

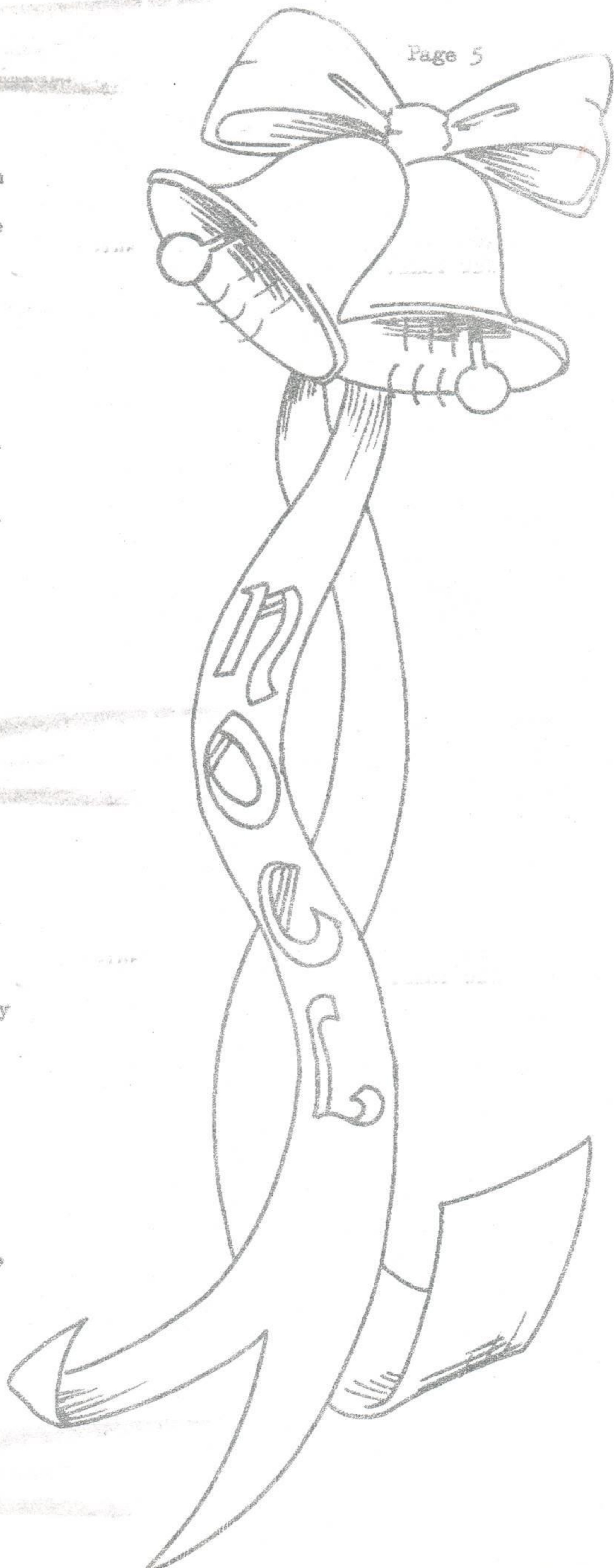
#### COMMANDERS CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

Christmas conjures up a variety of images; from the Nativity, through Dickens' characters, to Santa Claus and an annual multi-million dollar promotion.

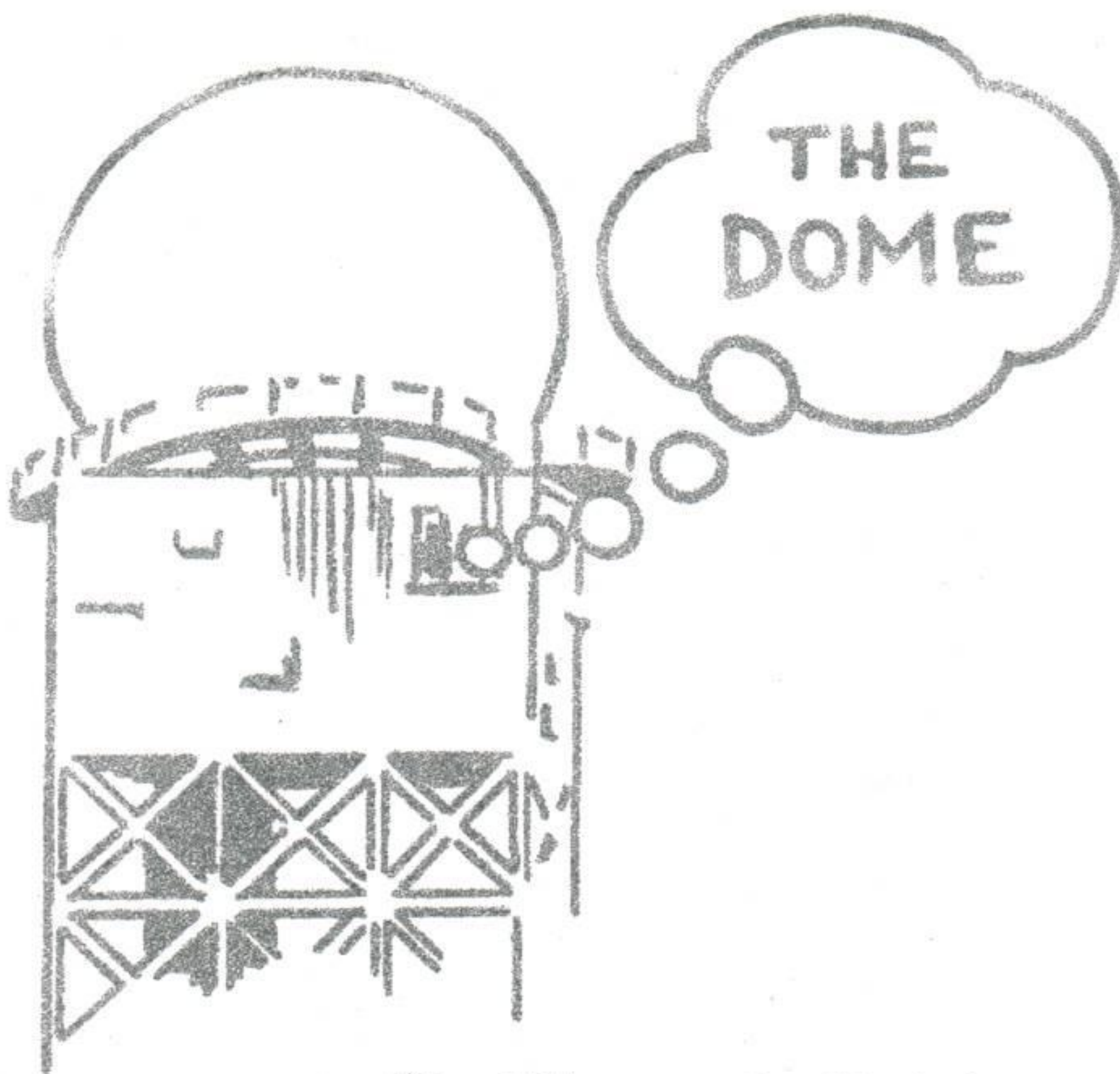
The year 1843 was a particularly good year in the development of Christmas Spirit. It saw not only the arrival of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol", but also the first commercial Christmas Card. The limited edition

card was sold in London England, and bore the simple greeting, "A Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year To You". One hundred and forty years later that phrase remains virtually intact, on today's mass produced cards.

Other Christmas traditions don't have such definite beginnings. Gift giving has been traced back to the Wise Men bearing gifts; the pagan celebration, Saturnalia; and just about any other event in history when gifts were given. The Christmas tree, generally accepted as originating in Germany, has been compared with the use of evergreens in ancient Egypt and China. Wherever it all came from it has developed into what we know as Christmas. In future years our children will remember this Christmas as the "Good Old Days", the way Christmas "used to be". Conjure up a favourite memory, and you could be starting a tradition.

Tumbleweed 2001: The tradition of the Christmas Generator originated in the affluent mid 20th Century, when the power required to support the extra Christmas load overtaxed available sources. #### ALSASK BOWLERS

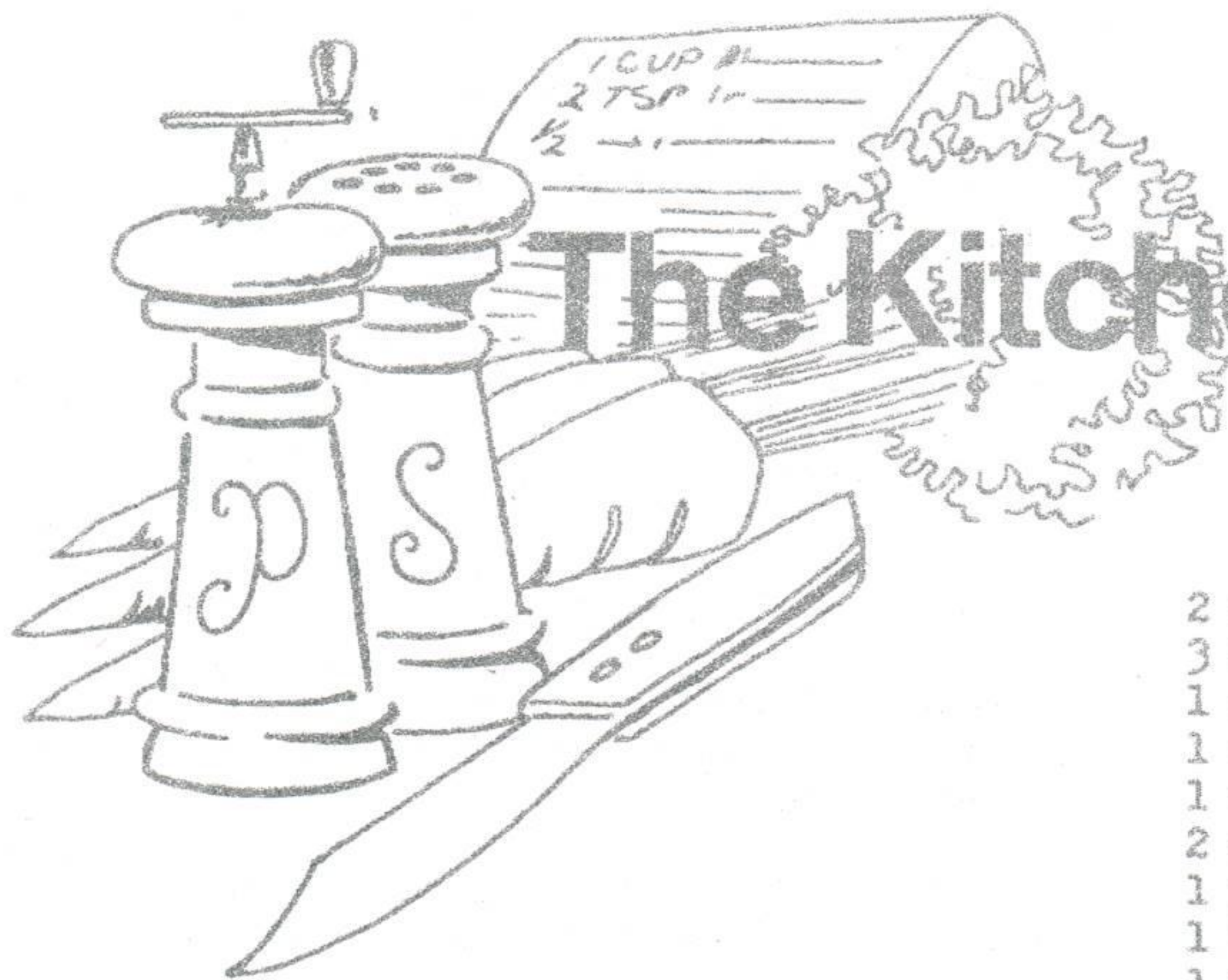
Three cheers for the guys that went to the Small Base Bowling Tournament in Wainwright. The final standings (for anyone who doesn't already know) were as follows:

# The Kitchen Page

## COLE SLAW (Edith Townsend)

- 2 quarts finely shredded cabbage
- 3 medium onions (finely chopped)
- 1 green pepper (finely chopped)
- 1 sweet red pepper (finely chopped)
- 1 or 2 medium carrots - grated
- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 pint cider or white vinegar
- 1 tbsp. salt
- 1 tsp. celery seed
- 1 tsp. mustard seed
- 1/2 tsp. tumeric
- 1 cup salad oil

Combine vegetables in mixing bowl. Combine all remaining ingredients but oil in a saucepan and boil gently about 5 minutes.

Stir in oil and pour over vegetables. Mix lightly but thoroughly. Then cover and refrigerate at least 24 hours. Mix occasionally.

## HOT POTATO SALAD (Peggi Sled)

- 2 cups diced cooked potatoes (4 med. size)
- 1 cup diced celery
- 5 hard cooked eggs, sliced
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 1 tbsp. parsley
- 1 tbsp. chopped onion
- 1 tbsp. chopped pimento
- 2 cups well seasoned white sauce

Mix all ingredients except cheese into hot white sauce. Pour into greased casserole and top with grated cheese. Bake in hot oven (450 degree) for 1/2 hour or until done.

## WHITE SAUCE

- 4 tbsp. butter
- 4 tbsp. flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 2 cups milk

## SUNSET SALAD (Judy Steinke)

- 1 pkg. (3oz) lemon or orange jello
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cups boiling water
- 1 can (8 3/4 oz) crushed or tidbit pineapple
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 cup coarsely grated carrots
- 1/3 cup chopped pecans

NOTE: Watch the amount of pineapple used as too much will not allow it to set properly. This is an American recipe and can sizes are different.

Dissolve jello and salt in boiling water. Add undrained pineapple and lemon juice. Chill until very thick. Fold in carrots and pecans. Pour into individual molds or a one quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Garnish with pineapple, if desired.

Makes 3 cups, or 6 side salads.

CANEX CORNER

In this issue I'd like to explain the objectives of Canex.

The aim of Canex is to provide CF Personnel and their dependants with the needed goods and services at favourable prices and through a profit objective, support welfare activities and free time amenities. Inherent in this aim is the need to realize sufficient profits to cover operating costs and financial commitments.

To some people profit sounds like a dirty word. Let's face it, the money generated here in Alsask does support you and family through your recreational activities: bowling, swimming, ceramics, etc. We have to pay wages and other operational expenses. Keeping in mind the messes also support your Station Fund. Canex is the biggest contributor of money into the pot.

It is a myth that someone in Ottawa is getting rich from Canex. Our 2% of the share we contribute goes to a very good cause. The money is used in many different ways; but one is for building new outlets and supporting messes for renovations, etc.

By the support you, the consumer, give your Canex it (the profits) comes back to each and every one. When you look at what your programs cost to join on the outside consider yourself fortunate you have a Station Fund.

We realize here at Canex in Alsask there are quite a few items we do not carry, however, there is a special order department which is open daily and most items are in 3 to 4 weeks. Sure there will be times when a specific brand will not be available but most major names are. One thing you should keep in mind is, you will not always be in Alsask and

at one point you may need service. Ask yourself, is this item servicable across Canada? Most national brands are but it's always nice to know. Yes, you also pay for the name but keep in mind that you are not just buying, say a stereo, but it should be an investment. If you put out a lot of your hard earned bucks you should get something in return that is usually the quality.

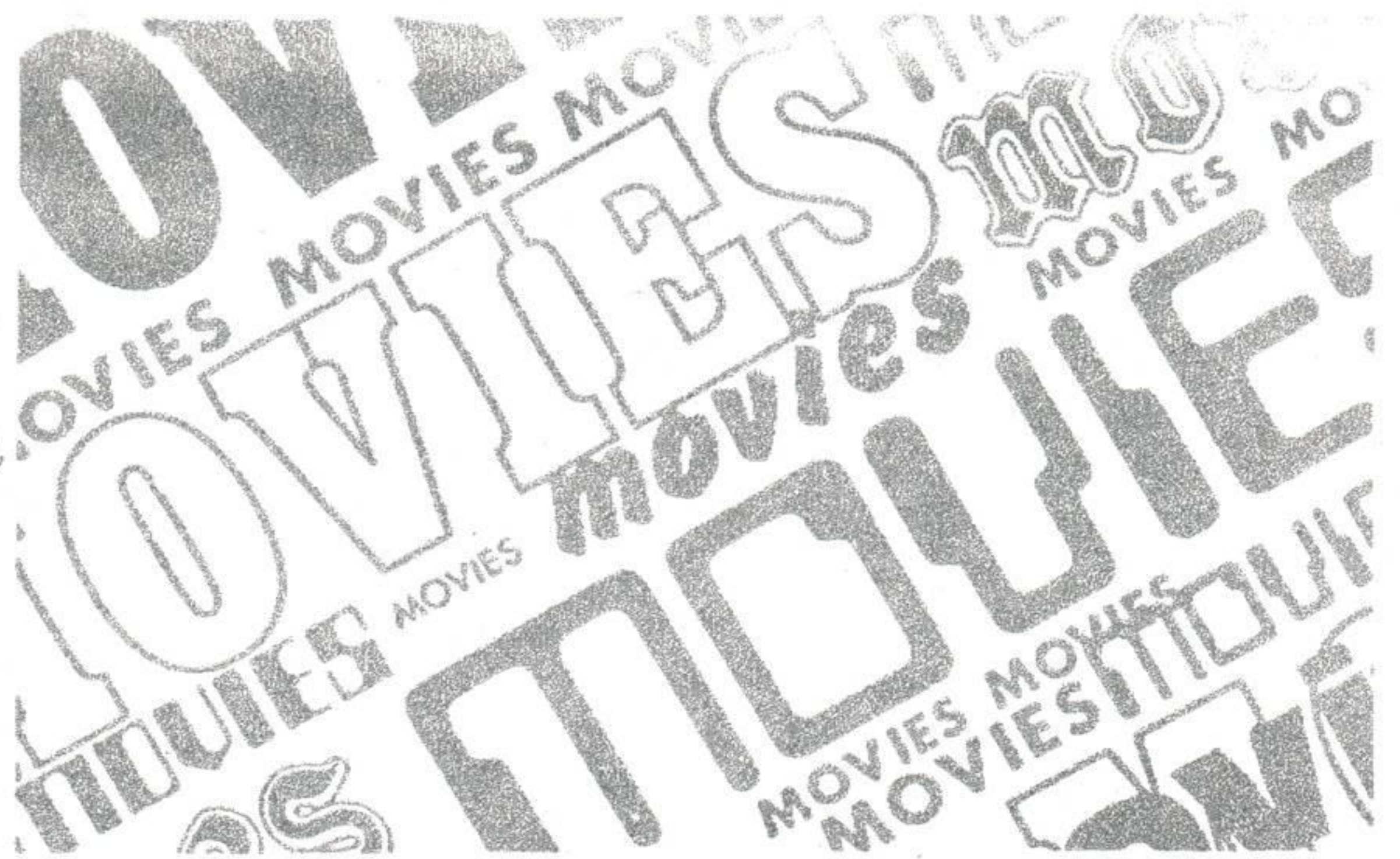
All movies shown in the Parish Hall are rated by the Canadian Forces Movie Guild. Admission to these movies is regulated as follows:
