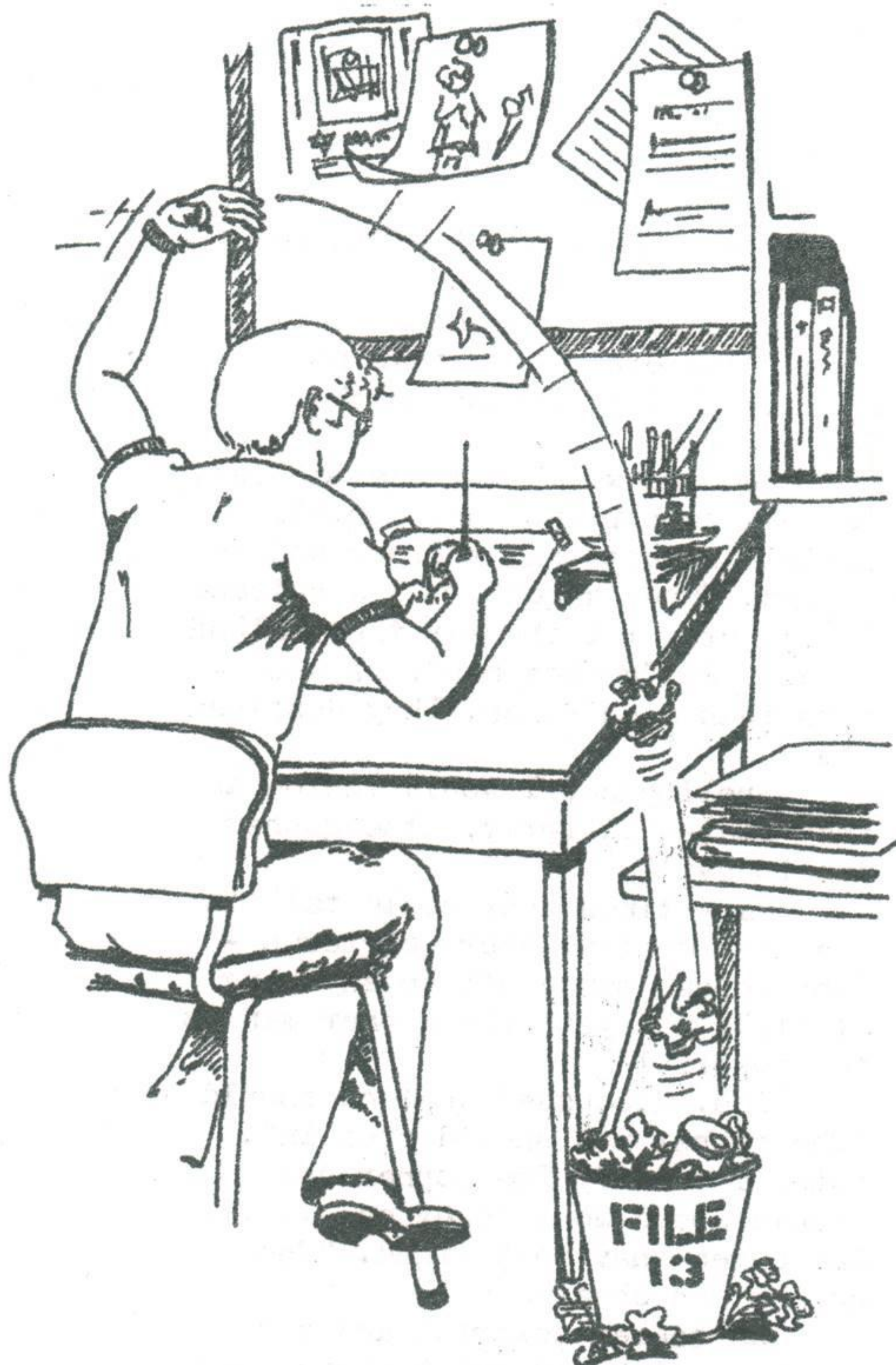

They discussed what he should do - "The gopher man should step in". (step in what?) The gopher man should spend more money on ..... And often they complained. "The gopher man cheated us".

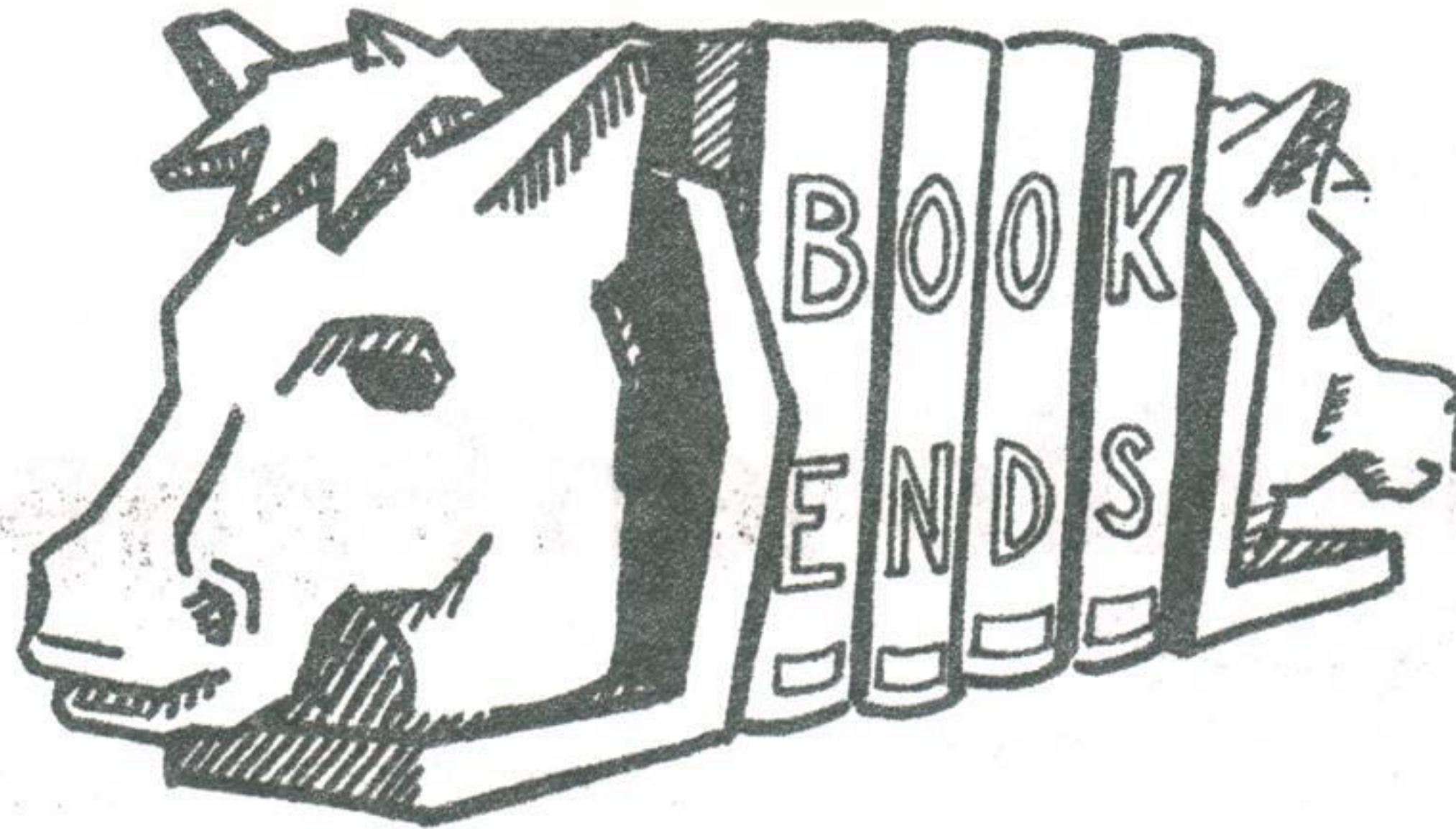
He seemed powerful and yet useless, rich and yet bankrupt and always wicked.

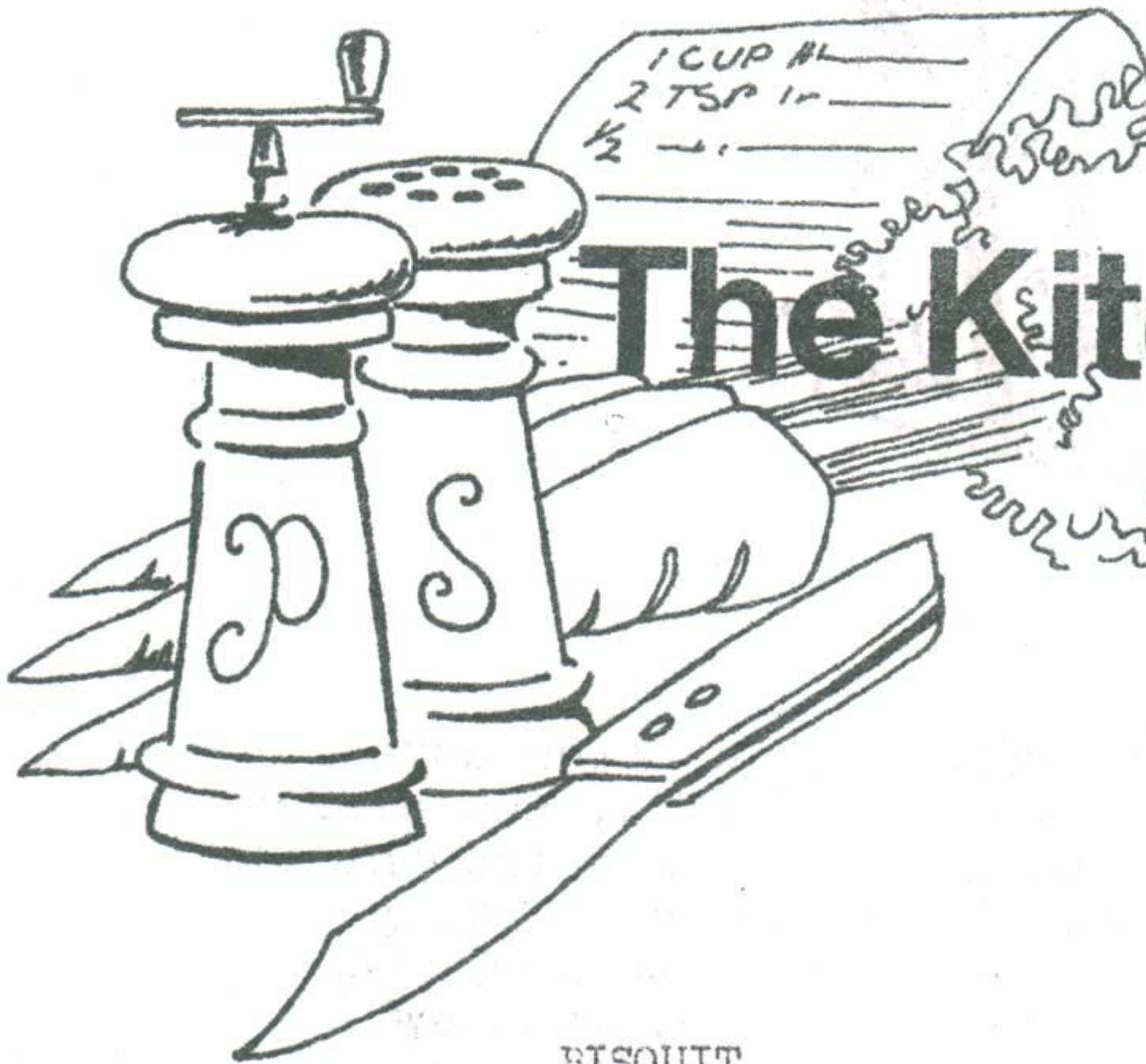

# The Kitchen Page

## BISQUIT (Edith Townsend)

3 egg yolks  
 1/2 cup boiling water  
 Beat till fluffy.  
 10 oz. white sugar  
 10 oz. flour  
 1 tbsp. baking powder  
 Beat egg whites till stiff and carefully add to mixture.  
 Turn oven to 300, before putting in cake. Then turn on to 400. Bake for 20 mins.  
 When cooled add strawberries, or cherries, or blueberries and top with whipped cream.

## RHUBARB CUSTARD PIE (Edith Townsend)

3 cups diced rhubarb  
 1 tbsp. butter (melted)  
 2 eggs, separated  
 1 1/2 cups white sugar  
 1tbsp. flour  
 1/2 cup milk  
 Wash and dice rhubarb. Cover with boiling water and let stand 5 mins.  
 Drain off all the water. Mix the sugar, flour, butter, beaten egg yolks and milk. Add rhubarb to this and turn into a deep pie pan, lined with rich pastry crust. Bake

in 350 degree oven about 40 mins.  
 Beat egg whites until stiff. Then add 4 tbsp. brown sugar. Continue to beat until the meringue is stiff. Heap this lightly over the pie and brown in slow oven.

## COOKIE BAR (Judy Steinke)

1/2 cup white sugar  
 1/2 cup corn syrup  
 3/4 cup peanut butter  
 1/2 cup coconut  
 3 cups Special K  
 2/3 cup chocolate chips  
 1 1/3 cups butterscotch chips

Mix sugar and syrup in sauce pan. Bring to almost a boil. Remove from heat. Add peanut butter, wait until melted a bit, then add Special K and coconut. Spread in an ungreased 9" x 12" pan.

Melt chocolate and butterscotch chips in double boiler and pour over mixture. Spread evenly.  
NEVER put in fridge.

## SWEDISH CHOCOLATE BALLS (Marianne Eckenswiller)

1 1/2 cups rolled oats  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 100 grams margarine  
 3 tbsp. cocoa  
 1 tbsp. vanilla  
 1 tbsp. cold strong coffee

Mix dry ingredients and add margarine.  
 Mix and add coffee and vanilla. Form into balls, roll in sugar and store in refrigerator.

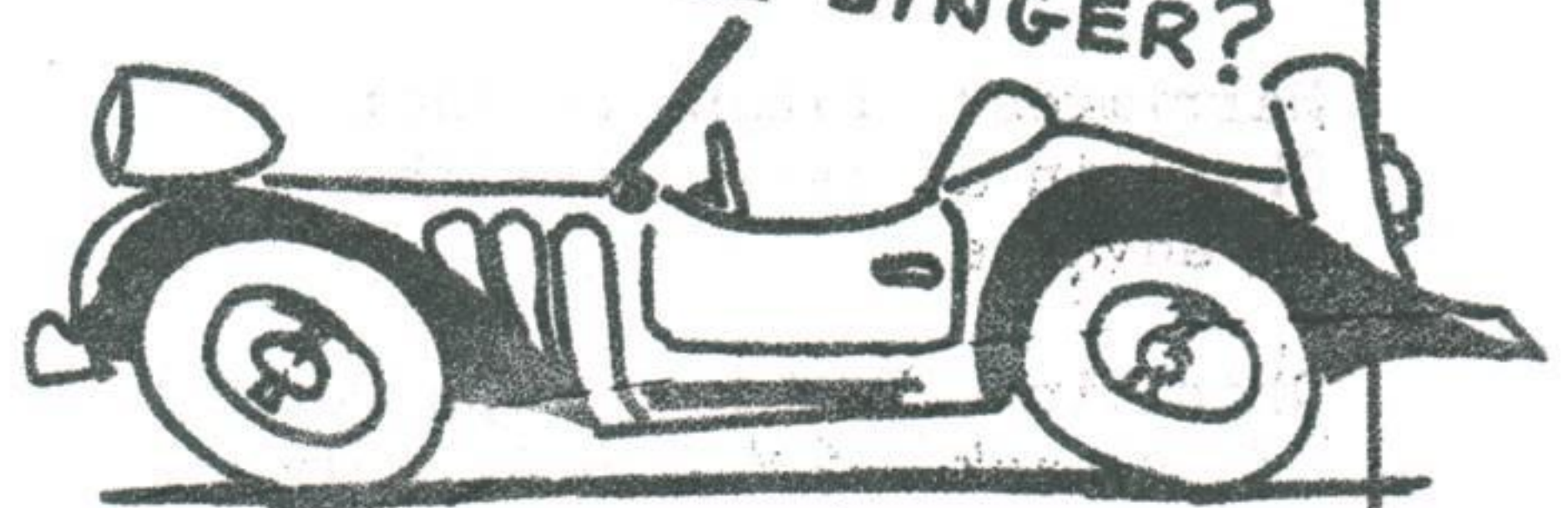
YOU HAVE TO NAME IT SOMETHING

selling B. & M. Singer Specials.

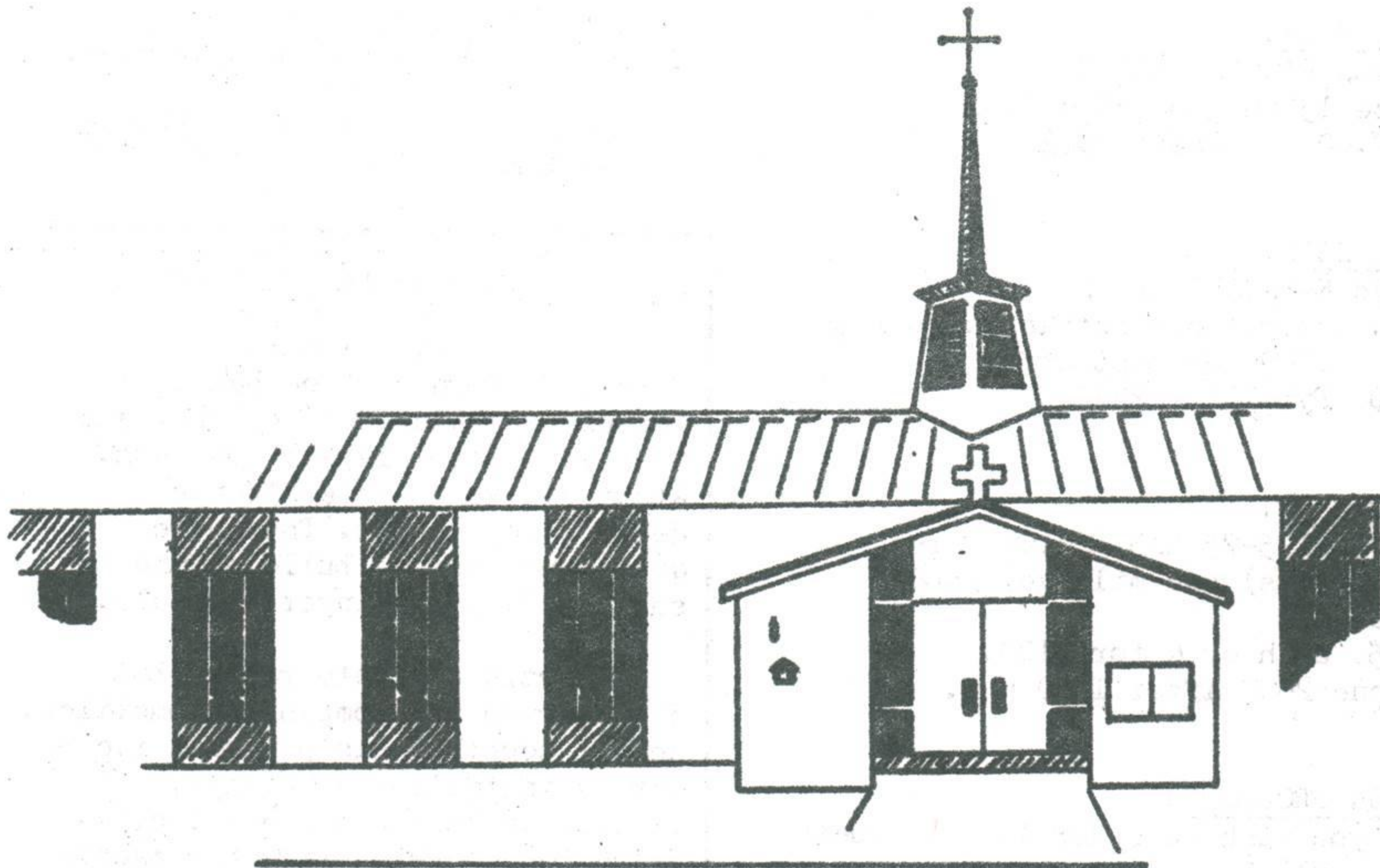
Martin was into racing but

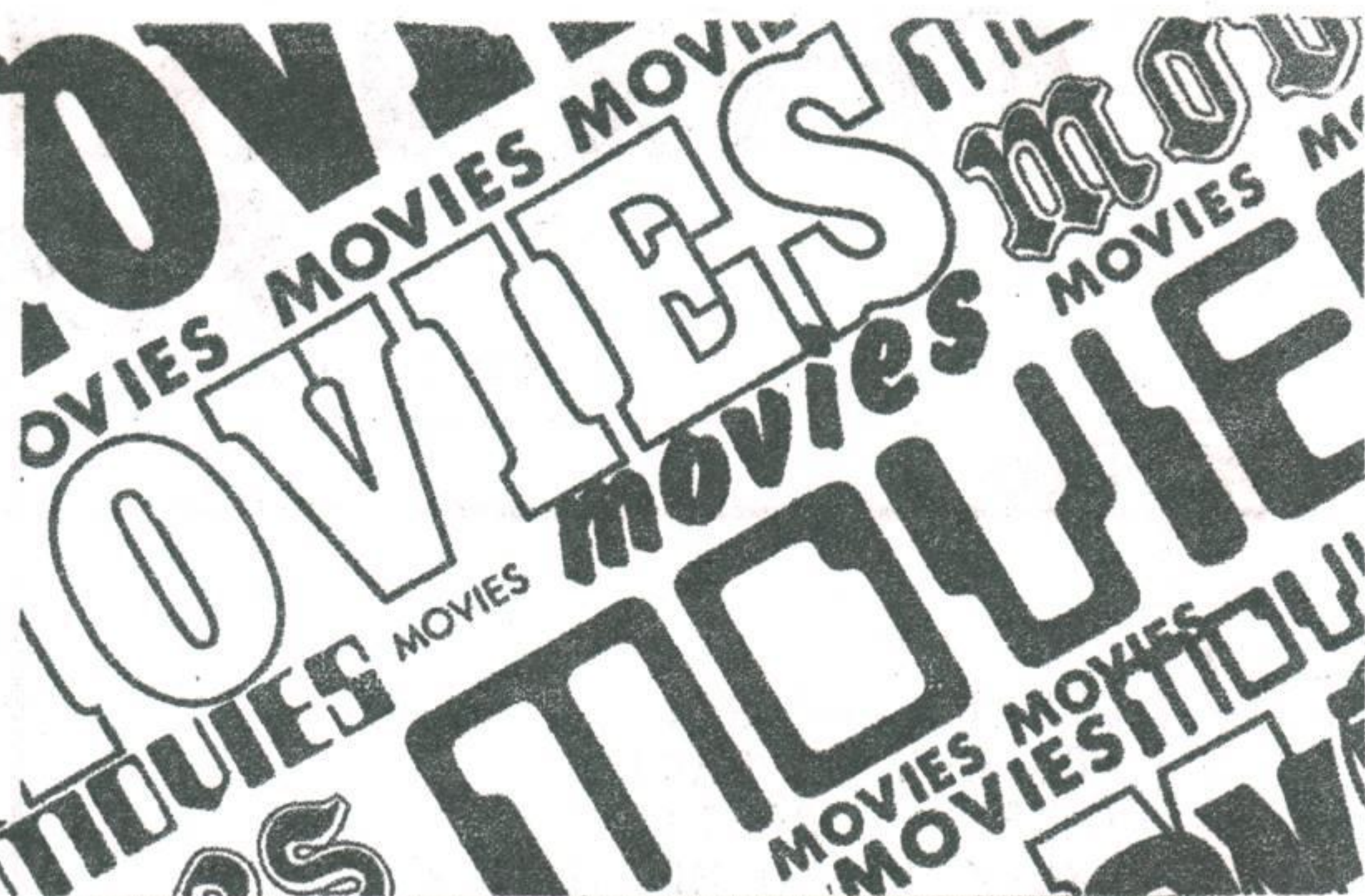

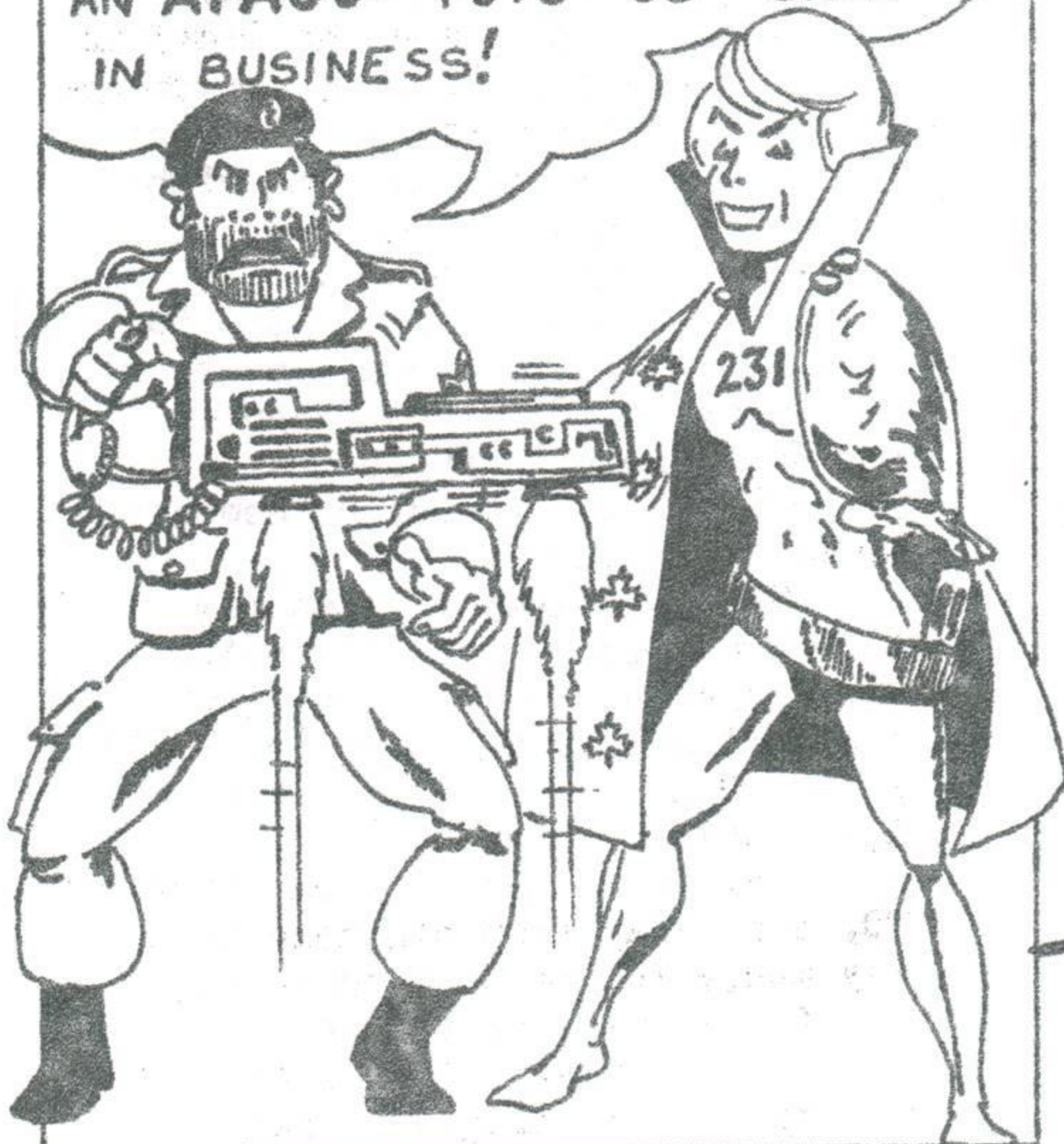

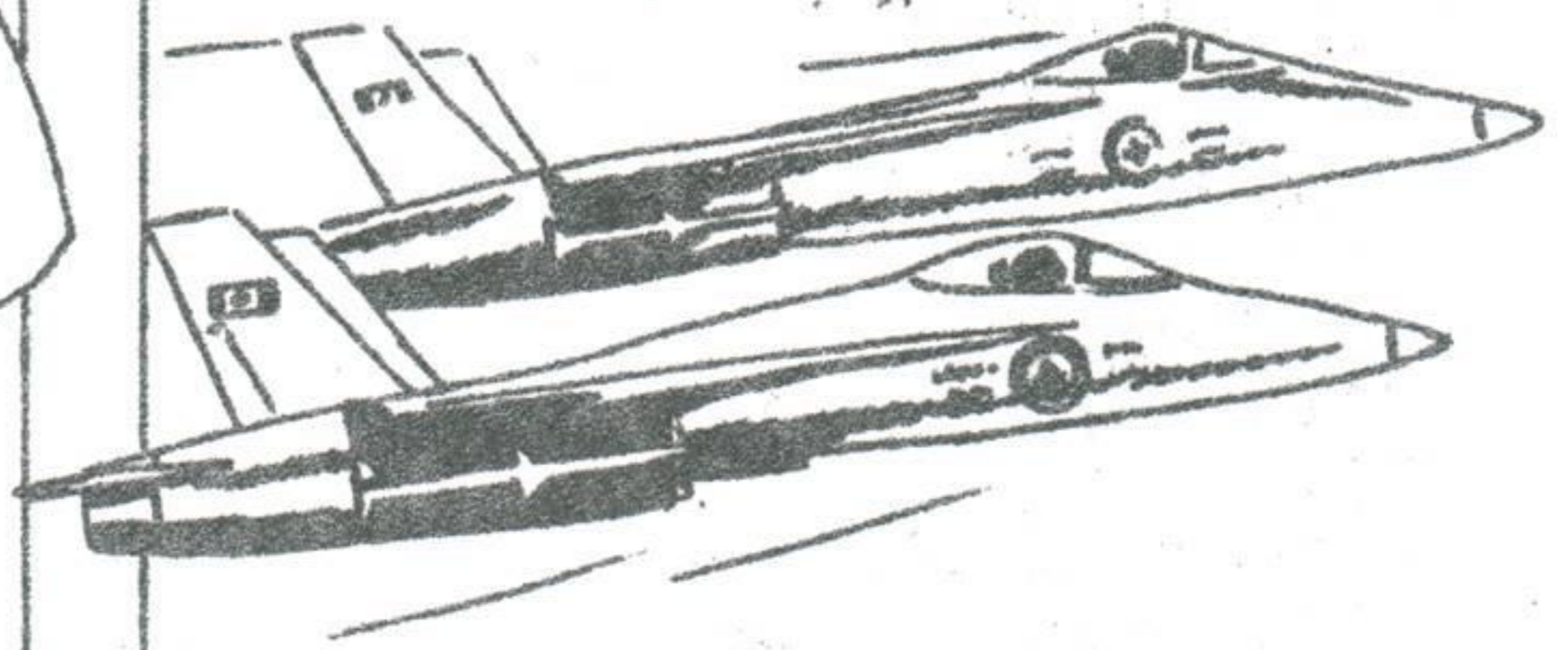

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND  
BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in co-operation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).

CFSLP Small Loans of \$50 to \$500 are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.

CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100 per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.

Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.

If a member is on an un-accompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.

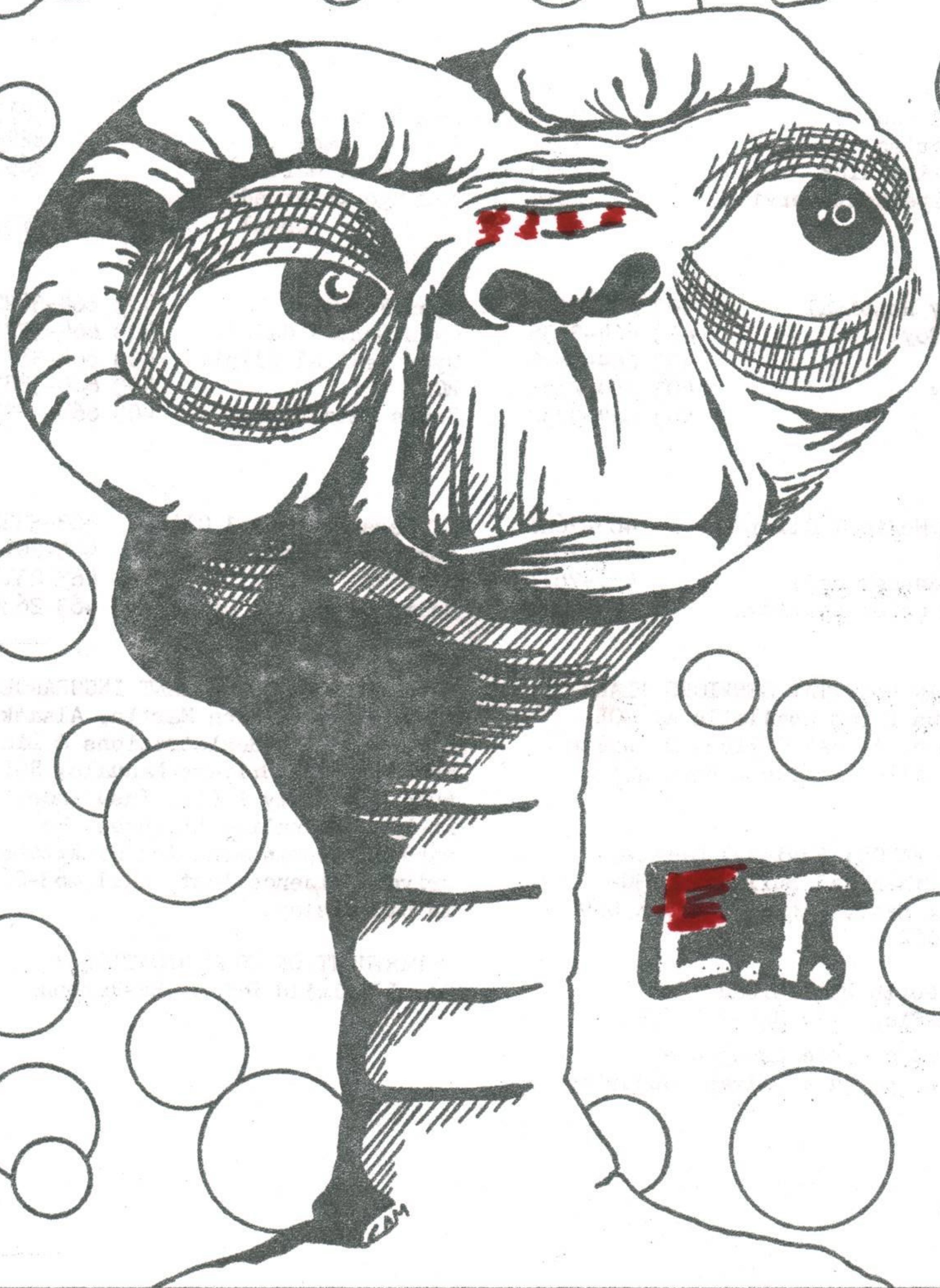
