MCpl Fred Young (Telecommunications Operator) Retires After 24 Years of Service

MCpl Fred Young joined the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals in July 1962 at the age of 16 as a soldier apprentice.

In September of 1962 Sigmn Young was sent to Vimy Barracks at Kingston Ont where he took his basic training and trades training as a Radio Operator.

In November 1964 Fred was posted to 1st Signals Squadron at Canadian Forces Base Calgary. During his posting to Calgary he did a number of things. In April 1965 was attached posted on a peace keeping tour to Cyprus for seven (7) months. Upon returning Fred met Betsie and courted her till August of 1966 at which time he asked for her hand in marriage. In March of 1967 Fred decided that life was too dull so he took a basic parachutists course at Rivers Manitoba and went on active jump strength upon returning to Calgary. Not even a year later Fred was sent on his Junior NCO's (Army) course with The Queens Own Rifle and was posted to the 8th Canadian Hussars at Petawawa in the fall of 1968. Not contented, in Dec of the same year decided to remuster to his present trade (Telecommunications Operator) and was posted to 702 Commun-

ications Squadron in Petawawa. In June 1969 Sigmn Young was promoted to Cpl.

Approximately 4 years later in June 1973 Fred was posted to CFS Foymount where he assisted in closing that Station in May of 1974. With the Station closed Fred had to move on, this time was posted to CFB Suffield and remained there till August 1978.

Cpl Young finding the west to his liking found himself posted to CFB Penhold and in June 1979 was promoted to his present rank of MCpl.

After a number of postings and a variety of jobs Fred was posted to CFS Alsask in June 1981. MCpl Young decided that after 24 years he would let Betsie support him. CHIEF OF DEFENCE STAFF'S FAREWELL MESSAGE

At a ceremony to be held tomorrow 11 July 1986, in the presence of her Excellency The Governor General, our Commander in Chief, I shall hand over my responsibilities to General Manson. As I do so, the thoughts and emotions within me will be many: the never ending and challenge of these thirty-five years of varied service, the comradeship, the help and support I have received from all of you, directly or indirectly, the enormous importance for our country of the tasks to which we have all been dedicated, to name but a few. QUESTION CORNER

Question: After reading several messages and hearing conversations about Unemployment Insurance, I have come to the conclusion that if I serve 20 years in the CF and retire I am not entitled to UIC benefits. I am paying \$46.84 a month which totals \$11,241.60 after 20 years. I feel there is something wrong here, and I do not fully understand what is happening with the money that I am paying for UIC.

My question is, "Can I redress this and refuse to pay for something that I am not entitled to receive after retirement?" After all, if you were shopping in a store, you would not pay for something you did not receive or were not going to receive.

I understand that every worker pays UIC, but then everyone benefits from it except Government employees. Will the much talked about changes rectify the deficiency in the present UI application?

Answer: The recent changes to Unemployment Insurance regulations with respect to linking severance pay and pension income to UI benefits have caused a good deal of concern within the Canadian Forces. Several points that you raise require clarification, however.

- Retirement with an annuity after 20 years in the Forces will affect UI benefits but does not necessarily remove all entitlement. The Unemployment Insurance Act permits claimants to have earnings (including pension income) of up to 25% of their weekly benefit rates without those earnings affecting the benefits paid in any week of unemployment. All earnings above this 25% limit must be deducted on a dollar-for-dollar basis from the weekly benefit rate. For example, the maximum regular UI benefit in 1986 is \$297.00 per week. A claimant could receive "earnings" of up to \$74.00 per week (25% of 297) without affecting his UI benefit. Take for example a Corporal who retires after

20 years of service with an annual annuity of \$8,800.00. This works out to about \$170.00 on a weekly basis. Weekly UI benefits would be reduced by \$96.00 (170 - 74). The member could still claim \$201.00 in UI benefits per week. To be totally cut off from UI benefits, the annuity would have to exceed \$371.00 per week (\$297.00 + \$74.00) or \$19,292.00 per year.

- A member cannot refuse to pay UI premiums even if he would have no entitlement to UI benefits on retirement. Payment of UI benefits is a statutory requirement; in other words, the law of the land insofar as members of the Forces are concerned.
- Not every Canadian pays UI premiums. There are excepted employments. The rules are extremely complex and are contained in Unemployment Insurance regulations.
- The recent regulatory changes do not single out employees of the Federal Government. Anyone in receipt of a pension, including those who are not government employees, are subject to the same rules.
- With respect to redressing this issue, any member of the Canadian Forces who believes he or she has suffered an injustice may initiate a redress of grievance pursuant to QR&O 19.26. All members should be aware by this time, however, that the Department of National Defence has been very involved in this issue for the last year, on behalf of all military personnel. On 11 February 1986, our Assistant Deputy Minister Personnel appeared before the Commission of Inquiry on Unemployment Insurance to state our concerns relating to the recent regulatory changes. It is hoped that when the Commission submits its report to the Government, it will make recommendations to change regulations in consideration of our concerns. The efforts of many people in the Department have been dedicated to ensuring that members of the Canadian Forces are treated in a fair and equitable manner.

So the man did what so many of us have done. He ate the tenth apple and gave god the core.

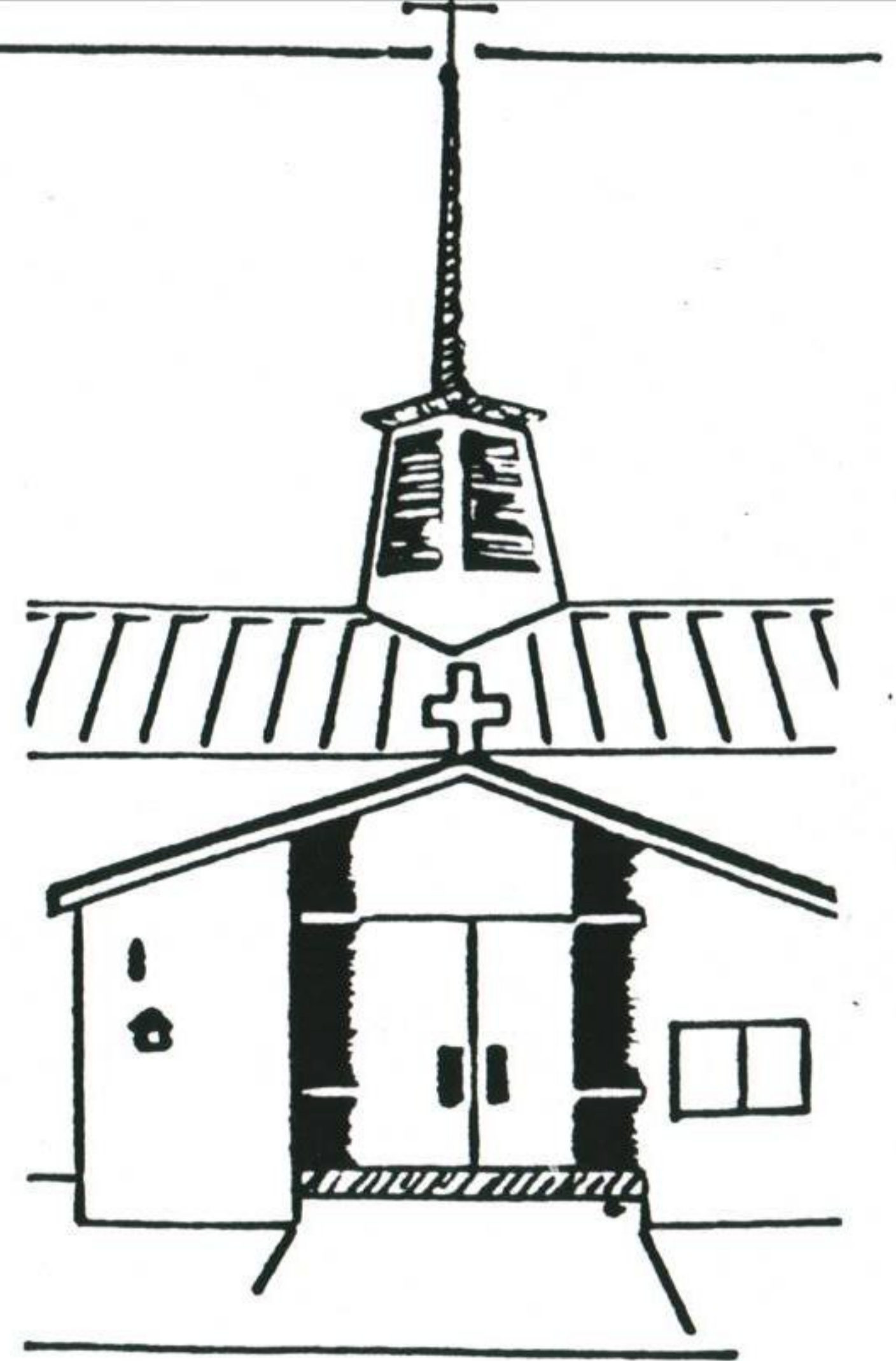

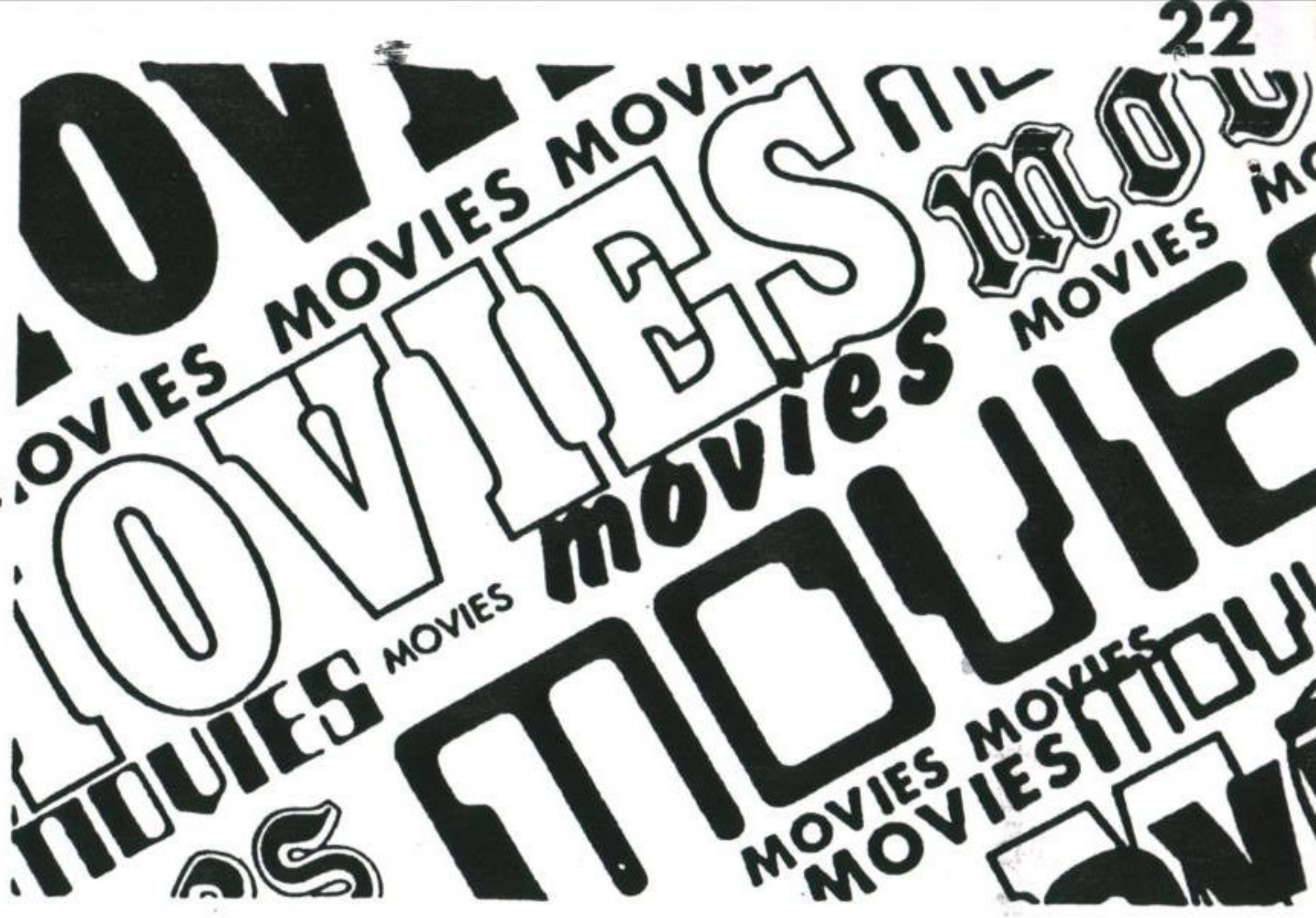
All movies shown in the Parish Hall are rated by the Canadian Forces Movie Guild. Admission to these movies is regulated as follows:
