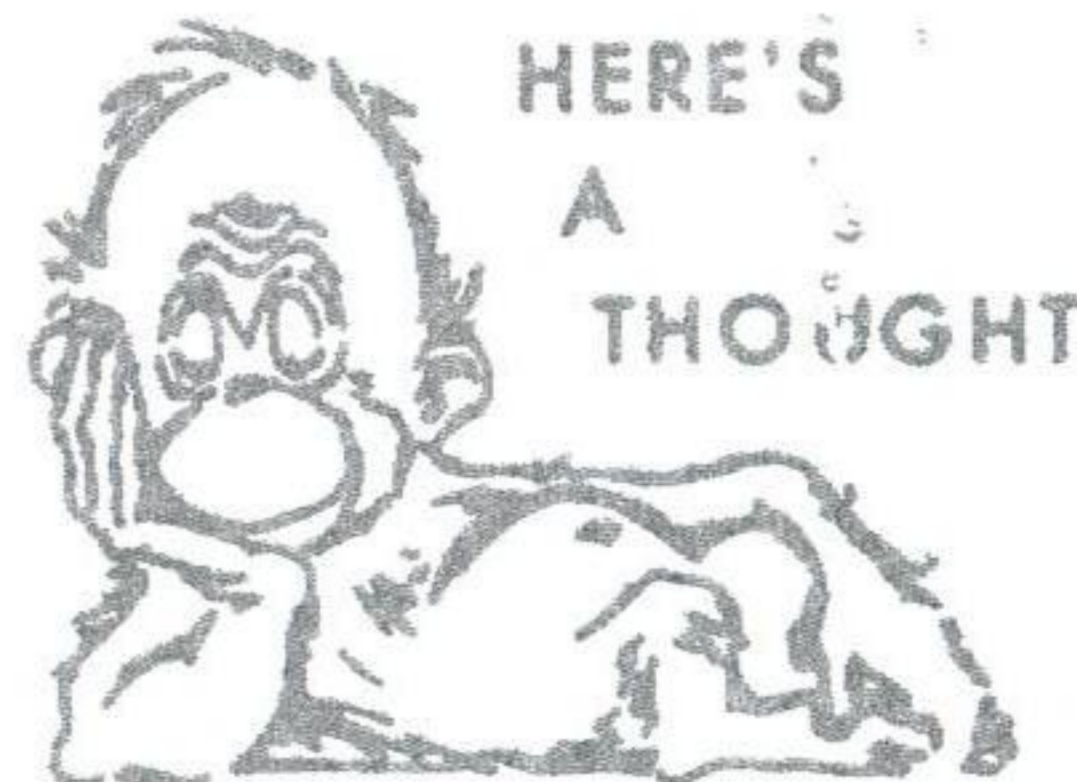

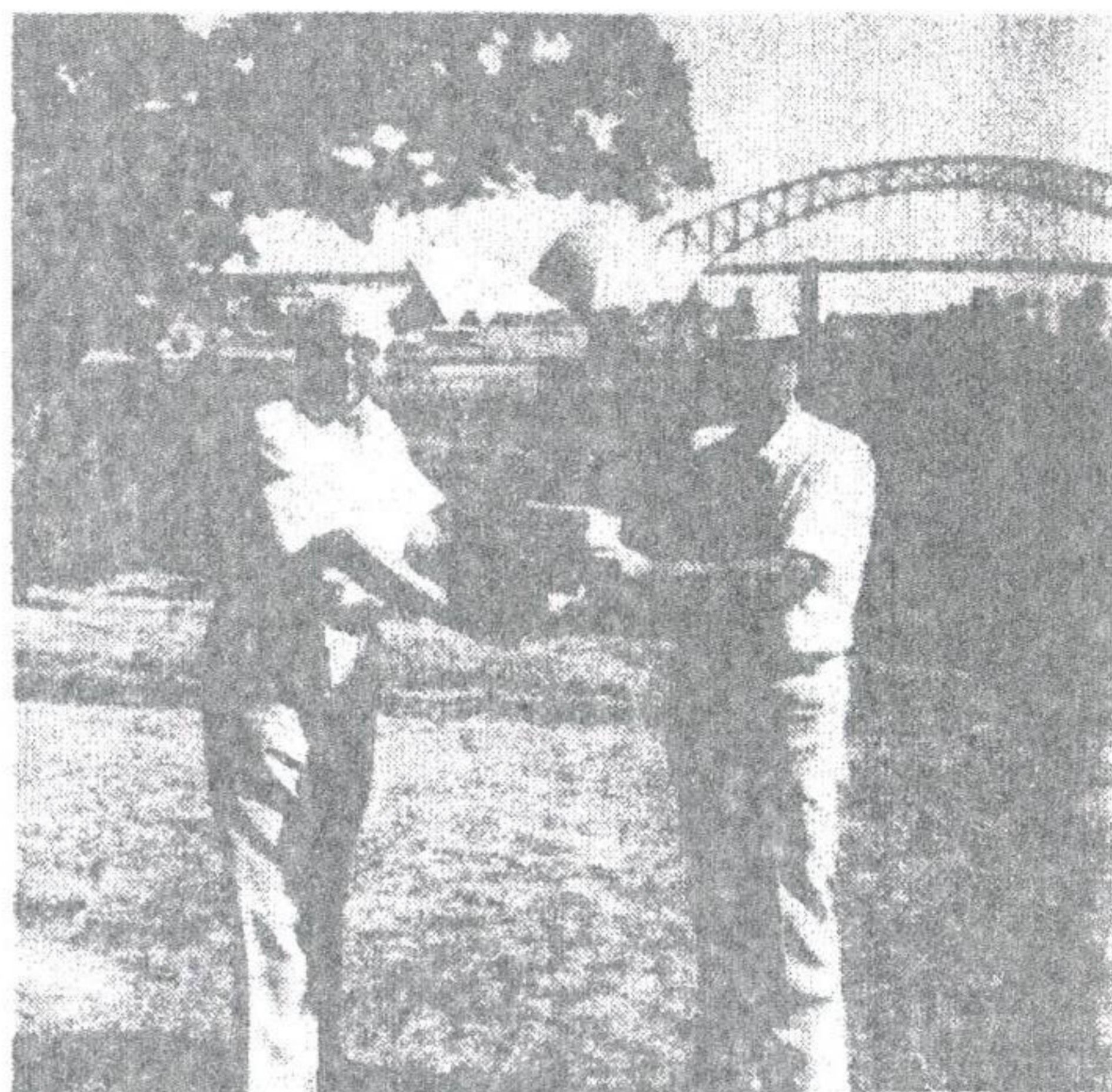

I met the secretary of the World's baseball team of Australia, John Hollander, at Sydney who received the medallions and emblems in front of the harbour of Australia's famous Opera House and harbour bridge as background. He will forward them to the coach of the team, Trevor Jarrett, whom I spoke to through a telephone conversation at his home town at Bourval not very far from Sydney. Trevor Jarrett wishes to say "Hello" to all the people who billeted the team in Kindersley and surrounding districts. A special thanks to Mr. and Mrs. John Boquist of Tisdales Sales and Service. He says he will never forget Mrs. John Boquist's hospitality. Gerry Flanigan, an executive of the World Youth Baseball teams at Kindersley and Mrs. Valerie Flanigan gave medallions on behalf of the Honourable Bob Andrews of Kindersley representing the Saskatchewan Government. Harry Murray, Secretary of the Rural Municipality of Milton at Marengo donated the Saskatchewan Lily emblems to all the team billeted in Marengo District namely Richert Reichert And Celine, Harry and Donna Stasuik, Stuart and Johan Coutts. I landed at Sydney, Australia and upon my meeting my son-in-law and daughter, I remarked that this country reminded me of England with their beautiful gardens of roses and poinsettias.

Sydney has a population of 3.5 million and has the English customs. I spent nearly thirty days at Newcastle that has a population of 1.5 million, where I stayed; it was only a ten minute drive from the Pacific ocean that I used to swim in at the baths on the beaches practically every day. It was good to get up early in the morning and take a jog and walk around the block in the invigorating air that come off the Pacific ocean. It was cool in the morning, around 50°F, but warmed up to 80° F around 10a.m., and even got higher

in the afternoon. The houses that they live in are built of brick and coloured stone and are beautifully landscaped. The cars are mostly Japanese makes that they drive on the wrong side of the road. Fresh fish is caught every day. Fresh lobster is a delicacy and they are speared from among the rocks on the ocean floor. In shopping with my daughter I helped her fill a big cart of groceries. To my surprise she paid only \$30. In Canada the same amount would cost over a hundred dollars I am sure.

To learn how to start the engines on a tug boat is quite an experience and to manoeuvre the tug boat in easing up to a 140,000 ton ship is quite a feat. You may ask how can two tug boats move 140,000 ton ships loaded with wheat, coal or aluminum, iron ore, etc. The engines are started by air compression and then switched on diesel. There are two 1800 HP engines in the engine room that have 8" crankshafts and are connected to a 9" shaft that drives two propellers. The engines run at 730 r.p.m. when at full throttle they throw 4ft waves across the harbour. The pilots room looks like a Boeing 747 instrument panel and the pilot has a microphone to keep in touch with the ships crew. These ships were destined for Korea, Japan and Haiti.

I had a grand experience on St. Patrick's night. We were booked in a large theatre. The orchestra reminded me of Guy Lombardo and the Royal Canadians. One of the microphones was lowered to the floor below the stage. Around 11 pm the orchestra leader called for anyone visiting Newcastle from any country in the world to come up to the stage. Several people approached the stage from the British Isles, U.S.A., parts of Australia, and New Zealand. The last announcement called my name from Canada and I would be singing an Irish song. By all accounts I received a good review. On the return trip home I flew 12 hours from Sydney to Brisbane then to Hawaii then to Vancouver where I stayed with

relatives for a few days spending one afternoon with Eric and Vivian Halpenny formerly of Kindersley and Arnie Warrington from Merid Sask. Eric and Vivian Halpenny drove me and my sister Ellen around Surrey B.C.. We stopped at their town house - a mansion if there ever was one and 300 feet from the front door a golf course that I said I would like to play him a game Australian style. The Australians are very athletic - even the mild delivery boys run from their van to the house and back with the empty bottles. The garbage collectors run with the garbage cans to the garbage collectors truck and back to the houses. The truck never stops, it just keeps creeping along. That is why I believe at a world's running marathon at Boston USA an Australian came in first place.

To sum up the trip, the different lifestyle would do anyone good. That's why one of the R.C.M.P. of Kindersley told me he would like to retire in Australia.

## Pay and allowance increases made retroactive

OTTAWA - The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Perrin Beatty, announced that pay and allowance increases for Regular Forces members covering a three-year period have been approved.

The initial increase averaging 3.75 percent is retroactive to April 1, 1986. This will be followed by additional increases averaging 1.87 percent effective April, 1987, and 3.00 percent effective April 1, 1988.

A recruit on joining the Canadian Armed Forces will earn \$11,304 annually while, the basic salary for a trained non-commissioned member in the rank of Corporal will be \$25,428. The basic salary for a Captain, non-specialist, will be \$33,984.

### A SATISFIED READER

A letter to the Editor of the Winnipeg Voxair gets results and solves a family tree mystery.

Dear Sir:

A friend of mine from this village recently received a Xmas parcel from Canada from a pen pal whose husband is in your Air Force. By way of packing, there was a copy of Voxair dated Oct. 30, 1985, the Remembrance Day edition. Inside there was a copy of that beautiful poem "In Flanders Fields," by the poet and soldier John MacRae in his own handwriting and written on the very day that I was born, Dec. 8, 1915.

My late husband always thought there was a relationship between the poet and this family, but nobody ever tried to find out.

My husband's great grandfather was a pipe major in the Seaforth Highlanders, born in Kintail, Rosshire in 1755. By his first marriage to a Miss MacKenzie from Applecross he had two sons who followed him into the Army as pipers. They were Alexander and John MacRae, and the poet may be descended from one of these.

Donald Roy married again when he was 80, and my husband was descended from this second union. The bride was only 26 and they had these children!

In an old book of the Clan MacRae Association I see that in 1925 that the Honorary President was Colonel David MacRae, Guelph, Canada, father of the late Lieut.-Colonel John MacRae. I would love to hear if these are descendants there with Rosshire connections, if you have any way of tracing them.

I have recited that beautiful poem in church on Armistice Sunday. It means a lot to me, as my own father, a gunner in the Royal Garrison Artillery, served throughout the First World War, only to die of "flue and pneumonia in Salonika" (Greece). He was 27 and I was three years old and my sister only six months. I have visited his grave at Garpol, so remembrance has meant something real to me all my life.

I am a poet myself and have always been affected by words like "Flanders

Fields" which pull at my heartstrings.

Please forgive me if this is asking too much of you, but I feel your paper was really meant to reach me.

I have just passed the 70 mark. My husband, a fishing skipper, died nine years ago. His name was Evander MacRae. They spell this surname in different ways.

### "In Flanders Fields" poet John MacRae family tree mystery finally solved.

Dear Editor,

May I thank you for the three letters which you forwarded to me a few days ago re the poet Col John McCrae. I have come to the end of my research.

When a gentleman in Guelph aged 81 told me about the museum there, I wrote the Curator for any information she could give me. I was delighted to receive a booklet published in 1972 commemorating the centennial year of the birth of the famous Canadian Soldier, physician and poet. The cover has some poppies and a copy of "In Flanders Fields". Inside, it gave the history of the poem, "The Saga of John McCrae", mentioning his other poems; pictures of his birthplace in

Guelph, both interior and exterior which is now a shrine; letters from the Queen at Buckingham Palace, from Government House Ottawa, and from Mountbatten of Burma.

The Curator also enclosed a copy of his family tree going back six generations to one Robert McCrae, Cuirrock, Ayrshire, who probably left Kintail, Rosshire, after the first Jacobite Rebellion in 1715. This disproves any immediate relationship with my late husband, but all the MacRaes in Kintail stemmed from the same source.

I was also sent, by another relative, an obituary notice of the Poet's father, Thomas McCrae, taken from the Guelph Mercury Feb 20, 1915.

He was a leading farmer and stock breeder in that Section. He, it was, who emigrated to Canada from Ayrshire. His son, Col David McCrae, was the poet's father. The poet left no issue, neither did his brother Thomas, but his sister, Mary Ainslie Geil, married a James Kilgour and they had four children.

On a recent visit to Eilean Donnan Castle, I was told that some of the poet's relatives had visited there several years ago. They have promised to send me on some papers left by them. The Castle is owned by John MacRae. Another famous Poet by the same name emigrated to North Carolina, with lots of other MacRaes from Kintail and was killed in the American War of Independence. Poems written in exile were brought home to Kintail by a one armed soldier of the same name.

Thank you for all the trouble you have taken. I have replied to all letters. I will remember you all on Armistice Day, when you can be justly proud of your poet — as I am.

## SERVICE REGISTERED SAVINGS PLANS

### Benefits of RRSP

There are two major benefits from investing funds in registered retirement savings plans. The first receives the most publicity, and that is the fact that deposits to RRSP plans are deductible from taxable income, within the contribution limits set by the RRSP legislation.

The second is equally important. The investment income earned within the RRSP is not subject to any taxation until such time as the funds are withdrawn from the RRSP. This enables the plan value to increase much quicker than would be the case if the same income was earned outside the RRSP.

The following charts illustrate this potential growth in plan value over a period of thirty years. The first shows the value as at the end of each year if \$1,000 is invested once, at the beginning.

The second chart projects the value if an additional \$1,000 was invested at the beginning of each year.

In each example, the rate of interest is assumed, for comparison purposes, to be 7.00%, 9.00% or 11.00%. Also this interest is assumed to compound annually.

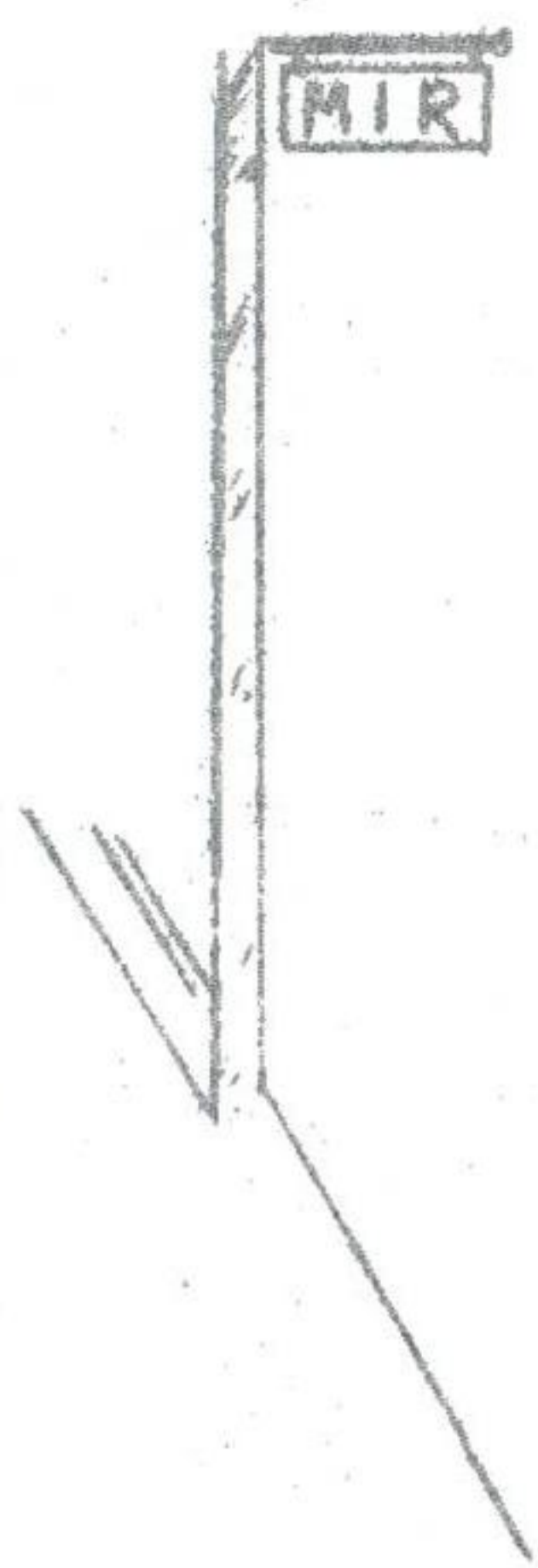

It is not uncommon to hear someone say, "I'm trying to lose weight so I've cut out all my bread and potatoes" or "Sugar - I never touch the stuff!" Many individuals consider certain foods as being either "good" or "bad" and tend to associate them with a "take it or leave it" attitude. In fact, there are really no foods that, when "good" are only so within recognized amounts.

Most would agree that Popeye's standby "spinach" is a good food (although not everyone agrees that it tastes good), but if spinach were the only food an individual consumed, that individual's diet would be far from good! That is because it would be excluding all the other foods that make up a healthy diet. Even milk, the "almost perfect food", has its limits. During infancy, when gastro-intestinal systems are still developing, milk plays an important role in daily feeding because it provides so many nutrients in an easily digested form. But as people grow older, they require different amounts of the various nutrients as well as variety in texture and appetite appeal. Milk, although still an important source of nutrients for an adult, should be only one of the foods in the daily diet.

Now for a closer look at those first items -- bread, potatoes and sugar. Bread and potatoes both contain the complex carbohydrate "starch". In the human body, starch can be converted to the simple carbohydrate "sugar" which is used as fuel for the body's daily energy requirements. Individuals who are more active require more energy, but if one consumes more of this fuel than the body requires, the excess is converted into fat and stored for future use. Regrettably, it is all too easy in our affluent society (regardless of the high cost of living!) to consume several times the daily requirement for energy and hence, the number of individuals that can be seen walking around with those fat stores bulging out hither and yon.

In addition to providing starch, bread and potatoes also provide other nutrients, texture and appetite appeal. The B-complex vitamins found in whole grain and enriched bread and the vitamin C found in potatoes are essential to metabolism, and one only has to imagine a day without any bread and potatoes to remember how much appetite appeal and texture they both add to meals.

Sugar, as mentioned above, is the simple carbohydrate. In its common form -- refined granulated sugar -- it contains no nutrients. That is not to say that sugar in limited amounts is harmful, but generally one's daily intake of sugar is sufficient (Cont.)

(and often more than sufficient) to meet the needs for this quick source of energy. Dietary sugar is quickly taken into the blood stream and sent to the various tissues that require the energy or it is converted to fat stores for use at a later date. Dietary sugar consists not only of granulated sugar but is also found in all the sweet food items such as candy, jam, syrup, molasses and honey. A glance at food labels will indicate the foods to which sugar has been added. It is often added to improve the taste appeal of other foods which are sources of important nutrients.

How then do bread, potatoes, and sugar fit into the daily diet? With moderation! When consumed in excessive amounts, they can bring about unnecessary weight gain and/or force the exclusion of other important foods from the diet, but if they themselves are strictly excluded, their benefits are also lost. Canada's Food Guide recommends daily consumption of bread (or its nutritionally equivalent substitutes such as enriched cereal, rice or pasta) as well as one daily serving of potatoe. The amount of bread will be determined by the "room" one has left after eating the other foods recommended in the Food Guide as well as by the extra calories one can afford to consume. The serving of potatoes does not include the rich "extras" such as butter or sour cream or gravy that are popular additions. These extras should only be added if they fall within a reasonable daily allowance since, like sugar, they are high in calories and are primarily added to enhance taste appeal. If their addition to some foods is important to you, it will be necessary for you to restrict their use with other foods in order to stay within a reasonable allowance.

So go ahead and enjoy your bread and potatoes and don't begrudge yourself some sweet foods, but remember, it is all "a matter of amount"!

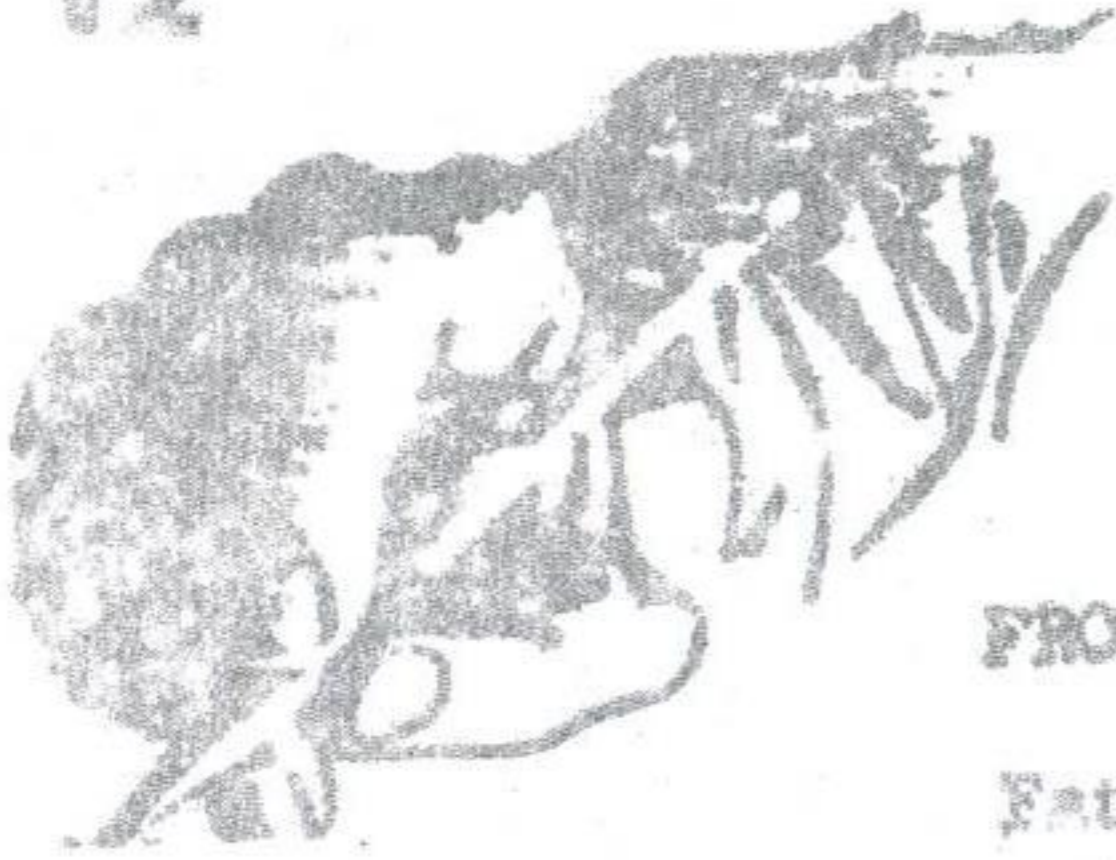

### FROM THE C.O.C.'s PEN

Nevertheless, I hope that the parish will help you during the remaining months here in Alsask. I must encourage all Catholics to make a special effort in the next few months to support the life of the parish. We need your presence and involvement if there is going to be life in the parish.

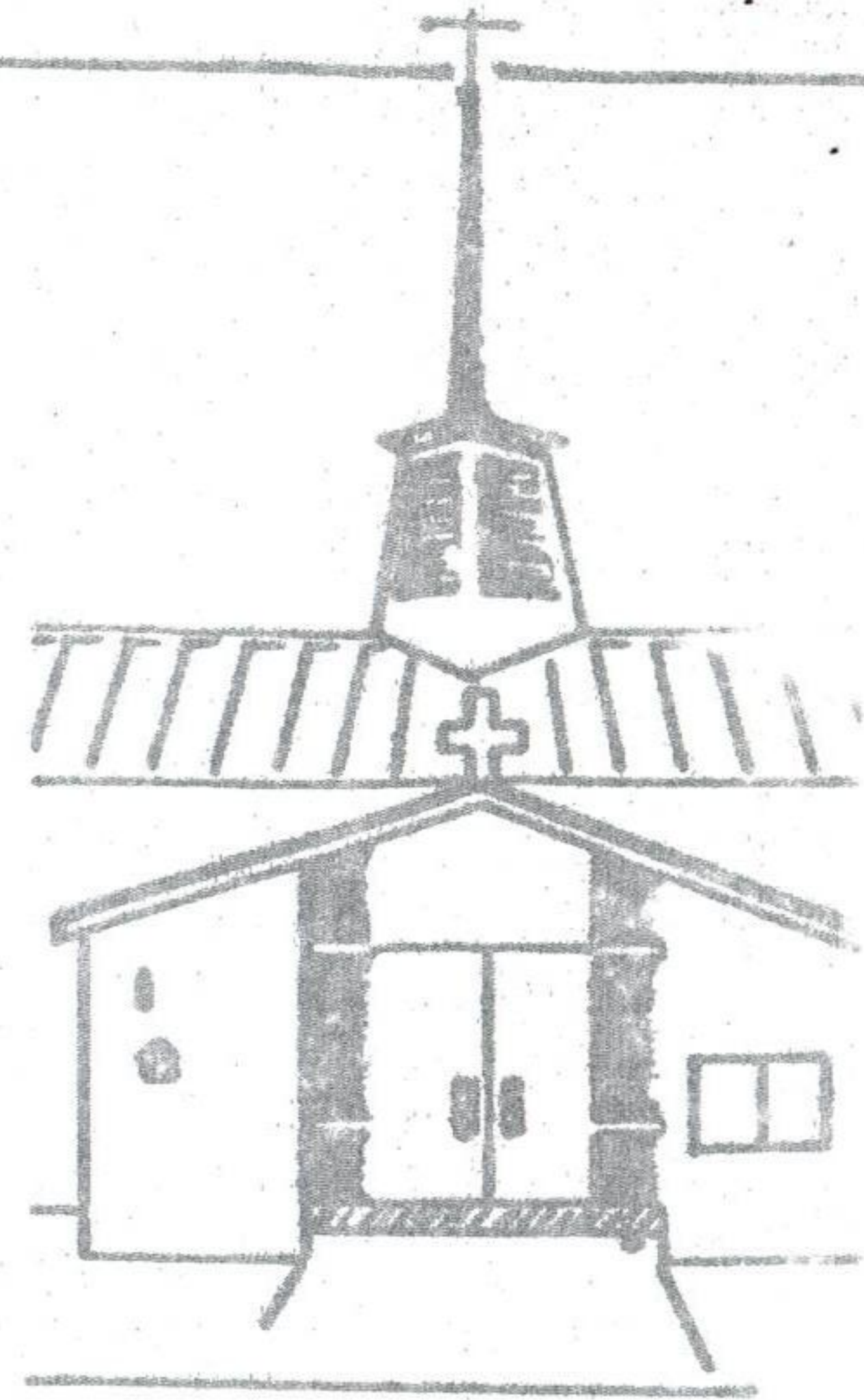
I am most grateful to Sgt. Andre Laliberte for his fine ministry of music and to Cpl. Guy Clouatre for his sacristy caring. We need help in nearly every ministry and so if you have gifts and time to share I am sure they could serve the life of the parish - and your own spiritual life.

I shall be visiting the station regularly on Thursdays. Sr. Germaine, my pastoral associate in the Kindersley/Marengo parishes, will come again for setting up the necessary Catechetical Programs for our children at the station. Please let me know by September 7th if you have children requiring catechism.

Finally I would like to address a pastoral concern for your serious reflection, namely, Sunday - the day of the Lord.

Our Sunday is experiencing strong competition today. It is very easy to allow other interests and concerns to rob the Lord's day of its rightful place. For us, the celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is the action of Christ and the people of God. Hence, it is to be central in keeping the Sunday holy and His day. One gets the impression that too many find any reason to excuse themselves from this course of life. Without a source - the Word and Eucharist - life will not blossom. No wonder so many marriages, for example, are not blossoming.

Admittedly, a lot of people because of the nature of their job e.g. Military job, Oil patch, food industry, etc., have to work on a lot of Sundays. Because of this contemporary reality the church is providing us with the convenience of Eucharist at the first mass of Sunday (Saturday night). This is the situation here at Alsask with our Saturday Liturgy at 6:15 p.m. And if this is impossible a mature faith should urge us to attend at least a weekday mass. Masses at Marengo (only fifteen minutes away) are at 11:00 a.m. Thursdays and Sundays at 9:15 a.m. From my observation I believe that many parishioners could well evaluate this important dimension in their Christian lives. What messages are being given to the next generation? Is Sunday truly the Lord's Day in your life?

7:30 PM (starts Sept 21st)

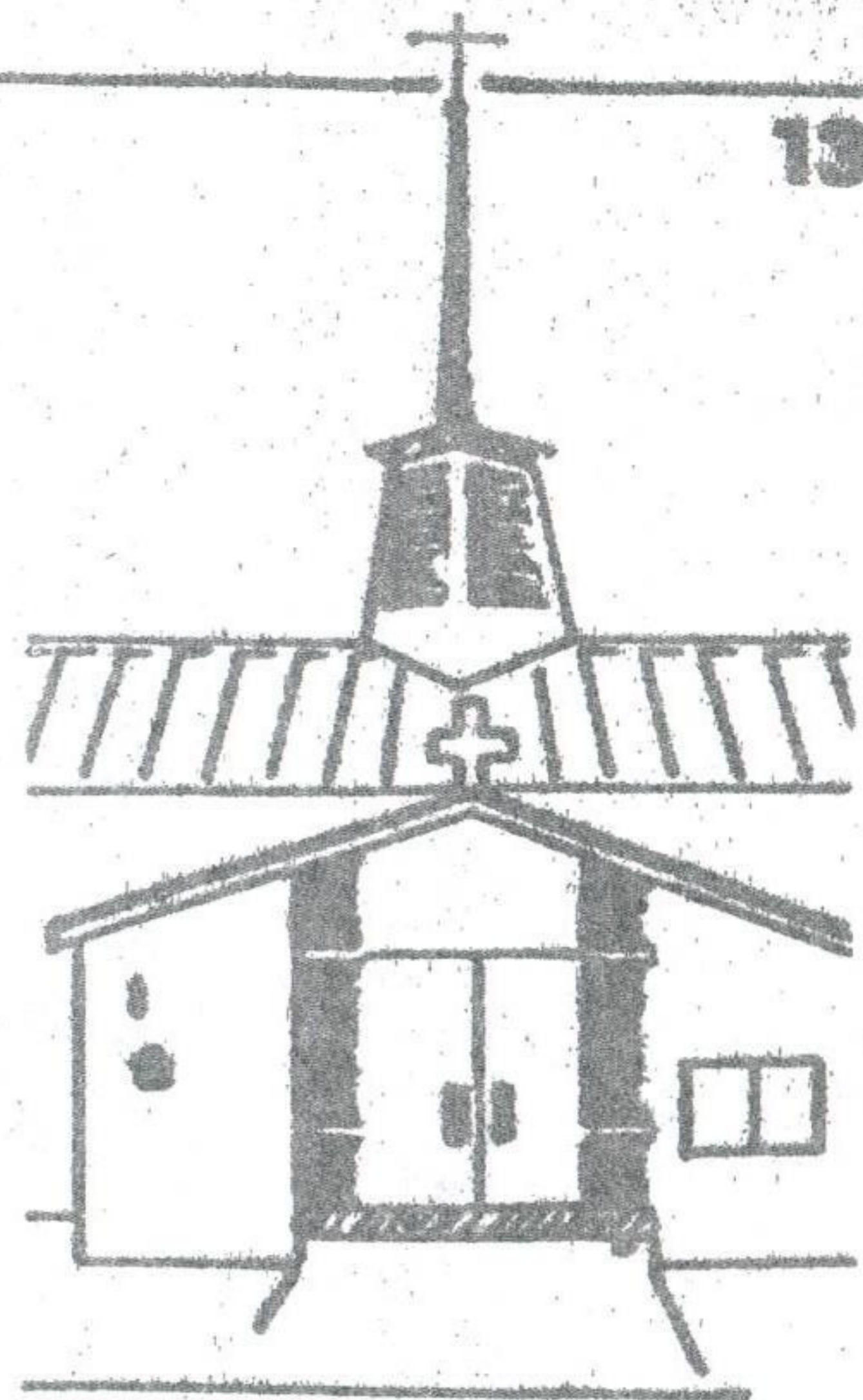
