## AT THE LIBRARY

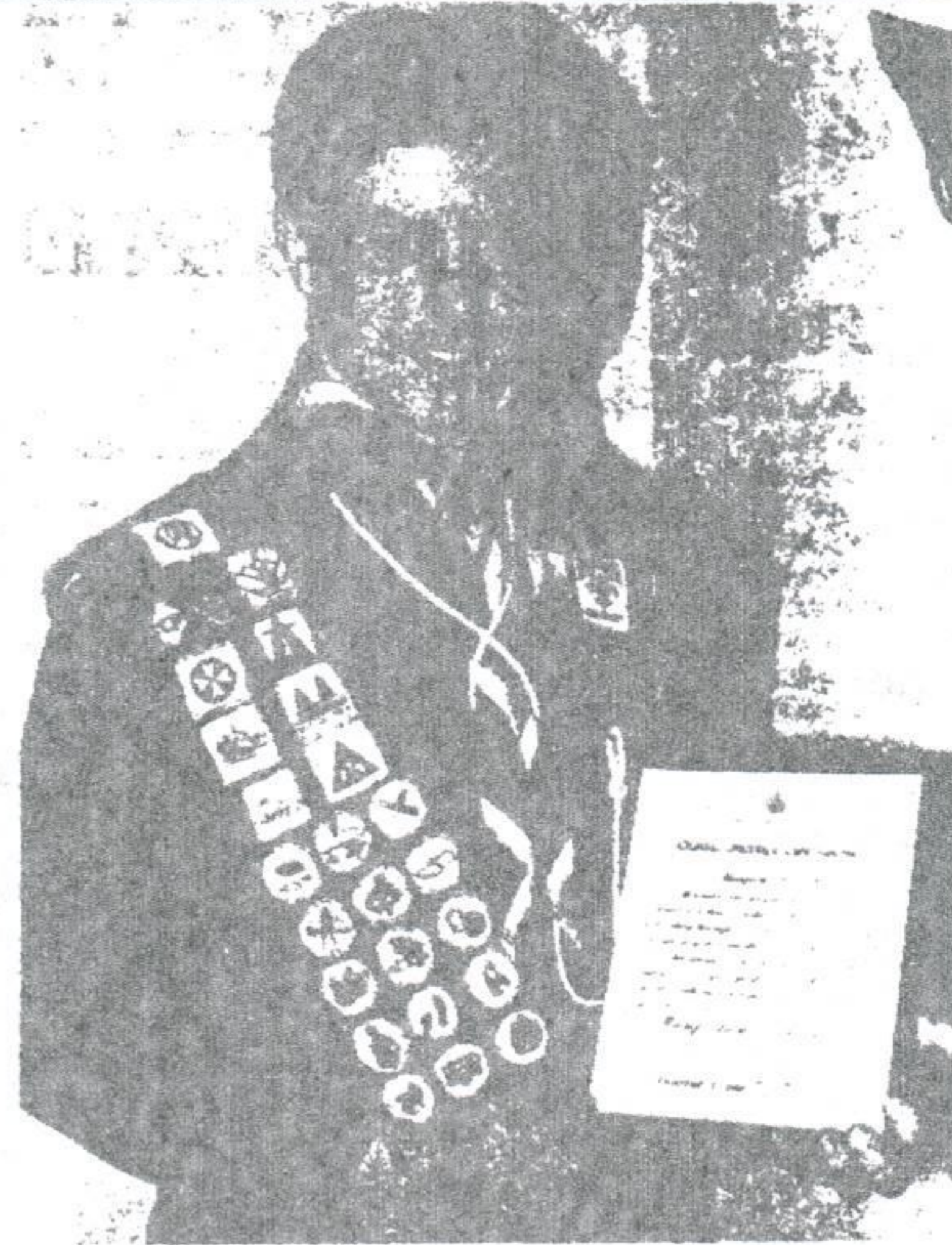


Hi again, from the Library:

# CFCCP News

## Canadian Forces Community College Program

It used to be that when people married, settled down and began to raise a family, they put their schoolbooks away and dedicated themselves to their careers, their family and in whatever time was left over, to relaxation from the effort required to cope with the first two.

The world is changing, though. The rate at which technological change is taking place is not just affecting the husband who finds himself taking more and more courses to stay ahead of his changing job. Outside the workplace he finds that he has to be well read on a variety of things if he is going to be an informed consumer of a myriad of new products vying for his attention. His old money management methods may no longer be effective because the ten thousand dollar nest egg he aims to put away now isn't likely to be ten thousand dollars by the time he wants to use it; thus he will have to think about learning something about RRSPs, RHOSPs, MURBs, etc. and may find that he needs a computer to stay ahead of the game. Both he and his wife ought to be monitoring what is going on in education (a revolution, really) so that they can make informed decisions on their children's future and even more than that, comprehend what their kids are talking about when they use terms like CAI, DUMB TERMINAL and DEBUGGING. And if retirement is staring the husband in the face or if his wife is thinking about re-entering the work force after an absence, both will have some catching up to do. In brief, more than ever before, it is necessary to keep pace with the world through education if life is to be rewarding and if retirement or "second career" years are to be fulfilling.

In metropolitan areas particularly, this awareness is reflected in record high enrolments in night schools; not only are people taking courses such as cake decorating, photography and woodworking, to name a few, but more and more are taking professional subjects to better cope with a changing job or to simply understand better what is going on around them. And many are taking computer courses so they can understand what their children are doing or simply because they don't want to be left behind as the computer increasingly becomes a household tool as ubiquitous as the frying pan.

In all of the above there is a message; maybe several. The most obvious though, is that Canadian Forces personnel and their dependents, being paid up members of the mainstream of Canadian society, are affected by the same things which touch the lives of all Canadians and are increasingly aware of the need to continue their education. It was in large part to satisfy this requirement that the Canadian Forces Community College Program was instituted. To help prepare service personnel for transition to civilian life at the end of their service careers, surely. But as well to provide a post-secondary educational system for them, offering on base many of the professional subjects which are being pursued by civilian contemporaries and other service personnel in community colleges across the country.

By the end of 1986 at least sixteen base learning centres will be in operation from Esquimalt to Baden. Some Canadian Forces students in Inuvik and Alert are taking subjects on their own, using the mails to communicate with their teaching masters in Seneca College, Toronto. This means that the opportunity for post-secondary education is not now restricted solely to those service members located in a community which is blessed with a community college. And as the CFCCP becomes a reality on more and more and more bases, more and more service personnel and their dependants will be able to pursue those studies which, in addition to being personally rewarding, will ensure that they don't end up in an educational backwater and aren't left behind by the world - or their children.

## EF 101 RETIREMENT

In December 1984 the CF101 Voodoo was retired from service, as an air defence interceptor, making way for the CF18. Since that time 414 Electronic Warfare (EW) Squadron has had the distinction of being the only squadron in the world still flying the F101 Voodoo aircraft. The Black Knight Squadron operates CF101006 a dual pilot trainer, and EF101067 the Electronic Warfare (EW) variant.

414 EW Sqn's primary role is to provide an Electronic Counter-measures (ECM) environment for the purpose of training Canada's land, sea, and air forces to operate in such a hostile atmosphere. To this end, the squadron operates the T33 aircraft equipped with ECM pods, the CC117 Falcon equipped with an internal ECM suite, and EF101067 (alias the "Electric Jet") equipped with an internal and external ECM capability.

The "Electric Jet" was the prototype for a USAF project to equip a number of F101s for the ECM training role formerly fulfilled by the EB57 Canberra which was retired in 1979. The prototype (tail no. 300) was equipped with a signal receiver, three barrage noise jammers, a deception jammer, a radar warning receiver, and the associated wiring and control boxes for external pods. This ECM suite provided the Voodoo with the ability to detect and electronically jam fire control radar signals. The project was dropped by the USAF after only six months of flying.

National Defence Headquarters undertook to lease the single Voodoo and in September 1982 the "Electric Jet" joined 414 EW Sqn. This new addition gave the squadron a high speed, high altitude, fighter capability. Between September 1982 and December 1984 the "Electric Jet" was employed in CF101 and other NORAD interceptor ECM training, and Maritime surface ship air warfare weapons crew training. As the CF18 replaced the CF101 in Canada the primary mission for the EF101 became CF18 ECM training.

Alas, all good things must come to an end. The EF101 will be returned to the USAF 31 March 1987. In keeping with the air force tradition of paying tribute to a departing warrior, the squadron is planning a farewell parade and flypast for 3 April 1987. As well, a committee has been formed to plan an all ranks social function on the weekend 3-5 April 1987 for those interested in, or affiliated with the EF101 operation. The proposed social events include a mixed TGIF at the respective messes on Friday and an all ranks dinner dance on Saturday night. Your support on this final Voodoo farewell is encouraged. # SO YOU LOVE AN ALCOHOLIC!!!

The first thing for you to acknowledge, believe, accept is that alcoholics suffer from a real sickness which affects all those who are close to him/her. Medical Associations the world over declare that the alcoholic suffers from an illness over which he/she has no control. It is not caused by weakness of will, immorality or a desire to hurt others. The understanding of this disease has overthrown ageold ideas based on superstition, ignorance and prejudice. The success of the new approach is evident by the thousands of recoveries in A.A., Al-Anon and Alateen. Once you have accepted the idea that alcoholism is a sickness from which compulsive drinkers and those who care about them can find release, you will have no reason to be ashamed of it, no reason to fear it.

The second step is to learn the facts - Wipe your mental slate clean of everything you think you know about alcoholism, then apply yourself to a learning program. Consult the A.A. group listed in the phone book, Al-Anon or Alateen, the Unit Drug Education Counsellor, the D.A.P. Co-ordinators, your clergyman or physician. Reading material is available at libraries, hospitals, etc.

Some Important "Don'ts":

- Don't treat the alcoholic like a child.
- Don't check up to see how much alcohol he/she is drinking.
- Don't search for hidden liquor.
- Don't pour liquor away - the alcoholic always Finds a way to get more.
- Don't nag about the drinking.
- Don't argue while he/she is under the influence of alcohol.
- Don't preach, reproach, scold or enter into quarrels.

If you bring yourself to avoid these things, you will be well on your way to a more comfortable frame of mind.

Alcoholics suffer from feelings of guilt beyond anything the non-alcoholic can imagine. Reminding him/her of failures, neglect of family, social errors is a wasted effort. The "if you loved me" approach is likewise futile. Remember that alcoholism is compulsive in nature and cannot be controlled by will power.

Equally useless are promises, coaxing, arguments and threats. A word about the latter: Don't threaten unless you are prepared to carry out that threat. Guard against a "Holler than thou" attitude - hostility and contempt cannot cure an illness and are unbecoming attitudes.

Sometimes a crisis can convince the alcoholic of the need for help - the loss of a job, an accident, an arrest. Steel yourself against coddling and over protectiveness. The crisis may be necessary to recovery. Do nothing to prevent the crisis - such as covering bad cheques, paying overdue bills, going to his/her boss with excuses. The suffering you are trying to ease by these actions may be the very thing needed to a realization of the seriousness of the situation - literally a blessing in disguise.

If and when the alcoholic asks for or seeks help, it is then your knowledge of alcoholism and your wiser attitude will pay off. Remember, it's the alcoholic who must be ready for help - whatever cause of action, your contact with Al-Anon or Alateen will see you through difficult times. Do not expect immediate recovery, the illness took a long time to develop, convalescence is a slow process, too. Do not be over-protective, recovering alcoholics have to deal with problems themselves. Guard against feelings of jealousy or resentment, try to be grateful when the alcoholic accepts treatment.

Don't take slips and setbacks seriously, if you feel mistakes have been made, learn from them then forget them. Let go of disappointments and setbacks and push forward. The way ahead is not always easy - everyone has been affected, everyone has to make changes, but you can find a life of rich rewards in a satisfying life for you and your loved ones.

In this month's issue of ROCK RAP, we'll take a look at two of the "younger" groups that are fast-making a name for themselves in the world of music today.

**HAYWIRE:** Paul MacAusland (vocals), Marvin Birt (guitars), Ron Switzer (bass), David Rashed (keyboards), and Sean Kilbride (drums). These five brilliant, and extremely successful, young men make up the dynamic group HAYWIRE.

Based in Charlottetown, PEI, this group of five friends formed what they hoped would be the best group in their town. As it turns out, they are one of the best groups in the nation today. The band's trip to success started in 1984 when they won first place in the Dartmouth's 0104 Homegrown Contest. One of the first place prizes was a chance to record a single but instead of doing only one song, they pooled their money and recorded a five song EP. The EP was released in June of '85 and sold over 5000 copies in the Maritimes alone!!

HAYWIRE signed with Attic Records after beating out 49 other bands in a Battle of the Bands in the summer of 1985.

They now have such hits as **HAD HAD BOY**, **STANDIN' IN LINE**, and **SHE'S NOT**.

**JERMAINE STEWART.** Jermaine is originally from the United States but has adopted Britain and, it is from this little island that he has launched his musical career.

Jermaine was born in Columbus, Ohio, on September 7th (the year is a well kept secret) and did most of his growing up in Chicago. His "passion" for music and dance was fuelled by his singing in church every Sunday and dancing in a school group called **THE SOUL TRAIN KICKS**.

Jermaine packed up and left Chicago to move to L.A. after he had lived there for a month. He was one of the first and most prominent dancers on Dick Griffey's **SOUL TRAIN**. He occasionally travelled around the country singing backup for such notaries as Millie Jackson, Tavares, The Temptations, and Gladys Knight and The Pips.

Dick Griffey originated the group **SHALAMAR** by inviting Jermaine's dancing partners, Jeffrey Daniels and Jody Wattley to join up. It was not long after this that Jeffrey and Jody asked Jermaine to help out with backing vocals and dancing. He agreed and toured with **SHALAMAR** for three years.

Jermaine's debut single and album, **THE WORD IS OUT**, soared into Canada's Top 10 and a short time later, made the USA's Top 40. As we can see now, Jermaine Stewart's career is off to a big start with his new album, **FRANTIC ROMANTIC**, and chart topping single, **WE DON'T HAVE TO TAKE OUR CLOTHES OFF (TO HAVE A GOOD TIME)**.

# All About Purchasing a Home

## Choosing the Right Home

When you've made the decision to buy a home and are starting to put together the down payment, it's time to make a checklist of what you want in your home.

**Type of Home:** Do you prefer a single-family detached house, a semi-detached or duplex, a townhouse, an apartment, a mobile home or condominium? Do you prefer a new home or an older home?

**Ownership:** Do you want to own the home and land? Do you prefer condominium ownership, where you own the unit in which you live and share in the common elements, such as hallways, elevators and perhaps the land? Do you like the idea of co-operative ownership where you own a share in the co-operative corporation which owns the land and buildings?

**Location:** What kind of neighbourhood do you prefer—downtown, suburban, older or newer? Do you need to be close to schools, public transportation, libraries, shopping areas, recreational facilities, your place of work, your religious and/or social centres? Are police and fire protection available? Do you want a strictly residential neighbourhood? What level of traffic noise are you willing to accept?

Is there industrial development nearby and, if so, are you prepared to live with it? Do you want a well-settled neighbourhood that is unlikely to change? For example, are there plans to build high-rise apartments nearby and does it matter to you? Does the zoning protect property values?

**Interior:** How big must your home be? How many bedrooms and bathrooms do you need? Does it have to be air conditioned? Do you need an eat-in kitchen? Do you want a basement for storage or a work area?

What property conditions are you willing to accept? Are you handy with tools and willing to make repairs? (If not, avoid properties listed as "handyman's special" or "renovator's dream").

Are you willing to upgrade the wiring, add insulation, replace the roof, or renovate to make the floor plan more suitable for you needs? Or do you want a house that is ready to live in?

How much will these repairs, renovations or redecorations cost? An independent building in-

spector could help. For example, be sure that the wiring in an older home is up to standard and get an estimate of costs if it isn't.

Make a list of your preferences and check it against available housing in your area. Consider the options before making a decision on what to buy.

## Your first home -- what about the down payment?

Before you begin looking for the home of your dreams, think about that down payment.

Most lenders will ask for a minimum down payment of 10% of the purchase price of the home you have in mind.

You must also consider the financing you will be able to obtain which will depend on the monthly payment you can carry. Interest rates will be a major factor in determining your monthly payment.

If you find yourself still short, you may try to find another, less expensive way of financing. Alternatively, you might lower your expectations or even postpone your purchase for a year or two.

There will be other expenses as well. These include legal fees, moving expenses, possibly additional furniture or appliances and so forth. Add these costs to the total of the down payment and this figure will represent what you should have in the form of cash in hand before making a commitment to buy a house.

If you've been thinking for some time about buying a home, you probably have put some savings aside already. If you're just starting to think about it, you

should begin a systematic savings plan. Check with your financial institution for up-to-date information on the best interest bearing accounts to suit you.

Consider setting aside 10% of your net income every month. Put it in a high interest savings account. You can have your financial institution set up an automatic transfer from the account where you deposit your pay cheque so that every month that 10% is put away and starts earning interest.

Look into government programs designed to assist home buyers and be sure to contact the nearest regional office of Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, the federal government agency charged with administration of the National Housing Act. This is a good source of information on government-insured loans and other matters affecting the home owner.

Once you have assessed your needs, decided on a price range and figured out when you will have your down payment ready, you can actually start looking at properties for sale.

# All About Purchasing a Home

## Buying Your First Home - What Can You Afford?

Before you begin to look for the home of your dreams, take a realistic look at the price you can afford.

One way is to use the annual income rule of thumb. To establish the price you can afford, multiply your gross (before tax) annual income by 2.5. Include assured income only, such as your wage, salary or secure investment income. If your spouse (or other co-applicant) is working, add his or her assured income as well.

For example, together you bring in a gross annual income of \$38,000. The price you can reasonably consider as a general guide only is up to \$95,000 ( $\$38,000 \times 2.5$ ).

Another general rule of thumb is the monthly mortgage payment. The mortgage(s) you assume must cover the difference between your down payment and the purchase price. A general rule for the monthly mortgage pay-

ment is in the range of 25 to 30 percent of your gross monthly income. Using the \$38,000 gross income example, this indicates a maximum monthly payment of \$800 to \$950.

Now take a close look at your current budget. Are you putting aside savings? Do you have other major debts such as a car loan or alimony? How about food, clothing, transportation, entertainment and so forth? Deduct what you are now spending from your take-home pay.

Expenses in your new home will include heating, electricity, water, minor repairs and special supplies. For older homes, major repairs are more likely. Condominiums have monthly maintenance fees. Here's another rule of thumb: Calculate 3 percent of the value of the home and divide by 12. This will give you an idea of your monthly expenses.

So you add up what it will cost

to live in your new home and deduct that from what you have left of your take home pay after allowing for continuing expenses. What you are left with is what you can reasonably expect to have available to carry as a monthly mortgage payment. Compare that with the monthly mortgage you got by using a rule of thumb. Depending on your financial circumstances, you may be able to afford more or less than the income multiplier suggests.

There are many other factors to consider when buying your first home. Getting as much information as possible will make you better able to make the best choice to suit your own circumstances.

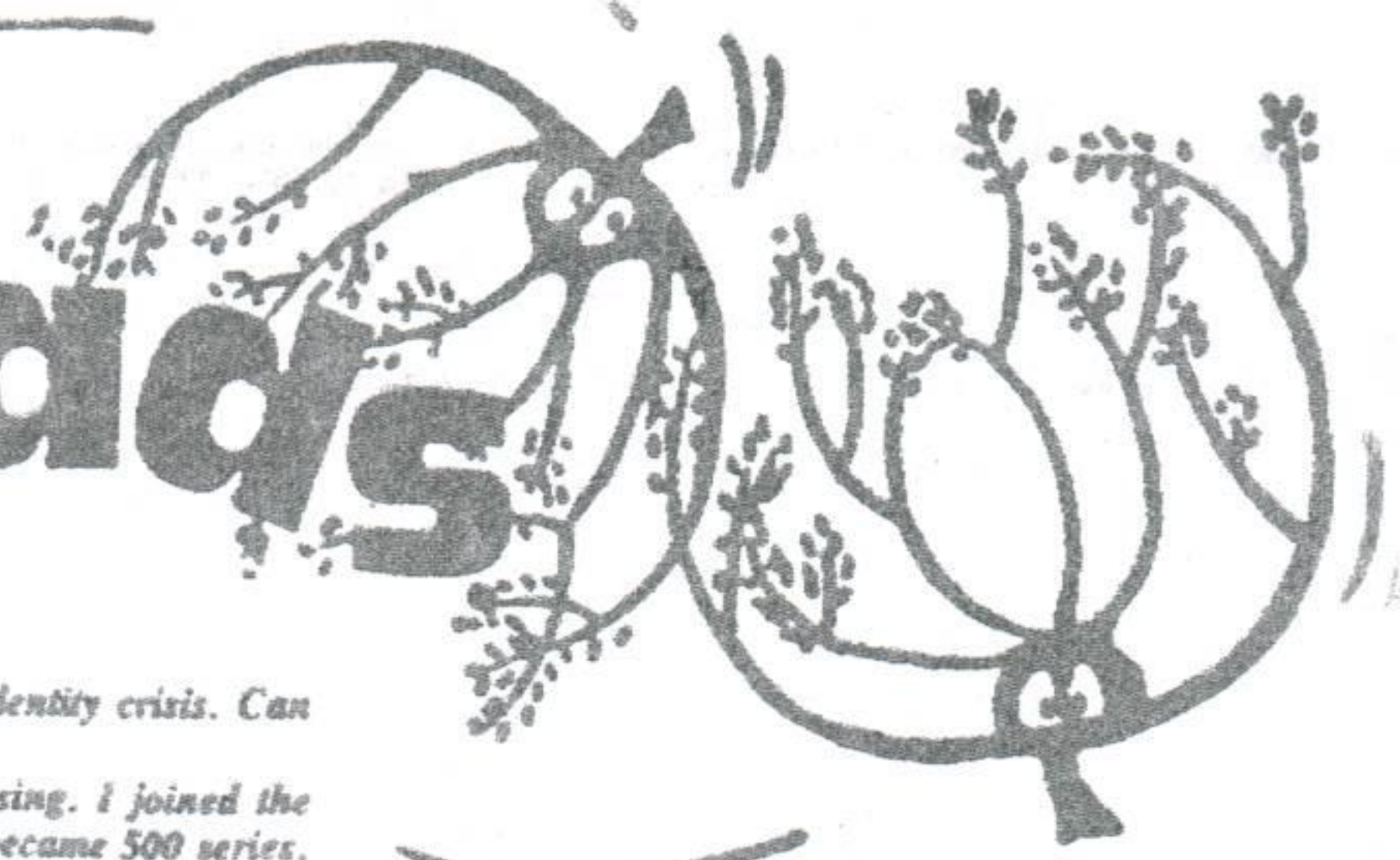

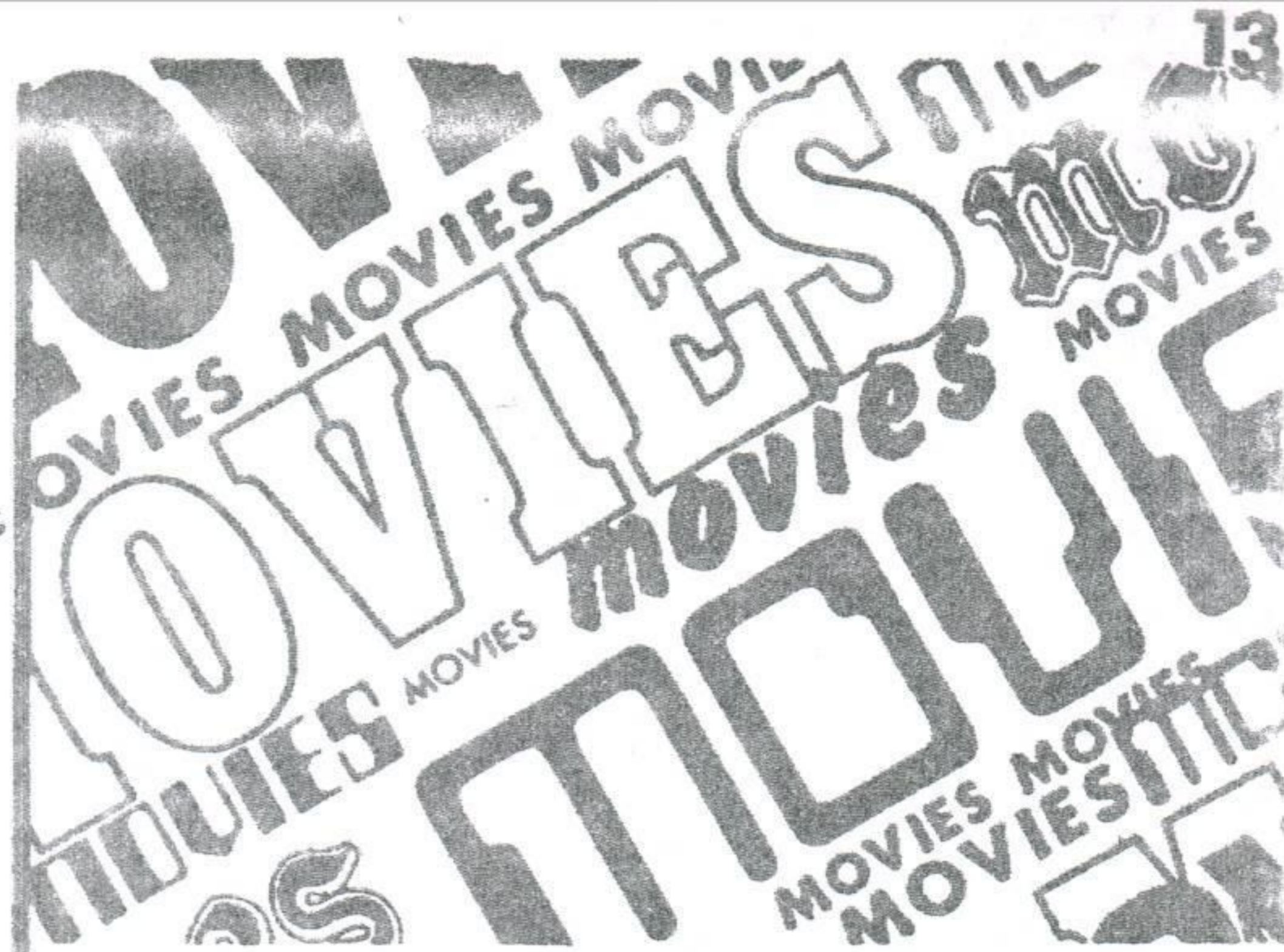
