the time frame requested by the Member, will be returned forthwith, as also 1982 membership fees received with such orders.

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in cooperation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5 1/2% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
