HALIFAX - Maritime Headquarters in Halifax is currently searching for the oldest veteran of the Naval Services of Canada.

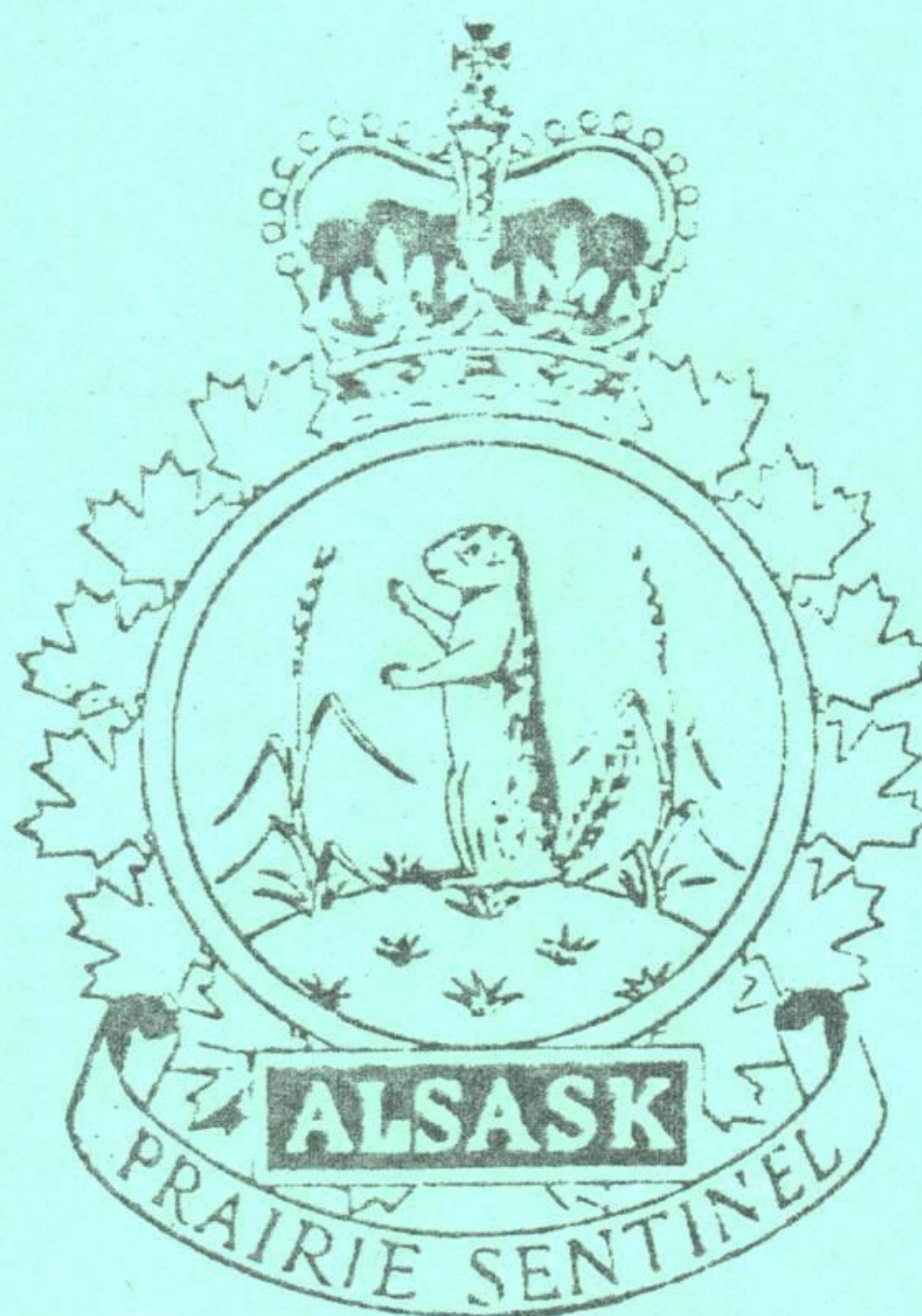

Financial Administration



The time has arrived once again, concerning the purchase of Canada Savings Bonds. The accounting procedures pertaining to this year's CSB campaign are outlined in this article for your information.

If you are interested in purchasing a bond(s), your first step is to complete a CSB application (Form S12PS). These forms can be obtained through your bond co-ordinator, Lt Zilinskas. It is imperative that the application is properly completed. Failure to supply a proper address, postal code, social insurance and signatures will necessitate return of the application to this unit. This would result in the forfeiture of purchasing a bond for this campaign year. It is the policy that applications shall only be accepted during the campaign period so that 12 monthly deductions can be made within the prescribed period.

When the accounting officer receives the application he shall ensure the application has been properly completed. At this time your pay guide is annotated to show the total monthly pay allotment deduction, coded H996. These deductions are taken over two pays every month.

When for any reasons, prior to the 01 Sep, you wish to terminate your CSB, you may:

- 1) terminate the allotment and receive a full refund of instalments paid to date (refund paid by the accounting officer).
- 2) terminate the allotment and personnel pay the balance to and in amount determined, by the CSB Section, Supply and Services, Canada.

Termination subsequent to the 01 Sep can only be actioned for a member released, AWOA, or LWOP or deceased. Under normal circumstances your pay allotment deductions for CSB 84/85 issue terminate automatically on the 01 Nov 85 (last monthly deduction Oct 85).

If you purchase a bond, note that carrying charges associated to CSB are tax deductible. Further information can be obtained from your income tax guide. It should also be noted that interest payments related to CSB will be released on 11 Oct 84. As a final note, if you change your delivery instructions or if you have any inquiries as to non-delivery of bonds they should be referred to the following address:

d. CARNIVAL '85 (February)

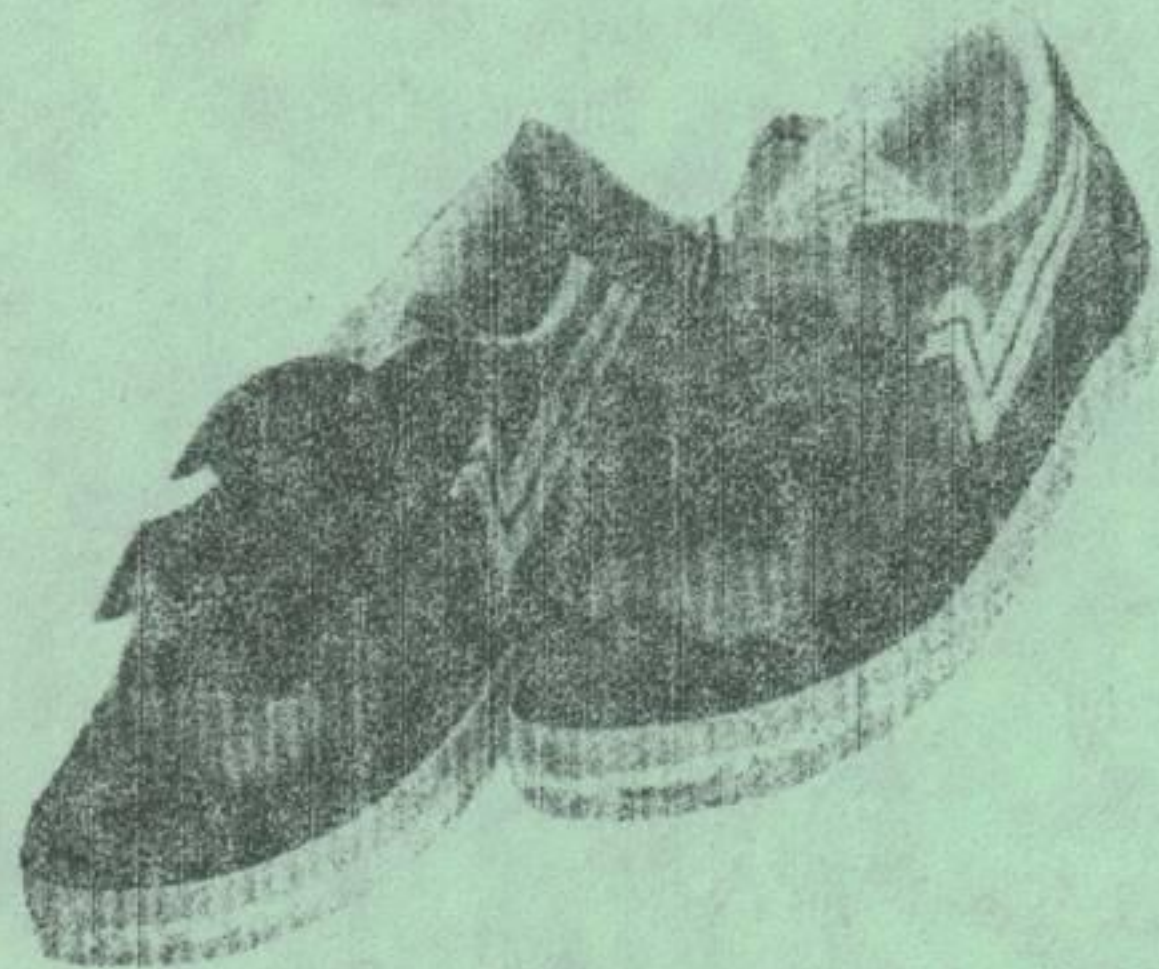
Hopefully a fun time will be had by all.

Hello again, it's time for the news from the Orderly Room.

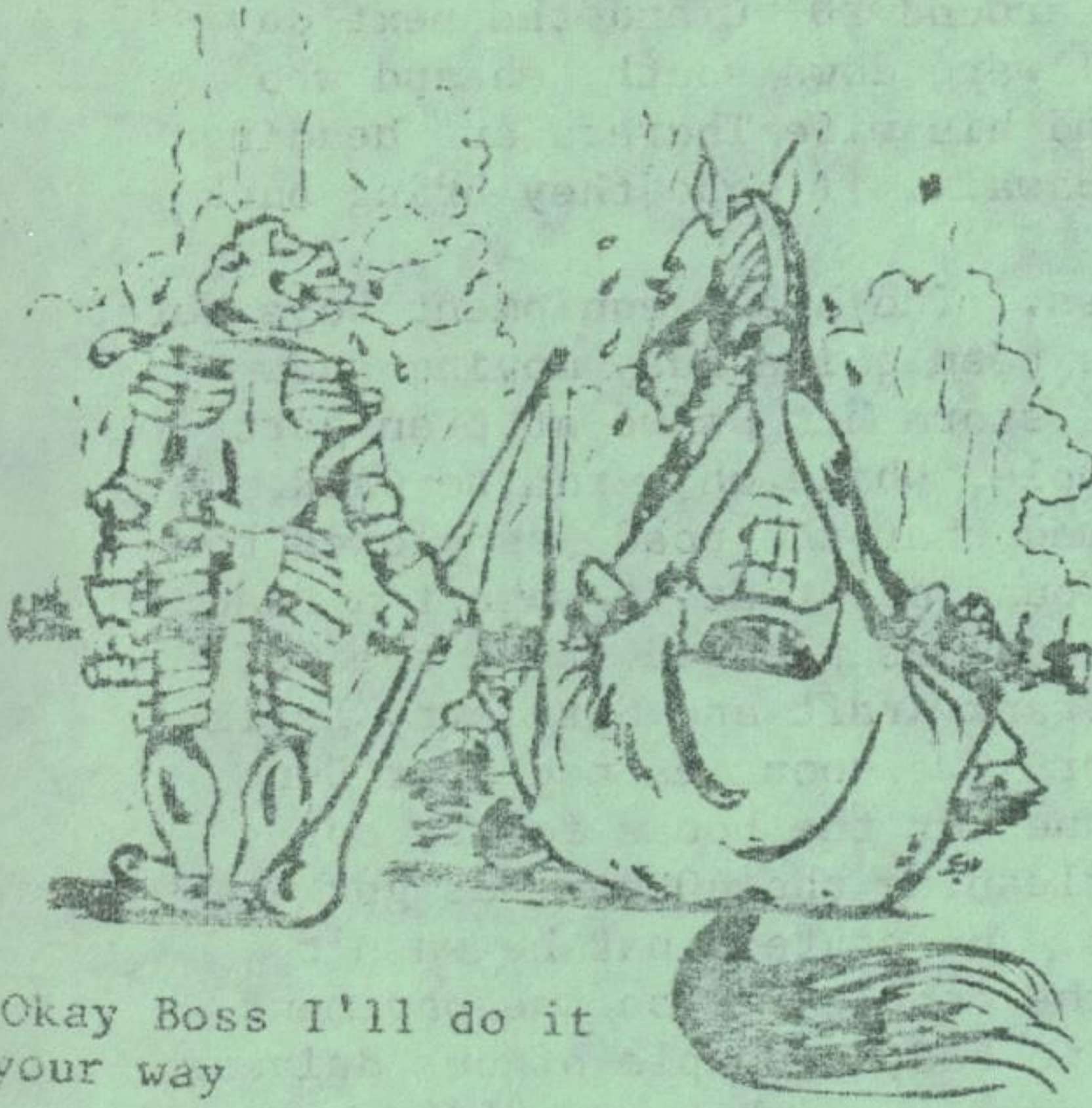

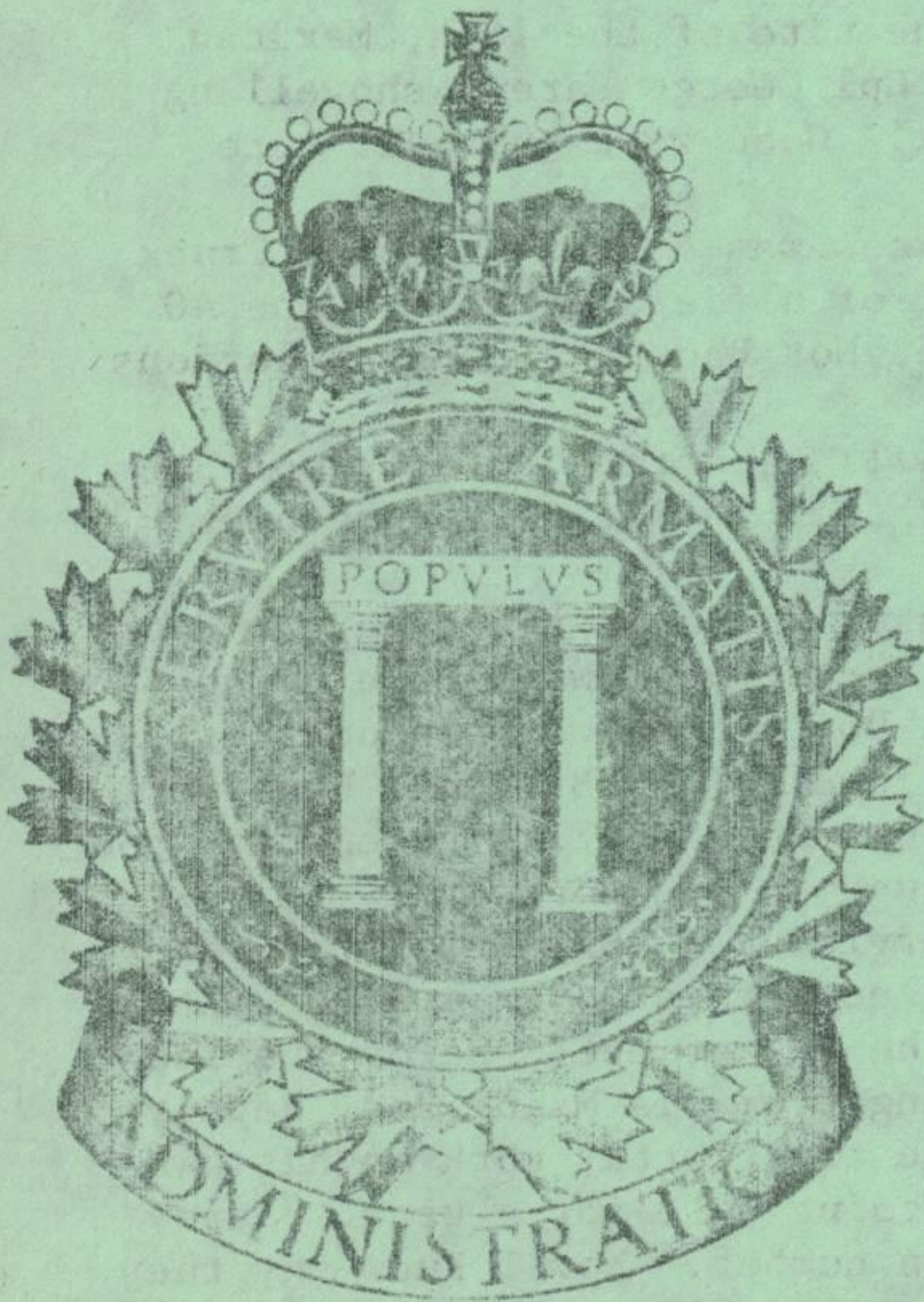
Stephen Christopher Downey has a new job and he seems to be in his glory. He still doesn't know what to do with his new found freedom but he seems to be enjoying it anyway.

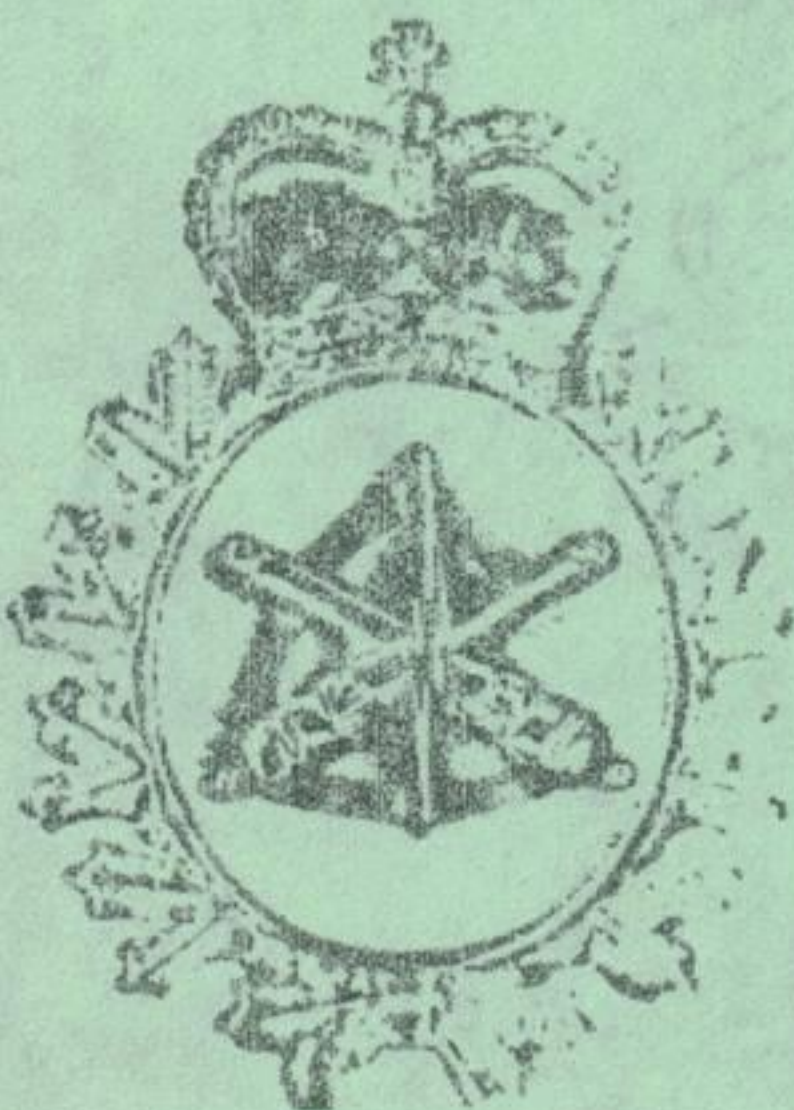
MCpl Al Myers our Safety Soup will be attending a School Bus Safety Managers Course from the 23-25 Oct in Regina. Something else for Al's retirement.

HOW TO SURVIVE
A BLIZZARD WHEN
YOU'RE ON THE ROAD

Though a smart driver won't take to the road knowing a blizzard is on the way, there is always the risk of finding yourself surrounded by an unexpected winter storm. Should this happen to you, our tips could help you survive.

If you find yourself driving in a snowstorm of blizzard proportions, turn lights on and try to drive out of it. As soon as it's safe to do so, turn around and drive with the wind instead of against it. You'll have better vision to look for shelter.

In many cases, of course, you can't put distance between yourself and the storm. And there is always the chance that your car will be caught in a snowdrift. Here are some action guidelines to follow.

- Look for shelter such as a house, gas station, diner, etc. It should be visible from the car.

- Stay inside the car - it's safer. In a blinding snowstorm you can quickly become disoriented and lost.

Hypothermia (subnormal body temperature) and overexertion can result from overexposure to freezing temperatures and physical struggle in a heavy storm. Either can lead to fatigue or heart attack, followed by freezing to death. The best chance for survival is to stay in your car and wait for help to arrive.

- Keep as warm as possible. Run the engine heater for a 10-minute period every half hour. This method guards against carbon monoxide (CO) asphyxiation, which, along with freezing, is the greatest danger when trapped in a car during a blizzard. Since running a V8 engine at idle consumes only one gallon of fuel an hour, you'll be able to run a V8 for about 15 hours (10-minutes on, 20-minutes off) with only 5 gallons in the tank.

To further reduce the chance of asphyxiation, open a window 1/8 in. on both sides of the car for ventilation. When you turn off the engine, close the windows.

- Periodically check to make certain that snow isn't blocking the tailpipe.

A snow-packed tailpipe can cause exhaust to seep into the car. The tailpipe must be clear of snow or the engine should not be turned on. If you don't have a shovel, pry off a hubcap or rip off a sun visor to use.

- Open one door every so often to push snow away and keep the door unblocked. This also helps prevent door mechanisms from freezing.

- Send signals intermittently by sounding the car horn in brief spurts while the engine is running. During those periods also flash lights if you think there are rescue workers within sight. Be sure to turn off the lights before shutting the engine. You must conserve the battery so it will start the engine.

- Tie a brightly colored cloth - if you have one - to the top of the radio antenna. This is a distress signal for rescuers and serves as a warning of your stopped position.

- Exercise. Getting out of the car to clear the tailpipe is enough. Those who stay in the car should swing their arms or stretch for five minutes every hour to keep blood circulating.

If the engine fails you must do everything possible to stay warm. The accompanying list of winter equipment includes all you need, frequent travelers should carry the items recommended. But if you're not equipped for freezing temperatures use whatever is available --- floor mats, seat covers, even a newspaper can become blankets. Upholstery can become blankets. Upholstery can be torn and the foam rubber in seats used to wrap around feet or to stuff inside clothing.

The worst possible situation occurs when a car is buried. In such cases the temptation is often great to leave the car and walk for help. Don't do it unless you had the foresight to store the proper winter gear. You are better off staying in the car and waiting for help.

- Thermal blanket retains about 80 percent of body heat.

Winter Survival Kit

- Thermal blanket retains about 80 percent body heat.
- Tire chains are still the best wheel traction aid.
- Snow brush and scraper with long handle makes it easier to clear windshield.
- Cat litter can be used as a traction aid.
- Reflective warning triangle is basic auto safety equipment.
- Tow rope or cable can get you unstuck if someone passes.
- First aid kit.
- Candle lanterns offer both heat and light.
- Cloth or tarpaulin can cover you or an opening in the car.

- Pocket knife with various utility blades.
- Shovel with sturdy telescoping handle and nonbreakable blade.
- Booster cables can get you started.
- Hat is vital in cold weather. This trooper type has flaps for forehead, ears and back of neck.
- Gloves are a necessity in snow.
- A sweater treated to repel water is good for working in snow.
- Boots should not only be waterproof, but lined.
- Waterproof matchbox has wooden matches for lighting candles.

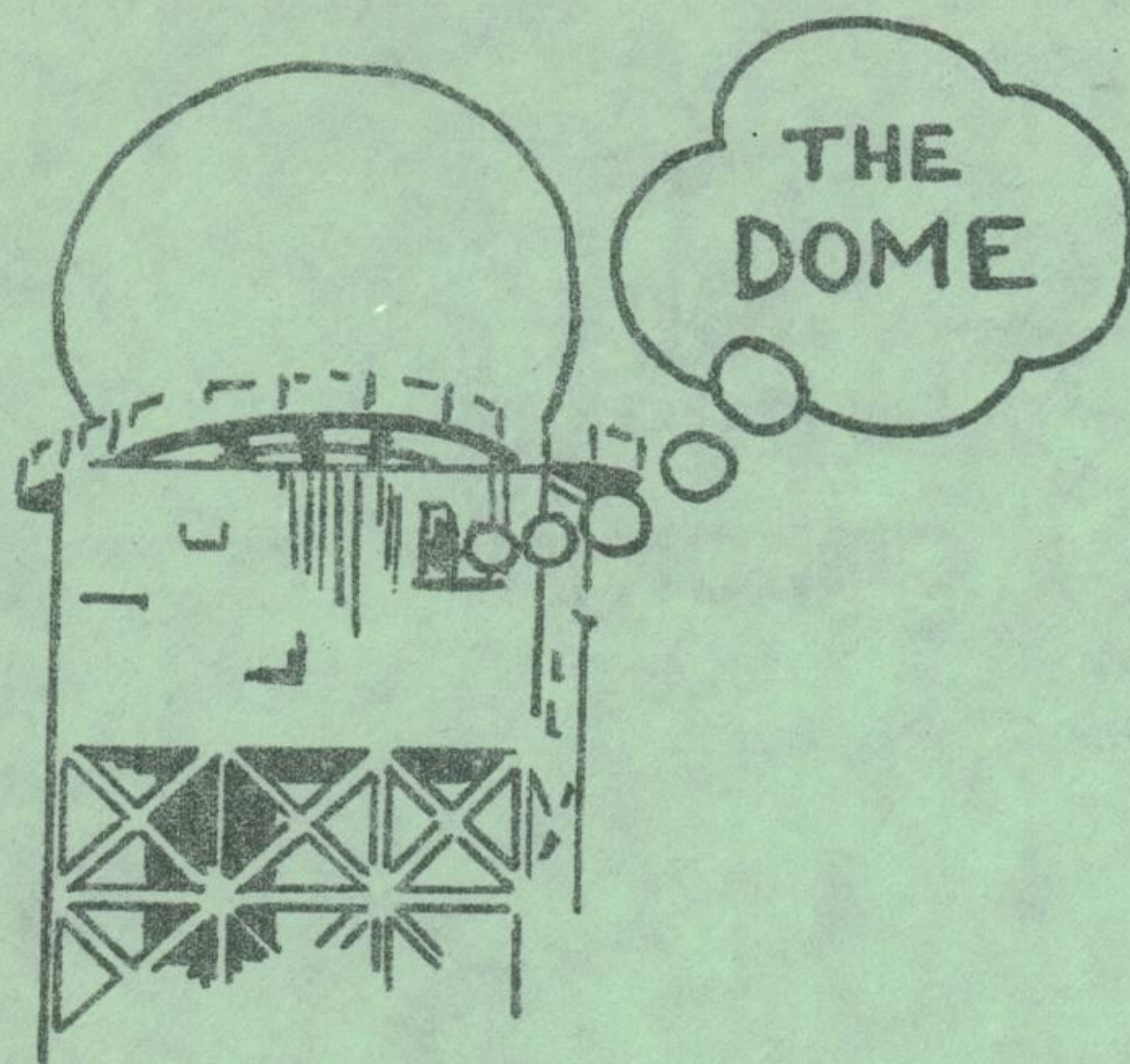

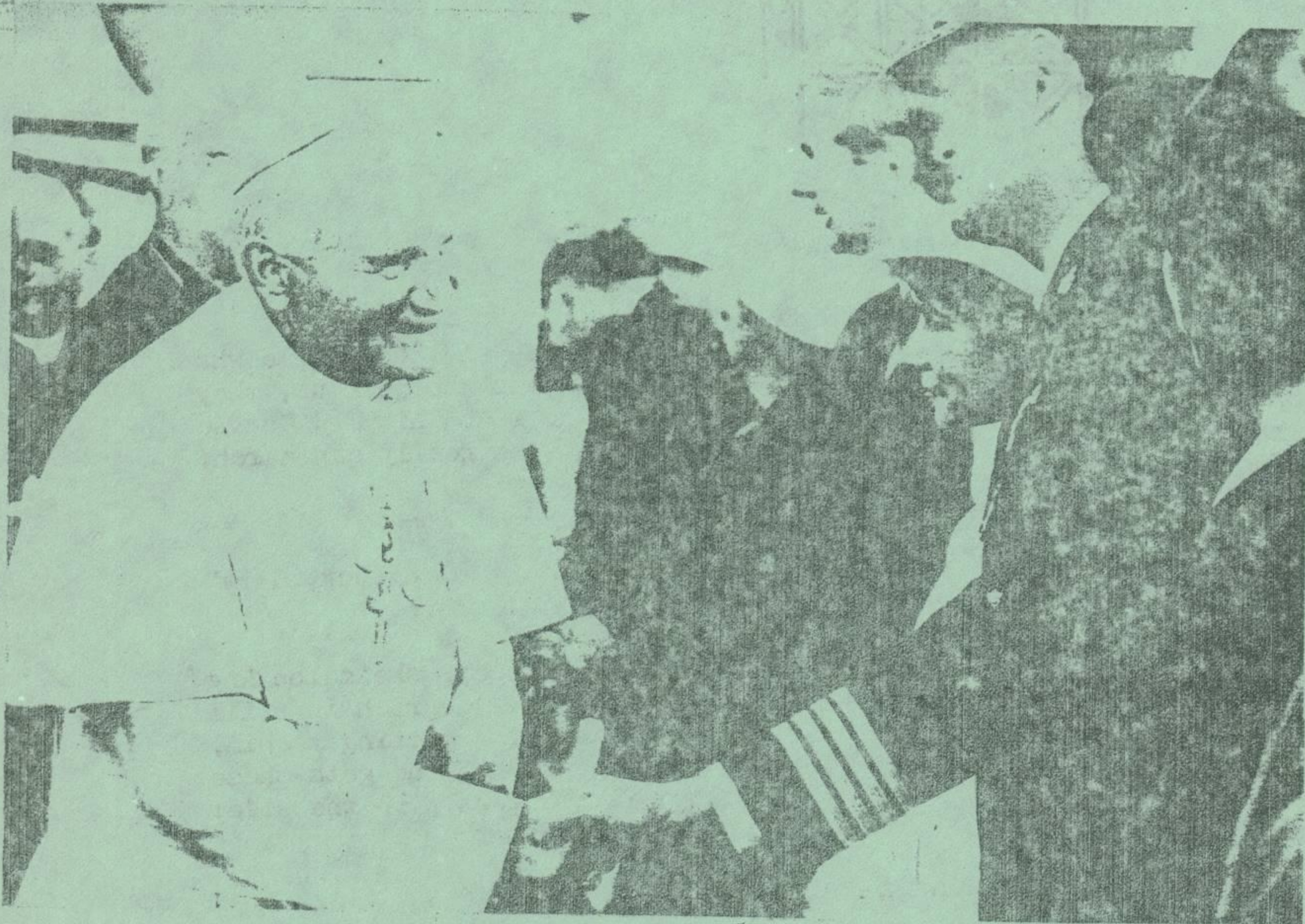

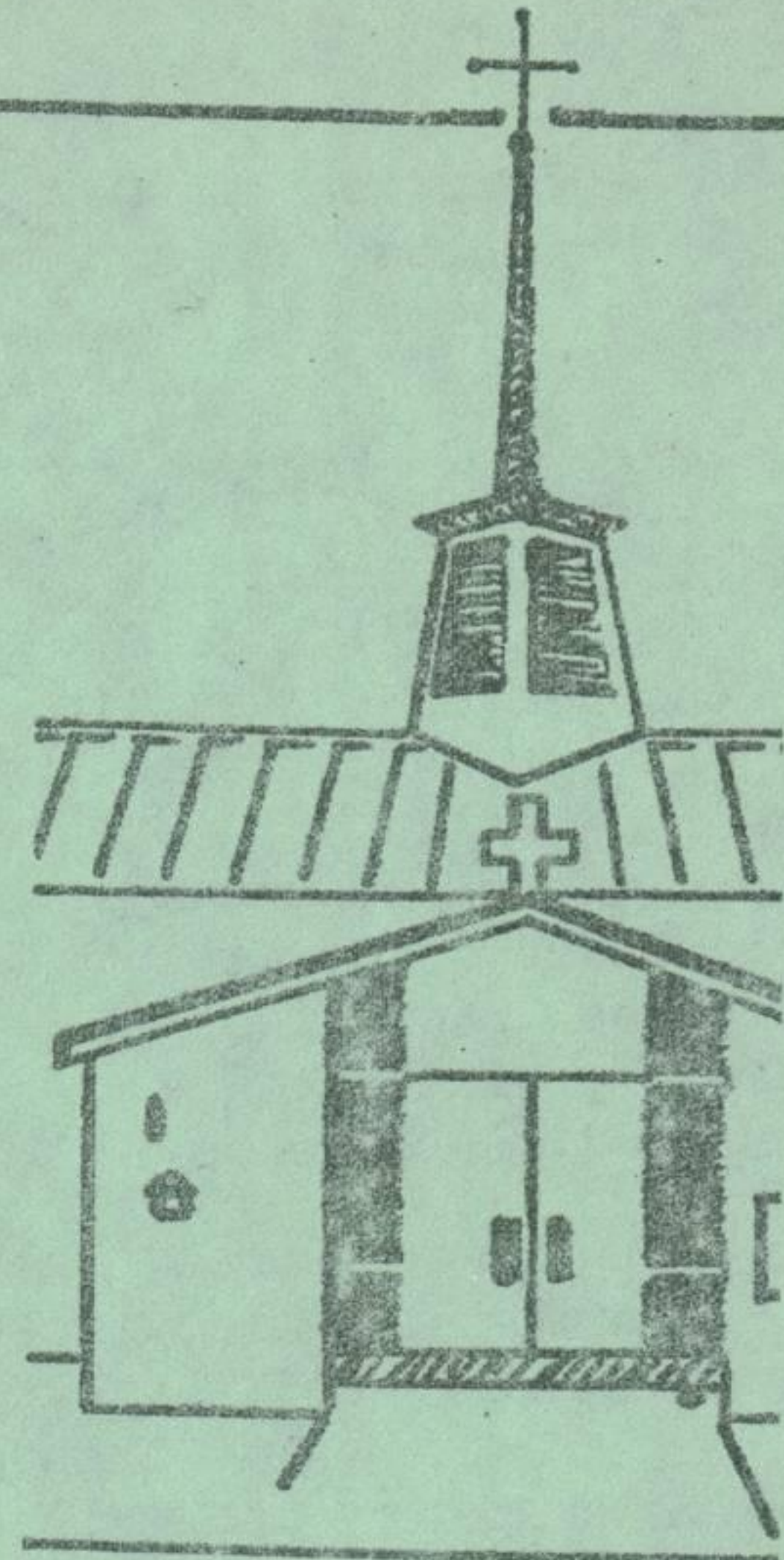
"TO BUILD PEACE WE MUST ESTABLISH JUSTICE"
By Pope John Paul II

At the end of my pilgrimage on Canadian soil, in your capital city, Ottawa, in this mass, we pray for justice and peace.

We pray for justice and peace in the contemporary world and we base our prayer on the Beatitudes of Christ according to the Gospel of Saint Matthew. We pray for peace, and the way to peace is through justice. That is why those who truly hunger and thirst for justice are at the same time peacemakers.

The Gospel of the Eight Beatitudes is a constant reaffirmation of what is most profoundly human, of what is heroic in human beings. The Gospel of the Eight Beatitudes is firmly linked to the cross and the resurrection of Christ. It is only in the light of the cross and the resurrection that what is human and heroic in human beings will recover its strength and its power.

No form of historic materialism can give it either a foundation or a warrant. Materialism can only question, diminish, trample underfoot, destroy, shatter that which is most profoundly human.

If we can accept the Gospel of the Beatitudes of Christ we will not be afraid to face up to these threats.

The moral conscience of humanity is discovering, by various means, the bond that exists between justice and peace. We should do everything necessary so that this consciousness, recovered at the price of immense sacrifice since the Second World War, will not be submerged anew by the spread of violence.

Contemporary men and women, nations, humanity, seek untiringly the ways which lead to justice and peace. Unceasingly the church participates in this great task. Particular churches and episcopates share in this effort, as does the Holy See. It is a human, Christian and apostolic duty.

To build peace we must establish justice.

What moral conscience could resign itself, without reacting, when there exist "frightful disparities between excessively rich individuals and groups on the one hand and the majority made up of the poor or indeed of the destitute?"

What moral conscience could resign itself to superficial arrangements which cover injustice, as long as somewhere on the planet man is wounded "in his most personal belief, in his view of the world in his religious faith, and in the sphere of what are known as civil liberties"?

We will be peacemakers hungering for justice if we consent without reacting "the breathtaking spiral of armaments..." presented as being "at the service of world peace," while the arms race is a real threat of death and while its economic cost deprives so many countries of the effective means for their development?

Our duty remains urgent at this time. We shall be peacemakers if our conscience makes us aware of the dangers, energetic to winning acceptance for dialogue and sharing, attentive to respecting the point of view of others at the same moment that we defend our own rights, faithful to love for humanity, and receptive to the Gift of God!

Let us allow ourselves to be seized by the Spirit of Christ. May he fill us with the truth of these words, with the power of the love that inspires them! May our prayer enable us not only to seek peace, but to bring our will into harmony with the will of God as it is revealed to us by Christ.

For peace among people will always be precarious if we are not at peace with God, if we do not conform ourselves in our most inner being to the plan of God for the history of the world.

May our justice be the relection of his justice! Recognizing our sinfulness, let us allow God to reconcile us with himself the author of life, and, at the same time with our brothers and sisters.

This reconciliation, which we cannot fully realize by ourselves, we shall attain by grace if we faithfully unite ourselves to the immense supplication of those who pray.



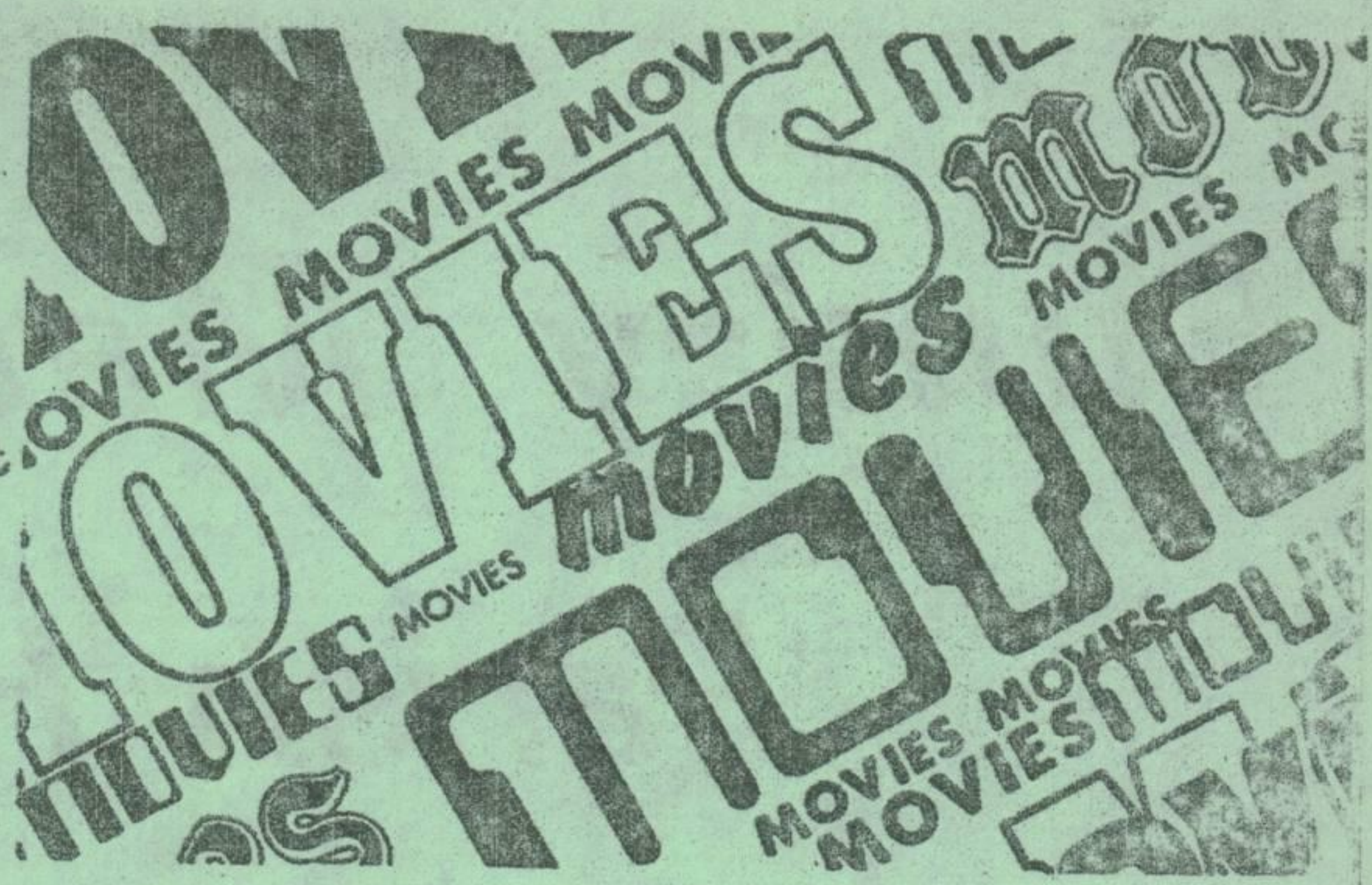
All movies shown in the Parish Hall are rated by the Canadian Forces Movie Guild. Admission to these movies is regulated as follows:
