## CFS ALSASK RAIDERS BEATEN OUT IN SEMI-FINALS

The CFS Alsask Raiders Hockey Team travelled to CFB Suffield to participate in the small base hockey regionals 21-25 Jan '87. The Station team was comprised of net minder Al DeFrancesco; the starting line was (team captain) Terry Morris playing right wing, Gerry Schock centering the line, and playing the left wing position was Remi Gilbert. Mark Mahon and Brian Charlebois provided the defensive strength. The second line was lead by centerman Vern Wyatt, right wing Ed Hawley and left wing Guy Cloutre, the defensive strength was provided by Bruce Young and Mike Inglis. The third line was comprised of centerman Rick Danjou, right wing Dave Lee and left wing Joel Brassard. The teams coaches were (player coach) Gerry Schock, Rick Philips, Arnie Cowan and Herb Roebuck.

Tuesday night was spent arranging accommodation and getting the rules and regulations of the tournament, and setting up the next few days game draw. The CFS Alsask Raiders played on the "B" side of the draw which was scheduled for the second game on Wednesday morning against CFB Suffield. The team came out fired

up and in the first few minutes of the game stunned the CFB Suffield team with five goals. The team lead by Team Captain, Terry Morris' four goals continued to rally and completed the match with an impressive 12-7 win. The team was given a long rest as they weren't scheduled to play their second game until Thursday evening. The second game saw them meet CFS Dana where they never trailed in the game and were able to pull off a victory of 7-5 over the Dana team.

The only game played on Friday by our team saw them pull an impressive 6-5 victory over the CFS Falconbridge team in the dieing seconds of the third period. This almost assured the team a play-off spot but they still had to play CFS Gypsumville. The coach had worked out the odds and the team could only lose by an eight goal margin. Saturday afternoon's game against CFS Gypsumville proved to be too much of a handful as the team was plagued with injuries to Gerry Schock and Guy Cloutre and a lot of bruises and pains. Although the team gave up a 7-2 decision to CFS Gypsumville they still managed to place second on the "B" side. This meant that they would have to meet 1st place team on the "A" side which was CFB Penhold.

Although the team came out fired up and got the first goal against CFB Penhold, the Penhold team proved to be too much. With the team playing their second game in less than three hours, it ran out of gas as they were beaten by Penhold in the Semi-Finals by 4-2.

The other semi final game saw CFS Gypsumville defeat CFS Sioux Lookout. On Sunday, the finals were played with the CFB

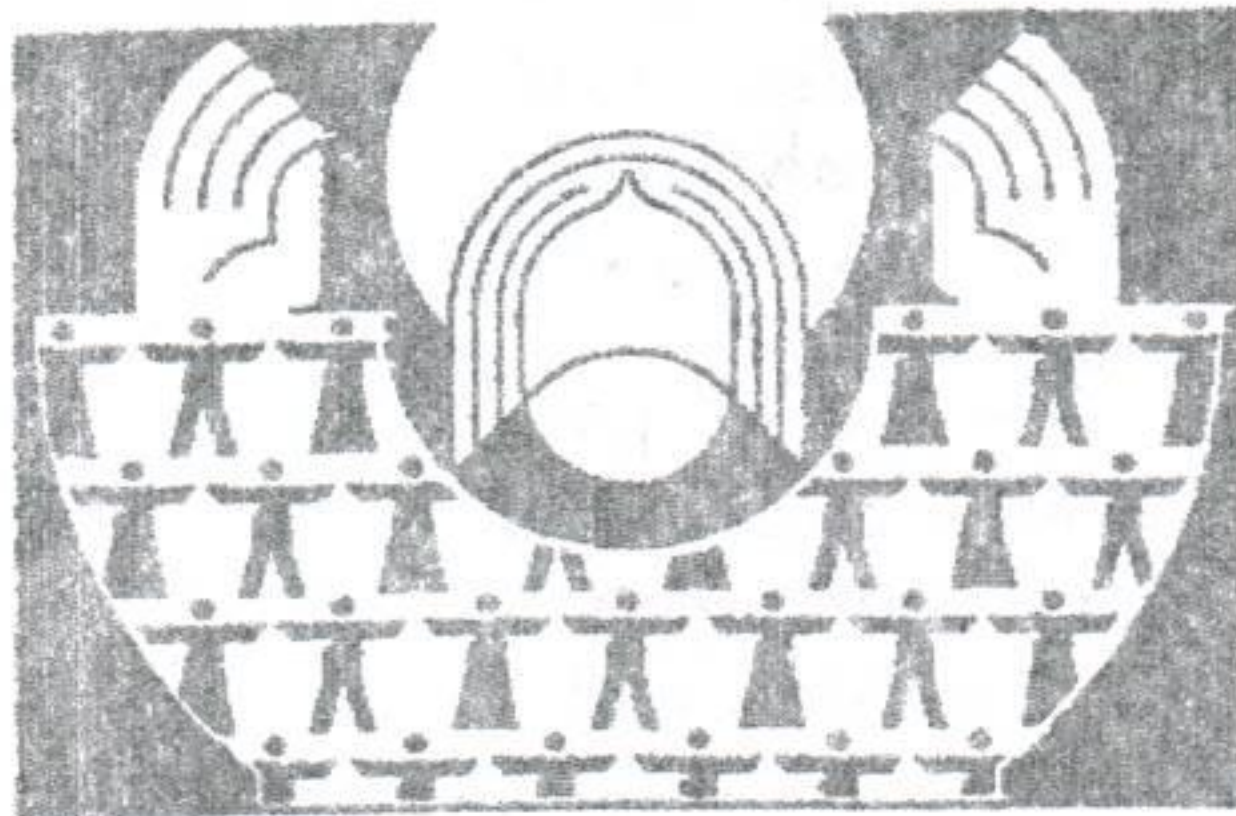
The young child works away with small, odd-shaped pieces of cardboard, slowly fitting and joining the ragged, disjointed chunks together, piece intersecting with piece, until a larger pattern begins to appear. As the final part of the jigsaw puzzle is inserted, a complete picture emerges and the fragments have become, in their unity, a thing of beauty.

The gospel proclaims that in Christ, God has done, is doing, the same marvelous re-creating with his people. Unity and beauty are restored amidst brokenness. Wholeness is given within that which is incomplete, and the true picture of the beauty God intended us to have, emerges from out of puzzling disarray.

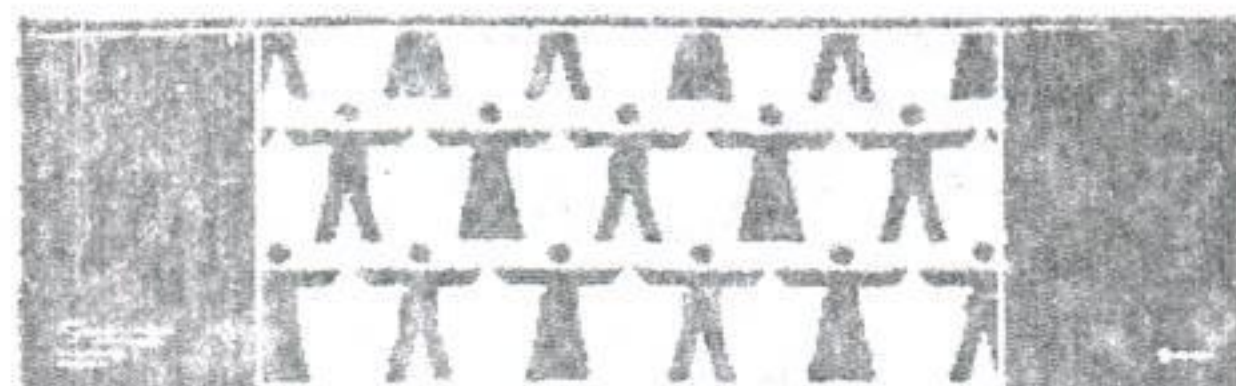
St. Paul called this process our reconciliation in Christ. And just as the child takes the broken fragments and makes with them a complete picture, so in Christ Jesus, broken, hurting, incomplete men and women are, by grace, transformed individually and corporately to become something new and beautiful for God. Paul said we become a new creation, and it is true!

The experience of the Corinthian Christians is a notable example. Ancient prejudice and constant divisiveness were overcome by the grace, peace and fellowship found in Christ. Greek and Jew, slave and free, rich and poor were moulded together in Christ to become a special people, the Church. The experience is the same today. The Church, despite all its puzzling diversity and brokenness, still finds in the Risen Lord the essential picture of our mission and calling, our faith and hope that binds us together.

In Christ, we are always being redeemed from our incompleteness. Wholeness is the gift our Lord offers. In turn, the Church and individual Christians make the new creation that is emerging a living reality. We are challenged to share the Good News as ambassadors of the reconciliation found in Christ. And we are called to put together, to heal, to restore, to mend wherever division and alienation exist, so that in our communities we may be agents of transformation. God's new creation is always emerging.

Greetings!

In the excitement of the New Year, I missed the last Tumbleweed deadline, so have not wished some of you a Happy New Year yet. Happy New Year!

I have wanted to tell you how great it was to see so many of you and your families out for the Christmas Eve service downtown, especially after the dismal turn-out at the Chapel for Communion the Sunday before Christmas. It is reassuring to know that, in spite of the prevailing attitude toward faith and religion on the station (i.e. "We get filled with the spirit on Thursday and Friday"), the faint flicker of the flame of faith is still visible now and again. It would be great to see that flame burn brighter and more often, but....

Some of you may have seen the Shirley MacLaine special "Out on a Limb" last week. Marge and I saw the second part. It was a rather weird show. However, the idea of a personal quest to answer the question that Ms. MacLaine was asking, "Where did we come from, where do we fit in, who or what is God and what happens after we die?" is not so crazy. These are questions about a part of ourselves that we tend to ignore. Sometimes I think the way we use our minds or souls is like playing PacMan on a super-computer. There is so much more that we can do.

I am not suggesting that we all run out to sit in a natural hot tub in the Andes, as Ms. MacLaine did, but perhaps we could do a little investigating closer to home. How about a little reading, a little meditation and maybe even some prayer? For reading, the Bible would be a good start, using a new translation that's understandable. If you don't have one, I can help. By meditation, I don't mean sitting on a rug naked and making strange sounds (but if you're already into that...). I mean taking some time alone, a short time each day if possible, to relax and clear your mind of all the daily clutter. I have a couple of good guides to meditation for a more detailed discussion of techniques. Finally prayer; just express your thoughts and feelings to God as you would to someone outside yourself. It doesn't have to be words, or sentences, or in any formal language. Just get by yourself and let thoughts and concerns flow. Remember, like a diet or an exercise program, results aren't overnight, so keep at it.

One final thought. Just imagine what you would look like if your spiritual shape was as obvious to everyone as your physical shape. Think about it!

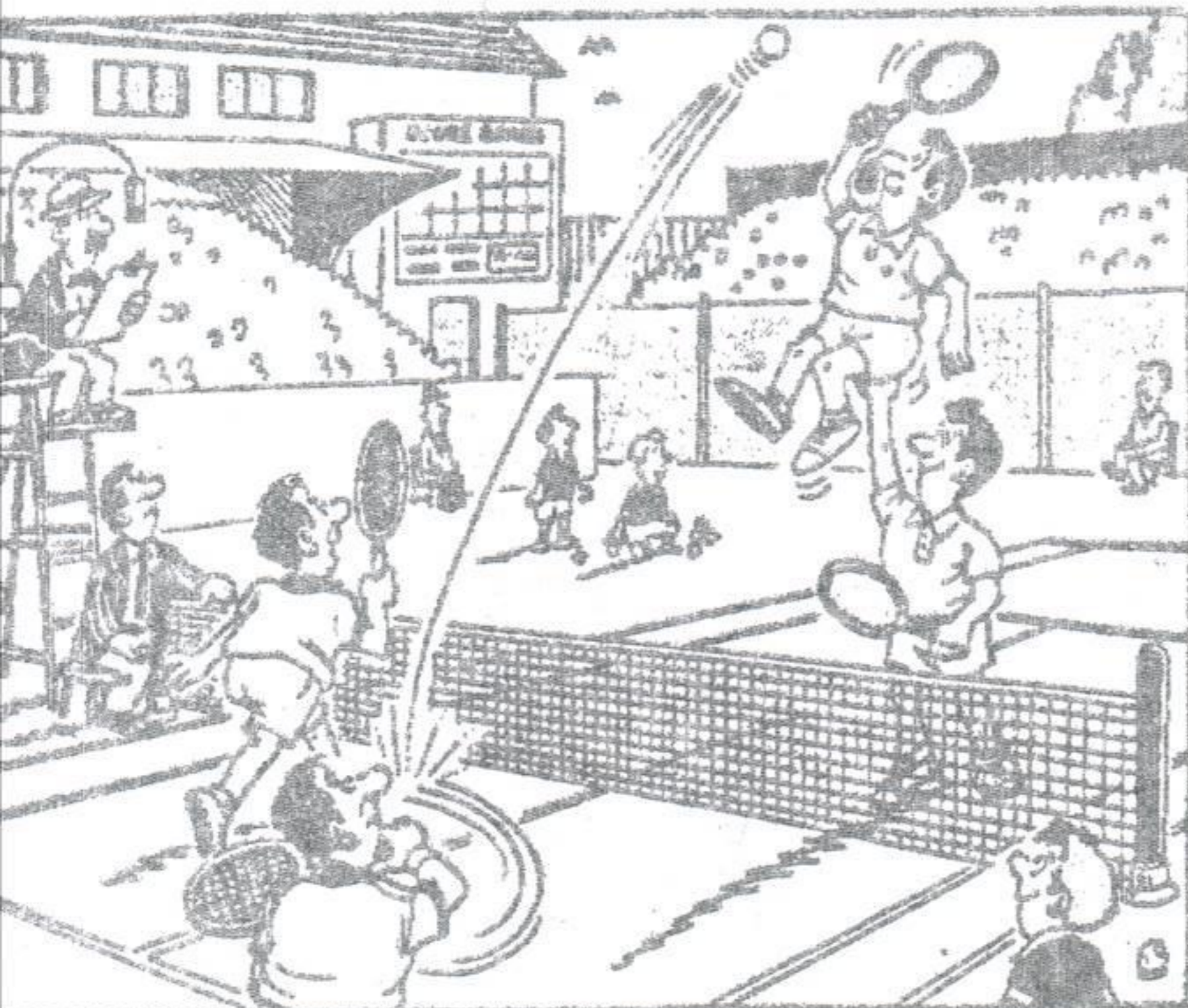

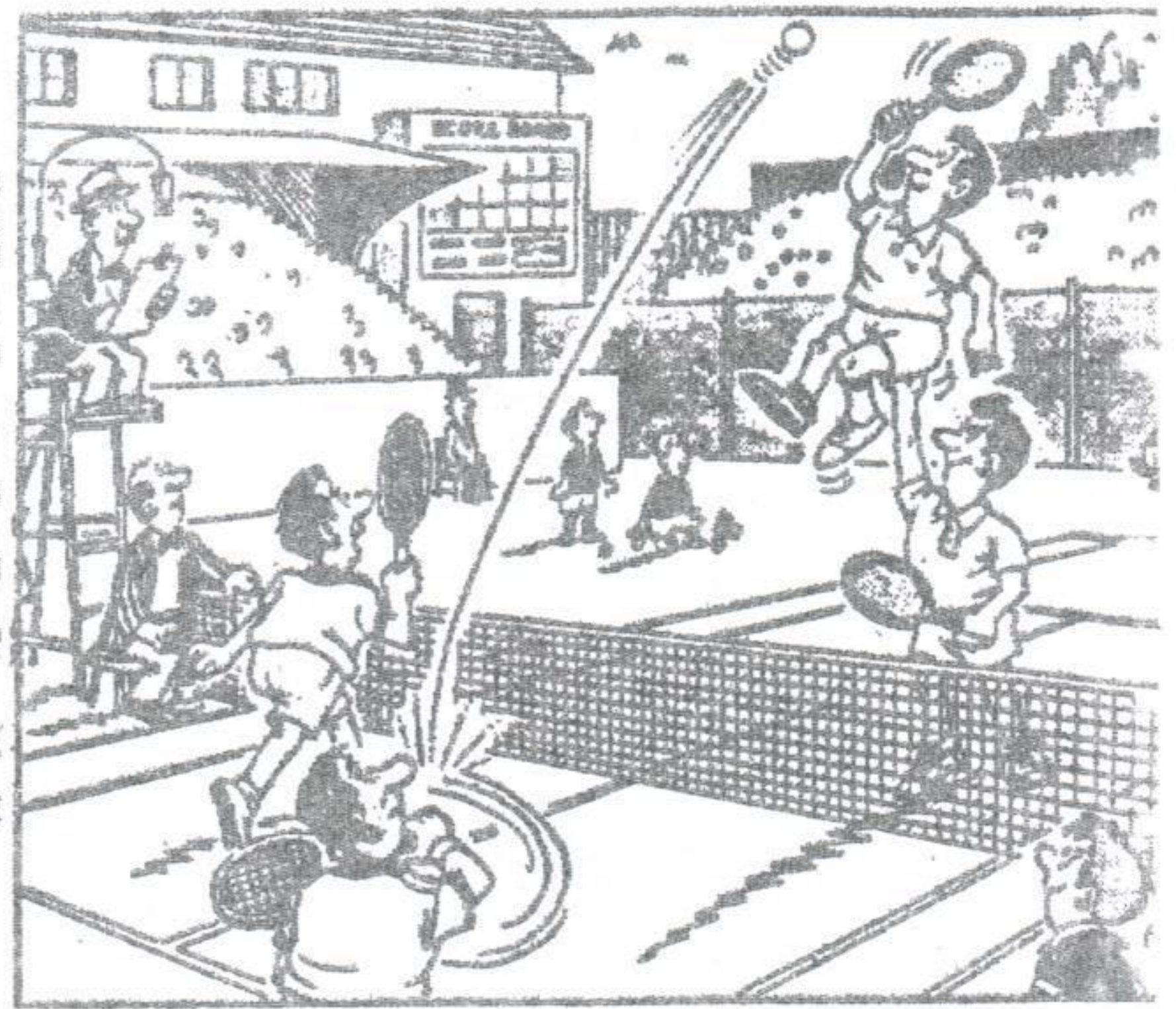

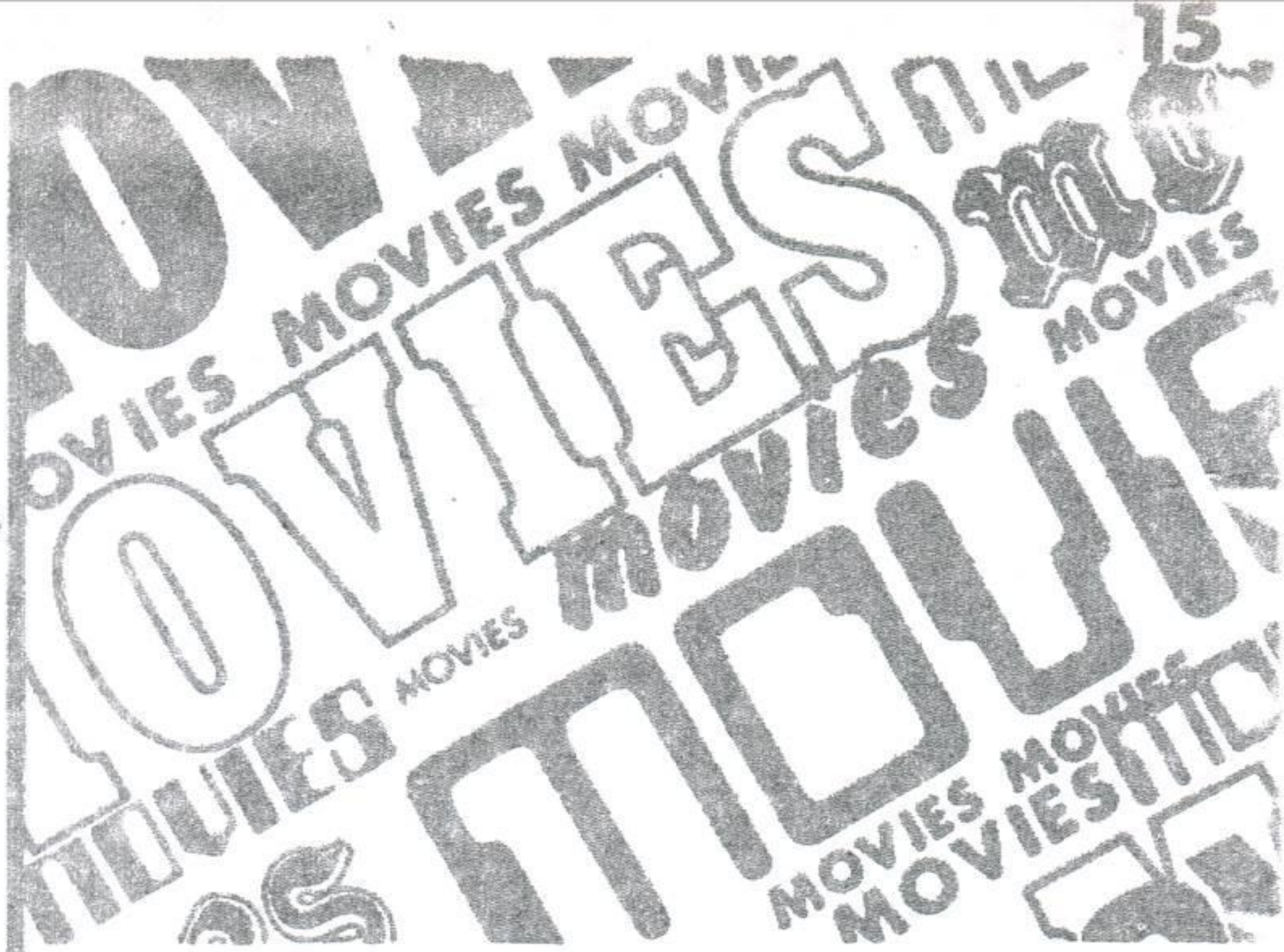
All movies shown in the Parish Hall are rated by the Canadian Forces Movie Guild. Admission to these movies is regulated as follows:
