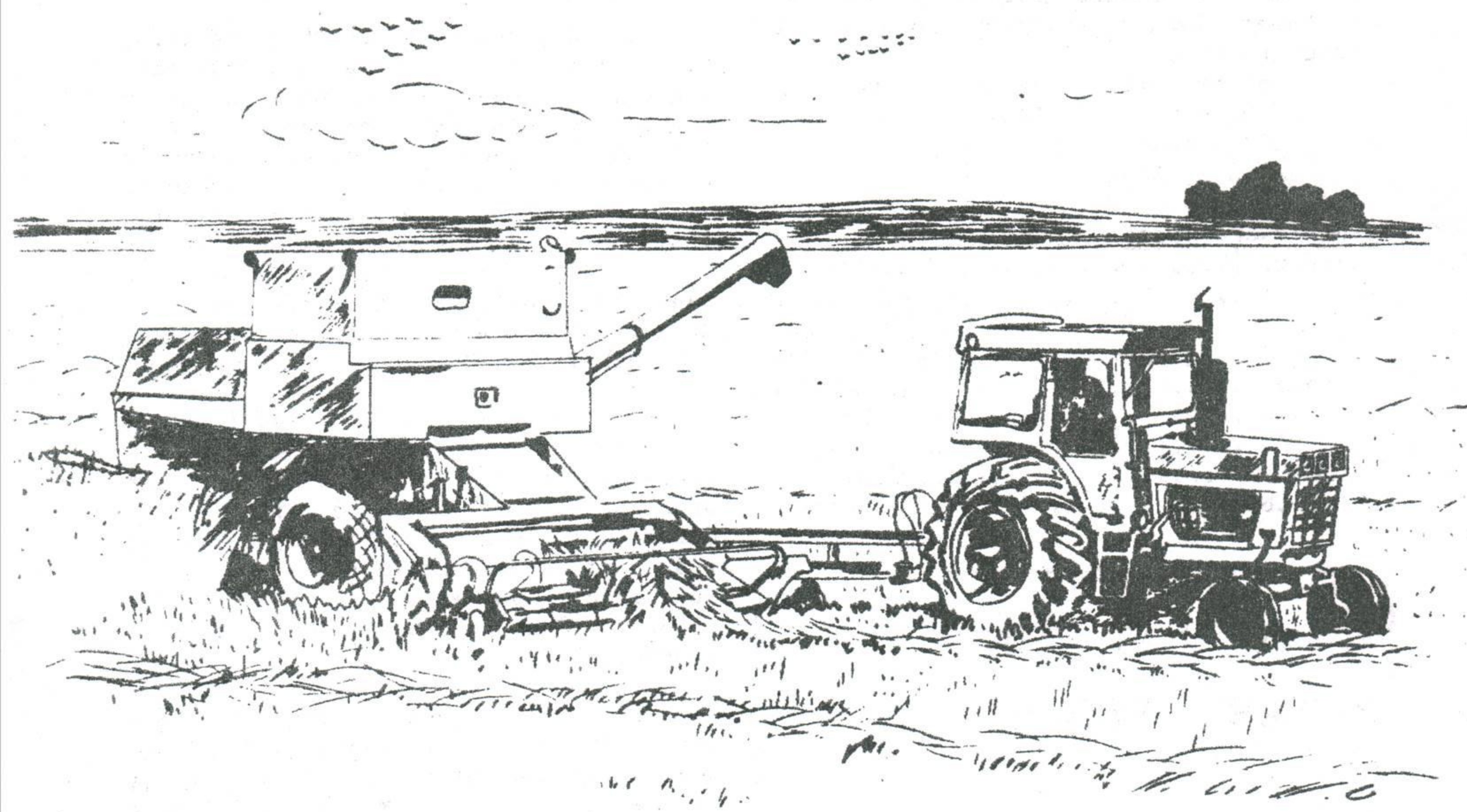

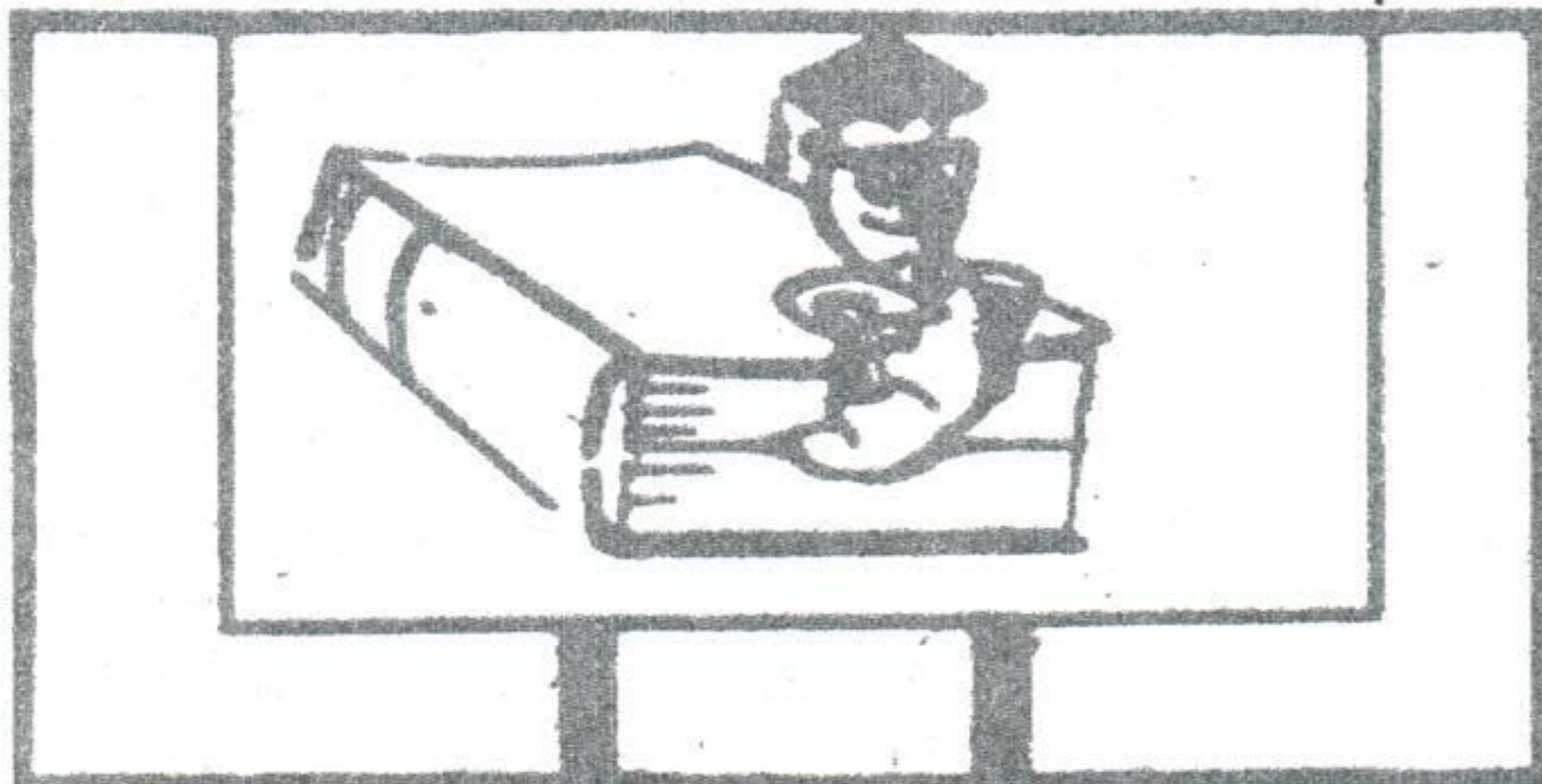

Think First

We don't know where this fellow is going. Maybe he is going to tell the boss about a new idea of give him a piece of his mind. But we do know one thing. "He's in too much of a hurry". 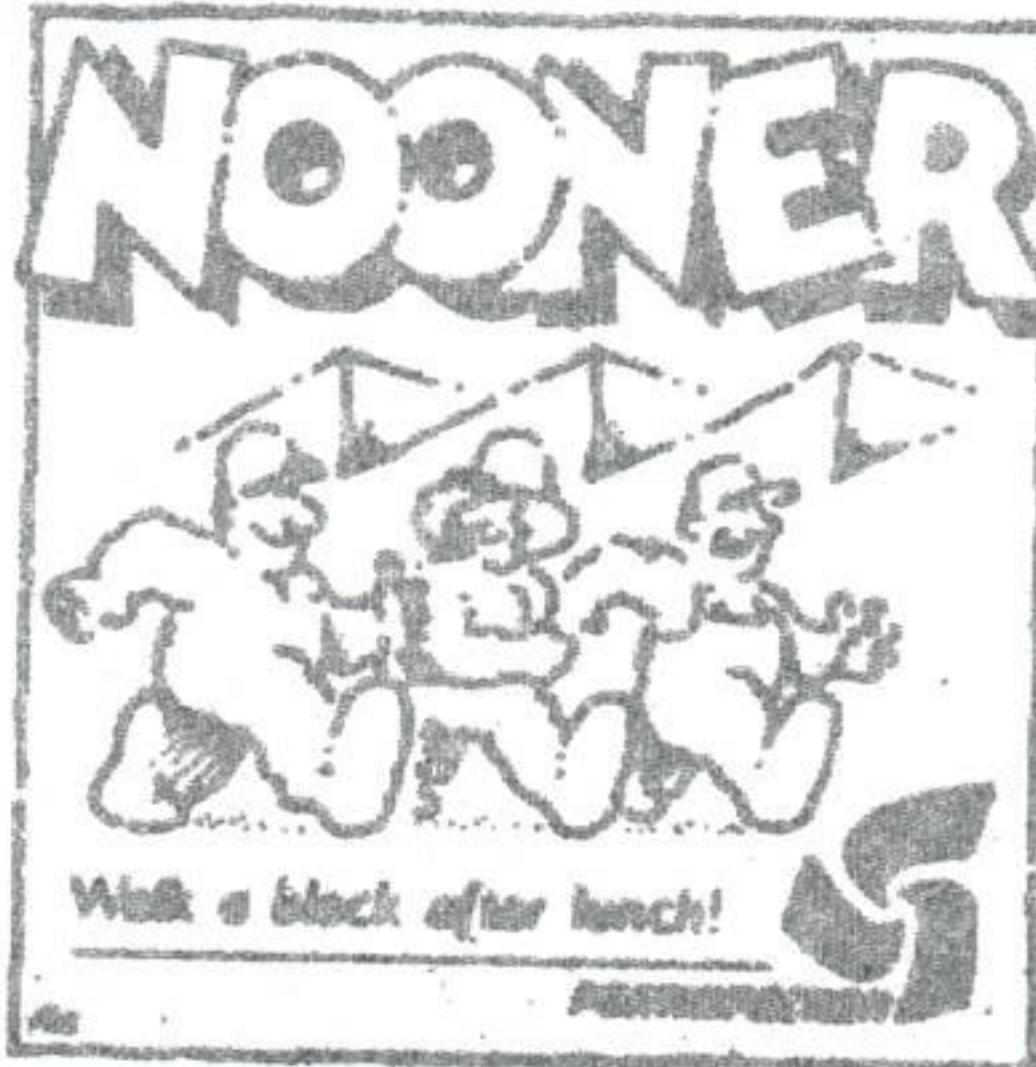
In fact, why not aim for an overall diet that gives you 35% of your calories from fats, 50% from carbohydrates and 15% from proteins? All it takes is a little planning.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Fire Prevention Week is observed across Canada the second week of October every year. In keeping with this tradition, on behalf of the Station Fire Dept and the General Safety Committee, I hereby declare 5 - 11 Oct "Fire Prevention Week" at CFS Alask.

During this week I ask everyone, whether it be at work, at home, or at school, to renew their efforts towards Fire Prevention. Most fires can be prevented, if we use safe procedures, and take steps to correct any hazards we see. During this week, everyone should carefully examine their surroundings and how they do things, to make sure they are protected from the dangers of fire.

I know your awareness for fire safety will not end with Fire Prevention Week. We must be alert and cautious every day of the year.

Fire Prevention Week is here again. Theme for this year's program is "Learn Not To Burn - It Really Works". In the interest of Fire Safety this year I'd like you to look around yourself and ask a few simple questions:

1. Is my area fire safe?
2. Do I have an escape route in case of fire?
3. If not - why not?
4. Do my children know what to do in case of fire and how to get out?
5. Why am I saving old papers and rags?
6. How much flammable liquids do I have?
7. Do they exceed the legal limit?
8. What condition are my electrical appliances in?
9. When was the last time I tested my Smoke Detector?

These are just a few questions. I could go on and on.

If you have any questions concerning your home or place of work, don't hesitate to call the Fire Dept. If you don't, it may be too late.

At this time I'd like to explain how Fire Prevention Week started.

THE STORY OF FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

On a warm summer evening of Oct 1871, a thoughtless, careless act sparked a fire at a modest city home. It seemed small and easy to control.

BUT it wasn't.

Thirty hours later 2,100 acres of Chicago were a blackened, smouldering waste. More than 200 of it's citizens had perished, 100,000 were homeless, almost 17,500 buildings were in ruins.

Direct losses were \$168,000,000; the indirect costs incalculable.

To mark the Chicago conflagration, Fire Prevention Week is observed annually during the week containing October 9, it's anniversary date. Fire Prevention Week was first officially proclaimed in Canada in 1922.

It strongly reminds us that fires are not unavoidable accidents. They are usually the result of some thoughtless act or neglect, and they can exact heavy penalties.

Don't gamble that you can escape the financial headaches or family heartbreaks that fire always brings. Make fire prevention your concern, at home, on the job - EVERY WEEK.

MILITARY PENSION PLAN

OTTAWA -- Proposed changes to the pension plans of members of the Canadian Forces (CF), part of a major reform by the Treasury Board of all public service pension arrangements, have been revealed in a report tabled June 25 in the House of Commons. The legislative changes will be considered in a Bill to be introduced before Parliament in the fall.

According to Chief of the Defence Staff, General Paul D. Manson, the proposed reforms do not pose any real threat to the pension arrangements for retired and serving members.

For existing CF pensioners, the good news is the government's continuing commitment to them to guarantee full annual inflation protection through indexing of pensions to the full consumer price index (CPI).

Serving members with pensions arising from service to their credit prior to the effective date of change will also have guaranteed indexing to CPI. However, service after the date of the legislative change will no longer have the same full inflation protection. Inflation protection will be targeted to, but will not exceed, full CPI. For CF members, this benefit will be funded through the interest earnings of the CF Superannuation Account (CFSA).

In other words, a serving member with 20 years service on the date the reform measures are enacted, will receive guaranteed indexing to full CPI for these 20 years, but service after the effective date will receive inflation protection consistent with the interest earnings of the CFSA. These interest earnings will be based on performance and rate of return earned by a representative sample of private sector invested pension funds.

"Provided the anticipated relationship is maintained between the financial performance of the private sector plans and the CPI," says Gen Manson, "full indexing to CPI should be possible in future."

The pension contribution rate for CF members will continue to be equivalent to that of employees in the public service. As well, the government will continue to contribute to the remainder of the cost. The government contribution is expected to remain in the range of two times the rate paid by CF members. "The government remains committed to the additional financial support implicit in the CF early retirement programs," says Gen Manson.

In recognition that joint management of public service superannuation plans is needed, the government will establish a Pension Management Board on which the CF will participate. According to the CDS, it may be more appropriate to establish, in due course, a separate management system for the CFSA, guided by general policy provisions applicable to public service superannuation plans, but tailored to CF needs.

The proposed pension changes reflect the government's intention, announced last April by Treasury Board President Robert De Cotret, to operate public service pension plans, including the CF Superannuation Act, in accordance with "accepted practices and standards of major employees in the private sector."

Since the announcement, Treasury Board and the public service have had extensive consultations on proposed pension reform measures. Senior CF officers participated at all levels of the process to ensure that special concerns of CF members and pensioners were given careful consideration. Gen Manson assured that the CF will continue to participate in the reform process. "Because of the great importance of this matter to all CF members, this headquarters will continue to make every effort to ensure that the unique position of the CF is recognized and that the interests of our personnel are fully protected," he said.

Disclosure of the proposed changes is expected to dispel any uncertainty which has prevailed regarding pension reform and remove pressures for early retirement to avoid the consequences of possible adverse legislative changes to CF pension benefits.

FROM THE C.O.C.'S PEN

Father R. Kleiter

Sacred Scripture challenges us to be witnesses to the gospel in all aspects of our lives.

Saint Luke, for e.g. presents Jesus' direct admonition to hear the gospel and pay attention to it. The rich man's dialogue with Abraham is also a warning for us in our times. Pope John Paul II in his homily in Edmonton in 1984 gave us the same warning. "...the poor people and poor nations - poor in different ways, not only lacking food but also deprived of freedom and other human rights - will judge those people who take these goods away from them, amassing to themselves the imperialistic monopoly of economic and political supremacy at the expense of others".

Amos, in the Old Testament tells us the fate of those who live in comfort and ignore the needs of others. "They will be the first to be exiled".

Psalms 145 recalls that while we may do the work, it is the Lord who is just to the oppressed and raises up those who are bowed down. Our work is done to give praise to the Lord.

Saint Paul's letter to Timothy calls baptized Christians to strive to live saintly lives that reflect their dedication to God. We are to fight the good fight of faith and to stand up and tell the truth before the world (in front of many witnesses) and before governments (Pontius Pilot).

To speak the truth, particularly about the causes of wealth and poverty, human rights and liberation is not easy in our world today. Complex international economic and political situations are involved. In order to try to discern how to apply the gospel to these complex questions in our age, the church needs to have access to research and scholars in a variety of fields.

When our Canadian bishops speak to leaders in government and society, calling them to practice Christian justice, they need our knowledgeable support. We need to study the messages and statements of Pope John Paul II and our bishops in full, and live the gospel. If government leaders were convinced that we truly wanted to live the gospel every day, and really desired a just society, they would be perhaps more open and able to build laws that would bring this about.

Within the Church the bishops need our prayers and support as they try to lead us to a deeper understanding of the gospel through prayer, study and events such as the international Synod of bishops in 1987 which will study the role of the Church and in the world.

In every mass we are asked to pray for our bishops and once a year, we are asked to give financial support to help them in their projects at the national and international levels so that they may better serve the needs of the Canadian Church.

ROCK RAP

Well I'm back again with more of ROCK RAP. In the past few months a lot of new bands have come out and in this issue of ROCK RAP we'll take a look at a few of those bands.

The Alarm. The group was formed in the fall of 1981 after the leadvocalist, Mike Peters, caught a glimpse of that ever-popular band U2 at the infamous MARQUEE CLUB. Mike and Nigel Twist, who plays drums, were previously members of a band called The Toilets. The group consisted of Mike Peters - Vocals, Nigel Twist - Drums, Dave Sharp - Guitarist, and Eddie MacDonald - Bass. Their current LP is entitled "The Alarm - Strength.

The Cult. Punk or Hippie? Both actually. Ian Astbury was born in Birkenhead, England and moved to Canada in his teens. He is a past member of the Canadian Armed Forces and in 1977 he retired to form a group called the Southern Death Cult. In 1984 the band changed to its present name The Cult. Present hits include THE RAIN and SANCTUARY. Ian Astbury - Vocals, Billy Duffy - Guitarist, Jamie Stewart - Bass, and Les Warner - Drums.

Missing Persons. The band was formed in 1981 by ex - Frank Zappa members Terry Bozzio, on drums, and Warren Cucurullo, lead guitar. Present hits are WORDS, RIGHT NOW and currently I CAN'T THINK ABOUT DANCIN'. If you're wondering who appears in the plexiglass tops and stainless - steel bikinis? It's Terry's wife and ex-Playboy bunny Dale Bozzio.

The Velvet Underground. Formed in the 60's the band was not very influential in the music world until their demise in the 70's. From 1967-1970 they released four LPs with hits such as WHITE LIGHT/WHITE HEAT, SISTER RAY, HEROIN, ROCK N ROLL, and SWEET JANE. The band consisted of Lou Reed, John Cale, Maureen Tucker, Nico and Sterling Morrison. Lou Reed has gone solo in the last few years and his new LP is entitled MISTRIAL. He performed on the SUN CITY LP and toured with the Amnesty International Tour Dingo Boingo. Rick Elfman formed the group Mystic Knights of the Dingo Boingo back in 1972. When he quit the band to follow a separate career he left his brother in charge of the group. The name was cut down to Dingo Boingo and the hits started to pump out. The bands music has been featured on many movie soundtracks with the likes of FAST TIMES AT RIDGEMOUNT HIGH and WEIRD SCIENCE. Their recent soundtrack DEAD MANS PARTY comes from the hit movie BACK TO SCHOOL starring Rodney Dangerfield. Their new LP is also entitled DEAD MANS PARTY.
